Once again historic Manchester will close downtown Main Street for it's 7th Annual Street Fair. Saturday, August 11 is the date set for the event, co-sponsored by the Manchester Art Guild and the Manchester Chamber Commerce.

The fair will include exhibits of original handcrafted works, juried by members of the Art Guild, who will also present awards to the best in the show. Many area artists, such as the local, award winning watercolor artist, Nancy Feldkamp, are chosen to participate in the juried section of the fair. In addition, an "Open Market" will include more items of interest to the handicrafter. This year, artists participating include jewelers, woodworkers, potters, basket weavers, fiber artists, and even an artist specializing in miniatures, as well as other talented individuals.

The downtown shops will open their doors, filling sidewalk displays with bargains and surprises. Antique hunters will enjoy the large variety of dealers in the Antique Mall and in the Old Mill. The gourmet will be enticed by the specialties of the local

eateries.

On Saturday, August 11, 1984, the fourth annual Manchester Mill Fair this year. Run will be held. 

Shawl Sheep to demonstration will be a new addition to the entertainment bill at the Manchester Community

The demonstration, which will presented by the Fireside Herita je Crafters, includes four steps. Those who are privileged to view the entire demonstration will observe the carding of the woo!, spinning, weaving and removing the final product - a shawl which measures 18" by 72" from the loom.

He explained that Sheep to Shawl is a contest in which the participants must shear the sheep, card the wool, spin it and weave a specific finished product within four hours. The demonstration at this year's fair is scheduled to begin at 1:00 and end by 5:00.

Hit Or Miss

There is a book available which nobody who pretends to be well informed should be without. It is "Chase's Annual Events," a 192page paperback that has "Holidays, Holy Days, National and Ethnic Days, Seasons, Astronomical Phenomena, **Festivals** and Fairs. Anniversaries and Fairs, Birthdays, Special Events and Traditional Events, Observances of all kinds the world over.

It contains such stirring facts such as the fact that Betsy Ross and Paul Revere were both born on January 1st and that the first day of the year also marks the beginning of National Soup Month.

January 16 is National Nothing Day which was created to provide the Americans with one national day when they can just sit without celebrating anything or observing or honoring anything. However, on that same date there are seven other observances including National Clean-Off-Your-Desk Day.

How This Town Has Grown

Manchester Enterprise March 21, 1889

A few evenings since we met our old friend George Amsden of Ypsilanti, on the street and after chatting a little, he broke out with the following remark:

"Gosh, how this town has grown since I first came here."

Then we sat down on a hitching railing and counted up.

In 1865, at the close of the war, the north side of Exchange Place boasted of the following: The Manchester Hotel, a wooden structure, which stood where the Goodyear house now stands. Next came a store then occupied by J.J. Clarkson, which burned down a few years ago, next was Wm. Baxter's wooden building where the People's Bank now stands; next was a small wooden building used at one time as a post office, and stood where the Enterprise office now stands, next was the Gleason, now Chubbuck block which was at that time quite a pretentious brick block.

On the east side of the river Dr. completes the list of business corner.

On the opposite side of the street stood the building now occupied by Fausel, and next to it a brick building occupied by C. Lehn. On the site of Kimble's fine brick block stood an old tumbledown wooden building, and the little old "Farmer's Mill' at the end of the bridge closed the count at the east side of the river.

The south side of Exchange Place was a knobby looking section and one who traversed it was continually going up or down. The mill, and "union hall' block of course stood where they do now, the boy said they have always been there. A little wooden office building stood where Steinkohl's is, and one of larger proportions occupyed the site of Lynch's. Farther up the street were two wooden structures and next to them the Stowell and Bessac stores, both brick, then came the Gwinner block, the first building erected on the street, and as it

Conklin had a little office on the blocks on Exchange Place, we will call it the Alpha and Omega.

> Today the entire north side of the street is one solid row of elegant brick blocks, mostly three storys in height, and the south side of the street is not far behind.

The east side of the river has been built up and improved, the south side of Jefferson street is almost solid brick and the Conklin block on the north side is a fine looking building.

A fine large iron bridge has taken the place of the old rickety one and the street has been graded and filled up some six feet.

Ann Arbor street, where now stand elegant brick and frame dwellings, was then a hazel thicket, the haunt of rabbits and gophers.

The union school building costing \$25,000 was not built and even the neat little ward school building had a shamed-face look. Jackson street which is now

Retirement Planning **Should Start Now**

People in the local area who plan to retire at the end of the year should take some time soon to think about Social Security retirement benefits, a Social Security representative said recently.

A person should apply for Social Security benefits 2 or 3 months before they plan to retire. This way, benefits can begin shortly after income from work stops. Before applying, a person

should get the necessary evidence together. This will save time at application time. The first item a person needs is his or her Social Security card or a record of the number.

Next, proof of age is required. Preferred proof is an official record of birth or baptism recorded before age other proofs can be submitted. The people at the local Social Security office can tell you what kinds of evidence can be used.

Records that might be used include school, church, State or Federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificates, union, immigration or naturalization. This is not an exclusive list and other records may be ac-

Forms W-2 or selfemployment tax returns for the past 2 years should be provided. These are needed because recent earnings reports may not yet be in Social Security records.

A husband or wife who

also plans to apply should have about the same documents. A marriage certifi cate may be required, but is not needed in all cases. Information about any previous marriages is also

Birth certificates of any young, unmarried children should be obtained as well. Additional documentation may be required depending on the particulars of certain cases. The people at any Social Security office will be glad to answer questions about retirement applica-

The address and telephone number of the nearest Social Security office can be found in the telephone directory.





Michigan Will Participate In IRP

Michigan participating in the International Registration Plan (IRP) for trucks 7:30 p.m. late this fall, Secretary of State Richard Austin announced today. Under the plan, when truckers

register in Michigan automatically qualify to operate in 27 other states and the province of Alberta, now participating in the plan. Trucks so registered will be issued one plate with a number and the word "Apportioned" on the plate.

Registration fees paid by all trucks registered under the plan will be apportioned to the states in which they travel.

Austin said that the IRP saves truckers and transporters from registering in every state in which they operate and makes for a more equitable division of truck 1, 6:30 p.m. registration fees to states in which trucks travel.

The IRP, initiated nationally in 1973, is endorsed by the Federal Government, the National trucking industry as a means of achieving nationwide uniformity in registration of trucks.


Studies have found that most cases of acne improve in the summer.

For most people, a suntan can help camouflage acne, but the wisest course of action for acne sufferers is to get out of the sun and into a dermatologist's office. These doctors who specialize in treating the skin have a wide variety of treatments, including antibiotics applied directly to the skin such as Cleocin T topical solution, which are very ef-

fective for controlling acne. While studies have found that most cases of acne improve in the summer, some experts believe that this may be due to the reduced stress and greater relaxation one experiences when sunbathing.

On the other hand, as many as 20 percent of those with acne report aggravation of the condition during the hot months. This may be caused by perspiration or the use of oily suntan lotions. Since 1981, Struss has provided educational support to the Saline Valley Project, an agricultural water pollution control effort sponsored through USDA's Rural Clean Water Program. He concludes this role the end of July to take a position with the Mennonite Central Committee providing agricultural assistance Zimbabwe, Africa. replacement has not yet been named.


According to Struss, the average cropland soil loss in the Saline Valley Project area is 7 tons per acre per year; a rate of 40% greater than the soils can withstand and remain productive. Besides stripping agricultural land of valuable topsoil, soil erosion pollutes streams and lakes with silt, fertilizer, and pesticides. "By controlling soil erosion, farms remain productive, and lakes and streams stay cleaner. It is a situation where everyone wins." Struss says.

To keep cropland protected from erosion, the Saline Valley Project is promoting a number of project area farmers.

"Some of what we are doing is to look better than clean plowed

When left on the field surface, crop residue provides a protective barrier between the soil and the forces of wind and rain. Traditional moldboard plowing turns soil completely residue burying crop and eliminating the protection it could have provided. The Saline Valley Project is popularizing conservation tillage and no-till; crop production methods which leave 30% to 90% of original crop residue on the soil surface. The effectiveness of these methods is dramatic, especially no-till, which can reduce erosion rates by 80% when substituted for conventional moldboard plowing.

Promoting conservation tillage has brought Saline Valley Project workers eye-to-eye with farming tradition. "For years, farmers have been judged by how cleanly they could plow their fields. Now we come along and tell farmers they should keep stalks and stubble on the field surface. It is fields cluttered with crop residue
