> The Ann Arbor Bicycle Touring Society was incorporated in 1977 (as an offshoot of American Youth Hostels) to promote local touring rides into the surrounding countryside on weekday evenings as well as one and two-day weekend rides. The club is comprised of riders

> ranging in ability from competitive racing athletes to interested beginners. As a rough gage to evaluate their present level, bicycle riders have a choice of three riding ability classifications: "A"-relatively fast, 15-18 mph, able to ride 100 mi. in 7 hours: "B"-moderate, 12-15 mph, stops as needed, ride 65 mi. in 5 hours; and "C"leisurely, 8-10 mph, frequent

Regular weekly rides in April include the Saturday Breakfast which leaves at 8:30 a.m. from the old Amtrak station, destination Dexter. "C" riders take breakfast from the bakery to the nearby park on the river, then return directly to Ann Arbor. "A"/"B groups continue after breakfast on a 40-70 mile ride.

A new feature beginning with the April 2 Saturday Breakfast ride is a 20-minute clinic on riding techniques to be held in Delhi Park, conducted by Reuben





A University of Michigan service has been "cleared for take off" in early May with a Certificate of Need recently approved by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

The emergency air service, called Survival Flight, will be based at the U-M Hospitals in Ann Arbor, serving the surrounding region within 150

The service will be the first hospital-based similar programs exist in other

The Hospitals' helicopter will be called in when special factors

Fire departments, police and ambulances would be the first responders at an accident scene, and only they will make the decision to call Survival Flight. Within 5 minutes of a call for its ervices, the belicopter will be in

Survival Flight also will be used

for transporting critically ill patients from other hospitals to U-M Hospitals for its special care mits, such as the Burn Unit or the Holden Infant Intensive Cre

be able to carry two patients, and will have a full range of special equipment for treating patients with obstetrical, newborn, burn, -Bonsai Clinic, June 4, 9:30 a.m. and spinal cord emergencies. The helicopter is capable of speeds of to 150 miles per hour. Its range of maximum effectiveness will be 40

> to 150 miles. Also carrying patients in Michigan in major emergencies are helicopters operated by the Coast Guard and the Detroit Police: however, these services are not based at a hospital or routinely staffed with physicians and flight nurses, a key advantage

of a hospital-based service. Survival Flight will be staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a eek. The team will include a pilot and flight nurses who complete a rigorous training program that includes emergency medical technician certification for advanced field medicine special

Emergency medicine physicians or other U-M Hospitals specialists such as cardiologists or eurosurgeons who have been trained in helicopter operations will routinely staff any flight where their services are needed. James R. Mackenzie, M.D., chief of Emergency Services at the U-M, will be medical director of

THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

In 1866, after the cruel war was over and Johnny had come marching home, greenbacks, government bonds, etc., were protruding from the pockets of merchants and farmers, until they had so much money they hardly knew what to do with it. The demands of the armies had raised that they all got rich and they decided to "rebuild the town."

One of the first buildings erected on Exchange Place was the three-story brick now Macomber Bros. It was built in 1866 by G.L. Unterkircher and George Hoy.

negotiated for lots on the elevated ground between Ann Arbor Road and the river, which was owned by J.W. Cowan. The first house built was the frame house now occupied by Dr. Ben Conklin and the handsome row of brick dwellings followed, one

Henry Goodyear, a wealthy Sharon farmer, caught the building fever and in 1867 erected the handsome three-story brick block, with basement. It cost about \$22,000, and had one of the finest public halls in the third story to be found in the state.

A planning mill and other manufactories were started. and with the erection of business blocks, which were rapidly filled with large stocks of goods, and the building of residences, etc., appropriated for its construction, the town fairly boomed. 



In 1983, America's electric utility industry will be starting its second century of service. Electricity has become so much a part of our lives that it is hard to believe that only 100 years ago it was a dazzling innovation, and only a fev homes and businesses were enjoying electric lights.

In September of 1532, Thomas Edison opened the first electric generating plant on New York City's Pearl Street, providing direct-current electricity to 59 customers in lower Manhattan. At first limited to lighting, electricity was virtually an overnight success, and by 1888, 185 Edison central electric illuminating companies were operating around the country.

The efficient, clean new power source sparked a social and technological revolution, and soon electricity was harnessed for every conceivable use. Electric motors moved to farms and factories, improving efficiency and productivity. Electric trolleys provided a new means of transporting electric elevators literally gave man the boost needed to build the first skyscrapers, and cities began to rise upward. Within the next few years, personal computers will help us to do everything from office work, balancing the check-

book, monitoring room

temperatures, ordering gro ceries and planning menus to providing burglar alarm systems, watching our children and entertaining us. All our technological advancements have made life easier for Americans; they lighten our workload and provide us with greater leisure time than ever before. 
