

Split Schedule for Buses: Dr. Thompson reported that at the request of the Executive Committee the administration had studied the question of changing to a two level busing schedule for elementary and secondary school students. He Horning, Talcott, Mann, Bunney, Little, indicated that the administration had attempted to examine the question from the effects on students as well as from an estimated cost analysis basis. The basic problem as reported by the administration was with the length of the runs in Manchester. The investigation had indicated that districts which had successfully implemented a two level busing program had done so with bus runs significantly less than one hour in length. The longest run in Manchester is in excess of 11/2 hours. It was noted that while some cost benefit could be realized if the time problem did not exist these benefits would not be highly significant. The consensus of the Board was in agreement with Dr. Thompson's recommendation that the

> current program be continued. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 96 OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ENTITLED "THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ZONING ORDINANCE."

#### THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Village of Manchester Zoning Ordinance is amended by deleting Section 21.03, "Conditional Uses" of Article 21.0 "R-18, Single-Family Urban Residential District" and substituting the following therefor:

#### ARTICLE 21.0

#### R-1B Single-Family Urban Residential District

#### **SECTION 21.03 - CONDITIONAL USES**

The following buildings and structures, and uses of parcels, lots, buildings and structures are permitted subject to obtaining a conditional use permit as provided in ARTICLE 50.0:

- A. Golf courses, but not including golf driving ranges;
- B. Country clubs, public swimming pools, and recreation clubs, public and private parks and playgrounds;
- C. Churches and public buildings;
- D. Public and private nurseries, primary and secondary schools:
- E. Essential services, as provided in Section 10.03 K and L. herein:
- F. Home occupations;
- G. Professional medical offices;
- H. A planned unit residential development only in accordance with the procedures and regulations in Article 52.0; parcel abutting a principle or
- I. Live professional reportory theatre, provided such use is located on a parcel abutting a principle or minor traffic artery (as defined in the adopted

Manchester Village General Development Plan), and provided such use within one block of the Central Business District.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced 30 days after passage and after legal publication thereof.

Washtenaw Community College Trustees face the problem of having to increase tuition and reduce the fund balance to provide a balanced budget for next year. At their February 23 meeting, the WCC Board of Trustees was alerted to problems the College will face in building

its 1982-83 operating budget. Anticipated state aid will be reduced by \$136,000 from this year's level and property tax revenue is estimated to increase by three per cent. To balance the budget, the College's fund balance (reserve funds the College has accumulated to support programs during difficult economic periods) would be used and tuition would be increased substantially.

"In the past, we have been able to keep our tuition rates well below the average for Michigan community colleges," Gunder A. Myran, College President, said. "Even though we will have to ask students to bear a larger burden of the cost of operating the College," he said, "the tuition rates will be no higher than the state average for community colleges. Our objective has always been to keep our tuition as low as possible and that continues to be our goal. However, with state aid declining and property tax revenues stabilizing because of the state's economic crisis, the College must increase tuition fees

The Board heard a report on a number of program reductions planned by the College. "We are reducing our costs in every possible area, but we also want to continue to provide the level of community college services the people in this area need and deserve," Myran said.

The Trustees will take action on the budget in June.



#### Manchester Students Score **High On MEA Tests**

Students in grades 4, 7, and 10. in the Manchester Community Schools once again tended to score higher than their counterparts throughout the rest of the state on the Michigan Educational Assessment Tests which were administered in the Fall of the school year.

The Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) measures student ability in basic skills in reading and mathmatics. The tests are designed to provide classroom teachers with information regarding students in order to help improve the instructional program.

Eighty four percent of the Manchester 4th graders had mastered at least 75 percent of the skills in mathematics at the time the tests were given in September Across the state 74 percent of this age was with Monsignor Kern as his Assistant group had mastered the math skills. Similarly 84 percent of the Manchester veritable fortune pass through this man's students had mastered at least 75 percent the reading skills was 73 percent.

At the 7th grade level 81 percent of the Manchester students had mastered the their state counterparts. #### **News Of Good Things Growing**

Ethnic foods have always been popular in this country, because of the varied heritage we Americans enjoy. Most recent addition seems to be the foods of Mexico. Favorites in our southwestern states for many years, their popularity has spread in recent years to the midwest.

You notice the proliferation of Mexicanstyle restaurants, and also the many chile varieties now appearing in our markets. Check your local farmers' market next summer and you'll find some of the different variation of chiles Although not in sizeable commercial production, they've joined the many other "good things growing in Michigan."

This week, a friend in New Mexico sent me some delicious recipes using chiles, dry edible beans, and other agricultural crops which are grown in Michigan. The spicy flavor of Mexican-type foods may take some getting-used-to, but you'll soon find the extra zip appealing.

Here's a recipe for Corn and Cheese casserole that will perk up a dull winter

Combine one 12-oz. can of whole kernel corn, drained, with one-quarter to one-half cup chopped green chile (canned, fresh or frozen). Place in a shallow greased baking dish. Add 11/2 cups grated cheddar cheese, top with 1 cup cracker crumbs. Combine 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter. a dash of salt and pepper, and pour over the corn mixture. Bake at 375 degrees about 25 minutes. You may add a layer of sliced cooked ham or crisp bacon, if you wish.
