

Dear Mr. Steele:

In December, the State Officers ded a salary increase for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, members of the Legislature and Justices of the Supreme Court, to take effect in

The present 31,000 salary for lawmakers would be increased to \$33.200 in 1984, and expenses would be increased from the present \$5,200 to \$5,700 per year. The Governor's salary would increase from \$70,000 to \$78.000: the Lt. Governor's salary from \$50,000 to \$58,000; the Justices of the Supreme Court from \$69,000 to \$74,000.

Several new legislators (I was one of them) sponsored a that automatic pay raise. It was defeated not by a vote as we had hoped, but by parliamentary procedure. The resolution was referred to the Appropriations Committee: then all committee meetings were cancelled until Tuesday, February 1st. In the House was Honors List addition, until Tuesday. adjourned February 1st - the resolution had to be rescinded by February 1.

What's Cooking in Michigan?

What's nutritious, colorful, flavorful, and conveniently bitesized? You guessed it - red tart cherries! And since February is National Cherry month, and Michigan is the Cherry Capital of the world, it's time for us to

Conveniently, Valentine's day is also in February, and cherries are appropriately colored

committee tells us there are 270 named varieties of red tart cherries, although only a few are grown commercially. And a prime cherry tree 8 to 12 years old will produce about 100 pounds of fruit in a good year — depending upon the weather.

According to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, our state's production of red tart cherries in 1982 totalled 200 million pounds, which was valued at \$28 million. Additionally, we produced 67 million pounds of sweet cherries, worth \$11 million. Our tart cherry production accounted for nearly 84% of the nation's total crop.

With all that information at hand, let's consider what we can do with cherries. They're great in pies, of course, as a filling for cake, in cookies, biscuits, yeast coffeecakes and rolls. Cherries are also a delicious accompaniment to many meats, and if you haven't had cherry soup you've missed an interesting old world menu item. Here's a recipe from "The Art of



herries, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 4 teaspoon cloves, with 4 cups water (or use the equivalent in water-packed canned cherries). Simmer fresh cherries until tender, puree in blender or food processor. Stir in 1 teaspoon cornstarch which has been mixed with 1 tablespoon cold water, bring to boil. Add 1/2 cup sugar and heat thoroughly. Cool, then stir in three-quarters cup sour cream. The cookbook suggests serving cold, after the meat course, with noodles or croutons.

In winter. I like to serve it piping hot as a first course, with spoonsful of sour cream floating on top instead of stirred into the soup. In summer, well chilled, it becomes a refreshing palate cleanser after the main entree.

Jobs Security Via Vocational Education

Throughout America "Educational Spotlight" this week is on Vocational Education. The theme is: "Vocational Education -An Investment in People". Several years of follow-up studies on Manchester High School graduates have shown higher pay and greater job satisfaction where the graduates had completed vocational training and were employed in work related to that

The studies also showed that Vocational Education is often a "stepping stone" to continued (college) in the occupational field. For example, a high percent of graduates of Health Occupations, Electronics, and Office Occupations continued their education in related areas. Surprising to many educators, the percent of "Vocational Graduates" continuing education is nearing that of "General Education Graduates". A key difference is that more "Vocational Graduates" have made a career choice AND have ich skills.

Is the training relevant and will jobs be available for graduates of a high school vocational course? The latest U.S. Department of Labor data lists the thirty-seven (37) occupations for which there will be high job growth during 1990 - 1990. Students in Manchester High School have access to Vocational Education Programs in their eleventh and twelfth

(or start the preparation) for sixty-two percent (62%) of the top surprisingly, the top two ational areas are secretary and nurse/nurse aide.

Through a arrangement with neighboring schools, students have a wide choice. The South & West Washtenaw Consortium provides the operating "umbrella" for Vocational Education in Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Milan and school districts. The Saline Vocational Programs which are available to all Juniors and Seniors include: Agriculture, Auto Service. Building Trades. Child Care. Education, Distributive Food Service Electronics. Graphic Arts, Health Occupations. Machine Shop, Office Procedures, Welding & Fabrication and Cooperative Education.

Besides preparing occupations employment outlook. Vocational Education enhances the academic areas, as English, math and the sciences are applied in real or simulated work settings. A current concern with youth is the lack of good work attributes. A special emphasis in Vocational Education is on job getting and job succeeding skills. Recently, many local employers participated in "Introduction to Employment" seminars and discussed the importance of worker attributes with vocational students. Many attributes or attitudes can be learned and Vocational Education with a concentration of hands-on learning best develops positive work attitudes.







CHILD ABUSE TAX

Would you be willing to help a child in serious trouble, especially if the monetary cost to you was minimal? Suppose, in the wildest stretch of the imagination, you could extend that helping hand not to just one but to thou children. Would you do it?

As mentioned at the outset, this is an opportunity for thousands of us to help thousands of "them" at very limited personal expense. hope you will be able to find i within your heart to help fight child abuse by preventing the problem BEFORE it starts.
