Lilley-Owens-Ford Company has announced that Brown & Sharpe Manufacturing Company has sold Double A Products Company, its Worldwide Fluid Power Operation, to Vickers, Incorporated. Terms of the agreement were not disclosed.

Headquartered in Manchester, Michigan, Double A is a worldwide manufacturer of fluid power products that primarily serves the industrial marketplace. It had sales of approximately \$36 million in 1963 and employs more than 600 people worldwide.

Vickers President, Theodore N. Duncan said current plans are to preserve the Double A name and continue development of its strong product line. Double A brings leadership in several product market areas where we are not now represented, as well as opportunities to improve manufacturing efficiencies and systems development and delivery capabilities to a broader customer base.

Double A Products will be marketed through its own distributor network separately from those of Vickers. Vickers Distributors will continue to handle Vickers Systems and Components.

The joining of Double A Operations to Vickers will create a new opportunity to provide a broader range of fluid power equipment and resources to the

Double A Products Company was started in Ann Arbor, Michigan during 1934 by Herbert H. Upton, Sr., Finley B. Riggs, and C.W. Childs. These three formed the company to promote the sale of small power tools.

The company operated in Ann Arbor until July, 1940, when it moved to its present location in Manchester. At that time Double A had 36 employees, 22 of them from Manchester.

On December 17, 1967, Double A was purchased by Brown & Sharpe Manufacturing Company of Providence, Rhode Island.

High School Opens Career Resource Center

Life is full of hard decisions, one of which is choosing a future career. Manchester High School students will have new resources available to them to make this decision a little easier. Thanks to a state grant written by principal William Bushaw and guidance counselor Richard Parson, Manchester High School has been able to design and staff a Career Resource Center this year. The center, which has been in the planning stages for a number of years, is located next to the counseling office.

Supervising the center is Mrs. Pam Lee. She is available to help students from 8:00 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. In addition, the center is open two evenings per month for adult education students and other interested community members. Official opening of the Career Resource Center has been waiting for the hook-up of a new IBM computer which will take place this week. Even though students

have been using the center this entire school year, the hook-up of the IBM computer makes the center fully functional.

Career information may be found on the MOIS, the Michigan Occupational Information System. This computer file contains more than 1400 occupational specialties. A computer printout will contain the nature of the job, job outlook, current wages and benefits, educational requirements, sources of additional information, schools offering the program, and estimated annual cost of the program.

However, not everyone knows what career they are interested in. Can these people benefit from using MOIS? Yes, they certainly can, by using the MOIS structured search. This search asks each user a short set of questions to determine his or her interests and needs. From these responses MOIS will suggest possible career options. If any of continued on page 9

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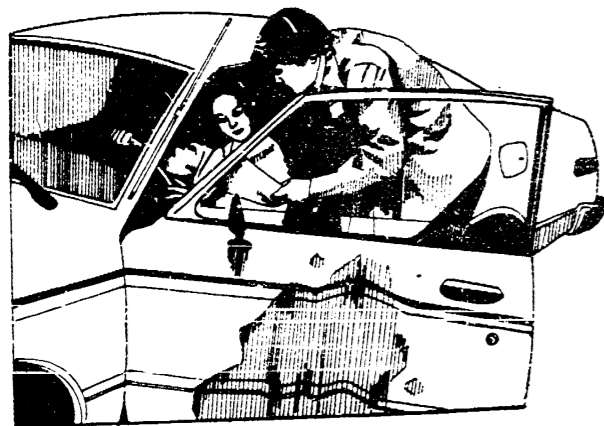
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Book Review

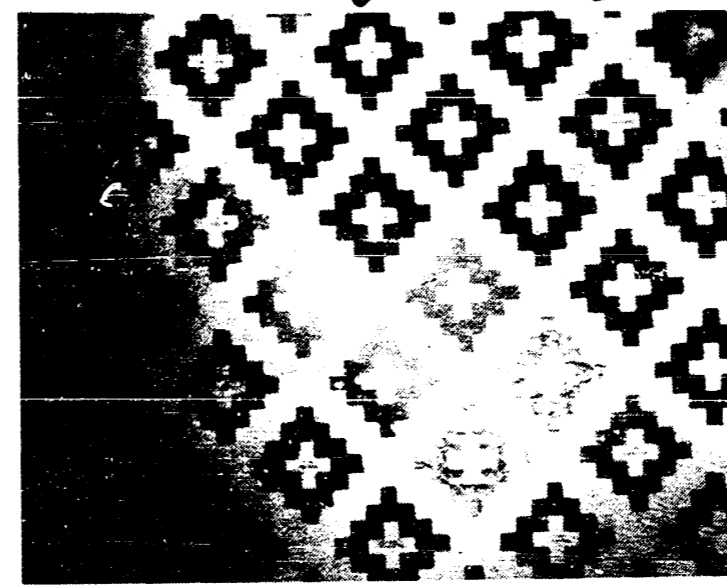

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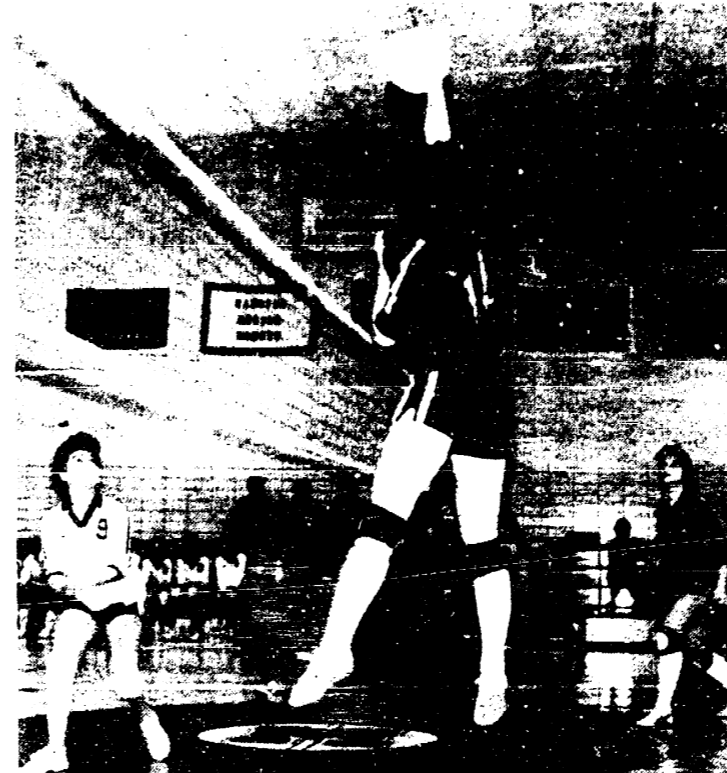

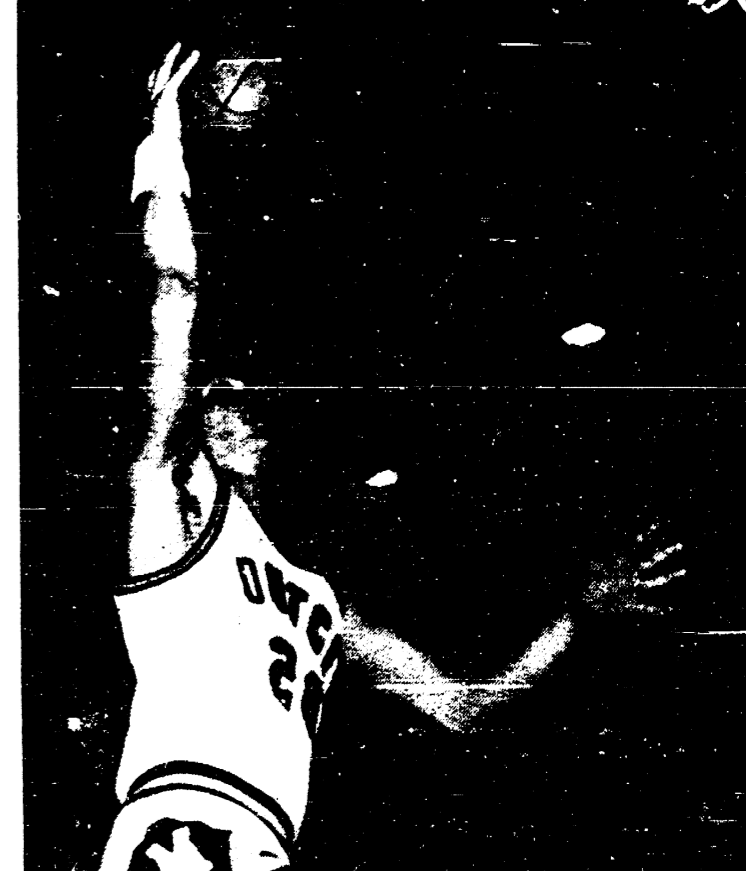

MOIS is but one of the services provided to students who use the Career Resource Center. Students will have access to numerous books, pamphlets, and filmstrips, some of which deal with careers in general while others contain specific information on careers and occupations. Also available are a large number of catalogs and applications from Michigan's two and four year colleges and universities, out-of-state schools, trade, technical, and business schools, scholarship and financial aid information, as well as information on all branches of the Armed Forces.

Seminars are scheduled throughout the school year in which community resource people come to the high school speaking in the nature of their work, chances for employment, training required, etc. The first seminar was held January 10, at 7:00 p.m. in the High School Study Auditorium. "We've been working on this concept for several years and with the materials and resources we have been able to purchase because of the grant, students who use the Center will have access to the most current and up-to-date information available."

affairs, we are amazingly uninformed about geography." Mr. Kopec administered to 1,875 students a test similar to one designed 35 years ago by the New York Times, which the newspaper at the time said revealed an "appalling" lack of geographical knowledge.

Mr. Kopec said today's students fared significantly worse than the students 35 years ago. "Fewer than half of the 1,875 students knew that Alaska and Texas are our two largest states, and only about one of every five knew that Rhode Island and Delaware are the smallest," he said.

Estimates of the United States' population went as high as 236 billion.

"Less than 7 per cent of those tested could name three of the 28 countries in Africa lying south of the Sahara Desert and north of the Republic of South Africa. Three of every four students could not name even one is this group," Mr. Kopec said.

Among the countries thought by some to separate Nicaragua from Panama were the Soviet Union and Cuba.

"This exam was given, not expressly to embarrass North Carolinians or to indict our educational systems, but to link our state with the nationwide deficiency in geographic training," Mr. Kopec said.

"Only in this country is the subject matter either nonexistent or sparsely provided in our grade schools. Elsewhere it thrives." Probably the most significant reason for the poor showing is that schools place little emphasis on geography, and two-thirds of the students tested had never had a course in it, said Mr. Kopec. The 1980 Census listed the U.S. population at 226.5 million, and Costa Rica separates Nicaragua from Panama.

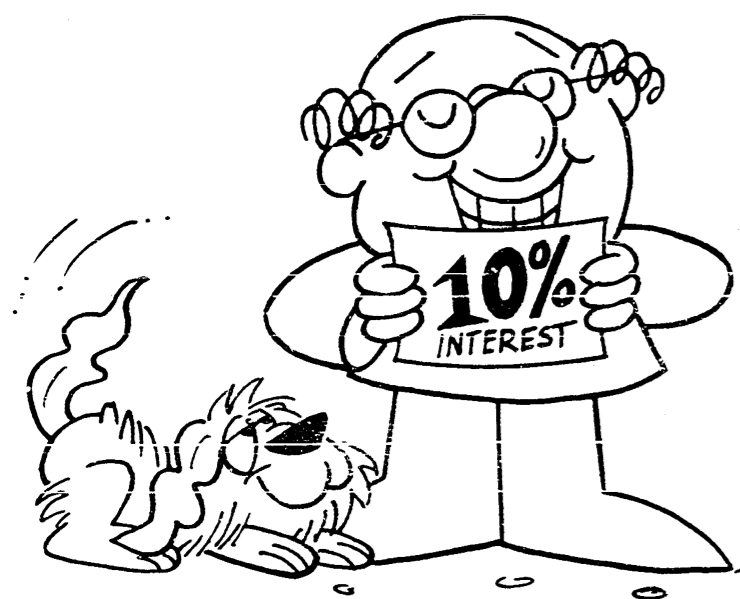

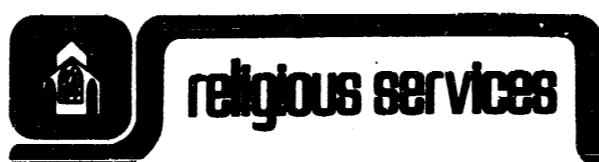

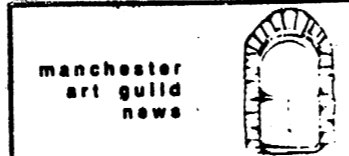

Manchester High plays Johannesburg-Lewiston in the C/D Division competition at 11:00 a.m.

All matches will be played in the Tyler-VanDusen Campus Center, with the A/B matches in the Louanna Baker Jones Auditorium and the C/D matches in the South Commons. The 1985 Alma College High School Quiz Bowl matches are open to the public without charge.
