

### Legislative Update

**Welfare Reform Introduced**—Republican-sponsored legislation has been introduced in the Michigan House of Representatives that would allow landlords to obtain money directly from the Department of Social Services to pay for ADC recipients who fall behind in their rent. Currently, ADC recipients who have already received their checks can come back to the state to ask for an emergency allotment if they are facing eviction. That practice has already cost the state \$2.5 million this year.

**Primary August 12**—The Michigan Primary Election will be held August 10, and at stake are political party nominations for Governor, U.S. Senate, U.S. Congressional seats, as well as State House, State Senate, and County Commission races. Winners of the primary will face off in the General Election, November 2.

**Cherry Farmers Seek Federal Aid**—Michigan's cherry industry faces losses of more than \$25 million this year, and farmers are asking the U.S. Department of Agriculture to purchase the surplus cherries for use in school lunch programs and other domestic food assistance projects. Because this year's crop is the largest since 1965, the \$38.5 million pounds of cherries will be sold at prices lower than the cost of producing them, which causes the farmers to lose money on the sale. Several northern Michigan farmers face bankruptcy if the U.S.D.A. does not act soon.

**Art Fairs—Art lovers**, and those who like to browse at summertime art festivals are in for a treat this weekend. Art fairs are planned August 7, in Hessel, for the Antique Boat Show; Holland's Art in the Park will be held in Centennial Park; the Island Art Fair in Grand Ledge; the Waterfront Art Festival in Escanaba; the Arts and Crafts Fair in Lewistown; the Kalamazoo Art Fair in Millam Park; North Muskegon's Arts and Crafts Fair in Walker Park; the Waterfront Art Show in Tawas; and the Summer Arts Festival, Cister Center in Sault Ste. Marie.

**Governor Vetoes Forestry Bill**—Governor William G. Milliken has vetoed legislation amending the 1960 Forest Improvement Act because it did not contain "adequate protection for the public interest." The Forest Improvement Act has not been enacted because the Office of the Attorney General is still reviewing various technical areas of the law. The vetoed amendment to the Act would have provided incentive payments for forest owners of 112 an acre for improving and maintaining woodland

areas. County fairs—County fairs prevail in Michigan throughout the month of August. Some counties and dates to keep in mind are: August 2-7, Monroe County Fair; August 7-14, Otsego County Fair; August 8-14, Alpena County Fair; August 11-14, Roscommon County Fair and the Montmorency County Fair; August 12-15, Gogebic County Fair; August 15-21 is the week of the Bay, Isabella and Cheboygan County Fairs, and the week of August 17-21 is the Berrien County Youth Fair and the Newaygo County Fair. The Upper Peninsula State Fair in Escanaba runs August 17-22.

### Income Tax Arguments To Be Heard

On Monday, August 9th, Ingham County Circuit Court Judge Robert Holmes Bell will hear oral arguments on a suit filed jointly by Senator Jack Welborn (R-Kalamazoo) and Rep. Alan Cropsey (R-DeWitt) charging the recent 22% income tax increase was unconstitutional.

"The Michigan Constitution clearly states that the original purpose of a bill cannot be changed on its passage through either house of the Legislature," Welborn explained. "The bill started out as property tax relief for some and was changed to increase the income tax on everybody. In my opinion, the original purpose of the bill was definitely changed."

On June 30th, Judge Bell denied the Attorney General's request to dismiss the suit. Since the state may be unconstitutionally withholding the tax, the judge also told both parties to proceed as quickly as possible. "Our attorneys worked very hard to comply with the judge's request; but the Attorney General's office has been dragging their feet," Welborn charged. "It took the Attorney General's office the full 20 days allowed to agree with everything we said, except our conclusions."

"The Legislature has the power to increase taxes, but it does not have the power to run roughshod over our constitutional rights," Welborn said. "If the Legislature does not abide by the Constitution, there is no reason to have a Constitution; and without a Constitution, the people would truly be at the mercy of the government. That is why I am fighting this battle," Welborn added.

### Hit Or Miss by farley

Now that the primary election is over we have nothing to worry about for a week or so until the standard bearers of the major political parties roll up the heavy artillery for the forthcoming campaign for election. But never in the state's history have so many spent so much to date in the attempt to be elected governor of Michigan, a state that is in terrible shape financially. And two-thirds of this money is to come out of the state's anemic treasury, and if you pay taxes in Michigan this two-thirds is coming from you.

Seven Democrats and four Republicans have spent nearly six million dollars. All this has taken place when the one thing all of the candidates agreed on was that the state treasury was in the worst shape that it had been since the great depression and if you will remember only last May the state had its bond rating reduced to the lowest of all the 50 states.

Under a law that took effect in 1978, politicians who qualify for the primary ballot gets \$2 from the state for every \$1 that they spend — that they can collect from private contributors and each can file for a maximum of \$660,000 from the Michigan treasury. One candidate Democrat James Blanchard did so some time ago. But a week before the primary election that state had given out some \$3,713,650 to the ten candidates. The first year that the law was in effect (1978) the primary cost the state \$1.43 million.

After the primary the end of the state money is not in sight. Candidates can go on raising and collecting primary money, filing reports of contributions and being reimbursed, \$2 for \$1, even if they lost. An executive order has been issued that primary money will be cut off after September 30, but until then if the candidates have debts, they can go on collecting their money.

No one forces these candidates to accept the money, but this year all but one has. He is John Safran, a retired Methodist minister, who is a political unknown. The rest have been filing reports, often weekly, with the state elections division to receive their share.

The winners for each primary will get a check for \$750,000 for the general election campaign provided they promise to spend no more than \$1 million.

The result will be in November, that after the expenses for the third party effort of tax-cut advocate Robert Tish and other minor party candidates are thrown in Michigan will have elected a new governor at a cost of between \$8 and \$10 million.

New Jersey, the only other state which finances the gubernatorial wars paid out \$6 million to 21 candidates in the 1981 election there.

If you're curious, here's how much the various candidates had received up to August 1st:

Democrats: U.S. Representative James Blanchard, \$660,000; State Senator Kerry Kammer, \$344,217; William Fitzgerald, \$338,628; State Senator David Plawerki, \$330,832; Zolton Farenev, \$244,901; total \$1,918,578.

Republicans: Lieut. Gov. James Brickley, \$540,234; Richard Hedlee, \$459,268; L. Brooks Patterson, \$450,770; State Senator James Welborn, \$162,227; making a total paid Republicans of \$1,612,499.

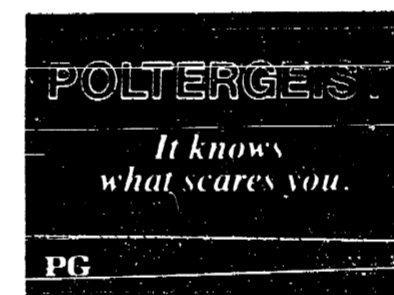

### News Of Good Things Growing

Michigan is enjoying the peak of the fruit season now and for weeks to come. So this is a fine time to remove some good Michigan eggs from your refrigerator and prepare fruit meringues.

There are several reasons why. Individual meringues are easy to make, they can be baked ahead for use at dinner, or even several days later if stored properly, and they are attractive and appetizing filled with almost any fruit.

Good things are growing everywhere in Michigan right now, with a bumper crop of cherries reported by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, an excellent crop of blueberries, peaches and pears awaiting us. Here's a good recipe for old-fashioned meringues, like the ones our great-grandmothers may have served at tea or for special dinners.

First, cover baking sheets with plain brown or parchment paper, and set oven temperature at 275 degrees. Separate six eggs and let egg whites warm to room temperature. In large mixing bowl, beat egg whites until foamy, then add 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar and a pinch of salt. Continue beating, gradually adding 2 cups of granulated sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Beat until sugar is dissolved and meringue holds peaks when beater is lifted.

Place large spoonful of meringue on your baking sheets, well apart. Swirl the meringue with the back of the spoon to build up the edges - you're forming a nest for the fruit. Bake at 275 for about 1 hour, until firm, and allow to cool in oven.

When cold, peel carefully from baking sheets. If storing, be sure they are dry and cool, then package carefully in airtight tins. Do not freeze.

Just before serving, place meringues on individual dessert plates, fill with sliced blueberries or peaches, or a combination; pitted poached, well-drained sweet

cherries; or delicate red raspberries. Top with sweetened Michigan whipped cream. If you prefer, you may make one large meringue, fill as above, then slice and serve at table.

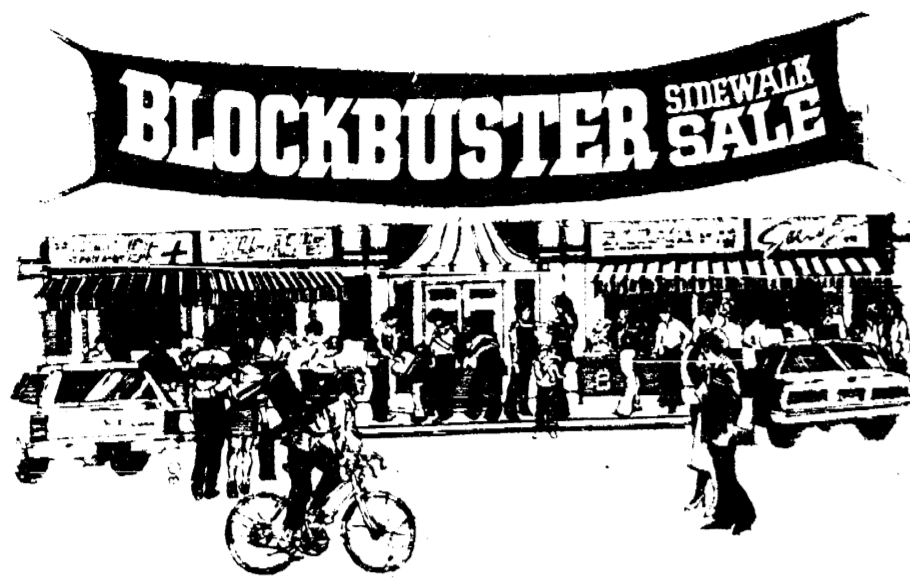

### Family Support Program

High Scope Educational Research Foundation, in cooperation with Chelsea Community Hospital is offering the Parent Program as a family support program for families in Chelsea, Dexter and Manchester areas. Some of the key components of this program are:

The relationship of parents to their infants in a home setting. Trained home visitors and parents share and initiate activities with the baby, respond to games and other activities initiated by the baby, and discuss child development using the

baby's actions as a focal point. The focus of the home visit is to "eliminate deficits" but supporting and expanding present parenting skills of the families. Rather than teach parents the "correct" way of raising children, they are encouraged to develop and clarify their own parenting skills.

Home visitors, individuals from the community, help parents to feel that their views are important, that they can learn to rely on their own informed judgement in raising children. This is accomplished through development information, assisting parents in developing a keener observational skill and encouragement of parents to explore and discover ways to respond to their particular child's needs, interests and personality through child-play activities.

By focusing on the child's development and parent/child relationship, this program can be very flexible and meet many family needs. Quite often, the parent/child relationship reflects other family problems because it is usually through the children that parents vent their problems, frustrations and anger. The Parent Program is therefore considered an effective preventive program as well.

During the home visits, the home visitor and the family will concentrate on child development and at the same time, build a trusting relationship whereby other family problems can be addressed. After all, if the parent feels good about themselves, they will feel good about their children and visa versa.

The Parent Program is a supportive and informational program that assists family members in focusing good about each other by working on the positive rather than the negative.

Now is especially difficult for families when they are faced with prolonged unemployment or fear of unemployment. As a result of this, families are drifting away from each other, even separating. There appears a lot of stress and tension. Even the best of parent/child relationships deteriorate under these conditions. The Parent Program can help these families by providing emotional support (a listening ear) and rebuild good relationships with each other.

Single parenting has increased rapidly in the last few years, not only divorced parents but also young teens opting to

keep their babies. Most of these young girls have very little knowledge of child development or parenting skills. The Parent Program can educate these young mothers in child development, parenting skills, community resources, nutrition, health and provide a positive, supportive atmosphere or example.

When services and programs are being cut back or eliminated completely these days, the Parent Program is even more important and badly needed to assist families in hard times.

### HEAT EXHAUSTION

We've been experiencing some very hot weather this summer, which caused me to think a bit of advice on the subject of heat exhaustion might be appropriate, particularly if you must work in the heat.

First, let me caution you not to overdo when it's hot. Be as easy on yourself as you can.

Heat exhaustion, the condition you want to avoid, is caused by an excessive loss of the body's fluids. It can lead to illness, and even death. So the things you do to take care of yourself are highly important.

To avoid becoming a victim of heat exhaustion, I would suggest several steps: Drink a lot of fluids. This is doubly important if you have to be outside in hot weather for long periods of time. But be sure the fluids are nonalcoholic.

Avoid being exposed to direct sunlight for long periods. If you have to be out in the sun, wear protective clothing, something light in weight and light colored. Even a head covering of some kind

is advisable. Keep stress situations to a minimum, and avoid overexertion.

There are some symptoms of heat exhaustion with which you should be familiar. A very common one is muscle cramping. This condition can be caused by lifting excessive stress on muscles, such as putting a load with your back instead of your legs.

Other symptoms are dizziness, drowsiness, and general weakness of the body.

The best advice I can give you is this. If you think you may be suffering heat exhaustion, and this applies whether you are working outdoors or inside in an extremely hot atmosphere; this is serious and you need help. Have someone help you get to a shaded or cooler area fast. Lie down, and drink some cool, nonalcoholic liquids. Notice I said "cool" liquids, not ice cold. And ask someone to contact a physician for you for further advice.

The summer heat can be nice or not nice, depending on where you are and what you may be doing in it.

### Woman's Doctors Directory Available

To aid Washtenaw county women in choosing obstetric and gynecological medical care, the Ann Arbor Women's Health Collective has compiled *A Woman's Doctors Directory*. The directory, containing responses from thirty-one physicians and clinics, is available for use at all branches of the Ann Arbor Public Library, the Ypsilanti Public Library and the Women's Crisis Center.

The directory includes physician practice information on obstetric, gynecological, des and abortion services, fees, waiting time for initial appointment, and attitudes toward alternative treatments.

The collective encourages women to examine the directory to aid them in making an informed choice in selecting a physician. The collective welcomes feedback on the content and format of the directory as well as women's experiences with physicians included therein.

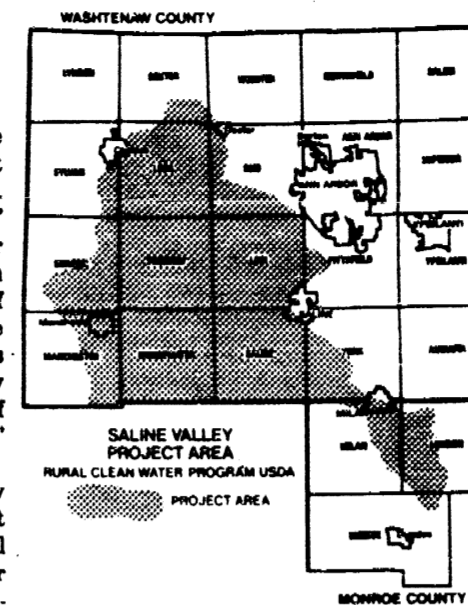

## Saline Valley Project

A record number of applications were approved for Saline Valley Project participation during the month of July. Twenty-one farms received "high priority" ratings, allowing them to be eligible for technical and cost-share assistance through the Project. This is the greatest number of applications to be approved in any single month since the Saline Valley Project's beginnings in March 1980. These new approvals brings the total number of applications receiving "high priority" ratings from the Project to 85.

"The noticeable thing about these new applications," says Ron Struss, Project Coordinator, "is that they are all for soil erosion control practices, where earlier applications were mainly for manure run-off control." Chisel plowing, waterways and erosion control structures are the main practices involved in these recent Project applications. The Saline Valley Project cost-shares chisel plowing on eligible fields at \$9.00 per acre, and will pay 75% the actual cost of installing waterways, erosion control structures and manure storage facilities.

The Saline Valley Project is part of USDA's Rural Clean Water Program. It is a group effort of ASCS, the Cooperative Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service. The Project provides technical and cost-share assistance to Project Area landowners to control soil erosion and manure run-off problems which are polluting area rivers. Ron Struss, Project Coordinator, encourages landowners with soil erosion or manure run-off problems to contact him at the Washtenaw County Cooperative Extension Service Office, 973-9510. ### Refugee Resettlement Project

A group of concerned citizens in the Manchester area is currently making preparation for the arrival of a Polish family into our community. The sponsorship program has been undertaken with the assistance of the Catholic Diocese of Lansing, The United Nations Refugee Program and The Government of the United States. Similar programs and efforts are underway in many communities here in Michigan and throughout the United States.

A great step is being taken forward as affects the Postal Service. Sammy and Susy will soon be able to mail letters to grandma and grandpa in the same envelope without breaking the law.

"The rule that you can't, if it ever really had a purpose, has outlived its usefulness," says Senior Assistant Postmaster General James Finch.

With that in mind the Postal Service Board of Governors has started the process of dropping the ban on sending messages from different people in the same envelope.

The rule caused a hassle recently at Hagerstown, Md., where the city and the county sought to save money by mailing their tax statements together. It was illegal under the rule and local officials have been billed for \$1960 in postage due.

Mr. Finch told the board that dropping the rule would not be expected to have any major effect on postal operation and it will remove Sammy and Susy from being classed as lawbreakers.

It was also reported that the postal service is \$661 million in the black for the fiscal year so far, despite a \$5 million loss in the most recent accounting period.

He said a much greater loss had been anticipated, and projected that the agency will end the fiscal year with a \$461 surplus.
