#### Special Meeting - July 21, 1981

A Special Meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was called to order at 7:34 p.m. by Chairman Hinkley. Members present: Hinkley, Kallewaard, Alber, Grossman, Leeson, Tracy, Walton, Smith. Member absent: Krauss. A quorum was present.

Tom Gallagher and Jack Zaborowski of National Bank of Jackson were present to submit the bank's application to place a 26" x 27" sign on the bank's drive-up facility, and to replace the Union Savings Bank name with the NBJ name on the 26" x 27" portions of the bank's exterior clock.

Gallagher and Zaborowski stated that the sign on the drive-up facility would be a wall-mounted sign, fixed on the north elevation between the door and the north-west corner of the building. It would display an oval "NBJ" logo in green and the words "National Bank of Jackson" in black on a white background. It would very likely be a non-illuminated sign; but if lighted, the source and placement of illumination would be in accordance with the Village Sign Regulations. They further stated that sign panels identical to the one on the drive-up facility would be placed in the exterior clock. They agreed that the bank will not modify the frame of the clock, nor alter any elements of the clock other than the panels formerly containing the Union Savings Bank name. They noted that the clock presently contains interior lighting and that this would be continued.

It was moved by Walton, and seconded by Leeson, that the Planning Commission recommend to Village Council that approval be given to the application of National Bank of Jackson to place a 26" x 27" wall-mounted sign on the bank's drive-up facility, and to replace the 26" x

27" panels of the bank's exterior clock with new panels displaying the National Bank of Jackson name, as described in these minutes. The motion was passed on a roll-call vote, with members voting as follows: Alber, yes; Grossman, abstain; Kallewaard, yes; Leeson, yes; Smith, yes; Tracy, yes; Walton, yes.

Members next considered the recommended revision of Article 25 of the Village Zoning Ordinance, relating to the placement of mobile homes within the Village. Kallewaard noted that the Planning Commission now has on file the full opinion of the Michigan Supreme Court in the case of Robinson Township v Knoll, which created the necessity of adopting a new mobile home ordinance.

Tracy requested that copies of the National Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974, which may be referred to in the new mobile home ordinance, be obtained for the Planning Commission and the Building Inspector.

Members reviewed and discussed a proposed mobile home ordinance recommended by the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and also a proposed mobile home ordinance recommended by the Michigan Mobile Home Commission. After discussion, it was moved by Smith, and seconded by Walton, to request the Village Attorney to prepare a new Article 25 of the Village Zoning Ordinance to be recommended for adoption by Village Council; the Article to include the items contained in the County's

### HIT or MISS By Farley

We wandered into the midst of a discussion about schools and teachers the other night which is a very pertinent subject this time of year. The general consensus of opinion was that local schools had, on the average, a very good crop of instructors particularly in the lower grades. This statement led to an animated discussion about how important to the future of our youngsters these instructors were.

Teaching the younger grades is generally considered to be a kind of apprenticeship or probationary period when it should be regarded as quite the opposite—the most challenging, difficult and important of teaching assignments, calling for the highest degree of emotional cooperation.

What is needed obviously, is the greatest degree of teaching skill and experience in the formative years of any pupil—not for the bright pupil who probably don't need it nor for the dull one who may be beyond comprehension but just for the average child who starts school with enthusiasm and a lot of curiosity but, in a few years turns out to be limp, listless and leaden eyed.

I can remember every detail, my kindergarten teacher—her appearance, her infectious smile, her blond hair which formed a halo for her always smiling and understanding face.

When you enter the classroom of a bunch of first graders and you will find a vivacious, curious and excited bunch of eager students who are greatly excited about this new adventure which has broken the bonds of their-to-date-home life. But by the time they enter the third and fourth grades you find an entirely different group. They are answering questions mechanically, their attitude is resigned as passive pupils while the more spirited are often in a rebellious mood.

You ponder and then ask yourself what has happened and then many times one finds out that this change has been caused by uninspired teaching by the young graduates who have not handled children and many of whom think that "teaching" is just the process of getting textbook material from there to the notebook. Syd Harris in a recent article on this subject says "our children must be stimulated, and not paralyzed".

In teaching anything—piano, swimming, a foreign language—we need better teachers—

## Wilderness Survival Skills For Adults

Washtenaw County older youths and adults who want to learn more about wilderness survival should take advantage of the opportunity to participate in the 4-H Challenge wilderness adventure training program.

Through the 4-H Challenge program, participants learn a variety of skills, including climbing and mountaineering, hiking and backpacking, canoeing, cross-country skiing, orienteering, and wilderness cooking and survival.

County residents interested in becoming part of the Challenge program and after training serving as group leaders for youth, should sign up now.

The 4-H Challenge leader orientation session will be held September 18-20, 1981 at Kettunen Center, the state's 4-H leader training facility near Cadillac.

Anyone wanting to become a Challenge leader must attend the orientation session and seven additional weekend intensive training sessions, pass a comprehensive written test and take a Red Cross first aid course.

Because Challenge leaders will be involved in high adventure situations and be responsible for youngsters participating in wilderness outings, they must be prepared. "After completing all the training, Challenge leaders become certified and are qualified to take youths on wilderness adventures."

To be eligible for the 4-H Challenge certification program, applicants must be at least 21 years old. Young people aged 16-20 years may become associate leaders, who must be accompanied by a certified adult leader when taking a group of youngsters on a Challenge outing. Training for both leader types is identical.

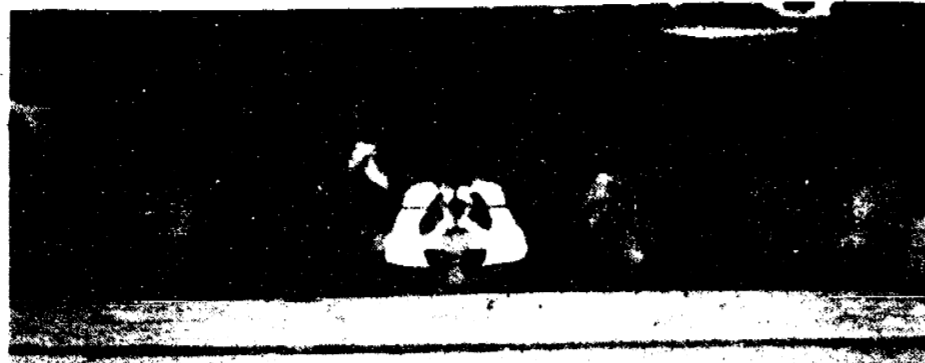


## Community Education

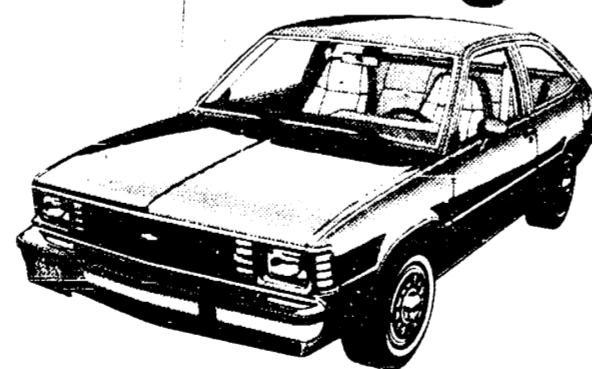
