1 can (12 ounces) V-8 Vegetable Juice

1/4 cup lime juice

3 3/4 cups sugar

1 cup chopped pears

1 pouch (3 ounces) liquid fruit pectin

chopped fresh mint

cut in very thin strips

(1/2-inch long)

1 tablespoon finely

In 4-quart saucepan, combine first 6 ingredients.
 Over high heat, heat to full boil, stirring constantly.
 Stir in pectin. Boil rapidly 1 minute, stirring con-

stantly.

3. Remove from heat. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Stir and skim to cool slightly and prevent floating fruit (about 10 minutes).

4. Ladle into hot sterilized jars or glasses. Cover with 1/8-inch hot paraffin. Makes about 4 cups.

SEVENTH AND EIGHTH GRADE ELECTIVE PROGRAM

This week's spotlight will focus on physical education and career education.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The seventh and eighth grade physical education program is split into four nine-week components to match the length of our marking periods. Each marking period is basically divided into three activities with both individual and team sports being offered at various times throughout the year. Theory and rules classes are also interjected into all activities. Sportsmanship, responsibility, and teamwork are stressed.

During September/October the students participate in soccer, flag football, and aerobics. November/January is reserved for floor hockey, volleyball, and basketball. "Physical fitness programs are introduced during February/March. April/June bring softball, track, and several individual sports such as tennis, badminton, and croquet to the forefront.

Mr. Ron Jansen and Mrs. Gay Perry are in charge of our physical education program.

CAREER EDUCATION

This elective features many films, film strips, speakers, and some written work and note taking. Field trips to local businesses are also incorporated into this class. Our students are exposed to a great variety of occupations learning the requirements, salary, etc. of each one. By the end of this nine-week course students should be aware of what type of job fits their personality traits.





SPINAL CORD INJURIES

Before this day is over, another 30 Americans will be paralyzed by spinal cord injuries. By this time next year, spinal cord injuriesbroken necks and backs-will have accounted for an additional 10,000 cases of paralysis. Most of these cases will occur, as they do every year, among young people between the ages of 15 and 24. Young men will be hardest hit. On the average, they'll be just 19' when they sustain their disabling injuries.

Automobile accidents on our highways account for almost half of all spinal cord injuries. Dives into shallow water, falls (particularly from heights) and assaults with guns and knives add to the toll. Spinal cord injuries have become a very serious problem among young people. Compounding the tragedy is the fact that in many cases a measure of caution and common sense could have prevented the injury.

Accidents will happen, yes, but a great many paralyzing injuries can be prevented. The grim reality of alcohol-related traffic accidents should be a primary concern of every parent, every citizen in the community. Seat belts and infant seats are available routinely. We should use them and insist that our children use them. A recognized driver's education program should be a must for teenagers.

We should insist, too, that family members who ride motorcycles and bicycles wear helmets, to protect against injuries to the head and neck. Diving accidents can be avoided by heeding the simple warning, "Know the depth before you

If, despite all precautions, your teenager or someone else does suffer a possible spinal cord injury, make sure that he or she receives proper medical care immediately. For starters, don't move the victim-not even a little bit-until a spinal cord injury has
