## HIT or MISS

Now that we have received our second seed catalog, it is not too early to list gardening hints for the novice. May we offer the following:

Most seed packages say to plant when all danger of frost is over. In Michigan that can be most any time. We have no idea when that is.

The smart thing to do is to plant your seedlings indoors and then transplant them outdoors after all danger of frost is over. They should be grown where they are exposed to sunlight which in Michigan is during February and March.

The bathroom is a fine humid place to grow them but there is liable to be objections on the part of your better half, so take them to the basement and install fluorescent lights at considerable costs.

You should start the seedlings about six weeks before there is any frost danger, whenever that is.

All gardens have pests. They wander over from their gardens next door, sneer at your crooked rows, chuckle at your anemic seedlings and peer at your unpulled weeds and ask "Whatcher growing, a new kind of

something?"

Weeds are as bad as pests but not so noisy. Plants that are not crops are weeds. One way to tell them is that they are the only thing in your garden that are growing. If allowed to grow they will kill what remains of your crops and attract pests. If you wait until midsummer to plant, weeds won't grow very fast - neither will the crops. Just make sure it is after all danger of frost.

Surround your growing crops with mulch which tis said is derived from rotting things in the German language. Some gardeners use old newspapers for mulch which works nicely until the first rain or high wind. Garden shops however, will sell you mulch for about \$3.00 a bale with the promise that it will keep the weeds down. For a somewhat larger amount the same fellow will sell you the Brooklyn Bridge.

It is quite difficult to tell the flowers from the weeds but if you use straw for mulch you will get hands full of the stuff every time you pull up the weeds that grow through but if the wind is right just toss handfuls up in the air in the direction of the pest's garden next door and chuckle loudly.

## Fire Destroys Livery

Reprint from the Manchester Enterprise dated September 7, 1876

While a majority of our citizens were quietly eating their dinner on Tuesday, they were startled by an alarm of fire, and soon the streets were filled with people, who discovered dense clouds of smoke issuing from the livery barn of J.S. Vreeland, in the rear of John Koch's meat market, on the north side of Exchange Place. The Babcock Hook and Ladder

trucks were soon upon the grounds but the barn being filled with straw and hay, was enveloped in flames almost before the horses, carriages, etc., could be taken from it, and the large barn adjoining it on the west was soon enveloped in flames. By this time the heat was very oppressive, and as the wind was carrying the flames in the direction of the Goodyear House, which was in close proximity, a portion of the crowd turned their attention towards that building.

while others, by the aid of the hooks and ladders, tore down the large carriage sheds in front of Vreeland's stables. In a few moments the hotel barns, occupied by T.J. Farrell, was on fire and beyond hopes of being saved. The excitement at this period became great, and telegrams were sent to Adrian for assistance. The air was filled with flying cinders and the residences on both sides of Exchange Place, west of Clinton street, were in

imminent danger. The Presbyterian and Baptist Churches took fire, but were promptly extinguished. The hotel building and all the business blocks were well guarded to prevent them from taking fire, and it was only by the greatest efforts that the hotel was saved. Had that taken fire there is no telling what the destruction would have been. It was in fighting the flames away from the windows of the Goodyear House, that the Babcock fire extinguishers did such gallant service, as nothing else could have done it. The large row of trees, on the east side of Dr. Bessac's house, and the promptness of Captain Spencer and his Babcock, was all that saved the Doctor's residence, and consequently the entire row of residences westward, from destruction. By almost superhuman efforts the flames were confined to the three barns which were soon laid low, and then the danger was over. It was then that the almost exhausted through ceased their labors to take view of the situation, and many a sigh of relief was heard, and smiles of satisfaction seen, on the faces of our citizens. We don't know but prayers were said. A second telegram was sent to Adrian, telling them that the fire was under control and not to come with their engine. The loss is probably not far from \$2,000. John Koch, J.S. Vreeland, Jos. McMahon, T.J. Farrell, A.S. Bradt and possibly one or two others, are the victims. The origin of the fire was not known until in the evening. In the forenoon Lorenzo Greenman got drunk, and went up into Vreeland's barn to sleep. He lit his pipe and three the match into the straw, which quickly took fire, and before he had scarcely time to jump from the door to the ground, the barn was in flames. This is his story for it. He told it because he could not keep it to himself; and to atone for his misdeeds, has agreed to lay the brick for Koch's new barn. This may be satisfaction for Koch, but how will the others feel about the matter? Our citizens have need to feel indignant, for it was a wonder that the whole town was not burned.

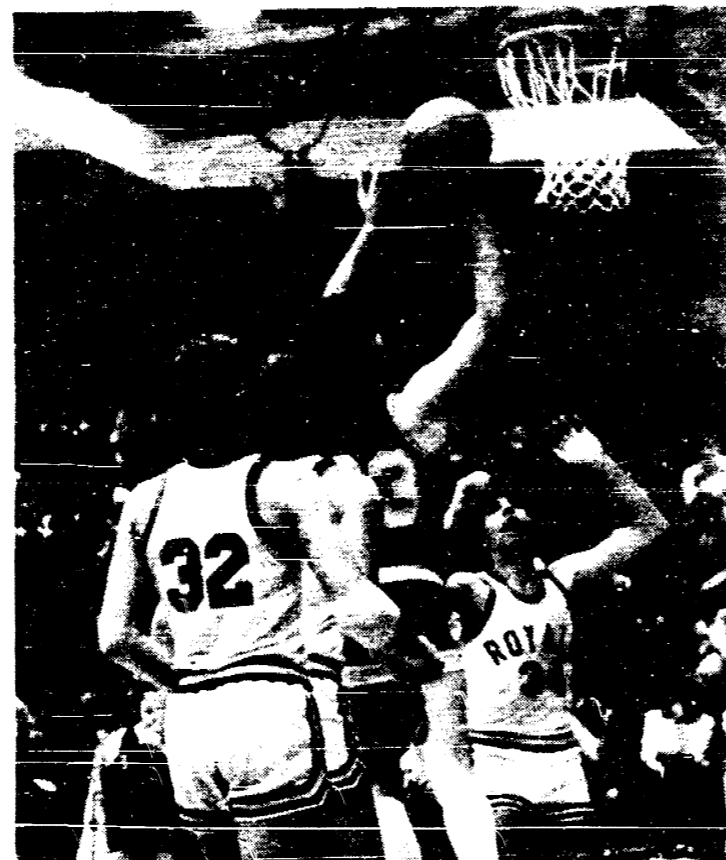
We learn that John Koch and Joseph McMahon intend to rebuild at once, and as the lots are inside the fire limits the buildings will have to be of brick.

Dave Malcolm pops for 2 of his 14 points against Blissfield



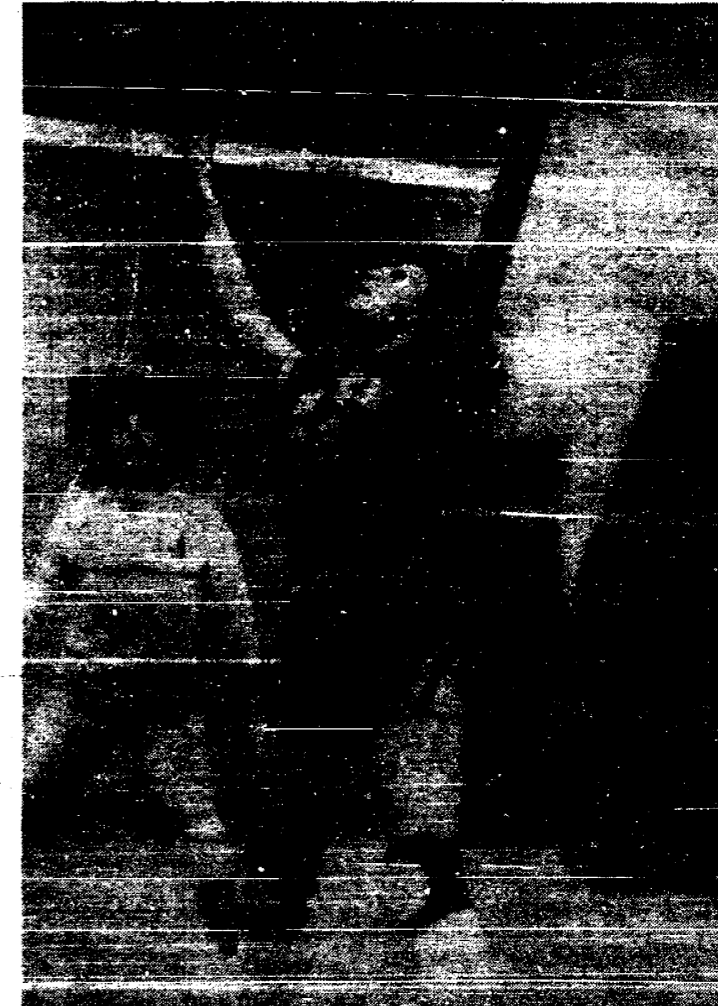

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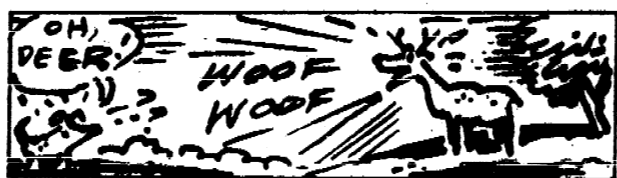


Hit or Miss

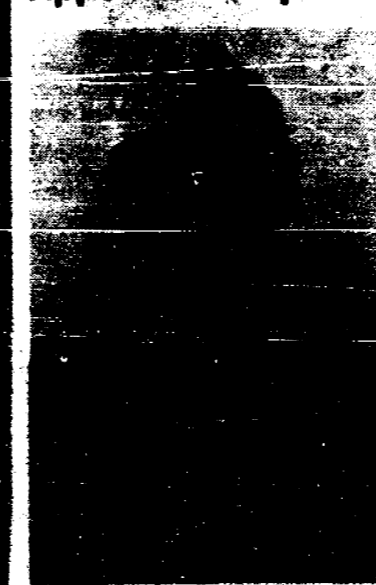

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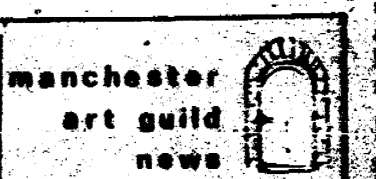

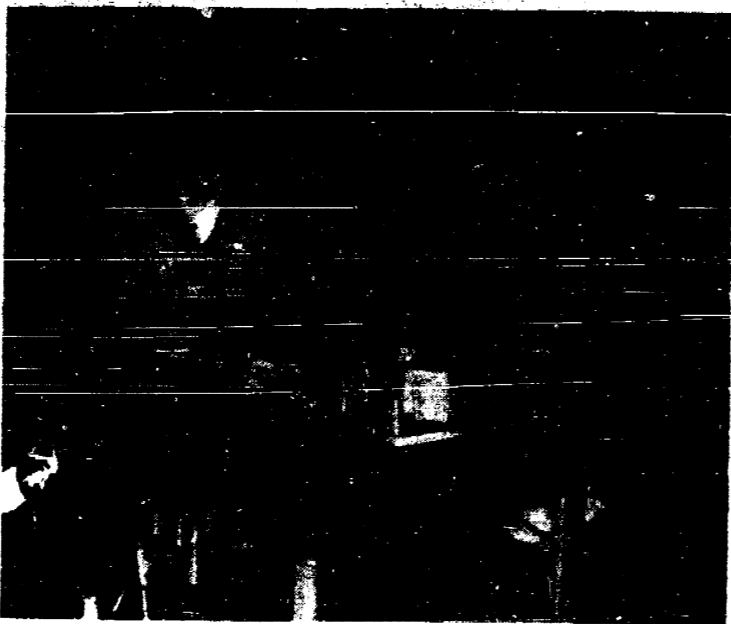

Four years ago, a basic woodshop program was introduced to the fifth and sixth graders so that the students could be given a practical "hands on" experience. Instruction in the use of hand tools stressing safety was implemented at that time. Simple projects were designed and created by the students.

Since that time the middle school woodshop program has expanded significantly. Programs now exist in each of our four grades. Simple hand tools are still being used in the fifth and sixth grade areas. The seventh and eighth grade segment has experienced tremendous growth as the result of acquiring needed power equipment.
