**Manchester Area Bloodmobile Monday, October 18th**

Manchester Area will have its annual fall American Red Cross Bloodmobile Monday, October 18, at the Knights of Columbus Hall from 12 to 6 p.m. Mrs. William Schwab is Chairman-of-the-Day and St. Mary's Altar Society will host the Canteen. A 250 pint goal is set in the hope that volunteer blood donors can keep the necessary blood supply for the county at a safe level.

Men and women in good health, between the ages of 17 through 65 are eligible to donate blood. A person can give five times a year with at least 58 days between donations. This area has 241 people on record who have given individually a gallon or more of blood over the 31 years the Manchester School District has hosted American Red Cross Bloodmobiles. Out of this number 45 are women. There are 3 men who have given 5 gallons each, 12 (including 2 women) who have donated 4 gallons each, 22 with 3 gallon records and 46 have received their 2 gallon pins. Admittedly, these records are low as there are many in the area who have given elsewhere or have lost their cards and their own records. Manchester has only Manchester donations on file.

There are four places in town where one can register and fill out appointment cards. These cards are to be left in the file boxes at each location for pick-up and scheduling. The cards are then mailed back to the prospective donors by October 16, giving the exact time of the appointment. The four locations are: Ann Arbor Bank and Trust on M52, 13A Market (A & B), Great Lakes Federal and National Bank of Jackson on Main Street. It is advisable to have an appointment in order for the Red Cross to be able to bring the proper amount of equipment and number of professional staff to run the clinic smoothly. If impossible to make an appointment, walk-ins are welcome up to 5:55 p.m. and they will be processed as quickly as possible.

**Board Of Education Receives Financial Audit**

At its regular meeting on September 20, the Manchester Board of Education received a report from the firm of Ierman, Johnson and Hoffman, C.P.A.'s regarding the financial condition of the school district. The Audit, which is required by school law, was led by Mr. L.B. Wahl, C.P.A., who is a partner in the firm.

The audit, which examined all financial aspects of the school district, indicated no deficiencies in the business operation of the school district.

Following a brief question and answer period the Board of Education expressed its appreciation for the completeness of the report and took formal action to accept the audit.

**Livestock Brand Register Permitted**

Beginning October 1, Michigan cattlemen and farmers may register livestock brands with the Michigan

Department of State.

According to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin, Public Act 52, approved by the Governor in March of this year, permits individuals who own cattle, horses, hogs, sheep or goats to register brands with the Department of State.

Purpose of the law is to provide uniform identification for livestock. Fee for registering an original brand is \$50.

During the school year many Manchester Middle School and High School students use the Manchester Township Library in preparing for themes, papers, and other reports. The encyclopedias owned by the Library [The Americana, Colliers, The Book of Knowledge, World Book, and Lands and Peoples] are for use in the Library only, and contain basic information about most subjects. The Library has many other volumes of incidental facts, such as the Oxford Companion, Greves Dictionary of Music and Musicians, Who's Who, the Public Affairs Pamphlets, and, in the basement, a file of several years of World Almanacs. It would be impossible, due to shortage of funds and space, for a library in a small community to have available the detailed information needed for long reports or term papers. For that reason, our library is a member of the Washtenaw County Library System and our staff is able to obtain additional reference books by submitting requests. It is, however, necessary to allow adequate time for such a service. The staff needs at least one week to process special requests, so students should stop in or call when the assignment is first given to insure receiving the information in time.

An additional source of current articles is the magazine file. The Library has a subscription to the Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature, and many recent and older issues of popular magazines located

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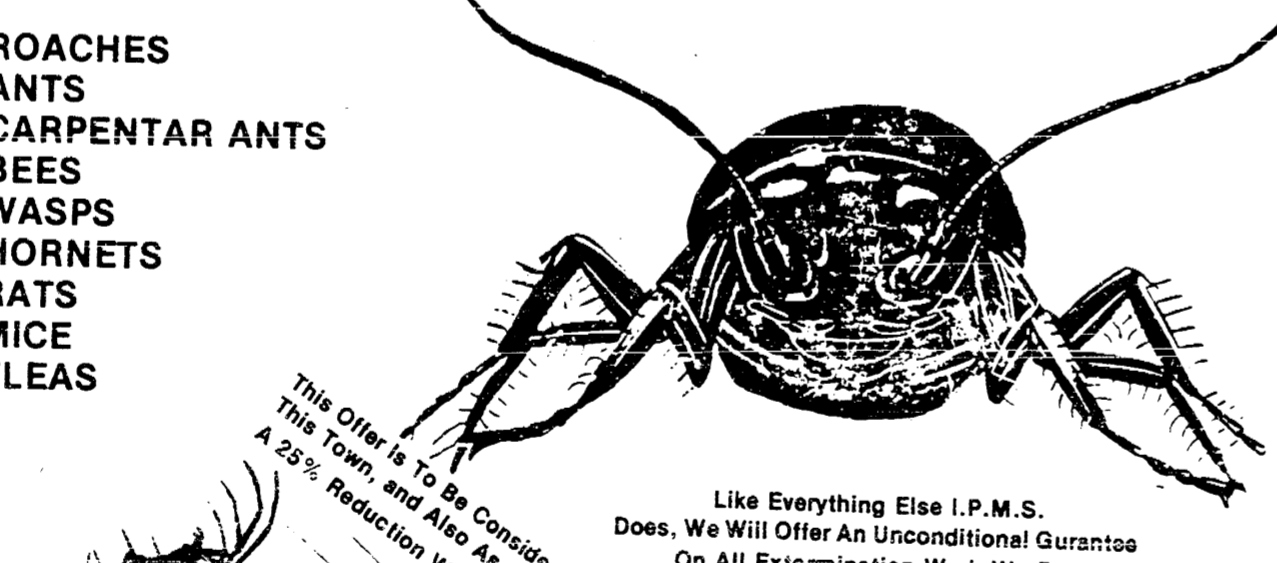

**NEW FISCAL YEAR BEGINS**  
Fiscal Year 1982-83 begins at midnight, September 30 and will expire at midnight September 30, 1983. After putting the final touches on the new \$4,594.5 million budget, State Senators and State Representatives adjourned until November 9, for the final session of the year. Included in the new budget is a provision that will earmark any revenue surpluses for education and revenue sharing with local units of government—areas hardest hit by current

year budget cuts.

**RURAL CRIME DECREASING**  
After years of dramatic increases, 1981 showed a drop in rural crime, according to Michigan State Police. Police officials are giving credit to rural crime prevention efforts on the local level that have made it harder to steal farm equipment and livestock.

**UNEMPLOYMENT DEBT SOLUTIONS UNVEILED**  
Governor Milliken has made several recommendations to the State Legislature to retire the nearly \$2 billion unemployment compensation debt that Michigan owes the federal government. Included in his plans are: a freeze on the maximum employee benefit (\$197/week) until 1986; increasing from 18 weeks to 20 weeks the qualifying period a worker must work before benefits can be received; and allowing new businesses to take a single business tax credit for any penalties they may have to pay the federal government for the outstanding debt. These and many more recommendations, if approved, would expire as soon as the debt is paid.

**TRAFFIC FATALITY STATISTICS**  
The Michigan Department of State Police has released its report on 1981 traffic related fatalities. Statistics showed that occupants in fatal accidents not wearing seat belts totaled 85.5%. Those wearing seat belts accounted for 5.4% of the deaths, with the remainder unknown. From 1977 to 1981, bicycle deaths increased 2.3%, and injuries increased 7.1%. In 1981, 73% of the fatalities occurred in rural areas and 73% of the injuries occurred in urban areas. In addition, the report stated that between 1979 and 1980, 28 people were killed in snowmobile accidents in Michigan.

**MICHIGAN RANKS THIRD IN WINE PRODUCTION**  
Michigan wine production is closing in fast on its closest competitors, California and New York. Increased wine production in Michigan has placed Michigan in third place for 1981. This fall would be the perfect time to visit one of Michigan's wineries. Most are located in Van Buren

and Berrien Counties in southwestern Michigan and in Leelanau and Grand Traverse Counties in northwestern Michigan.

### News Of Good Things Growing

By: Margaret G. McCall  
 Before all our summer garden goodness disappears, I suggest you process and freeze some of it for the winter ahead. Think about all the fresh produce still available in gardens and markets that can be stored - it's like simmering a bit of summer for the snow season.

For starters, you could make a rich spaghetti sauce, using about a dozen of the good things growing in Michigan. If you're going to freeze a batch or two, you can add cooked ground beef if you like.

Use the prepared sauce with spaghetti, in lasagna, in chili, or to make cream of tomato soup.

Start with a large heavy Dutch oven. Saute in 1/2 cup olive or vegetable oil, one large chopped onion, two chopped green peppers, and 3 cloves minced garlic. Cook over low heat about five minutes, then add one pound sliced fresh mushrooms, and eight cups peeled, seeded and chopped tomatoes. Add a half-cup fresh chopped parsley, 1 tablespoon fresh sweet basil, chopped, 1 tablespoon of salt, one of sugar, and a pinch of black pepper. Add 1 cup chopped celery and a cup of shredded carrot. If you have zucchini, shred a cup and add that, too.

Simmer all this slowly, uncovered, until vegetables are very tender and sauce is quite thick. Check for seasoning, and keep it light if you are freezing the mixture. (Flavors intensify in the freezer.)

For spaghetti sauce, brown a pound of ground beef, drain well and add to the vegetable mixture. You may also want to add a few slices of pepperoni, or combine a quarter-pound of hot Italian sausage (casings removed) with your beef when you brown it. A bay leaf adds to the flavor, too.

If you want to use this for tomato soup, puree the mixture in a blender or food processor. Then heat, thicken slightly with a mixture of equal parts of flour and butter (about 2 tablespoons each). If you are using

three cups of your vegetable sauce, pureed, then heat in another pan half as much cream, almost to boiling. Slowly stir the hot cream into the hot vegetable mixture and serve at once. Top with a spoonful of sour cream and a sprinkle of fresh parsley.

### PRESCHOOL NUTRITION

The way a preschool child eats - or doesn't eat - can be frustrating for parents. But, our nutritionists tell me, the years from one to six are frequently marked by changing or finicky appetites. By age six, appetite usually improves again as the need for food increases in response to

another rapid growth period. Still, it's important to develop good eating habits in the preschool years. You can help do this by encouraging your child to eat for fun as well as for health.

Here are ways to make food fun. First of all, serve foods that look good, taste good, and have bright colors, interesting shapes, textures, and temperatures. Discuss how foods look - shapes and colors; feel - smooth, soft, hard; smell - minty, fruity; taste - sweet, bitter, sour; and sound - crunchy, squishy, snappy.

Let the child help prepare meals and snacks. Children tend to eat food they fix themselves.

Praise your child for good eating habits; don't criticize. Your child should not be forced to eat. It is better to encourage a taste and if rejected, try another time. Children will eat when hungry. Don't use food to bribe, reward, or punish, or serve dessert as a reward for a clean plate. This can lead a child to use food to meet emotional needs, which can lead to overeating and possibly obesity.

Remember that play and exercise stimulate an appetite, but exhausting exercise will cause a child to eat poorly. A planned quiet time within an hour before meals can help your child settle down before eating.

Finally, set regular times for meals and snacks. Children need to eat more often than adults. Serve nutritious snacks at least two hours before meals. Meals need to be a family time where your child learns about food, good food habits, table manners and conversation skills. It is important to be casual about what, how much, and the way a child eats. Expect spills and have a towel handy. Little children are usually messy eaters.

If you follow these tips, chances are your child will develop good eating habits - eating for health and for fun.

Barrier Free Design provisions of the Building Code Rules of the MI Construction Code Commission will be reviewed for the public at large at no cost. Handicappers wishing to get information on proposed rules that may affect their level of functioning in the community and statewide are encouraged to attend—as are builders, planners, contractors, building managers, service providers, and realtors.

## Klager Parents Pleased

Last June, all Klager Elementary parents were given an opportunity to express their opinions about the Klager program and staff. Their responses were overwhelmingly positive. In written

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comments parents complimented Dr. Hammond, the principals enthusiasm and new ideas. The Little Dutch News (school newspaper), special events such as Hobby Day, Young Author's Day, and individual teachers.

The area of greatest concern to parents was that the report card did not provide them with enough specific information. A committee consisting of teachers, a parent and principal has since designed a new report card that will be used this year and will hopefully provide more useful data on the child's progress.

Sample responses from the survey were: 99% of the parents responding agreed or strongly agreed that the school was doing a good job teaching basic skills (math and reading). 92% agreed the school helps children get along with other people. 98% agreed the teachers are generally highly competent. 99% agreed that parents are welcome and encouraged to be actively involved in the school.

86% agreed that conferences and reports from school concerning students progress are adequate (In response Klager staff has designed a new report card this year).

About the Principal: 100% of those responding agreed that Dr. Hammond shows interest and enthusiasm and appears genuinely interested in the welfare and satisfaction of the students. 100% agreed that she exercises leadership in planning goals and activities for the school. 99% agreed that she communicates well through letters, school paper, meetings... with parents and community. 93% agreed that Dr. Hammond is available to talk to and assist parents. 100% agreed that she works well with teachers and maintains a comfortable friendly atmosphere in the school. The Klager staff wishes to thank all of the parents who responded to the survey and greatly appreciates their support.

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# Ask The Governor . . . . .

**Question:** A drunk driver killed a young girl in our town not long ago and it turned out he had been arrested for drunk driving before. He still hasn't spent a day in jail. Why aren't the laws enforced?

**Governor:** You have touched on a very serious problem that has stirred public outrage in recent months. We certainly must increase our efforts to deter drunk drivers with previous arrests. It is even more important to deter those who have not yet been arrested. Drivers with prior records represent only 20 percent of the drinking drivers involved in traffic crashes. A recent report on recommended drunk driving counter-measures states that an estimated 80 percent of drinking drivers involved in fatal crashes are first offenders—that is, they never have been arrested for drunk driving before. This statistic makes it clear that it is especially important also to deter drivers who drink but have no prior arrests for drunk driving.

Among several findings, the report revealed that:

-In 1980, 58 percent of the total highway fatalities in Michigan involved drinking drivers. As a result 1,025 lives were lost, 37,996 people were injured, and there were 28,917 property damage crashes. The estimated total annual dollar cost in Michigan was \$580 million.

-Intoxicated drivers represent a very small percentage of the driving population but they are extremely over-represented in traffic fatalities. Of Michigan's more than six million drivers, approximately 10 percent is involved in traffic accidents. Only about 1 percent is involved in alcohol-related crashes, yet more than half of the traffic fatalities involve intoxicated drivers.

-Seventy-six percent of the drinking drivers involved in fatal crashes in 1980 were under the age of 34; 47 percent were 24 or younger and 87 percent of the drivers involved in all alcohol-related crashes were

male.  
-More than two-thirds of the fatal accidents involving drinking drivers occurred in rural areas.

On the basis of these and other findings, the report made a number of recommendations regarding changes in public policy, procedures and proposed legislation. 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## DUNN ANNOUNCES DEADLINE FOR 1983 SERVICE ACADEMY APPLICANTS

U.S. Rep. Jim Dunn of East Lansing has announced that young men and women from Michigan's Sixth Congressional District who are interested in seeking nomination to the U.S. Naval, Air Force, Merchant Marine and Military Academies must apply no later than Nov. 15 for the class entering in June 1983. Michigan's Sixth District stretches from eastern Lansing to Pontiac and includes most of Ingham County; all of Livingston County, except Brighton; northwestern Oakland County; and certain townships in Clinton, Jackson, Shiawassee and Genesee Counties.

Applicants must be legal residents of the State of Michigan, at least 17 years of age but not older than 21 on July 1, 1983, citizens of the United States, unmarried and have no children, Dunn said. The SAT or ACT exams must be taken and scores reported, he added.

The Michigan lawmaker said that selections are based on the scores achieved on the SAT or ACT, class rank, grade point average, school records, extra-

"I urge young people who are interested in attending any of the four U.S. service academies to obtain a nomination application packet from my office as soon as possible," Dunn said.

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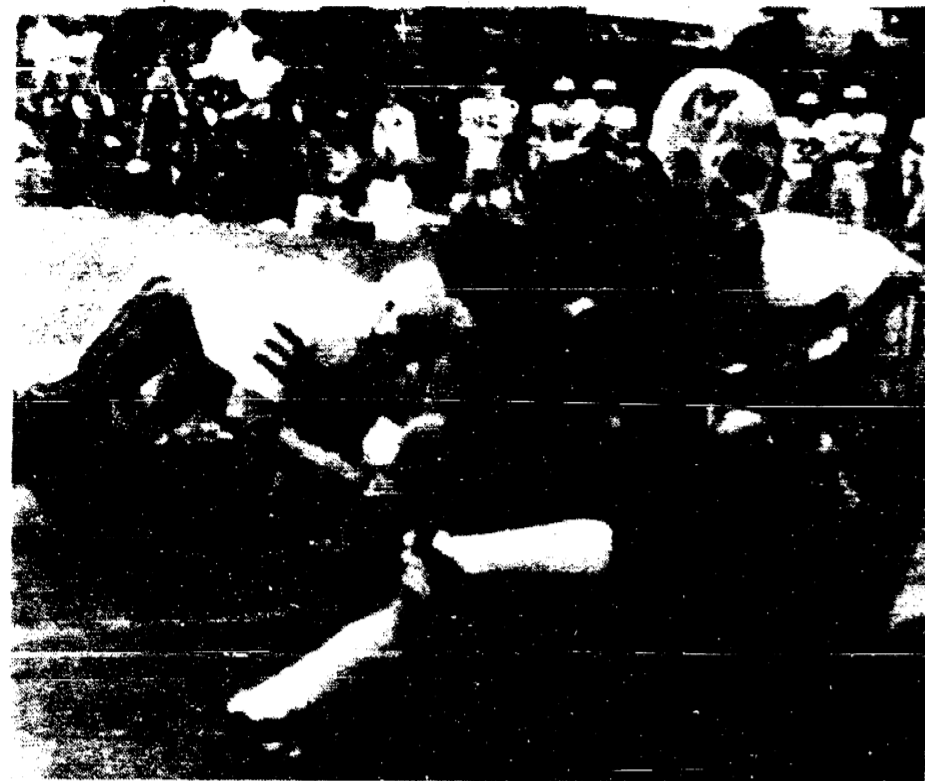
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## Capac Defeats Dutch

student handbooks needed. Don't put it off, this is an excellent opportunity to learn this life saving skill.

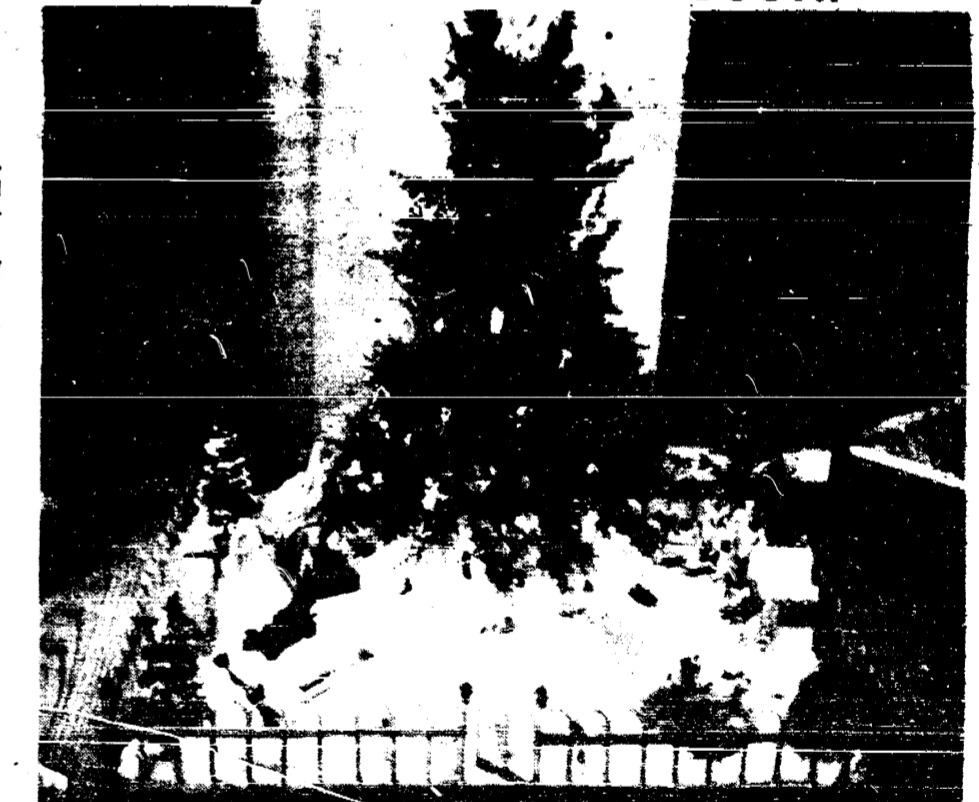

## "Toys Past and Present"



This 18" x 24" Christmas Miniature Tin Village was handmade by Mr. Louis A. Kuebler, a master tinner, for his children Bertha Kuebler Huber, William, Minnie, Herman and Hilda Kuebler Kappler, well before the turn of the century, perhaps after the birth of the first child, Bertha, in 1887, or 1900.

Herman, now 89 years old lives in Saline, told me the story of the little Christmas Village his parents would decorate during the Christmas season, and one part of the story has never left his memory. Herman said his father told the children "to leave the little gate open, so the Angels could go in and out at night," and now nearly a century later, the little gate remains open, guarded by Angels.

Louis A. Kuebler came from Stuttgart, Germany in 1858 to Chicago, Illinois with his brother. The brother, August went to Atlanta, Georgia and Louis came to Ann Arbor, then to Manchester. He married Barbara Kalmbach, born in Wurtenberg, Germany, who came to the United States with her parents at age two, went to Pennsylvania, but then to Manchester. Louis started his tinning business in Manchester in 1895 and was known as "Tinner Kuebler".

Son, Herman went into the business with his father in 1910 at age 17. The shop was located where the Parr Electric is now.

The Village had been stored in the attic of the original Kuebler home on Furnace Street and was re-discovered at the household sale of the late Hilda K. Kappler in May 1980. It was suggested to Herman, rather than selling the village, would he give it to the Manchester Historical Society to which he gladly agreed.

The Village has been repaired, cleaned and painted, same as the original.

The cone shape in the center, once held a live Christmas tree, kept fresh by water held in the cone, which is now rusted out - so a 20th century plastic tree must be substituted.

Isn't it fun to imagine the beautiful tiny antique village miniatures that once upon a time made the Kuebler children happy? Now, in 1982 the village has the 1950's style.

Thank you Herman for giving the children (and adults) a part of a Christmas of long ago. Merry Christmas Herman, 1982, from your friends in Manchester.
