cause of embarrassment and concern to the child. Teachers, family and friends do not at this meeting for their hard work and see the problem as readily and are confused as to why a child may seem not to understand what they are talking about, or

be able to express ideas in a way which is clear and complete. Because some children with language problems have difficulty with reasoning skills, academic subjects which call for a high degree of reasoning can be very hard for them. Usually children with language problems at this age are also experiencing problems in written language as well as spoken. Since much of the required work of high school is written these children are often struggling under a heavy academic handicap.

At the high school level getting teachers and students to understand the nature and effect of speech and language problems on the child's performance is a primary goal. With understanding and extra help, children with language and speech impairments can have very successful and rewarding high school careers. Having the courage to confront and seek help for their problem is of utmost importance in bringing about this success. If you know of students who are or may be suffering from speech and language problems, encourage them to come forward and receive the help they need. It can mean the difference between years of frustration and failure and years of success and confidence.

The Manchester School District has a Speech and Language Pathologist who is available to deal with any child who is experiencing speech, language or bearing difficulties. If you know of a child who may be displaying any of the above difficulties. please contact Miss Leslie Szubeczak at Klager School.



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



Budget Offers No Relief

The budget resolution approved by the Senate recently offers no relief from the economic recession either to Michigan or to the nation.

It will keep interest rates high, unemployment high and the economy depressed because its deficit is too great, the result of misplaced spending and taxing priorities.

Our state has endured a double digit unemployment rate for 27 consecutive months and now it is being forced to bear the heaviest burden for the administration's economic policy. Nothing in the budget resolution, which supports the administration's policies, will reduce our unemployment or ease our burden.

When the Senate began considering the budget resolution, I had some hope that a better resolution would result -- one that would provide a more sensible approach to spending and taxing and lead to a smaller deficit and lower interest rates, the two essential ingredients for economic recovery.

My hopes proved short-lived when Senate Republicans, who are in the majority in the Senate, decided to go along with the administration to continue the same budgetary policies of last year that are proving so disastrous to Michigan's farmers, workers and small businessmen.

They decided to reject a bipartisan compromise I had agreed to support even though I did not agree with every element in it.

But this bipartisan compromise offered a balanced approach toward achieving lower deficits and lower interest rates. Although it would have cut non-discretionary spending more than I preferred and defense spending less than I preferred, I was willing to vote for it in the spirit of bipartisanship because it would have lowered the projected deficit from the plan supported by President Reagan and the Republican-controlled Senate Budget Committee.

I sensed that a number of Senators from both parties were willing to accept this compromise sponsored by Senator David Durenberger, a Republican from Minnesota. Unfortunately, the Durenberger proposal never was submitted for a vote because Republican backers decided to back their committee budget even though its deficit was higher.

To some extent, the budget agreed to is similar to the budgets offered by President Johnson during the Vietnam War. It tries to provide cans and butter.

The guns are in the form of bloated military spending that includes MX missiles we don't know how to base, B-1 bombers that will be obsolete shortly after they become operational and nuclear aircraft carriers that will be sitting ducks.

The butter is in the form of the President's sacrosanct tax cuts that disproportionately benefit those who need it least and have failed abysmally to spur investment as we were assured they would.

The budget approved by the Senate majority shows the consequences of indiscriminate funding of guns and butter. It proposes a deficit of \$115.8 billion for next year and a cumulative deficit of \$272.7 billion over the

Deficits of this magnitude, the direct result of excessive increases in military spending and excessive, disproportionate tax cuts, assure that interest rates will not come down and that any recovery from the recession will be only feeble and temporary.

Both last year and this year I argued against deficits like this and for deferral of the third year of the individual tax cut and a lesser increase in military spending. If we deferred the third year of the tax cut, we would reduce the 1985 deficit from \$64.2 billion to \$28.3 billion.

If we also reduced the increase in military spending to 6 percent real growth, as Republican Senator Nancy Landon Kassebaum of Kansas proposed (and I supported), we could reduce that year's deficit to below \$20 billion. This, along with an easing of the money supply by the Federal Reserve Board, would bring reduced interest rates and a revitalized

Although this year, as last year, I was in the minority in voting against the budget, it was gratifying to see that 42 other Senators agreed with me this year. Last year only 19 other Senators joined me.

The deficits voted by the supporters of this administration are tragically high. They will do nothing to lower interest rates or lower the unemployment rate. They will do nothing to revitalize auto sales or housing sales.
