It would very likely be a non-illuminated sign; but if lighted, the source and placement of illumination would be in accordance with the Village Sign Regulations. They further stated that sign panels identical to the one on the drive-up facility would be placed in the exterior clock. They agreed that the bank will not modify the frame of the clock, nor alter any elements of the clock other than the panels formerly containing the Union Savings Bank name. They noted that the clock presently contains interior lighting and that this would be continued. It was moved by Walton, and seconded

Small fruiting bodies may be present on the needles in late fall or early spring and appear as black spots along the length of the needle surface. Needle cast is spread predominantly by the wind. For control, Bordeaux can be sprayed in early June and then three weeks later.

Recently, Diplodia tip blight was observed on blue spruce. This is extremely unusual as this disease most commonly attacks pines. The tips of the branches turn brown first and the disease usually starts on the lower part of the tree. Since this is not a common disease in spruce, it is especially important to get it accurately identified. Spraying now will not help, but Bordeaux applied in the spring as the buds swell, should be effective.

An insect problem that was common in spruce this year can be responsible for browning and dying of branches. This insect is known as the spruce gall aphid and forms pineapple-shaped galls an inch or less in length on the twigs. These galls can prevent twig growth and if enough of them are present can affect the entire tree. Careful examination of the tree for these greenish-yelloe, pincapple galls will help in positive identification. Spraying with Sevin or Diazinon in mid to late April or in early October should control the insect and prevent the problem from progressing.

Legislative Update

TOURISM BOOMING-Michigan now ranks sixth among the 50 states in attracting travelers, and is fourth in outdoor travel and recreation, according to the Governor's office. In addition, the travel industry accounted for a record \$5 billion in 1980, and every state dollar spent to promote travel generated \$37 for Michigan business and \$3 in state revenues. Better news is that 1981 is proving to be an even bigger year for tourism and recreational equipment.

PETITION DRIVES-Petition drives are underway for the November, 1982 ballot. One would shorten the legislative session to four months a year, another would equalize welfare benefits to those of surrounding states, and a third would allow the Governor to appoint judges and university governing boards.

FILM CAPITAL OF THE MIDWEST-Michigan has gained \$350,000 from film productions over the past three months. and is being promoted by a national film industry publication as a great place to shoot feature-length films. The prestigious trade publication Hollywood Reporter is devoting its entire September issue to articles on Michigan's diversity in location sites, its sophisticated facilities and equipment, its skilled labor force and its talented and willing citizen/extras.





As kindergarteners march off to school for the first time this fall, most of them can be sure of several things. They won't contract measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, or polio. And their hearing and vision problems, if any, will have been detected and attempts made to correct

Enforcing the school entry law guarantees that.

All children entering school for the first time, and transfer students from other school districts, must show proof of immunization against the seven childhood communicable diseases before they are admitted. In a few instances, they may have their final immunization within two months after school starts.

They also must have their vision and hearing tested, usually at their local health department, and proof of that examination and the findings must be presented at

The only exceptions to the school entry law are those children whose health would be jeopardized by immunization, or whose parents' beliefs are contrary to the concept of immunization.

Immunization should begin in infancy. At two, four, and 18 months and between four and five years of age, children should receive the DIP (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis) and polio immunizations. At six months they should have another DIP, and at about 15 months the measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) immunization.

In the not too distant past, children bore he discomfort and frequent afflictions caused by disease. Five percent of measles ases develop middle ear infections or pneumonia; one in every 1,000 cases develops encephalitis, and one in 3,000 results in permanent mental retardation.

Rubella, or German Measles, when it infects a woman in the early stages of pregnancy, has a 30 percent chance of causing a child to be born with congenital defects, such as blindness, and/or heart




