It's Flu Season - Should You Be Vaccinated?

Do you need a flu shot? It's flu season again, and people at "high risk" should check with their doctors or local health department about a vaccine against influenza. Dr. Paul Kvale, a member of the American Lung Association of Michigan's State Board and president of the Michigan Thoracic Society (American Lung Association of Michigan's medical advisory group), says that vaccination against the

flu is a strongly recommended annual preventive measure for the elderly and persons with chronic heart, lung or kidney disease.

"These people stand an increased chance of complications following an attack of the flu because they are much more susceptible to bacterial pneumonia or other fatal secondary infections. The Christmas Seal people hope that they will protect themselves through vaccination," Dr. Kvale explained. The vaccine is 70 to 90% effective, but not enough people in the high risk category take advantage of it.

The vaccination is effective for about a year. This fact, plus the annual appearance of different strains of influenza virus, mean that people need revaccination every year.

If you get a flu shot, make sure it's the new 1981-82 serum. Influenza, or flu, can range from a mild upper respiratory infection to severe pneumonia and death. The disease strikes a large portion of the population every year, even without the presence of an epidemic. Its incidence is highest in the five to nine and 25 to 35 age groups. But people in what Dr. Kvale called the "high risk group" are often so weakened by the flu that other infections can easily attack. The most common complication is bacterial pneumonia, a disease that kills thousands each year. Viral pneumonia, encephalitis, kidney failure, and other serious diseases can also occur.

Anyone who contacts influenza is urged to keep away from infants, the elderly and the sick. If the symptoms persist or return after a week or so of rest and proper treatment, patients are advised to get in touch with their doctors.

Red Cross Looking

Washtenaw County Chapter, American Red Cross, is assisting the Veterans Administration in locating former Prisoners of War of all eras as soon as possible. Tom Harris, Volunteer Co-Chairman of the Chapter's Service to Military Families and Veterans Committee says, "Recently the President of the United States signed Public Law 97-37, known as the "Former Prisoner of War Benefits Act of 1981, expanding VA benefits for many thousands of POWs, particularly for certain disabilities resulting from malnutrition. The number reached to date is small compared to the total number known to have been POWs during one or more periods of declared war or armed conflict. We are asking former POWs to call their county Red Cross office, 971-5300, by early January, for further information." Legislation mandates that a special advisory committee will be established to address the concerns of the affected group and the Congress has asked for a report to both Houses of the number of POWs reached.

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A new law effective January 1, 1982 permits all employees to start an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) whether they have a company plan or not.

Manchester Village Planning Commission

November 10, 1981

The Regular Meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was called to order by Chairman Hinkley at 7:33 p.m. Members present: Hinkley, Kallewaard, Alber, Smith, Leeson, Tracy, Walton, Grossman, Kraus. Members absent: none.

A quorum was present.

The minutes of the Regular Meeting of October 13 were read and approved on a motion by Leeson, seconded by Walton.

In regard to the business property at 320 Riverside Drive, it was noted that Thomas Roberts, property owner, had previously asserted to the Planning Commission that the freestanding sign in front of the building would be removed. Since the sign is still standing at this date, the Secretary was authorized to write to Mr. Roberts concerning its removal.

Leeson reported on the Commission's project of cross-referencing past and present Village street names. The listing is in process and will be presented for the Commission's preliminary consideration at the December Regular Meeting.

Smith reported on preparation of the new Village Zoning Map. It will be presented to the Commission at the December Regular Meeting.

Hinkley reported on the question of the extension of South Washington Street to the south of Territorial Street. It is the Commission's determination, based on all available authority, that South Washington Street ends at Territorial. Access to residences south of Territorial is by means of a farm lane which is still privately owned; no street has been dedicated.

Hinkley reported that a property owner at 424 Territorial Street has erected a storage building directly on the adjoining property line and extending onto the Village right-of-way. Zoning Inspector Knaus has red-tagged the structure and the matter has been referred to the Village Attorney for legal action, since the structure in its present location is in violation of the Zoning Ordinance.

In regard to the medical office property at 515 West Main Street, Hinkley reported that the property owner has adhered to the approved site plan and therefore there

will be no action by the Planning Commission at the present time.

The Secretary read a letter to Mr. Patrick Sheridan of the FHA regarding the Manchester Village Apartments, Inc. No reply having been received, the Secretary was authorized to contact Mr. Sheridan again, by telephone.

Hinkley also reported that the amendments to the Zoning Ordinance recommended for adoption by Village Council, have received first-reading approval by Council. A Public Hearing will be scheduled before the Planning Commission on this matter.

The Commission reviewed the progress of construction at Pinnacle Engineering, 617 City Road. The Secretary was authorized to write to Building and Zoning Inspector Knaus, detailing the items that must be completed before a Certificate of Occupancy can be granted. Walton will contact Gene Smith of Pinnacle to arrange a meeting with Alber and Hinkley, so that approval can be granted on architectural details of the front facade, roof line and building materials.

The Commission extended thanks to Tom and Dave Walton, and all the individuals who worked with them in the recent construction of ball diamonds and play areas at Kirk Park.

In regard to the proposed Industrial Park, the Secretary was authorized to contact the Industrial Development Division of the University of Michigan Institute of Science and Technology regarding a series of industrial development seminars. Alber expressed an interest in attending one or more of these seminars if the Commission determines that they offer a practical benefit to the development of an Industrial Park in the Village.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:21 p.m. Mary Kallewaard, Secretary

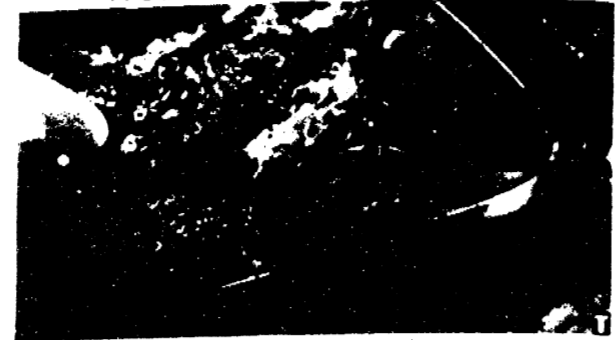

A CUT ABOVE THE ORDINARY



Something as simple as sauerkraut can turn plain pork chops into a creative casserole.

SAUERKRAUT AND PORK CHOP CASSEROLE

- 4 thick slices bacon
- 4 pork chops
- 3 1/2 cups Silver Floss sauerkraut, drained
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 1/2 cups beer

Sauté bacon, remove from skillet and brown chops lightly in bacon fat. Grease a 2 to 2 1/2 quart shallow casserole or deep baking dish and lay in strips of bacon. Drain sauerkraut and fork over top of bacon. Slice onion in rather thick slices and lay over sauerkraut. Sprinkle with pepper. Place pork chops on top of sauerkraut and push into mixture a bit. Sprinkle chops lightly with salt. Pour beer around chops in casserole and bake in 350 oven for 45 minutes to an hour. Or cook on top of stove, layering the ingredients into a kettle. Cover and simmer for 45 minutes.

HOLIDAY NUTRITION

In Elizabethan times the holiday table was spoken of as the "groaning board", laden with foods that had been frosted, glazed, dipped, garnished, and otherwise embellished from their natural states.

Now it's we who eat the festive food who groan. We are so conscious of calories and excess weight that holiday foods evoke conflicting emotions of delight at taste treats and guilt at adding weight to our rarely too-slim bodies.

Some people prepare for holiday eating by eliminating high calorie desserts and snacks before the festive season begins. They modify the size of their meals, and follow the tried and true recommendations for nutritional eating.

They eat the required two or three ounces of meat and poultry; one egg; a cup of dried beans, peas, or lentils; or four tablespoons of peanut butter daily for proteins, fats, minerals, and B vitamins.

Depending upon their age, they drink two to four cups of milk daily, or choose

yogurt, cheddar or cottage cheese from the milk group for calcium, phosphorus, protein, vitamin A, and riboflavin.

Four servings a day of fruits and vegetables for vitamins, minerals, and roughage; and three or four servings daily of bread, cereals or pasta for starch, bulk, proteins, vitamins and minerals.

In this way they observe the rules for eating from the four basic groups of milk, fruit/vegetable, meat, and bread/cereal.


Each of the basic foods serves a vital purpose. Proteins produce the essential amino acids for body cells' growth and support. Fats are a primary source of energy, and support the vital organs such as the kidneys. Carbohydrates provide energy and support our activity and growth, and cellulose provides bulk. The minerals help to build bones and teeth, and aid the vital functions of nerves and muscles. Vitamins are essential for the proper utilization of food and the healthy functioning of the body.

Of course, there's water, without which we could not live.

If many people condition themselves for an active vacation, why not slim down before the holiday season? Then when the holiday treats tempt you at every turn, you can enjoy them. After the first of the year you can return to your more wholesome diet, but for now, you won't groan at the sight of the "groaning board".

Good Things Growing Register Now For Genealogy Class

Christmas baking is an annual ritual which always turns into a nostalgia trip for me. I bet it's the same for many of you.

My "never-fail" divinity recipe never fails, thanks to the lovely lady who shared it with me many years ago. The "blond brownie" recipe is from a friend far away in Iowa; candied nutmeats from a good friend and former employee now living at Coldwater lake. And so it goes - each recipe brings to mind fond memories of friends, far and near, to warm the heart at Christmas.

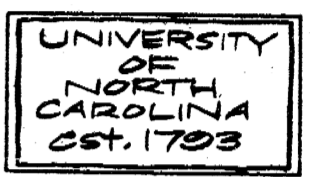
Here's an unusual Christmas recipe using Good Things Growing in Michigan, from a friend in East Lansing who shares my enthusiasm for cooking with Michigan products. Our state is the nation's leading producer of red tart cherries, so feel free to make these Cherry Triangles any time. They disappear in a hurry.

First, drain 2 number 308 cans of water-packed red tart cherries, reserving 1 cup of liquid. Set aside.

Combine 3/4 cup sugar, 5 tablespoons cornstarch and 1/4 teaspoon salt in a saucepan. Add reserved cherry juice and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in 1 tablespoon butter, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon almond extract, the drained cherries and a few drops of red food coloring. Cool.

Sald 2/3 cup milk and cool to lukewarm, then add to 1 package yeast. Cut 1 cup butter and 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, add the milk mixture and 4 slightly beaten egg yolks. Turn out on floured surface and knead 10 times. Divide dough in half. Roll one half until large enough for an 11 1/2 by 17 1/2 inch jelly roll pan. Spread cooled cherry sauce over dough in pan. Roll out second half of dough to fit, covering dough and sauce in the pan. Pinch edges of two layers together.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF BRIDGEWATER HAS LATELY RECEIVED A LOT OF CRITICISM ABOUT OUR NEW ORDINANCE. WE WOULD LIKE TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO EXPLAIN FOUR OF OUR PRIMARY DECISIONS:

1. We were working with a 20 year old ordinance that had no plan, contained many inconsistencies with state law, and had no legal strength to protect the Township against zoning problems. We felt it necessary to spend tax dollars to rewrite the ordinance, knowing it would not provide any direct service to the people, but would provide us all with long term protection.
2. There have been comments stating we are considering sub-divisions and are going to do away with agricultural properties. In the very ordinance we are talking about, page 1 under Purpose, we state protection and promoting of agricultural properties ahead of any other zoning class. However, when a tax-paying owner makes inquiries regarding subdivisions, he has a right to, and we will give him, equal consideration. We feel Bridgewater Township is not ready to get in a position where we would need sewers nor the extra taxes that they would require.
3. The biggest disagreement is minimum lot size, two acres or ten acres. Ten acres does promote open space and keeps low density housing, but rapidly eats up agricultural properties. Two acres will only take small amounts out of agriculture and, if handled properly, will keep low density. If large parcels are divided into several ten acre lots, you are left with seven and eight acre remnants, for example, Kies Road. Today's profitable farming lies in large equipment so that one man can do two and three times the work in the same amount of hours. He can't do this by working these small patches. If two acre lots are used, it gives sufficient room for a house, outbuilding and a nice yard, leaving the rest of the ground in large enough tracts to be attractive to the modern farmer. After all, it was the everyday farmer that made this nation the bread basket of the world, not the take it or leave it ten acre city farmer.
4. Some people feel we don't listen to or acknowledge their comments. When elected to positions such as ours, the people have put their trust in our ability to take care of the everyday workings of our township. But when something so controversial is brought to us by petition, we believe that five men, or a committee of about fifty, shouldn't make the final decision until every voting member of the Township has had a chance to speak. We are in the process of setting up an election on some of these major problems. Watch the paper for the proposals and dates. This will be your chance to speak up.

Expecting A Baby?

The Manchester La Leche League would like to acquaint you with their group. La Leche (pronounced La Lay-chay) League is a non-profit, non-sectarian corporation which provides support and encouragement to women who wish to breastfeed.

Informal discussions are led by a trained leader and focus on a particular topic each month. There are four topics in each series, which are: (1) The Advantages of Breastfeeding to Mother and Baby, (2) The Art of Breastfeeding and Overcoming Difficulties, (3) The Baby Arrives: The Family and the Breastfed Baby, and (4) Nutrition and Weaning.

As mentioned, these are informal discussions which allow nursing and pregnant women (married or single) the opportunity to learn more about the art of breastfeeding, and to share their problems and experiences. Directed Patrol Effort Program

Effective January 1, 1982 the Michigan State Police, Clinton-Blissfield Team Post will take part in a state-wide Directed

Patrol Effort. Various locations in Lenawee County and Washtenaw County which are patrolled by the Clinton - Blissfield Team Post have been identified as high traffic accident areas and will be the targets of this program.

Lieutenant James J. McGaffigan stated there is a direct relationship between violations and accidents. The more violations which can be cut down, the more accidents will be prevented. The State Police cannot enforce all violations with equal force wherever and whenever they may occur simply because we do not have sufficient officers available to do so. For this reason our enforcement efforts must be directed primarily to those violations which appear most frequently in traffic accidents.

Patrols from the Clinton - Blissfield Team will be assigned to these designated areas during certain periods when an unusually high rate of traffic accidents are known to occur.

Officers assigned to this program will

The Manchester Enterprise direct their enforcement attention to Speed, Stop Sign and Improper Passing violations, with special attention directed towards traffic violations of Following too Closely, Failure to Signal for Turns and Improper Passing on the Right.

During 1982 the Blissfield officers will patrol each day on US-223 from Ogden Highway to Rome Center between the hours of 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. with the exception of Wednesday in which they will patrol M-52 from the north city limits of Adrian to Shepherd Road.

During 1982 the Clinton officers will patrol US-12 between Clinton and Saline on Monday, Friday and Saturday between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. This will be during the months of January, February, March, October and November. During the months of April through and including September and December, they will be confining their directed patrol efforts to US-12 from 10:00 p.m. and 12:00 Midnight from Clinton Village limits to M-60.

Workers' Comp Reformed - Reform of Michigan's workers' compensation system became reality last week when several Democrats defected from the party line to join all Republicans in passing the measure that will save Michigan businesses \$250 to \$300 million during the first year of its enactment. Reform includes the coordination of benefits, tighter definitions of eligibility and the removal of fringe benefits from calculation formulas for disability rates.

Welfare Reform Passes Committee - A bill that would significantly reduce abuse within the general assistance program of the Department of Social Services has won approval and the Republican-backed bill now comes before the full House for final consideration.

Property Tax Reductions Approved - If approved by the Michigan Senate, a House-passed property tax reform bill could save Michigan taxpayers \$3 billion in relief over the next three years. The bill, which grants the relief across-the-board to commercial, agricultural and residential classes of property, lowers the state's assessed valuation from 50 percent to 44 percent in 1982, to 39 percent in 1983, and to 35 percent in 1984. A Republican amendment, adopted by the House, would require the state to reimburse local units of government for lost revenue, and would require the state tax commission to discount land contract transactions in determining true cash value.

Christmas Seals - Christmas Seal contributions help 47 million Americans who suffer from one or more respiratory diseases, such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, tuberculosis, pneumonia and lung cancer. The American Lung Association, which uses funds raised through the sale of Christmas seals, is financing 47 research programs including studies of lung diseases affecting newborns, children, adults and the elderly.

Snowmobile Accidents - Snowmobiling in Michigan during the previous winter season resulted in 21 deaths and 438 personal injuries in 492 accidents. Registrations of snowmobiles in Michigan total 487,036, however, snowmobiles operated on private property require no registration so the total number of snowmobiles in Michigan is not known. Of the accidents, the majority, or 336, involving 18 of the 21 deaths, occurred in off-roadway areas while 156 happened on roadways, involving three deaths.

Washtenaw County Council On Aging

Among the many services offered by the Washtenaw County Council on Aging is an information and referral service to older adults in Washtenaw County. The Information and Referral Service puts older adults in touch with different social agencies within Washtenaw County that can best serve their needs. Though most of the contacts are by telephone 663-6600 the Information and Referral Service also provides a walk-in service.
The Information and Referral Service is located in the Social Security Office in the Federal Building, in downtown Ann Arbor. Because of its location, Jane Diehr, coordinator of the service, sees many older adults referred from the Social Security Office on a walk-in basis. So far this year, the Information and Referral Service has responded to 1700 phone call and walk-in queries.

We're Just Beginning

Some frequently asked questions are: Where can I find senior housing in the area? How can I find legal assistance? Jane Diehr will give them the name and phone number of a service that can help or will supply the needed information herself.
During conversations with people who have questions, Diehr may determine that they have additional needs and will refer them to agencies who can assist.
The Washtenaw County Council on Aging, a United Way agency, also provides other services for older residents of the county including health screening, tax aid, the Senior Reporter newsletter and education programs. The Washtenaw County Council on Aging telephone number is 665-3625.

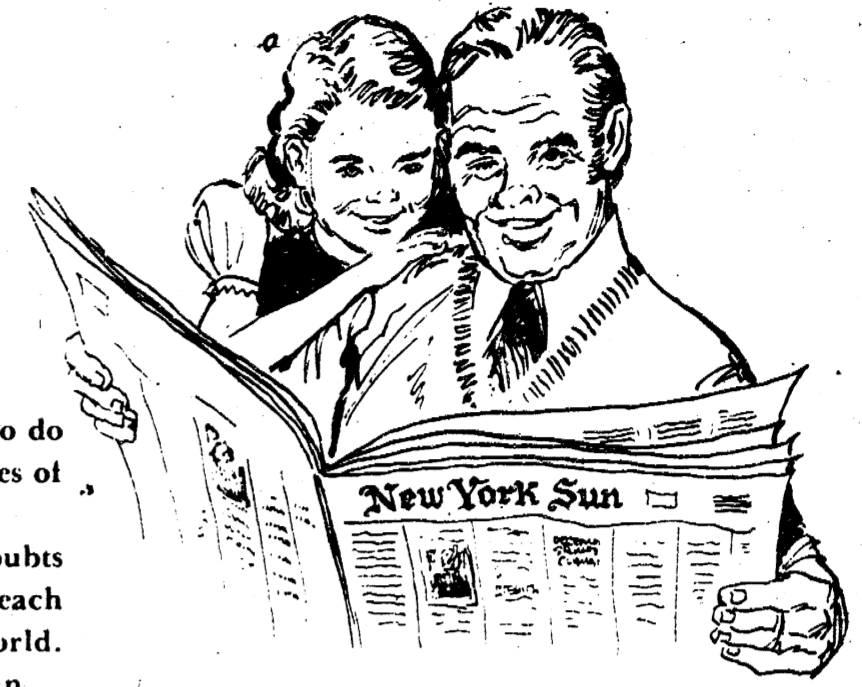

One of the most famous newspaper editorials of all time has to do with Christmas. It first appeared September 21, 1897, in the pages of a leading newspaper of the day, the New York Sun.

Virginia O'Hanlon, eight years old, was torn between the doubts placed in her mind by playmates and her own sincere belief that each Christmas a jolly old man came to help spread joy through the world. To settle the matter, she posed the question to the editor of the Sun.

Francis Pharcellus Church replied as follows:



"Is there a Santa Claus?"
"We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of the Sun:

"Dear editor:
"I am 8 years old.
Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus.
Papa says 'If you see it in the Sun it's so.'
Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except what they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable their existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

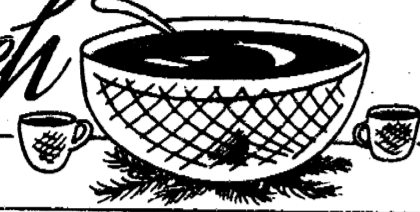
Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your Papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Cranberry Punch



A unique but simple way to add more holiday flavor to your Christmas parties is to allow pineapple balls to float in your bowl of cranberry punch.

Make the balls by pouring pineapple juice into small bell-shaped molds. Then freeze them. Dip the mold quickly into warm water and slide the balls into the punch when you are ready to serve.

Good for about 12 servings, try the following recipe at your fast approaching yuletide party.

Spiced Cranberry Punch
 1 pound cranberries—fresh or frozen ½ cup water
 1 quart water ½ cup sugar
 1 tablespoon whole cloves 2 tablespoons lemon juice

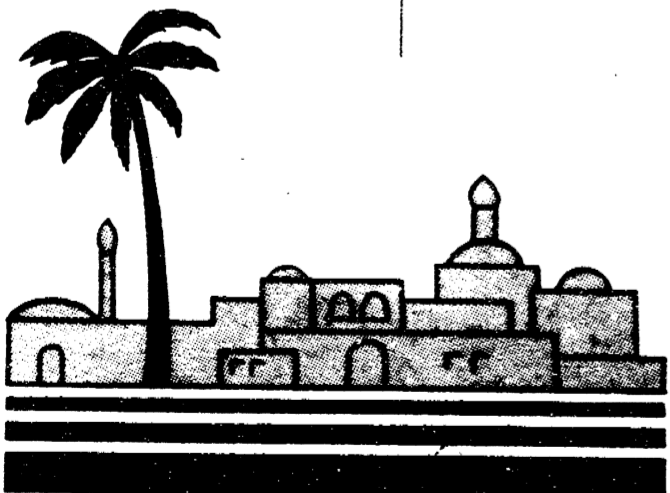
Cook cranberries, water and cloves until skins of cranberries burst—approximately 5 minutes. Be sure cranberries are soft. Strain through cheese cloth. Mix pulp with ½ cup water. Mix well and strain again. Heat, add sugar and boil two minutes. Just before serving, add lemon juice. (To vary this punch you may try substituting some very thin slices of lemon and some fresh mint leaves for the pineapple balls.)

Holy Night Flower Is Poinsettia

Mexicans tell the story of blood falling on the ground from the broken heart of a young girl and from each drop, a poinsettia plant grew. The poinsettia, traditional flower of the Christmas season, was known to the Mexicans as "Flor de la Noche Buena"—Flower of the Holy Night.

The Yuletide emblem was discovered by Dr. Joel Roberts Poinsett, a native of Charleston, South Carolina, in 1828 while he

was U.S. minister to Mexico and the flower was given his name.

Dr. Poinsett sent some cuttings of the plant to Robert Buist, a Philadelphia nurseryman, who specialized in collecting new plants. He named it "Euphorbia poinsettia" and later it was classified in botanical terms, Poinsettia pulcherrima.

The poinsettia has become one of the most popular Christmas emblems. Many people enjoy a gift of the potted plant and pictures of it appear on Christmas cards and ornamental wrappings.

First Christmas Card Subject of Controversy

Americans exchange billions of Christmas cards every year. There are conflicting reports on who sent the first one, however. According to one source, John Calcott Horsley designed the first card for Sir Henry Cole in 1843. It is a triptych, the center panel of which shows a well fed family at the table. They raise their glasses to toast, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year To You." Flanking them in the end panels are the poor and the hungry.

According to another source, the origin of this custom is sometimes ascribed to the English Royal Academy artist, W.C.T. Dobson. In 1845 he sent friends lithographed copies of a sketch he had made to symbolize the Christmas spirit.

The first English printed cards were very simple; a robin, a sprig of holly or mistletoe, plus a conventional greeting. Pioneers of Christmas card printing in the United States were mostly Germans such as Louis Prang, who opened a shop in Roxbury, Mass. in 1874.

Let's Analyze Santa Claus

Every year about this time somebody starts analyzing Santa Claus. The concept of Santa has been criticized as a jolly fat man. He is said to set a bad example because overweight people are not happy, or at least not as healthy as skinny ones.

Now comes a professor of anthropology who points out a curious contradiction in the Santa Claus legend. He says we live in a society that is based on the mass production of goods by highly specialized machines. The goods are purchased with money and the desire for the goods is promoted by massive advertising.

Once a year, the professor says, we insist that the toys distributed to children emanate from the Santa Claus workshop in the North Pole. We tell children that their toys are delivered by reindeer sled and through their chimney, and that their gifts were not bought by Mother and Father but by a mythical gentleman of extraordinary outward appearance.

 The professor states that adults use Santa Claus as an equalizer in a world that is really based on interpersonal competition and in which goods and power are won by the more successful from the less successful. At Christmastime, family financial priorities are rearranged so that "Santa Claus" can give an electric train to a poor child who in the real world would have to be content with much less.

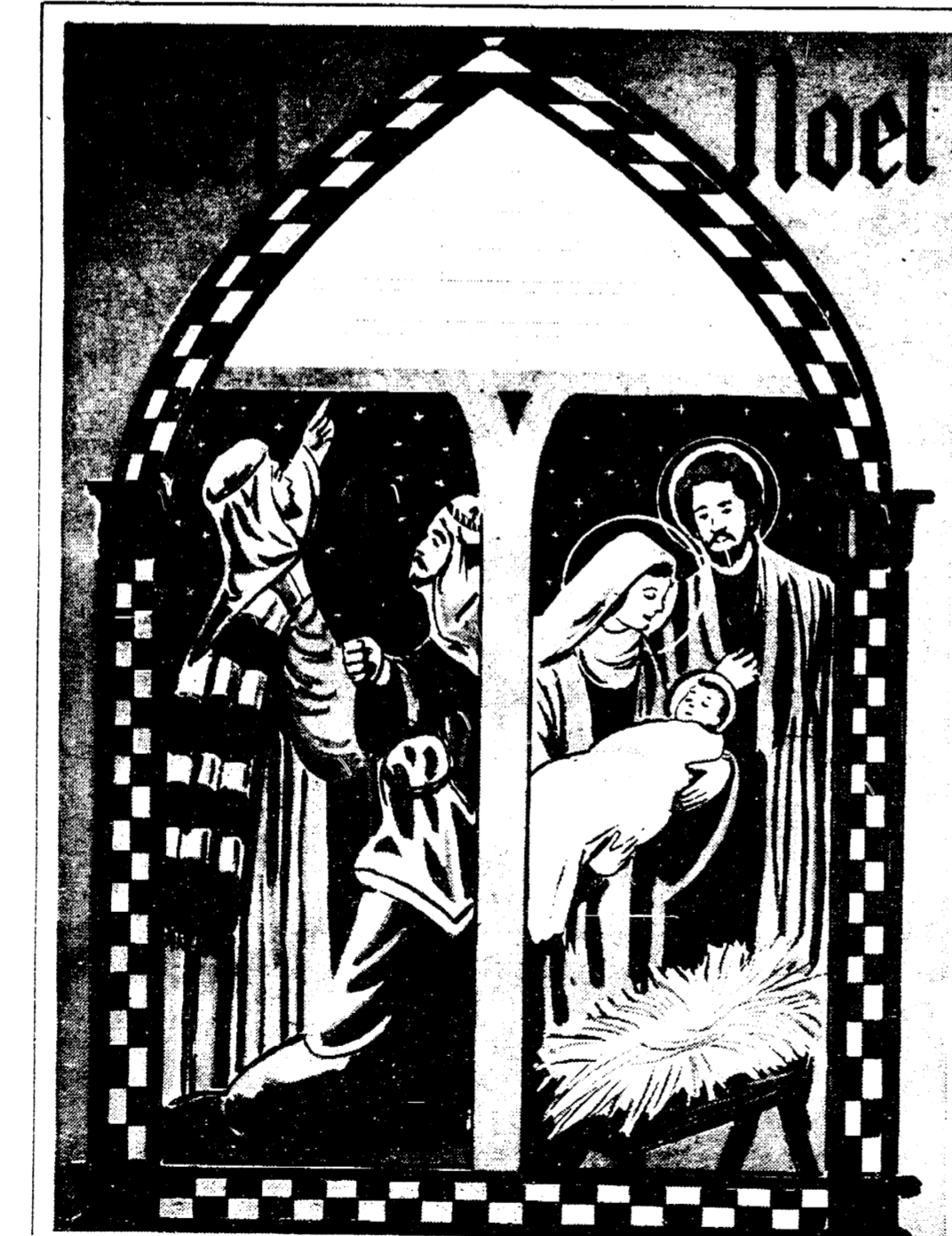

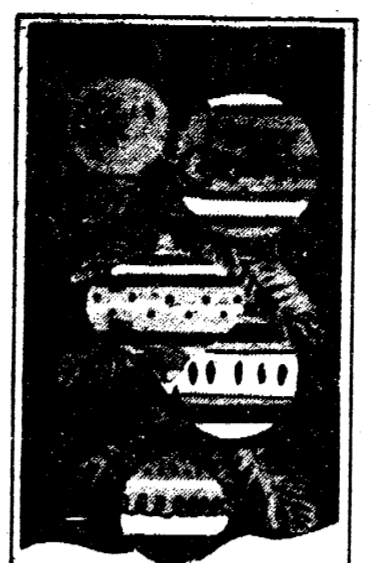

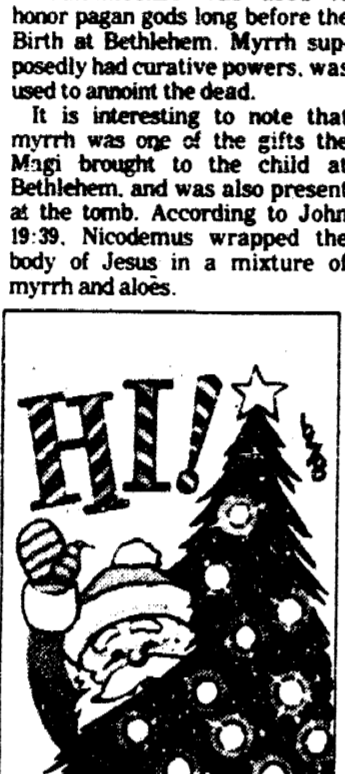
**Gifts Of The Magi
Were Highly Prized**

Gold has always been a commodity of known value. Many of us have wondered, however, about the two other gifts brought by the Magi to the Christ Child. They were also highly prized at that time.

Frankincense and myrrh both come from small trees. When the tree bark is cut, an aromatic gum exudes from the incision, hardens when exposed to air. The Greek historian once wrote that the Arabian trees which produced frankincense were guarded by winged serpents. They were guarded, because South Arabians protected their trees and kept the wealth they produced in the hands of a privileged few.

Frankincense was used to honor pagan gods long before the Birth at Bethlehem. Myrrh supposedly had curative powers, was used to anoint the dead.

It is interesting to note that myrrh was one of the gifts the Magi brought to the child at Bethlehem, and was also present at the tomb. According to John 19:39, Nicodemus wrapped the body of Jesus in a mixture of myrrh and aloes.

Most Christmas Plants Have Symbolic Meaning

The plants and greens we use to decorate our homes at Christmas often have symbolic meaning. During the Roman Saturnalia, the pagan festival in tribute to Saturn, the custom of decorating with evergreens was established. Then, as now, evergreens symbolized immortality because they remain green throughout the winter.

The commonly used holly plant, with its bright red fruit, was originally sacred to the ancient Druids. They believed it protected them from witches and severe weather. To Christians the sharp leaves came to symbolize Christ's thorns, the red berries His blood.

One of the most popular evergreens, the fir tree, was regarded as King of the forest and a sacred tree. This was before the Christian era in France, Germany and northern Europe, and they believed that spirits in the woods chose the fir tree as their home. The custom of using the tree as part of the Christmas celebration began long after Christianity took hold.



The Three Wise men would never recognize the Star of Bethlehem this Christmas.

But it's there, in plain sight — though now fragmented into the planets Jupiter, Saturn, Mars, and Venus. A popular astronomical theory is that two or more of these planets appeared to come together in the heavens so that they looked like a single star to the Three Kings. Astronomers offer this explanation — among others — in the assumption that the Star of Bethlehem was in fact a genuine celestial object.

Some Biblical scholars, however, argue that when the Three Wise Men talked about a star, they were actually using the word in an allegorical description of a spiritual experience.

St. Matthew described in the Gospel how a star guided the Magi to the Christ child in Bethlehem: "And behold the star which they had seen in the east went before them until it came and stood over where the child was. And seeing the star they rejoiced with exceeding joy."

Astronomers say that the star was really a conjunction or apparent coming-together of several planets. They point out that, due to changes in the calendar since then, the birth of Christ was really about 7 or 6 B.C.

Other explanations — that the Star of Bethlehem might have been a supernova or exploding star, or that it was an exceptionally bright meteor — are discounted because none of the many professional stargazing astronomers of the time mentioned any such observance.

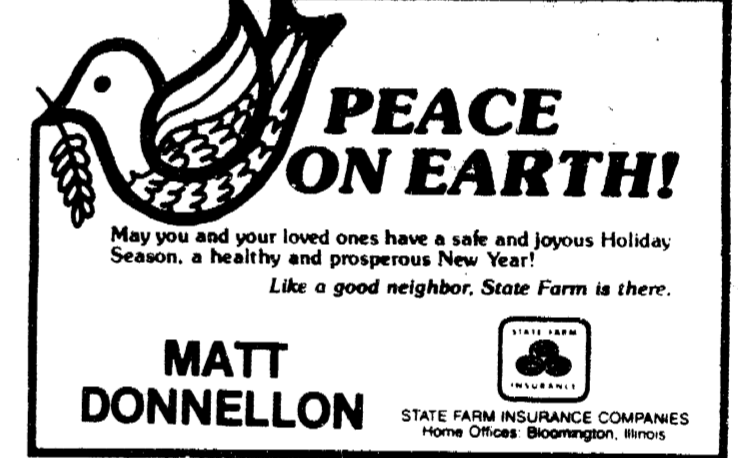

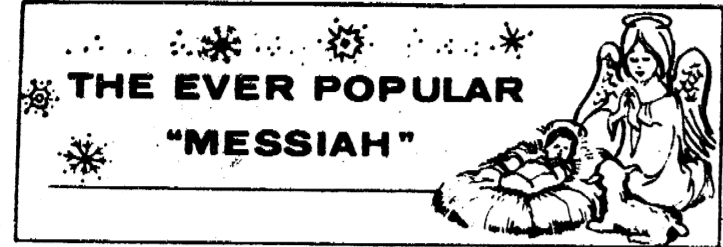

THE EVER POPULAR "MESSIAH"

This is the season of "Messiah" performances and "Messiah" sing-ins, and articles about "Messiah", as it has been every year at this time back to 1742, the year that the most popular choral work ever composed received its premiere.

Stories about its composition are part of the mythology of music: George Frederic Handel had finished the "Messiah" in 1741, the year before the premiere. The exact make-up of the orchestra at the premiere is unknown.

Handel had accepted an invitation to give a subscription series of oratorios, including a new one (which turned out to be "Messiah") for a local charity. The stories about his composition of the "Messiah" had him locked into his Dublin apartment working 24 straight days. It was said too, that he ignored food and sleep, to get his music on paper.

Handel returned to London and was in charge of the first performance there. It was this performance that the king introduced the custom of standing for the "Hallelujah" chorus.

"Messiah" was the backbone of Handel's subsequent oratorio seasons, and the work also was played all over England.

The last piece of music that Handel heard was the "Messiah" performance in London on April 6, 1759. Mortally ill, he attended the event, went home, took to his bed and died a few days later.

SYMBOLS OF SPIRIT
The three gifts of the Magi... the innocent expectancy of a little girl... the delicacy of a winter snowflake... the lift of a church spire... the sparkle of a Christmas tree. These symbols of the spirit of Christmas, familiar to all of us, capture the spirit of Christmas in America.

MISTLETOE
The traditional time for the French to exchange gifts as we Americans give on Christmas is New Year's Day. It is also the season when everybody calls on his friends and relatives. Also, it is at New Year's that the old Druid custom is observed of hanging a large clump of mistletoe above a doorway so that people may exchange kisses when they walk under it.

Horace Walpole's Christmas Letter

From a letter Horace Walpole wrote to his friend Sir Horace Mann, Strawberry Hill, December 26, 1748:

Did you ever know a more absolute country — gentleman? Here I come down to what you call keep my Christmas. Indeed, it is not in all the forms: I have stuck no laurel and holly in my windows, I eat no turkey and chine, I have no tenants to invite, I have not brought a single soul with me. The weather is excessively stormy, but has been so warm, and so entirely free from frosts the whole winter, that not only several of my honeysuckles are come out, but I have literally a blossom upon a nectarine — tree, which, I believe, was never seen in this climate before on the 28th of December. I am extremely busy planting here.

"I'm here for the blind," said the visitor.
The husband took a bill from his pocket, gave it to the man and shut the door.

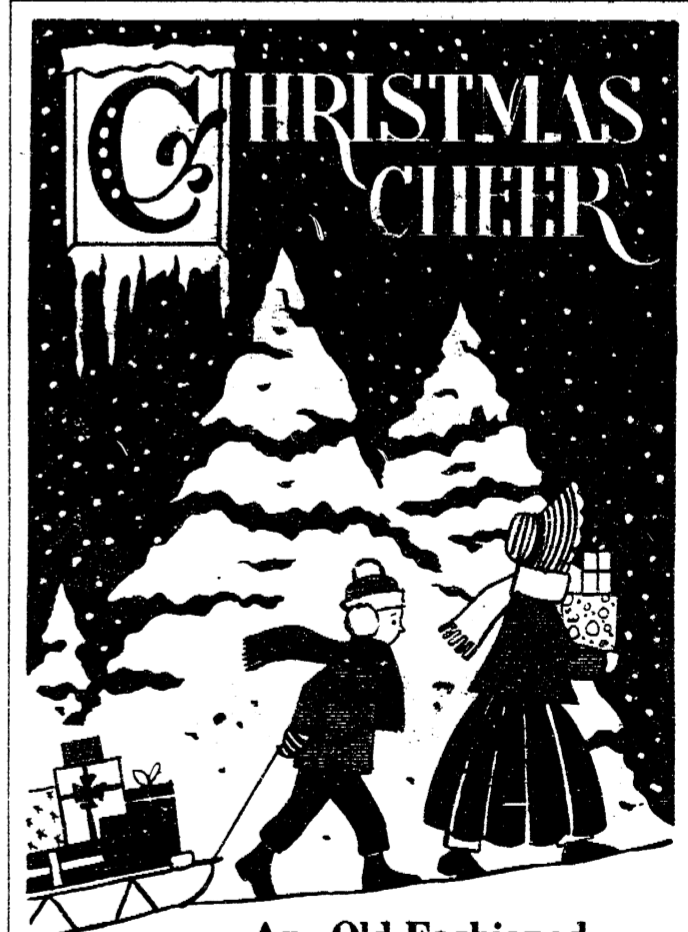
