# A Joy Ride By Auto

From a story in the Patriot, "A June Ride Through A Lovely Country," we extract a few sentences.

"Rural Michigan needs to be seen to be appreciated. Only glimpses are obtained as the whirling auto wheels make fence posts seem near apart. From the land all living comes. The toilers in the fields must grow a surplus before the rest of us can contrive to live. We are dependent upon the labor of others. The solidarity of humanity is a fact, however much we may pull apart or fight each other. But the chiefest of all our thanks are due to those who live in the country-those who charged the wilderness into fields of grass and grain, orchards and vegetables, for they are the most useful men and women in the social organisam.

"Michigan never appeared in finer garniture than it does this year. All foliage is fresh and green, not somber with the dust of earth's highways and byways; the fields of wheat and rye, of clover and timothy, never looked more promising; the thick bunches of alfalfa on the Probert dairy farm had a suggestion of up-to-dateness that assured good returns from the large herd of Jerseys; and the hundred acres of wheat on the Watkins farm stood chin-high to a full-grown man, and perfect in appearance, as the long and heavy heads swayed in billowy motion with the summer breeze. Corn is late but has a healthy look. Most of it had to be re-planted in June because of the cold and un-germinating weather in May.



So do other things. These roses will bloom and fade, as do human lives, which is a way of their own as the years themselves come and go. But think of it! Mr. L.D. Watkins has lived on this farm continuously since 1834, for eighty-one years; every tree in the twenty acres of park is a familiar object to him; many of them have been set out by his own hands, and now are stalwart growths; their life is a part of his life; the farm itself has grown more bountiful crops in recent years than in earlier years: the land has been treated intelligently and scientifically, and responds thereto profitable yields; evidence that it is the fault of many whenever the soil becomes exhausted of its fertility and finally brings discouraging returne for the capital and time and labor spent upon it a lesson well worth learning in this utilitarian age.

"Much of the original forest has been retained on the Watkins farms of over 2,300 acres, to which 160 acres with three private lakes has been added within a year. Trees are cut only to save them and to let other trees take their places. And the rapidity with which the young trees grow shows that deep down there is much strength of soil, and the greenness of the foiliage indicates an abundance of nitrogen in the atmosphere, which may be had with the propr means of taking it."

Following the recommendation of Superintendent of Schools Gene Thompson, the Manchester Board of Education took action at its regular meeting on Monday, July 16, to confirm the appointment of JoAnn King Okey as Principal of Klager Elementary School.

Mrs. Okey, who had been elected to the Manchester Board of Education two years ago, had submitted her resignation as a Board Trustee at a previous meeting stating that she wanted to be certain that there was no conflict of interest.

Okey is a 1969 graduate of the University of Michigan. Her Masters Degree was earned at Chapman College in California in 1979 with a major in Educational Systems Management. She was recently accepted into the Doctoral Program at the School of Education at the University of

Okey's professional experience includes working as a teacher in the Inkster and Howell School Districts prior to becoming principal of the Birkenstock Elementary School in Howell. In 1974 the Okey family moved to California where Mrs. Okey worked as a teacher and as Vice Principal in the Fallbrook Schools.

Too many cooks spoil the soup? Not necessarily, say the 14,000 people who flock to Manchester the third Thursday each July for the Annual Charcoal Chicken Broil. The event is sponsored by local groups as a fund-raiser, and puts to work about 700 area men and boys in the preparation and serving of the food.

Since 1954, when the Broil first began, the menu has varied little. Guests in our village have been served a butter-basted chicken half, cole slaw drenched in a secret recipe dressing, potato chips, radishes and a beverage. The price, however, has increased to keep up with current costs. This year tickets will sell for \$4.00 presale and \$4.50 at the gate. Advance tickets are available from volunteers or from area businesses, including the Gambles store, the Broil headquarters.

This year "Fat Bob" Taylor will

once again be on hand for entertainment. He will be honored at the 1984 Broil for his part in making the Chicken Broil even better-known to listeners of his radio show. July 19 has been designated as "Fat Bob" Taylor

Proceeds from the event, which total over \$110,000 over the last 30 years, have been used to improve parks facilities and other recreation areas and equipment for the vouth. Immediately after you stop swimming, take your pulse at your neck (see illustration) for 10 seconds and multiply by six to get the number of beats per minute. A 35-yearold, for example, would probably have a maximum heart rate of 185 beats per minute and a target zone of 111 to 138.



of the Solomon amendment which requires that all men receiving federal financial aid for education must be registered with Selective Service. Chief Justice Burger stated that: "Conditioning receipt of Title IV aid on registration is plainly a rational means to improve compliance with the registration requirement." He went on to state

that the law is "a fair allocation of scarce federal resources ... by limiting Title IV aid to those who are willing to meet their responsibilities to the United States by registering with the Selective Service when required to do so." The legislation (sponsored by

Representative Gerald Solomon of New York) went into effect on October 1, 1983. Its intent is to make men aware of their legal requirement to register with Selective Service as they reach their 18th birthdays. To date, 12.4 million men have registered which represents 98% of the draft eligibles.

Pleased with the Court's decision, General Thomas K. Turnage, the Director of Selective Service, noted: "It has always been my philosophical conviction that a man who accepts the benefits of our society must also accept the responsibilities that go along with them. And, registration with Selective Service is a very unintrusive responsibility that must be met. To their credit, the vast majority of young men have already registered with us. They are proving to be responsible, lawabiding men - I salute them.'

Registration is a simple process that takes about 5 minutes at any U.S. Post Office. A man fills out a form which asks only for his name, address, telephone number, social security number and date-ofbirth. Men must register within 30 days of their 18th birthday. For their convenience in applying for student loans and job-training benefits, they may register up to 120 days before their birthday. Failure to register is a felony with a penalty of \$10,000 and/or 5 years in prison.

# Medication for severe acne Cause of birth

## defects

There is now enough evidence to say that a new prescription drug consistent with earlier reports of for acne can kill or malform the hydrocephaly, microcephaly (very human embryo, according to the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation.

"Any sexually active woman should have a pregnancy test before treatment with Accutane," says Arthur J. Salisbury, M.D., March of Dimes vice president for medical services. "She should avoid becoming pregnant during treatment, and for one month afterward," he warns.

The drug was licensed for sale in 1982 with knowledge that it caused birth defects in test animals, and with a warning against its use during pregnancy. Since then, the manufacturer has twice sent letters to doctors and pharmacists nationwide to stress the risk of damage to unborn babies. The drug's packaging includes a red sticker, warning of

However, to date the manufacturer and the Food and Drug Administration have received at least 29 reports of miscarriages and birth defects after use of the drug during pregnancy.

The most recent report of birth defects associated with the drug appeared in the June 22 issue of Journal of the American Medical Association. Two cases were described by Dr. Paul J. Benke, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Miami and director of a March of Dimes supported genetics clinic serving Florida's Palm Beach County.

(enlargement of the fluid-filled spaces in the brain), abnormal ears, small mouth and cleft palate. Both babies died.

These malformations are small head), small and malformed ears and eyes, very severe congenital heart defects and cleft palate in offspring of women taking Accutane early in pregnancy. They also resemble the malformations that have been produced in test animals.

"This consistency," Salisbury says, "is the single most convincing piece of evidence that the drug has really caused the reported birth defects. Coincidence is not a plausible explanation.

"Accutane has F.D.A. approval only for very severe acne that does not respond well to other treatments," he adds. "Restricting its use to appropriate cases is one way to reduce the risk to women of childbearing age.

"A problem with any drug that causes major malformations is that it does its damage in the early weeks after conception, often before a woman knows that she is pregnant. This is why it is necessary to have a pregnancy test before starting treatment with Accutane, and to have a reliable way to avoid conception during treatment.

"Fortunately," he says, "Accutane is not meant to be taken for more than a few months. When it works for acne, its remission effect seems to last for a year or more. Responsible adult women should be able to avoid conception during the relatively short period of treatment and for a month afterward. Teen-age girls, as a group, are more worrisome, and the choice to treat them with Accutane must be made very carefully on an individual basis."

Women who become pregnant while taking Accutane are urged to have their personal physicians contact the drug's manufacturer, Roche Laboratories in Nutley, N.J., at (201) 235-3021.

I am writing to let you know that there is no campaign of this type going on now, nor has there ever been. Cigarette wrappers, computer price codes and flip tops from aluminum beer and pop cans are being saved throughout the state because of a rumor which is circulating that they can be used to buy minutes of time on a kidney machine. Any help your paper could give us in clearing up this rumor would be very much appreciated.

Right now any kidney patient who needs kidney dialysis treatment or a kidney transplant can obtain this treatment and personal cost is no longer a factor. The federal government now pays about 80 percent of the cost of dialysis for most patients. Private health plans and other government programs pick up most of the remaining costs. This federal program also covers the inhospital costs of kidney transplantation.

There are several ways interested citizens can help kidney

patients. First thing would be to consider signing an organ donor label to "will" kidneys and other needed organs for future transplantation. Also, volunteers are always needed to help us in our public education effort.


