The Manchester Bank

The Manchester Bank is not in existence. It has never "grew" like Topay, nor has it been ushered into life in any natural way whatever. In fact we have no Bank of any kind; but in fact, also, we greatly need one. We are surrounded by a class of wealthy farmers. There is not a week passing in which each of them doesn't handle money. They are perplexed regarding its safety; troubled as what to do with it; or, rather to find out the best and surest way either to borrow or lend.

Our business men feel this inconvenience very much. They have no way by which they can secure exchange on New York or Boston, unless they send by mail, for we have no telegraph, to Jackson or Adrian for such. And then they must do their business by letter instead of by personal negotiation.

Indeed never has a small, live, growing town been in greater need of a bank than ours. But let us state what kind of a bank we need.

First of all we need a Bank with responsible and well known citizens as its Officers and Directors. We say citizens, not a citizen. We need a Bank so strong and so square in its responsibilities and dealings, as to make every one having any transaction with it, feel perfectly at rest.

Secondly, we do not want a broker; by this we mean one man skulking behind a little counter, having keen, cool, merciless eyes

in his head, bent on bleeding to the very death every one crossing his threshold. We do not want any such thing. We would do our best as a journalist, to discountenance such an unprofitable enterprise.

We speak of this in a plain and emphatic manner because we know, know from personal experience how such men act and deal. We would as readily wade barefooted in a marsh full of leeches as to deal with men of this class if we could possibly help it.

Thirdly, we need a Bank possessing fire-proof and burglar-proof safes. We need a bank having deposits and correspondence with some of the main banks in New York and other cities. A bank where coupons and government stock

Karl Agin Honored

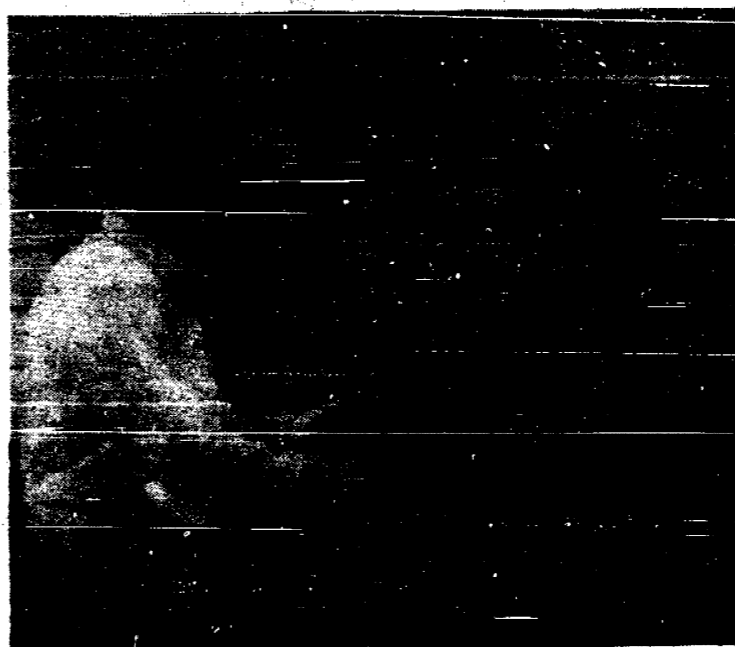
