\$145.00 per month. Currently this option is tied to full family health insurance premiums. In conjunction with this recommendation it was also recommended that the dental program provided to administrators be improved.

R. Mileage Reimbursement: Upon the recommendation of the Superintendent it was moved by Talcott to increase the mileage for use of staff automobiles to 20¢ per mile retroactive to July 1, 1981.

C. Board Retreat: By consensus the Board agreed to schedule an all day retreat on Saturday, January 23, 1982 for the purpose of discussing the Superintendent's evaluation, Board goals, and WLEA negotiations.

D. Principal's Objectives: Following discussion and general consensus that the objectives identified by the building administrators are appropriate it was moved by DuFresne to accept the management by objective plans.

A. Bus Driver's Contract: Upon recommendation of the Superintendent it was moved by DuFresne to ratify the Manchester Bus Driver's contract reflecting an 8.5% increase in the hourly salary to \$5.89 per hour.

B. Food Service Budget: After discussion it was moved by Little to adopt a budget for the Food Service Program for the current school year indicating expenditures of \$107,118 and revenues \$86,800.

C. PACE: The following resolution was submitted by Bunney, supported by DuFresne. It was approved unanimously.

News Of Good Things Growing

It wouldn't be Christmas at our house without Plum pudding. Some years, I've made as many as 30 for friends and neighbors, which indicates how easy it is to make this traditional Christmas dessert. Steaming puddings fill the kitchen with a wonderful spicy fragrance.

Plum puddings are a part of our English heritage, and the plum in the name really means raisin. When Jack Horner 'stuck in his thumb and pulled out a plum', what he got was a raisin.

Gourmet shops have a variety of handsome pudding molds. Or you can use baking powder or coffee cans - anything

with a tight fitting lid. If you haven't a lid, several thicknesses of foil securely tied with string will do. Most molds have clamps.

Here's my recipe for Plum pudding, which uses several of the Good Things Growing in Michigan.

Chop or grind two cups suet (ask your butcher for this). Add 1 cup light molasses or 1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups peeled, chopped apple, 1 cup seedless raisins and 1 cup currants. Stir in 1 cup cold water and 2 well-beaten eggs.

Sift 1 1/2 cups flour with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, and a half-teaspoon each of cloves and allspice. Stir in 1 1/2 cups fine dry bread crumbs. Add this mixture to the suet mixture and blend well. You may add one-quarter cup brandy if you like.

Grease the mold and sprinkle it with sugar. This is necessary to give your pudding a glossy surface. Fill with batter, not more than two-thirds full. Cover tightly.

Energy Programs Announced

Saving energy and creating new industry are the goals for a new Energy Technology Development Program announced today by Michigan Energy Administration Director Joann Neuroth. The program will provide financial assistance for development and demonstration of innovative energy devices or systems.

The Energy Administration intends to spend \$200,000 for projects which have the potential for commercial scale production. Individuals, non-profit organizations, state and local government agencies, and small businesses may apply for funding.

This innovative program responds to Michigan's priorities of reducing energy consumption and dollars spent on energy imports, as well as diversifying the state's economic base, Neuroth said.

Projects which are at the prototype development stage and which are technically feasible may be eligible to receive funds. Applicants must share a portion of the project's total cost.

Applications will be accepted in two categories:

1. Prototype development of energy conservation or energy storage devices or systems.
2. Demonstration of a prototype which illustrates a renewable resource or energy conservation technology.

Energy Technology Development Program applications are now available. The deadline for submitting applications is January 30, 1982.

your skills and learn about community resources.



The Christmas tree should not be placed near the fireplace, nor any other source of heat. Even placed in a container of water, the tree's needles become dry and could catch a spark from the fireplace.

Nor should the tree lights be left burning all night, nor when no one is at home. A defect in a frayed cord could start a fire that would flare out of control before anyone could restrain it.

No matter how festive the handrail looks decorated with entwined boughs, holly, and ribbon, it should be left clear as a safety device for people going up and down the stairs.

If the toy train is operated by line current, it could be dangerous. Does it bear the Underwriter's Laboratory label?

To have a Merry Christmas, heed the warnings. Remember to check the Christmas tree lights for frayed cords, and discard them if they're worn. Never use a regular string of lights on a metal tree, because of the danger of shock (use a spotlight). And do not use "angel hair" in combination with spray-on flocking snow to decorate the tree, because the combination

is highly combustible.

Place the tree near electrical outlets, so that extension cords don't snake across the room and under the rug, or connect with overloaded circuits. Gather the gift wrappings and plunge them into a rubbish bag instead of feeding them to the fireplace.

Set your holiday scene so that when the children waken, your Christmas will be memorable for the safety and pleasure it brings.

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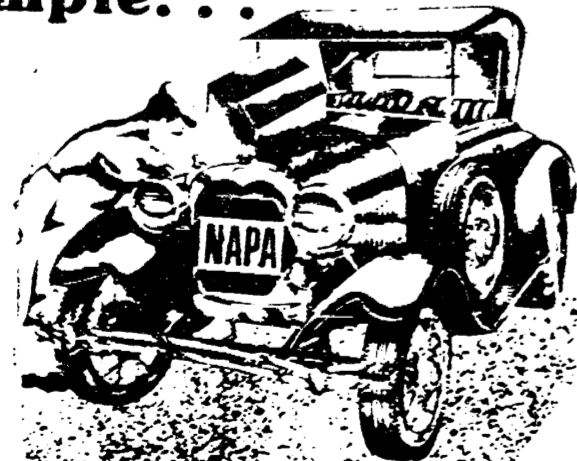

MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP Ordinance No. 22

AMENDMENT TO MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 9

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING ZONING DISTRICTS WITHIN MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Article III is amended by adding the following Section:

Section 3.10 Mobile Homes

A. Purpose - This section of the zoning ordinance is designed to establish regulations under which mobile homes may be used as single-family dwellings on lots outside of mobile home parks. It is hereby recognized that other forms of manufactured housing, commonly referred as prefabricated, modular, or sectional housing, among other names, are and have been permitted in Manchester Township, on individual lots, in a zoning district in which single-family dwellings are permitted, provided such units comply with the adopted building code and zoning requirements. This section intends to treat mobile homes in a similar fashion, while recognizing the unique features of their similar fashion, while recognizing the unique features of their construction. The regulations contained in this section are specifically designed to:

- 1. Insure compliance of mobile homes on individual lots with all zoning regulations applicable to all other single-family dwellings permitted in Manchester Township.
2. Insure compliance with the National Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974 (Title VI of PUB.

L. 93-383, 88 STAT. 700, 42 U.S.C. Section 5401, et seq) and all Township codes, in addition to the zoning ordinance, for the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare.

3. To be aesthetically compatible with other single-family dwellings in the community.

B. Standards and Requirements - A mobile home may be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot outside a mobile home park, if the following standards and requirements are met. These standards and requirements shall not apply to a mobile home located in a licensed mobile home park.

- 1. The lot shall be located in a zoning district which permits single-family dwellings.
2. The lot and the mobile home shall comply with all regulations of the zoning district in which located.
3. The mobile home shall meet all requirements for residential mobile units, as provided in the National Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974 (Title VI of PUB. L. 93-383, 88 STAT. 700, 42 U.S.C. 5401, et seq).
4. The mobile home shall be placed on a permanent foundation wall. The wall shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction Code and shall completely enclose the area under the mobile home. The area so enclosed shall not be less than the ground floor area of the mobile home. The mobile home shall be anchored and meet all State of Michigan requirements.
5. The wheels, tongue and hitch, or other towing appurtenances, shall be removed before attaching the mobile home to the foundation wall.
6. The mobile home shall be connected to public water and sanitary sewer lines, where available, according to Township standards and specifications, or to a well and septic tank approved by the County Health Department.
7. The mobile home shall be aesthetically compatible in design and appearance with conventional on-site constructed housing, and other types of approved manufactured housing. Compatibility shall be determined by the following

standards.

a. Exterior walls shall be finished with natural or simulate natural materials, common to single-family dwellings, such as but not limited to beveled siding, vertical siding, board and batten siding, or brick.

b. Front and rear or front and side exterior doors.

c. A roof drainage system which will collect, and concentrate the discharge of, roof drainage, and will avoid roof drainage along the sides of the dwelling.

8. A building permit shall be required for construction of the foundation wall, for placement of the mobile home on the lot, and for any addition to the mobile home. A building permit shall not be issued until a health permit has been issued by the County Health Department, where applicable and until a certificate of zoning compliance has been issued in accordance with Article XX, herein, and is in effect. The mobile home shall not be occupied until a certificate of occupancy has been issued as provided in Article XX, herein and is in effect. Any addition to a mobile home shall meet all requirements of the Michigan State Construction (stick built). If the addition is constructed by the mobile home manufacturer, then it shall meet the standards in Subsection 3 above.

9. The mobile home, prior to any additions, shall have a minimum floor area of 1,000 square feet, a minimum exterior width of 24 feet for at least one side elevation, and a minimum floor-to-ceiling height of 7.5 feet. Expanso rooms are considered additions for the purpose of this ordinance.

10. Not more than one mobile home shall be used as a single-family dwelling on a lot, nor shall a mobile home be placed on any lot on which another single-family dwelling is located. A mobile home shall not be used as an accessory building in any residential district.

11. A mobile home shall not be removed from a foundation until a permit therefore has been issued by the building official, in accordance with the Michigan State Construction Code.

12. Outdoor storage shall be prohibited.

Section 2. That Article XVIII is amended by adding the following Section:

Section 18.11 - Single-Family Dwelling Floor Area
All single-family dwellings constructed or erected in Manchester Township shall have a minimum floor area of one thousand (1,000) square feet and a minimum exterior width of 24 feet for at least one side elevation.

Section 3. That Section 4.03 - G, 5.03 - K, 6.03 - G and 7.03 - F are amended by deletion of the language therein and substituting the following therefore:

"Temporary occupancy of a mobile home other than permitted under Section 3.10 of this Ordinance."

Section 4. That Section 2.02 is amended by deletion of the language therein and substituting the following therefore:

MOBILE HOME: A structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without permanent foundation, when connected to the required utilities, and includes plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems contained in the structure. Mobile home does not include a recreational vehicle.

Section 5. That Section 2.02 is amended by adding the following definition thereto:

RECREATIONAL VEHICLE: A vehicle primarily designed and used as a temporary living quarters for recreational, camping or travel purposes, including a vehicle having its own motor power or a vehicle mounted on or drawn by another vehicle.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its publication.

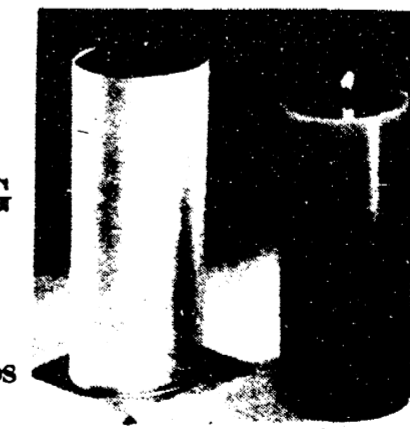

Portable Kerosene Heaters: Use With Extreme Caution

Portable Kerosene heaters can be efficient units for providing temporary heat in chilled, well ventilated areas. But they should not be used as a substitute for conventional heating systems for several hours at a time, particularly in weather-tightened homes. Used improperly, kerosene heaters can turn into killers, primarily because of carbon monoxide accumulation.
 Although the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) denied a petition to ban these heaters as unsafe, they have been banned by 11 states (not including Michigan) for residential use. While these units are not banned in

"Cross-country and downhill skiing and other winter sports activities require sports enthusiasts to get in shape before beginning these strenuous activities," stated Walter Zeiler, Auto Club's MemberLife manager. "Lack of proper preparation could cause injuries severe enough to halt a person's winter sports participation. "Conditioning the muscles used in a particular sport is the best way to avoid injuries and work toward peak performance," Zeiler said. Auto Club recommends the following to prepare for both types of skiing and other winter activities: * Push-ups for arms and shoulders. * Sit-ups and side jumps for the waist and abdomen. * Leg lunges and squats for buttocks. * Toe lifts for calves and ankles. * Squats and side jumps for thighs. "Warm-up exercises are essential to relax muscles which naturally tense in cold weather," explained Zeiler. "Tensed muscles mean greater risk of injury, especially during the first few minutes of activity, and a lowered level of skill. Experts recommend a few minutes of mild, large-muscle activities gradually increasing in intensity before strenuous workouts. Muscle stretching also will help increase limberness and flexibility. Stretches should be part of both warm-ups and cool-downs after sports activities."

It's Flu Season - Should You Be Vaccinated?

Do you need a flu shot? It's flu season again, and people at "high risk" should check with their doctors or local health department about a vaccine against influenza. Dr. Paul Kvale, a member of the American Lung Association of Michigan's State Board and president of the Michigan Thoracic Society (American Lung Association of Michigan's medical advisory group), says that vaccination against the

flu is a strongly recommended annual preventive measure for the elderly and persons with chronic heart, lung or kidney disease.

"These people stand an increased chance of complications following an attack of the flu because they are much more susceptible to bacterial pneumonia or other fatal secondary infections. The Christmas Seal people hope that they will protect themselves through vaccination," Dr. Kvale explained. The vaccine is 70 to 90% effective, but not enough people in the high risk category take advantage of it.

The vaccination is effective for about a year. This fact, plus the annual appearance of different strains of influenza virus, mean that people need revaccination every year.

If you get a flu shot, make sure it's the new 1981-82 serum. Influenza, or flu, can range from a mild upper respiratory infection to severe pneumonia and death. The disease strikes a large portion of the population every year, even without the presence of an epidemic. Its incidence is highest in the five to nine and 25 to 35 age groups. But people in what Dr. Kvale called the "high risk group" are often so weakened by the flu that other infections can easily attack. The most common complication is bacterial pneumonia, a disease that kills thousands each year. Viral pneumonia, encephalitis, kidney failure, and other serious diseases can also occur.

Anyone who contacts influenza is urged to keep away from infants, the elderly and the sick. If the symptoms persist or return after a week or so of rest and proper treatment, patients are advised to get in touch with their doctors.

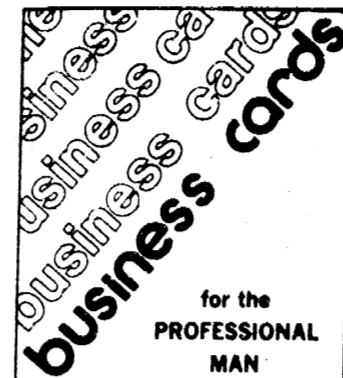

Tom Harris, Volunteer Co-Chairman of the Chapter's Service to Military Families and Veterans Committee says, "Recently the President of the United States signed Public Law 97-37, known as the "Former Prisoner of War Benefits Act of 1981, expanding VA benefits for many thousands of POWs, particularly for certain disabilities resulting from malnutrition. The number reached to date is small compared to the total number known to have been POWs during one or more periods of declared war or armed conflict. We are asking former POWs to call their county Red Cross office, 971-5300, by early January, for further information." Legislation mandates that a special advisory committee will be established to address the concerns of the affected group and the Congress has asked for a report to both Houses of the number of POWs reached.

As usual I don't seem to realize that Christmas is "upon us" until just a few days before then and I sat here and remembered Christmases past. I remember, for instance, one when I was reminded several times each day that if I wasn't good I would get nothing for Christmas and once I remember that my father told me to "straighten up or all that I would get would be a lump of coal". This exhortation had some effect when I was reminded of it day after day for several weeks before that holiday but I never did get the lump of coal. At today's prices several lumps of coal might not be a bad gift after all.

I always went to bed rather early, not unwillingly, and lay there in the dark listening to the silence after hanging my stockings on the back of a chair near the oase burner hard coal heating stove. Can you remember silence that you could hear? We don't have much of that kind any more, there's always some sort of noise. Nowadays there are so many kinds of noise. I laid awake the other night and listened-although we are supposed to be out here in the boondocks-in a silent area-to oodles of sounds, to trucks on the highway, to planes tearing overhead, punctuated now and then with the snort of a motorcycle and the faint noise from a neighbor's TV. There was some sort of noise at all times. I guess we have gotten used to some kind of noise at all times. Silence is something we know very little about.

After trying valiantly to stay awake we finally fell asleep awaking early Christmas morning to run downstairs to see what Santa had left and found that my stockings -two of 'em-filled with hard candy and candy canes which we never saw any other time than during the holidays together with mixed nuts and topped with a huge Valencia orange which we also seldom saw except at Christmas time.

On the floor this year there was a simple spring operated game and a cast iron ice wagon complete with cast iron horse. Do any of you remember ice wagons or cast iron horses or ice boxes?

In a nearby corner of the room stood a small Christmas tree decorated with strings of popcorn hanging on threads, which we had been busy fixing for some time, together with quite a collection of blown glass ornaments which we carefully packed away each year, and a couple of dozen colored candles in metal holders clipped to the tree. These furnished the lights for the tree. They were lit only for short periods-such as when we had company or during the Christmas dinner when the entire family was gathered around it exchanging their gifts, or for short periods in the evening when someone was there to watch the tree, for they were a definite fire hazard and each year there were several tales of house fires being started from candles and trees. However during the time the tree was lighted we sat in raptured silence enjoying-to us at least-its stunning beauty.

Each day we played with our ice wagon and steed, pulling it about on a string. In fact we played with this toy all during the spring and summer.
