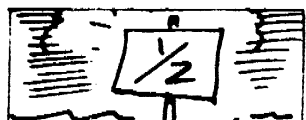

**Pursell To Speak On 'Gifted/Talented'**

Honorable Carl D. Pursell, Michigan's 2nd District Congressman, will be speaking on "Today's Federal Perspective on Gifted/Talented" at the High Point Cafetorium, Washtenaw Intermediate School District, 1819 S. Wagner Rd., Ann Arbor on Monday evening, September 20 at 7:30 p.m. The congressman will discuss what's happening for gifted/talented students in the light of shrinking federal dollars and highlight gifted education in U.S. Department of Education priorities. Congressman Pursell authored the landmark legislation for gifted and talented students in Michigan in the early 1970's and at the federal level in Public Law 95-561-Educational Amendments of 1978. Known as one of the republican "Gypsie moths", he serves on both the House Appropriations and the Sub-Committee on Labor, Education, Health and Human Resources. The evening has been planned by the Young Adult Fellowship as an event for the entire family. Reservations are still being accepted, and can be called in to the Church office 428-8259.

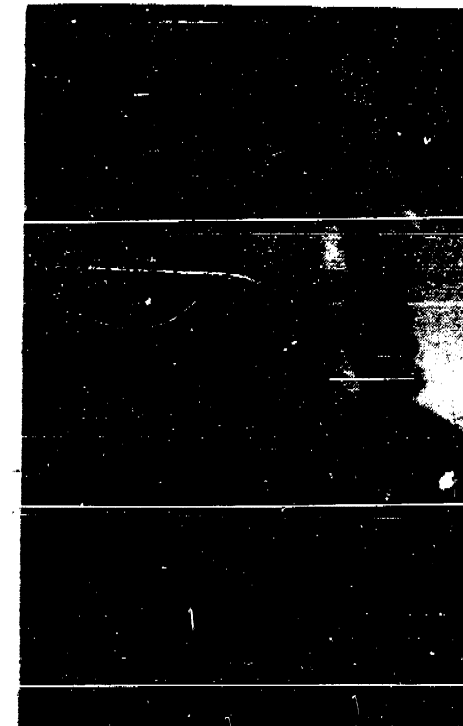
**Manchester Area Historical Society**

Now that school sessions have settled down and we have become used to our routines for the next eight months or so we have found a report of a survey that will be of special interest to all parents of teenagers. It is entitled "How To Avoid Embarrassing Teenagers" and, as you parents who fall in that category well know is a very important document and every parent in that classification should have a copy.

The authors of the survey report that they interviewed 160,000 youngsters and came up with a list of things they wish parents wouldn't do. The four most important were:

1. Don't reprimand them in front of friends.
2. Don't treat them like babies.
3. Don't make scenes in public places.
4. Don't act inappropriately.

To give examples:  
1. Don't, as your daughter comes into the room to greet her date, say, "Susie, don't squeeze the pimple on the end of your nose."

2. Don't tell his teammates that Johnnie still has his Teddy Bear in the closet.  
3 and 4. This means that your teenager has a right to do anything that he pleases, that is, anything that could be called legal such as wearing an orange Mohawk hair cut while sis runs about with a large safety pin anchored in her pierced ear. Above all, ignore these things; don't call attention to them, says Ellen Goodman, an evident specialist on such things. Most children who once thought their parents perfect now, at this age, think they are hopeless. They are as critical of their parents as they are of themselves. Anything we do that is

**New Tapes Added To Tel-Med**

Nine new tapes on plastic surgery have been added to the Tel-Med tape collection in recent months. They include discussions of breast reconstruction, cosmetic body surgery, surgery for Rheumatoid Arthritis of the hands, microsurgery, rhinoplasty, hair transplantation, chemical skin peeling and plastic surgery for scars.

Revised brochures listing all 261 taped messages in the newly expanded Tel-Med library are now available at no cost to community businesses, organizations and residents.

Tel-Med is a free telephone health information service sponsored by the hospitals of Washtenaw and Livingston Counties, the Washtenaw Medical Society and the Washtenaw United Way.

Manchester area residents can call toll-free to the Tel-Med program center, located at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor, and listen to tape recordings in 29 health categories. Tapes cover an extensive range of health topics, including cancer, infections, heart disease, drug use, sexuality and family planning.

**Saline Hospital Stop Smoking Clinic**

A few hours of your time could dramatically improve your health. A Five-Day Stop Smoking Program will be offered at Saline Community Hospital from Monday, September 27, through Friday, October 1, 1982, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the Hospital's Blue Room.

The American Cancer Society has provided valuable information which states that millions of smokers would like to give up cigarettes but continue to smoke because they think that "the damage has already been done." People who have stopped smoking show immediate health benefits. After one year away from smoking, there is an important drop in the risk of heart attacks. When smoking is eliminated from a person's lifestyle, the risk factor is also reduced in the areas of lung cancer, high blood pressure, obesity, high blood cholesterol and strokes.

The Five-Day Plan is sponsored by the Seventh Day Adventist Church of Ann Arbor and Saline Community Hospital. The program will be directed by Arthur Weaver, M.D., and John Swanson, M.P.H.

**Small Cities Program Grant**

Gov. William G. Milliken has announced a \$551,825 Small Cities Program grant for replacement of a 76-year-old bridge over the Huron River in downtown Ypsilanti.

The two-lane bridge, whose load limit has been pared to nine tons from its original 24-ton limit because of structural deterioration, will be replaced by a three-lane bridge with completion scheduled for December of next year.

"This project was considered under the public works aspect of the Small Cities program," Milliken said; "its replacement

is vital to Ypsilanti economic development because it links three separate business areas of Ypsilanti. It is a major transportation connection with Ypsilanti's Depot Town, a commercial and shopping district of historic buildings."

The Small Cities grant, which will be administered by the Ypsilanti Community Development Department, is for half of the estimated \$1.1 million cost of engineering,

demolition and construction. The Michigan Small Cities program is designed to promote economic development in the state through distribution of \$30.5 million of federal funds now administered by the Office of Community Development in the Michigan Department of Commerce.

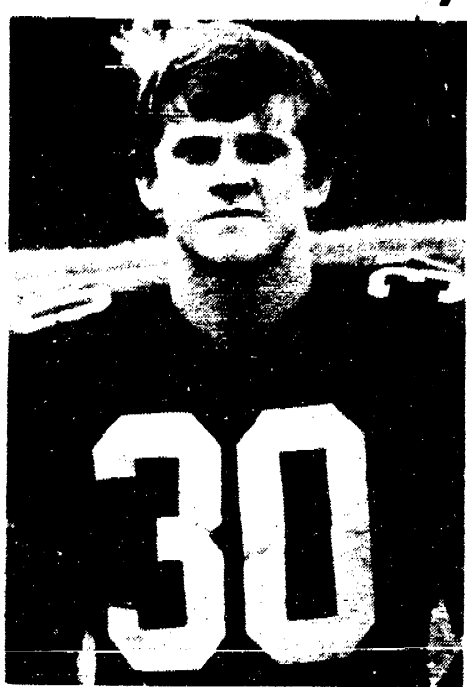

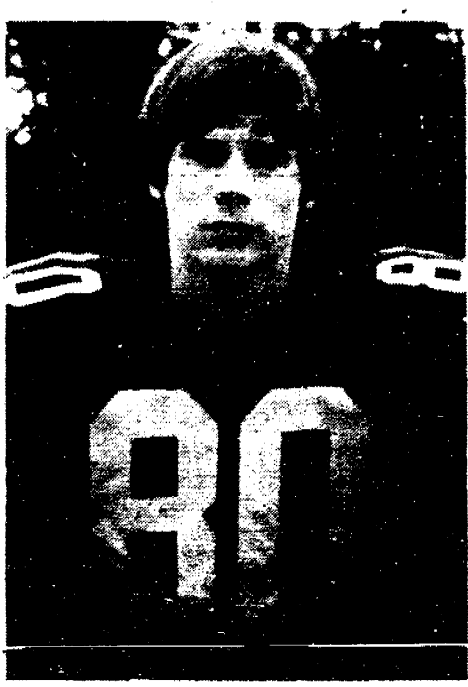

**SUDDEN INFANT DEATH**

Perhaps the most devastating thing that can occur to parents of an infant is a mysterious malady called Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), or crib death. You've all heard of it I'm sure - an apparently normal, healthy baby goes to

sleep and just never wakes up. Although there are a number of theories, the cause of SIDS is still not known. SIDS is the largest single cause of death among infants between the ages of one month and one year, with its peak at 3-to-4 months. In Michigan, somewhere between 250 and 360 infants die each year from SIDS.

SIDS is exactly what the name describes: a sudden, unexpected catastrophe. It leaves the parents not just grief-stricken but also with a terrible sense of guilt. They can't help feeling that if they had just been more alert, their baby's life might have been saved. This is almost never true, but the guilt remains.

The State Health Department has, for some years, been involved with this problem in several ways. For example, in cooperation with local health departments we offer a counseling service for parents of SIDS infants to help them cope with what may, otherwise, be an overwhelming emotional crisis.

Another program provides money for apnea monitoring equipment. Apnea is a medical term which means temporary stoppage of breathing. Studies of infant apnea have focused on the age group most susceptible - infants between 2 weeks and 6 months of age, and the apparently perilous combination of sleep-and-apnea. Some infants can be identified as being at greater risk of SIDS; for example those with a brother or sister who died of SIDS or those who have had what is called a "near miss" for SIDS - an episode of apnea and/or low pulse rate almost causing death. For such infants, monitoring equipment is available to check breathing and heart rate. It is sophisticated equipment which is expensive - but the Department's Crippled Children Program

will pay for the rental for infants anywhere in the state who qualify medically and financially.

Finally, the Department pays for autopsies on all cases of SIDS in the state. These are essential to help determine if possible physiological abnormalities may be identified as common to these infants. As yet, no common cause has been shown to be responsible for SIDS, but research goes on and there are some promising leads.

SIDS is still a mystery - a tragic and heart-breaking mystery - to which medical science still has no answers. But, nationally there is systematic development and support of academic research, and we can all hope that in the not-too-distant future there will be a breakthrough so that the tragedy of SIDS can be prevented.

**Seasonal Suggestions For Horse Owners**

Horse owners are reminded by the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association of a few seasonal suggestions that should help keep their animals healthy and the owners happy.

Foals born this spring and summer will be weaned soon and should be getting plenty of grain and hay so their high nutritional needs for growth can be met. Growing colts and fillies need proportionately much more feed per pound of body weight than adult horses, especially when they are first weaned and "on their own." Mares still nursing foals need more feed than other adult horses since the stress of lactation is quite significant. If your mare was bred and is in

early pregnancy, this is an additional stress on top of lactation that should be taken into account when considering nutritional needs.

Confirmation of pregnancy may not only help determine the mare's fall and winter management needs, but it may help avoid disappointing news in the spring that a mare thought to be in foal was, in fact, not. Pregnancy determination can be done by rectal palpation and/or laboratory blood tests by a veterinarian. Non-return to heat is, of course, an indication that a mare is pregnant, but certainly not fool-proof since many mares cycle heat during the longer days of late spring to late summer and often have no heats at all during the "off" season months. This is why they are known as seasonal broodmares, responding to the longer days when there is more light to stimulate their natural instincts and hormone levels.

Foals need additional attention to internal parasites and vaccinations against the major diseases, and both of these programs should begin when they are two to three months of age. Your veterinarian will advise you of the specific needs but in general foals require the same vaccination and worming programs that the adult horses on your farm need. These programs are generally administered more frequently the first year than later when vaccinations and worming are done at approximately the same intervals as adult horses.

**Manchester Area Bloodmobile Monday, October 18th**

Manchester Area will have its annual fall American Red Cross Bloodmobile Monday, October 18, at the Knights of Columbus Hall from 12 to 6 p.m. Mrs. William Schwab is Chairman-of-the-Day and St. Mary's Altar Society will host the Canteen. A 250 pint goal is set in the hope that volunteer blood donors can keep the necessary blood supply for the county at a safe level.

Men and women in good health, between the ages of 17 through 65 are eligible to donate blood. A person can give five times a year with at least 58 days between donations. This area has 241 people on record who have given individually a gallon or more of blood over the 31 years the Manchester School District has hosted American Red Cross Bloodmobiles. Out of this number 45 are women. There are 3 men who have given 5 gallons each, 12 (including 2 women) who have donated 4 gallons each, 22 with 3 gallon records and 46 have received their 2 gallon pins. Admittedly, these records are low as there are many in the area who have given elsewhere or have lost their cards and their own records. Manchester has only Manchester donations on file.

There are four places in town where one can register and fill out appointment cards. These cards are to be left in the file boxes at each location for pick-up and scheduling. The cards are then mailed back to the prospective donors by October 16, giving the exact time of the appointment. The four locations are: Ann Arbor Bank and Trust on M52, 13A Market (A & B), Great Lakes Federal and National Bank of Jackson on Main Street. It is advisable to have an appointment in order for the Red Cross to be able to bring the proper amount of equipment and number of professional staff to run the clinic smoothly. If impossible to make an appointment, walk-ins are welcome up to 5:55 p.m. and they will be processed as quickly as possible.

**Board Of Education Receives Financial Audit**

At its regular meeting on September 20, the Manchester Board of Education received a report from the firm of Ierman, Johnson and Hoffman, C.P.A.'s regarding the financial condition of the school district. The Audit, which is required by school law, was led by Mr. L.B. Wahl, C.P.A., who is a partner in the firm.

The audit, which examined all financial aspects of the school district, indicated no deficiencies in the business operation of the school district.

Following a brief question and answer period the Board of Education expressed its appreciation for the completeness of the report and took formal action to accept the audit.
