31st Annual Chicken Broil

Last year's Broil was the thirtieth put on since Luther Klager and Dr. Howard Zindel of Michigan State University hatched the idea in 1954. For the first time in those 30 years, the weather almost put a stop to everything when a series of severe thunderstorms swept Washtenaw County. The rain put out the fires and doused diners waiting in line, but the fortitude and organization of the Broil volunteers carried the day, and Manchester's classic chicken dinners were served up in spite of everything. The weather did its worst, but the Broil still made a profit last year.

This year, Mother Nature is bound to be more polite, sc Manchester's tradition should enjoy a lively repetition. In honor of past performances, Fat Bob Taylor, the singing plumber and

local radio host, will be the guest of honor. Bob will no doubt treat everyone to a sample of his glorious sound. The Manchester Historical Society will open the doors of the old blacksmith shop on East Main Street to visitors eurious about our town's past. Broil organizers are busy lining up entertainment to accompany the chicken munching and finger licking. Since 1984 is an election year, a crowd of politicians is sure to attend, ready to shake anyone's hand and give away free bumper stickers.

As always, Gambles Hardware Store on Main Street is the headquarters for the Broil. Any volunteers, man or boy, who would like to work at the Broil can stop by and sign up with Donna Gill. Tickets can be purchased in advance for \$4.00 or at the gate the day of the Broil for \$4.50. These prices include the first increase in four years, but are still very reasonable for the size and quality of the meal.

Manchester Physics Students Awarded

Manchester students placed second overall and took first place honors in the academic areas of the Tecumseh High School Physics Olympics held Saturday, April 28.

The students scored highest in the Phiz Quiz (general physics knowledge), the Fermi Quiz (using powers of estimation) and the laboratory skills.

Katie Miller, Bill Hansen, Chad Creps, Kraig Sauter and Mike Duvall participated in 10 of the 13 events winning seven blue ribbons and three second place red ribbons. Jim Stengel was unable to compete in the competition but did aid in preparation for the events. The physics team was coached by Janet Garrity, physics instructor.

In the competition based on the physics principles of sound, the Manchester team tuned 16 pop bottles by ear alone then played the "Blue Danube Waltz" as their musical selection.

Other areas of competition in which Manchester students placed first were the building of a toothpick bridge that supported over 100 times its own weight; the construction and flight of a paper airplane; and the firing of a catapult for accuracy.

The Manchester team placed second in the construction of a package to protect a raw egg dropped 25 construction of an automobile powered by a mousetrap; and estimating the number of glass beads in a bottle (the use of

measurement tools). The competition, designed by Tecumseh High School physics instructor Paul Cunningham, is based on the famous Physics Olympics, Engineering Design Competition and other games. It was designed to demonstrate that physics can be adapted to events of everyday life.

Entry forms were received from Sand Creek, Southlake, Taylor Center as Manchester and Tecumseh.







> Always try to swim at protected pools or beaches under the supervision of a trianed lifeguard. If a boat overturns, stay with it. Don't try to swim a long distance to shore. The boat is something you can hang on to

from qualified instructors.

If you are doing your swimming in private pools or your own backyard there are also precautions you should take. Keep the pool clean and the water chemically purified. Walk, don't run around the pool since water and suntan oils may cause you to slip more easily. Fence the pool and keep the gate locked to prevent small children from wandering in. Rescue equipment, such as long poles and ring buoys should always be handy. Keep bottles and glasses away from concrete or metal pool decks.

A final note is to avoid going in the water after drinking alcohol. Alcohol dulls your senses and reflexes and increases your chances of being involved in an unnecessary accident.
