## Hoover Universal Plans Community Event

Hoover Universal, Inc. through its Plastics Machinery Division has been a productive member of the Village of Manchester since November of 1971, the year in which it was relocated to Manchester from Saline. Starting out in Saline as a small manufacturer of Uniloy reciprocating screw, extrusion blowmolding systems for producing polyethylene handwear containers, the Division now employs in excess of 475 people with total sales nearing \$50 million. In the last fifteen years it has grown to become a worldwide leader in the manufacture of state-of-the-art, in-plant blowmolding systems for producing all types and sizes of plastic containers and parts.

The Division is headquartered in Manchester with additional manufacturing facilities located in Middlesex, New Jersey, City of Industry, California, East Longmeadow, Massachusetts and Somerset Center, Michigan. Recently, the corporation authorized the Division to further strengthen its commitment to the economic base of the Village of Manchester by purchasing and renovating the historic Ford Motor Company manufacturing facility, which is located on the scenic Raisin River. The facility will serve as a Marketing and Technical Service Center, and, if

business continues to develop as planned, it should provide the base for 25 to 30 jobs over the course of the next two to three years.

The dedication and skill of its employees is pointed to as the basis for the continued success of the Plastics Machinery Division. ## FIRE!!

A reprint from the Manchester Enterprise, dated April 1, 1880

Our citizens were alarmed by the cry of fire at about two o'clock on Tuesday afternoon. The rapid strokes of a farm bell at the mammoth hardware store attracted the attention of the business men and people on the street, and an excited crowd was soon seen rushing across Exchange street bridge, going towards "Canada." A large volume of smoke was seen arising near the Universalist church, and it was soon ascertained that the barn occupied by John Schaffer, in the rear of the church was on fire and the flames were spreading rapidly. Immediate efforts were made to save the contents of the barn. There were three cows and a span of horses in the barn; two of the cows were taken out, but the fire drove the people out, and one was left to be devoured by the element. The horses were taken out, but one of them was badly scorched and its eyes put out.

It was useless to attempt to save the barn or the one adjoining it, belonging to Charley Youngmans, so the people turned their attention to the care of the adjacent property. The wind was blowing slightly from the east and the flames were carried in the direction of the church, but a vigilant watch was kept and no damage was done.

The Cause.  
Schaffer's little boy went to the barn and set the straw on fire.

then told his mother that he had built a bonfire in the barn.

The Loss.  
The barn occupied by Schaffer belonged to an Ann Arbor man; the loss was slight. Schaffer lost some hay, etc., besides the cow, which was not of much value, but as he is a poor man, of course he will feel the loss considerable.

Charley Youngmans says his loss is about \$50, besides the barn, which is between \$50 and \$100 more. He had the barn and contents insured, but the policy expired a day or two before and he had neglected to have it renewed.

Incidents.  
A number of little children were playing horse in Charley Youngmans' barn, and Charley's little four-year-old boy was tied to the manger with a clothes-line. His cries attracted the attention of George Sherwood, who went to the barn and found the little fellow rubbing his eyes and screaming like mad. Sherwood had considerable trouble to break the rope and extricate the little fellow from his perilous position.

The fire department did not turn out and it is just as well, for they could have done no good. However, almost every member of the company was there, and had the common council not taken the extinguishers off of the trucks and away from the engine house last winter, the company no doubt would have been promptly on hand.

## HIT OR MISS

There have been of late, references in the papers of a new Social Security card to be issued by the government to be made of bank note paper to be used after October 31, which it is hoped will be nearly counterfeit proof.

The new card will look the same as the existing pasteboard version, but it will be printed by the intaglio method and will feel like a dollar bill. The Social Security Administration expects to issue about 11 million of them a year, but officials have emphasized that existing cards will remain valid and need not be replaced unless they are lost or worn out.

The little-noticed change in the law, which was approved by Congress in April, as part of a massive financial rescue plan for the Social Security system, "will make it more difficult to counterfeit or misuse the Social Security card," Louis D. Enoff, acting deputy Social Security commissioner, told a Senate Judiciary subcommittee. This was the purpose of the

switch to banknote paper; counterfeiting of Social Security cards has become a big business in recent years as illegal aliens have sought cards to show employers.

But the new requirement is regarded as a mixed blessing by the Reagan administration in general and the Social Security Administration in particular.

"We are concerned," Mr. Enoff said, "that issuing the banknote-paper card will heighten the tendency to regard the Social Security card as a reliable identifier and will intensify interest in using the SSN (Social Security number) for purposes of identification."

He noted that the Reagan administration, like its predecessors of both political parties, "has stated repeatedly its vigorous opposition to the idea of any document, and particularly the Social Security card, becoming a national identifier."

Mr. Enoff has good cause for concern: 205 million Americans

Income levels for low income families include the income for all in the household and should be less than \$6,075 for a family of 1, \$8,175 for 2 and add \$2,100 for each family member in larger household. (example - \$16,575 for family of 6).

**Meeting Notice**

Washtenaw County school superintendents, board of education presidents, and township supervisors met at the Washtenaw County Intermediate School District offices on Tuesday, September 13, at 4:00 p.m. to sign agreements initiating summer tax collections starting in the summer of 1984.

A committee of several school superintendents and township officials has been meeting since January to explore the best ways to achieve common implementation of the summer tax collection legislation passed

last year. Committee co-chairs Harry Howard of the Ann Arbor Public Schools and Robert Lillie of Pittsfield Township have cited several examples of advantages to be gained through the new agreements. Chief among these reasons are: countywide uniformity in summer tax collection, the elimination of the 1% collection fee formerly assessed against taxpayers, and a considerable reduction in the time involved negotiating separate annual agreements between the districts and the townships.

Lillie and Howard report that while taxpayers may find the first year adjustment bothersome, the long range effect will be to the taxpayer's benefit. Summer tax collections will greatly improve the cash flow process in county school districts, with borrowing at high interest to meet first quarter revenue needs becoming unnecessary or substantially reduced.

**Family Rights And Privacy Act**

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 directs that the Manchester Community Schools inform you of your right to review any and all school records, files and any other data which we have which relates to you (adult student) or your child. After you have reviewed any of these materials, if you feel there are any inaccurate, misleading or inappropriate data in these files about you (adult student) or your child, you have the right to request a hearing to challenge and/or correct such information. Such a hearing request should be directed first to the principal, and subsequently to the superintendent, if you are not satisfied with the principal's decision.

Additionally, we will not release any information about you (adult student) or your child without your permission; this is really a continuation of our long-standing policy. The only exceptions to this procedure are when another school district requests your records or the publication of school directories, athletic programs, and other similar listings. Parents or eligible students shall be notified when other districts request records. Please feel free to call to make arrangements for reviewing any records we may have or the policies and regulations covering student records. We will ask only that you complete a form that allows us to keep accurate records of such requests.

August 15, 1983

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Council was called to order by President Hinkley at 7 p.m. Present: Cornell, Kallewaard, Koebbe, Schaible, Smith, Zsenyuk. Absent: DuRussel, and Harris.

Cornell moved to approve minutes as corrected, supported by Koebbe. Motion approved. Dan Hutchins and David Gibson, representing Dihydro Company, (Quality Water Systems) was present to discuss water filters. After a lengthy discussion, Mr. Hutchins and Mr. Gibson recommended that the Village refurbish the old water filter system.

Mr. Hutchins gave a firm bid of \$27,780.00 to clean, scrape and rebed the old filters. This was the lowest bid of the four bids which were submitted.

DuRussel entered at 7:42 p.m. Mr. Hutchins said before they begin in two weeks they will submit in writing an itemized list of work to be done on the filters that was presented to Council. 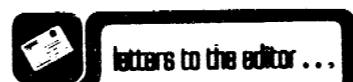

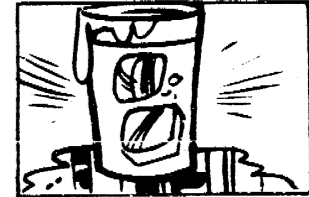

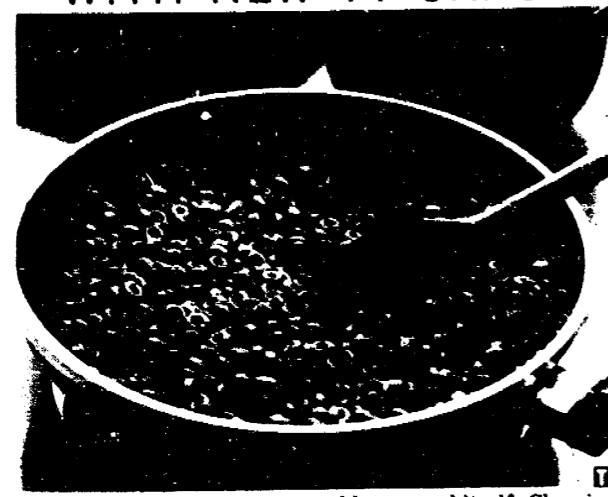
Buono placed fifth in the fitting and showmanship class and sixth in conformation judging.

workers must check documents - including Social Security cards - of applicants to insure they are legally entitled to work in this country. The executive branch would have three years to implement a new secure system of identifying everyone eligible to work in the United States, and a revamped Social Security card is viewed by many as the logical front-runner for use as a national identity card.

Since 1978 applicants for new or replacement Social Security Cards have been required to provide documentary evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or alien status.

But the Social Security system has been in operation since 1936, and nearly 90 per cent of all active SSNs were issued simply on the basis of the applicant's own statements about his or her name, address, date and place of birth, sex, and other information.

The validity of any identification document, Mr. Enoff noted, is only as good as the proof presented in obtaining it. Even under the more rigorous evidentiary requirements in effect since 1978 documents used to qualify for a Social Security card are relatively easy to counterfeit or to obtain fraudulently, he said.

"Trying to create a new, secure national identification document based on existing proofs of identity would be like building the proverbial house upon the sand," Mr. Enoff warned.

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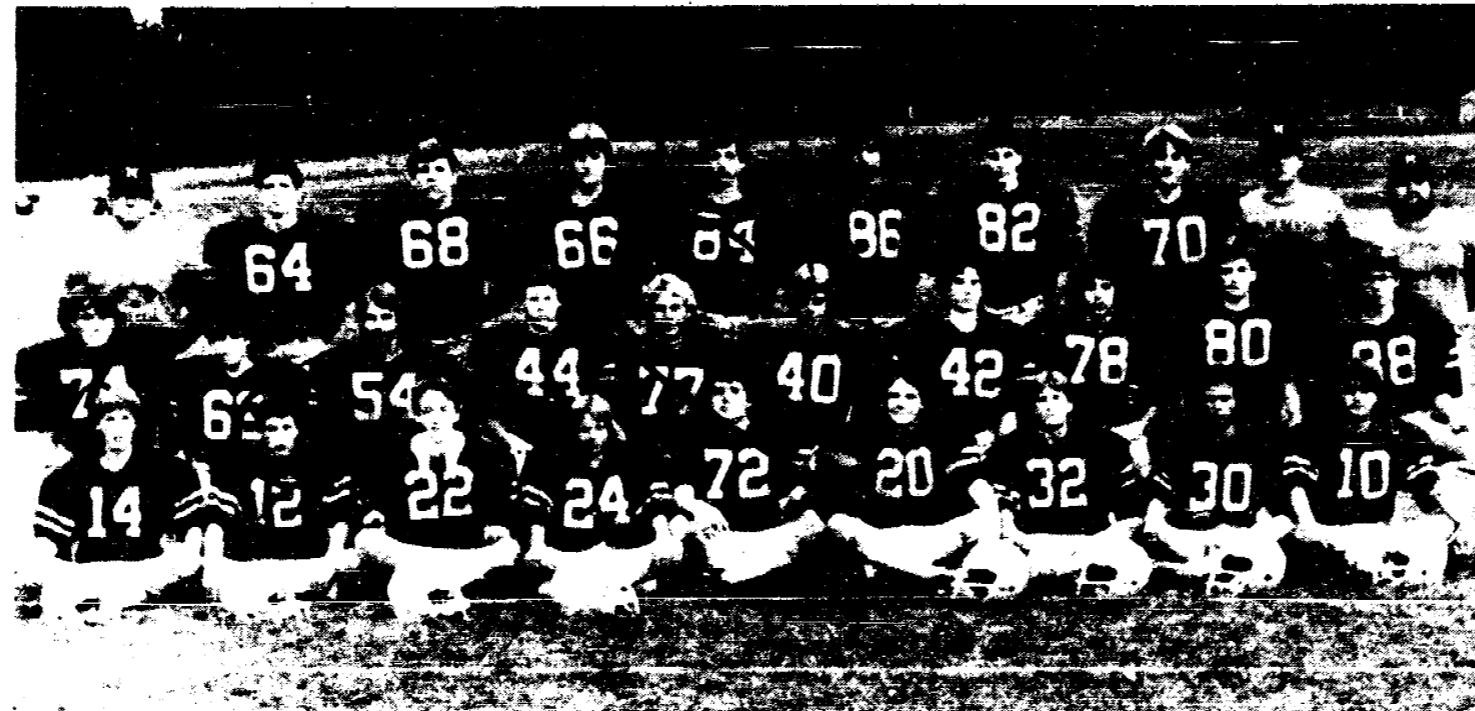
