Thursday, July 16, Manchester's big day, is fast approaching.

Gene Bentschneider, Chicken Broil General Chairman, says plans are well underway to assure another record Broil.

Bentschneider also proudly announces a special treat is in store for our 12,000 guests this year. Through the cooperation and efforts of Dr. Eugene Thompson the United States Marine Band, 45 strong, from Parris Island, South Carolina, are making their first appearance in the Midwest at Manchester's Broil. This famous musical group will entertain during the afternoon and evening hours.

Over 550 volunteers have received their assignments to the more than thirty working committees. They will be meeting for a pre Broil session on Thursday, July 9 at the American Legion Hall to finalize plans for this year's 28th annual Broil.

Wendell Reinhart has again arranged the popular shuttle service. Eight horse

drawn wagons and buggies, driven by their owners, will provide free transportation to our visitors from the High School parking lot to the Broil site at the athletic field and return.

All volunteers now have advance sale tickets available for purchase. Tickets may also be purchased at Gill's Gambles Store-the Broil Headquarters, at the banks and most business establishments in Manchester as well as at many banks and stores in nearby communities. The advance sale ticket price is \$3.50. The price at the gate on July 16 will be \$4.00. Serving will be from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Girl's Track 1981 School Records

The 1981 Girl's Track of Manchester finished a very successful year. The girls finished 3rd in the L.C.A.A. for 3rd straight year.

The Lady Dutchmen really felt the loss of Sr. Co-Captain Gretchen Platt, who because of injuries, ran only in the L.C.A.A. league meet and the Regionals. Gretchen had two outstanding performances in the L.C.A.A. in which she ran on two winning relays.

Our dual meet record was 5-4 and we did well at the three various relays. We also scored our first point ever in the State Finals as sophomore Kari Agin finished 6th in the 200 m. hurdles. Kari also won the 220 yd. hurdles at the Washtenaw County meet of Champs, in record time of :29.4 sec. On Saturday, June 6, Kari ran the 220 yd. hurdles in Detroit Free Press Girls Invitational and finished 5th. The Free Press meet is open to all the top girls in the State regardless of school size.

There are 15 different events during a track meet and in 1981 the Dutch girls set school records for 10 different events.

To All Concerned -

Now that the Manchester School District millage proposal has been soundly defeated by the taxpayer, let's hope that Dr. Thompson and the dedicated school board members have learned a lesson worth remembering. Even though much time and effort is donated to their sometimes thankless jobs, occasionally mistakes are made. Additional school millage cannot be obtained by adding it to a renewal millage under one total millage proposal. These tactics have been attempted in the past, as well as this time, and have failed. Dr. Thompson stated that a renewal millage proposal vote might be held later this summer. We all know that the millage renewal will have to meet with the voters approval, or Manchester Schools will not be able to open their doors this fall.

There are no concrete figures as to the cost of running the polls a second time each year, or the added expense of transportation to and from the voting place, or the additional time involved. It has to be assumed that these needless expenses, as usual, hit the taxpayer where it hurts, in the pocketbook.

Let's hope, that in the future, enough foresight is seen, to separate a renewal millage and any additional millage under individual proposals on the same ballot, so that the happy taxpayer may vote the way he or she wishes the first time. Having to

return to the polls to vote on issues which could have been resolved previously, is not to the liking of the voters, who pay the expenses.

Named To Albion Dean's List

Manchester Village Planning Commission

May 5, 1981

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Alber, Krauss, Tracy, Smith, and Bond. Also in attendance was Mr. Don Limpert.

The meeting was called to order at 7:35, by Ch. Hinkley. Minutes of the meeting of April 7 were read, corrected, and on the motion by Bond, seconded by Krauss, were approved.

In regard to the housing development proposed by Mr. Leo I. Stein, representing Manchester Village Apartments, Inc. with further reference to Semcoog (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments) case no. 153, it was decided to write a letter to Council President Schaffer, explaining the position of the Planning Commission, that no formal application has been received,

and therefore that no action can be taken. Copies of the letter to be sent to Mr. Stein; Mr. John M. Amberger, Deputy Executive Director of Semcoog; Mr. Robert O. McMahon, Manager of Housing and Community Development Programs (Semcoog); Mr. Robert L. Tetens, Associate Planner, Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission; and U.S.D.A. Farmers Home Administration.

Reference the previously considered problem of relocating Mr. Thomas Roberts' bus (motor home) parked in front of his place of business on Riverside Drive, it was decided to recommend to Council that the suggestion from Attorney Mark Gisting be accepted: essentially that the bus be moved to the side of the building, with or without a screening fence. Secretary Leeson was asked to write a letter to Council President Schaffer, appraising him of this decision, with copies of Mr. Gisting's communications.

It has been suggested that we consider rezoning a parcel of property within the area bounded by East Duncan St., Hibbard

St., City Road, and Morgan St., from Residential to some degree of Industrial District. It was the consensus of the Commission that to do so would be at odds with our long term goals, as well as with our present investigation of establishing an "Industrial Park" at a site presently outside the village boundaries. (See Minutes of April 7, 1981, meeting.) Secretary Leeson was asked to write a letter to Village Manager Zsenyuk, informing him of this opinion and the reasons and precedent for denial.

The Council has received a request from Laurin Leeson to upgrade and repair the extension of South Washington Street, between Territorial and Wager Streets, to accommodate emergency traffic, especially ambulance and fire department vehicles, in the event of temporary closure of the similar portion of South Macomb Street. On President Schaffer's request, Chairman Hinkley named Member Leeson to investigate ownership and/or dedication status of this property.

The Commission has been asked to assist in determining the exact permit under which the Back Door Party Store on Ann Arbor Street is operating: "Conditional Use", "Non-conforming", or "Conforming" per the Zoning Ordinance. Research of actions by both the Planning Commission and the Council, originally taken in accordance with the "old Ordinance", and later with the current Ordinance (adopted Nov. 6, 1975), indicate probable definition under provisions specified in Article 57.0 of the current Ordinance. Member Bond was asked to follow thru for a determination of present status of the permit.

It was announced that Ch. Hinkley and other members of the Commission are to meet with the Manchester Township Planning Commission on May 11, to review progress on our mutual concern of establishing an "Industrial Park" in the

area south and possibly east of the Hoover Universal, Inc. (Blowmolding Machinery Divis.) plant.

In order to expedite inter-action between the Planning Commission and the Council, it was moved by Smith that we change the day for our regular meetings from the first Tuesday of each month, to the second Tuesday following the first regular meeting of the Council, each month. The motion was seconded by Bond, and unanimously approved.

Mention was made that in accordance with the September 7, 1977, recommendation from the Village Council, the U.S. Postal Service is proceeding with an environmental assessment report on enlargement of the Manchester Post Office facilities at its present site.

It was moved by Bond, seconded by Krauss, that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:45 P.M.

Baseball and Softball
Little League - For Boys and Girls aged 10-12. 1981 season begins June 1 and runs through July 15. Games are played every Monday and Wednesday at Carr Park, Kirk Park and behind the High School. Game time 6:00 p.m.

4th, 5th, and 6th Grade Softball - For Girls in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. The 1981 season begins June 1 and runs to July 10th. Games are played every Monday and Wednesday at Klager Elementary. Game times are 6:00 p.m., 7:00 p.m., and 7:30 p.m.

Recreational Swimming - Every Monday, beginning June 15, provided we have at least 20 interested swimmers we travel to Bohn Pool in Adrian. This Olympic-sized pool features high and low diving boards, two basketball goals, two water slides, and much more. There are 6 lifeguards on duty at all times. You must wear a regulation swim suit, and hair that touches your shoulders requires a bathing cap. The cost is \$.65. A bus will leave from the tennis courts at 12:15 p.m. and return at approximately 3:15 p.m.

Swimming Lessons - There will be one 2-week session offered. This session begins Monday, June 29 and runs to Friday, July 10. This session is open to pre-beginners and beginners only. The cost is \$11.00. Certified Red Cross instructors will teach the course. You may register at school or by contacting Bart Bartels. You must pay when you register. The class size is limited to the first 40 students. A bus will leave every Monday-Friday at 8:15 a.m. and return to the tennis courts at approximately 10:45 a.m. during this session.

Roller Skating - Every Wednesday, beginning June 17, we will be going roller skating at the Adrian Skate-Arium. Buses will leave from the tennis courts at 12:30 p.m. and return at approximately 3:30 p.m. The cost is \$1.00 per person, which includes skate rental, and transportation.

Junior Playground - The junior recreation program is open to all children who will be 5 by December 1st up to those going into the 4th grade in the fall. The program will be run from 1:00-3:00 Monday through Friday, June 15-July 24. Room #113 in the Nellie Ackerson building will be used for indoor activities. There is no charge for attendance. Prices of field trips will vary. Children may come every day or when they want. Attendance is not taken. This year's program will consist of arts and crafts, outdoor games and activities, and field trips. Children do not have to attend playground to come on field trips. However, any child going on a field trip will need a permission slip signed by a parent. Younger brothers or sisters must be accompanied by a parent or babysitter. Field trips this year will include a parachute demonstration at the Tatum Airport, the Toledo Zoo, Stagecoach Stop and Prehistoric Forest in the Irish Hills. Board Of Education Sets New Millage Proposal

At a lengthy meeting on Monday, June 15, the Manchester Board of Education took action to hold a new millage election on August 10 or as soon as possible thereafter.

Noting that with available revenues the school district could operate for only approximately 6 weeks the Board moved to modify the original millage proposal.

Three propositions will be placed before the voters at the August election. The first of these will be a renewal of 17.78 mills for a two year period. This levy had previously been approved by the voters.

Noting that it has been five years since additional millage has been approved the Board also took action to place a proposition on the ballot which is intended to replace the severe losses in state reimbursement for transportation and to provide support for the maintenance program. Proposition number 2 will be for 1.5 mills for 1 year.

In an effort to reduce the budget by approximately 1 mill the Board took action to transfer the Pleasant Lake Education Program to Klager Elementary. The savings realized by this action are approximately \$50,000. In further action the Board reduced support for the athletic program by 50% or approximately \$30,000. In order to provide the necessary funds for athletics it was directed that a participation fee be instituted for all athletes.

A third millage proposition designed to provide funds for the reduced portion of the athletic program was included. This final proposition will be for .04 of a mill in order to support athletics.
