Board Of Education Sets New Millage Proposal

At a lengthy meeting on Monday, June 15, the Manchester Board of Education took action to hold a new millage election on August 10 or as soon as possible thereafter.

Noting that with available revenues the school district could operate for only approximately 6 weeks the Board moved to modify the original millage proposal.

Three propositions will be placed before the voters at the August election. The first of these will be a renewal of 17.78 mills for a two year period. This levy had previously been approved by the voters.

Noting that it has been five years since additional millage has been approved the Board also took action to place a proposition on the ballot which is intended to replace the severe losses in state reimbursement for transportation and to provide support for the maintenance program. Proposition number 2 will be for 1.5 mills for 1 year.

In an effort to reduce the budget by approximately 1 mill the Board took action to transfer the Pleasant Lake Education Program to Klager Elementary. The savings realized by this action are approximately \$50,000. In further action the Board reduced support for the athletic program by 50% or approximately \$30,000. In order to provide the necessary funds for athletics it was directed that a participation fee be instituted for all athletes.

A third millage proposition designed to provide funds for the reduced portion of the athletic program was included. This final proposition will be for .04 of a mill in order to support athletics.

We are very disturbed at the recent action taken by the Board of Education to close Pleasant Lake School. It was very annoying to many voters in the Manchester School District that the very important issue of closing Pleasant Lake School was not even on the agenda for the 6-15-81 school board meeting. Was it legal to bring a voting issue before the board without public notice? Many times it has been asked for the actual cost savings from the closing of the school. To date it has not been satisfactory shown to us.

A group of concerned citizens from the Pleasant Lake Area are considering taking action. Many of the "yes" votes in the previous election will now be "no" votes for the operating millage in the next election. In addition many people are considering holding their property taxes in an escrow account instead of paying them to the township treasurer. These actions are only being taken because we feel the Pleasant Lake Area is losing more than a school building - it is losing an important part of the community.

We would like the school board members to take a second and deeper look into this issue or possibly face a more serious problem.

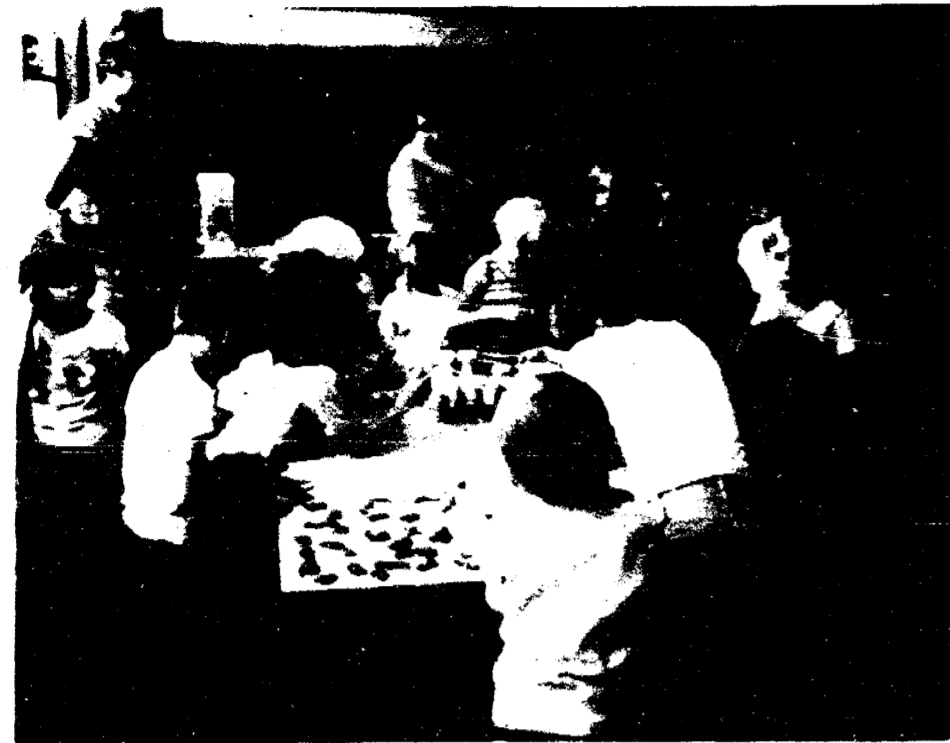

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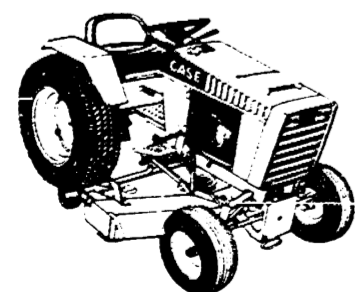

Persecution Of Baha'is In Iran Escalates

In the aftermath of the execution of seven of their fellow Baha'is last week, the Baha'i Community of Manchester has joined its National Spiritual Assembly in appealing to Dr. Kurt Waldheim, Secretary-General of the United Nations, to send a representative to Iran to investigate the condition of the persecuted Baha'i community and to take steps to alleviate the plight of its members.

At dawn on June 14 seven outstanding and respected members of the local Baha'i governing body of Hamadan, Iran faced a firing squad after having been imprisoned and tortured. Similar execution of Baha'i leaders have occurred in recent months in Tabriz, Tehran, Shiraz and Yazd.

In its message to the Secretary-General, the local Baha'i community said, "We are moved to bring to your attention the latest heart-rending incident in the continuing persecution of our co-religionists in Iran. We have noted with ever increasing concern the expansion of persecutions against our brethren. What began as denial of official recognition to the largest religious minority of Iran, progressed to the expropriation of Baha'i assets, denial of employment to Baha'is, desecration of Baha'i cemeteries, destruction of Baha'i homes, confiscation and demolition of Baha'i holy places and has culminated in the arrests and executions of scores of prominent Baha'is throughout Iran. Appeals to the Iranian authorities from Baha'is throughout the world for a cessation of these atrocities have met with no response."

The Baha'i National Assembly plaintively wrote, "We urgently appeal to you, Mr. Secretary-General, immediately to lend the full weight of your influence to arranging to send a special representative or a United Nations commission to Iran at the earliest possible moment to ascertain the condition of the Baha'is and to take

forthright measures to lift the oppression burdening this peace-loving, law-abiding people."

The Baha'i Faith originated in Iran in 1844 and has been opposed as a heresy ever since by the Moslem clergy. Meanwhile, the religion has developed a world-wide following with adherents in more than 100,000 localities around the world. The founder of the religion, Baha'ullah, was exiled from his native Iran because of His teachings, including the unity of the world's religions, the oneness of all the races of mankind, the equality of men and women, and the necessity of establishing a world government to ensure universal peace.

Local Amateur Radio Hams In Test

On the weekend of June 27-28 from 2 p.m. Saturday to 2 p.m. Sunday, members of the Chelsea Communications Club will participate in the 45th Annual American Radio Relay League Field Day emergency preparedness test.

On this weekend, thousands of Amateur Radio operators (hams) in the U.S. and Canada set up their stations in the open using only emergency power and portable antennas. They contact as many operators as possible in the 24-hour period. These tests are designed to help hams refine their operating skills so necessary during disasters and times of emergency when normal channels of communication are disrupted or unavailable.

The operation site this year for the Chelsea Radio Club is Park Lyndon, located 1 1/4 miles east of M-52 on North Territorial Road. Members of the club will be on hand to answer questions about equipment, procedures and the public service role that Amateur Radio plays in the community.

Field day is sponsored by the American Radio Relay League, a membership society of U.S. and Canadian Amateur Radio operators with headquarters in Newington, Connecticut.
