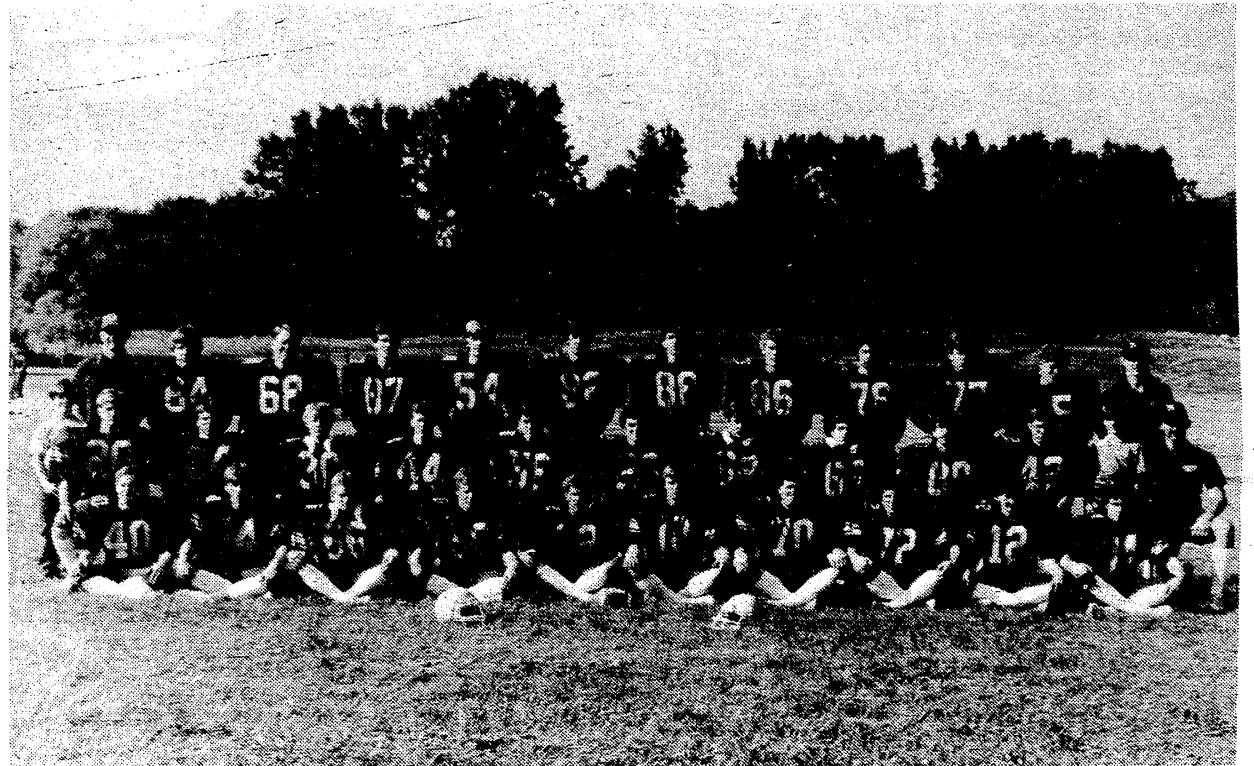

The normal run, bang and bruise battle changed this year as both squads went airborne for their touchdowns. There were 5 touchdown passes and 3 went our way as we defeated the "skins for the first time since 1981.
Neither team could put points on the board in the opening quarter and it almost continued 0-0 till half. With 29 seconds left our quarterback Pat Ridenour spotted Mike Agin sneaking down the left sidelines. Pat hit Mike from 24 yards out to break the scoreless tally.

Ann Arbor MESC Office Closes

Ypsilanti, 214 E. Michigan Ave., and Canton, 8775 Ronda Dr.

MESC staff at the Ann Arbor office will be transferred to other MESC offices based on their seniority with the agency and Civil Service procedures. The other MESC offices that are closing include: Grand Haven, Greening, Romulus and three in Detroit.

BROOKLYN TO-DAY



Pleasant View Hotel, Clarks Lake, Mich.

Manchester Enterprise September 20, 1896
 People said that if the C.J. & M. railroad skipped Brooklyn by about four or five miles it would kill the town deadlier than a smelt, but the Enterprise found the village a very lively smelt last Saturday. A ball game between Horton and Woodstock teams was advertised and as they are considered above the average a good many people were anxious to see the game, and the streets were filled with people. The game was called at 2:30 but was only begun when a thunderstorm drove players and spectators from the field, but after it was over the game was resumed and though the grounds were in a deplorable

condition the boys played an excellent game, the score being 3 to 1 in favor of Horton.

The main street in Brooklyn is very broad. There is room enough for Buffalo Bill to give an exhibition without encroaching upon the space needed by pedestrians. It might look better if a row of shade trees was set out on either side, or a double row down the center. Or, how would a stature of Col. King look right in the center?

The enterprise of the Ennis

Bros. was clearly shown in the erection of a fine three story building several years ago. Then W.S. Culver followed with a two story brick block for his own occupancy. The Cosmopolitan hotel and other neat brick buildings put the old-fashioned wooden structures to shame. Now if the Cooks would enthuse a little and improve their valuable location by removing the wooden building which has been a landmark for more than half a century and erecting in its place a fine brick or stone structure as a monument to the memory of past business conquests, what an addition it would make.

The location of Brooklyn is favorable for a healthy newspaper

that visitors can scarcely decide which they like better. The C.J. & M. railroad has a station at the upper end of the lake and passengers are brought to the hotels by steamboats or carriages, as they prefer. The lake is about four and half miles from Brooklyn and resorters patronize the merchants to a considerable extent.

Somehow false rumors get afloat regarding schools as well as of other things, but it should be remembered by those who live near by that the Brooklyn schools are to be kept up to their usual high standard.

Among old friends whom we met was Dr. E.N. Palmer, who showed us his new suite of rooms to be fitted up for offices for himself and son, who are enjoying an extensive practice. They had too many office calls to make visiting enjoyable and we were invited to call again. We found Herbert Reed full of business at his barber shop, in fact everybody seemed to be doing well.

So much has been said about Clark's lake that we found it impossible to refuse the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. John Cruse, whose guests we were, to drive out to that pleasant resort. Having once spent a few hours at "eagle point," we resolved to visit "pleasant view," just opposite, and we could scarcely believe our eyes, for behold, the sleepy quiet which pervaded the lake last summer has fled and now we hear the shrill whistle of half a dozen steamboats large and small, see numerous sailboats and rowboats flitting here and there upon the rippling waters, see crowds of people enjoying themselves in various ways, hear the song or merry laughter of humanity old and young who have come here for rest or out of idle curiosity. We found the hotel situated on a bluff near the lake shore in the midst of a grove of forest trees which afford ample shade. It is well managed by Thos. Beech, who, assisted by his wife and daughter and other competent help, is doing his best to wait upon the guests. The hotel seems to be provided with comforts and conveniences, has broad verandas facing the lake from which one can look across to "eagle point," or up and down the lake. This resort is much different from the other, which is situated on a low point of land jutting into the lake,

The streets of Brooklyn are lighted with incandescent lights, the same as Manchester, and the stores and residences are provided with both incandescent and arc lights. The plant is owned by the Green Bros., and is skillfully managed.

There are many fine residences in Brooklyn. The old Cook and King mansions remind one of those of colonial times, and their hospitable roofs have sheltered many a noted guest. Near them are the beautiful and commodious homes of W.S. Culver, Heil Woodward, M. Sheridan and others, while in other parts of the village are those of Dr. E.N. Palmer, Henry Cash, the Parkers, Worthington and others whose names we fail to recall. All speak of the thrift and prosperity of their owners and give the village a home look that is pleasant to see.

We might write columns about the quaint little town but space will not permit at this time. We can vouch for the hospitality as well as intelligence of its inhabitants, and he who has the privilege of being their guest may consider himself lucky. He will be well treated.

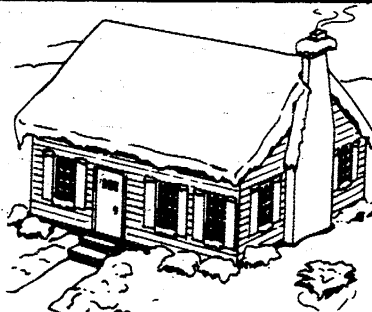

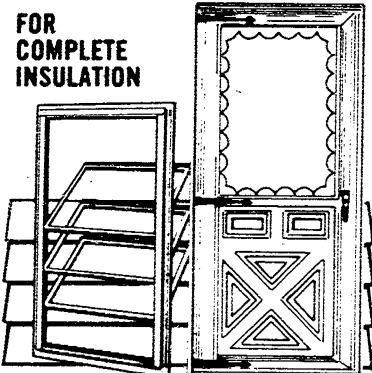
