Poppy Day

On May 17 & 18, the red crepe paper poppy will be offered to the public by the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary. This reminder of the sacrifice of countless thousands in four wars is an annual event undertaken by the members of Unit #117, Emil Jacob Post in Manchester.

Funds collected on Poppy Day are used to assist the needy veteran and his family. It is a self-help program, for the Auxiliary's familiar red paper poppy is hand-made in Poppy Shops run by Auxiliary Volunteers. In these shops, disabled and hospitalized veterans make the flowers by hand, petal by petal. It is part of a physical and psychological therapy program by veterans for veterans. These poppies are purchased from the shop by the Auxiliary and offered to the public, not at a price, but for a

contribution...a few cents to say America remembers.

Contributions made on Poppy Day are used by the local unit to aid needy veterans and their families in the community and in hospitals throughout the state. All proceeds are channeled directly into rehabilitation and welfare work for children and youth.

In addition she has served as Student Council President, and has participated in the high school band, the Volleyball team, the Varsity Track Team, and the Summer German Exchange Program.

Recently awarded two scholarships, the State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship and the University of Michigan Regents Alumni Scholarship, Miss Royle plans to attend the University of Michigan where she will major in Bio-medical Engineering.

The second senior to receive high honors is Lisa Rickelmann, 1985 class Salutatorian. Projects Identified For Special Millage

The Board of Education has identified three major projects for the special maintenance millage for 1985-86 school year and directed the superintendent to begin the development of specifications for these projects.

The Nellie Ackerson Building is scheduled to receive a new single membrane roofing system. The system to be utilized will be identical to that which has proved to be very successful at the high school.

Specifications are being prepared to replace the warped and worn out gymnasium floor at Manchester High School. Along with the floor, specifications will be drawn to replace the bleacher system in the high school. Both the floor and the bleacher have surpassed renovation possibilities.

As specifications are drawn up bids will be requested from various companies in order to provide the renovation work. The Board of Education is expected to take action on these projects at its June meeting.

Superintendent Thompson stated, "These projects are part of our five year plan for the special maintenance millage. We are making every effort to be certain that all tax dollars are used in as cost effective a manner as possible."

Truck Dumps 500 Gallons of Chlorine



On Monday, May 13, a serious health and safety hazard occurred at the corner of Riverside Drive and Vernon Street. An Onsted Building Center truck, driven by Joseph Wingard, spilled over 500 gallons of chlorine onto village property and property owned by Donald Steele. The driver stated that one of the tie-down straps had broken and allowed the load to spill. As the crates fell, they broke apart letting the bottles of chlorine loose, which also broke open. Village Public Works Department personnel Gary Wiedmayer and Fire Chief Scully arrived on the scene to assess the damage and take preventative action.

High School Plumbing Renovation Nears Completion

The plumbing renovation work currently underway at Manchester High School is nearing completion. The project which has been budgeted at approximately \$15,000 is part of the special millage which was approved by Manchester voters in 1983 in order to improve facilities. Renovations throughout the high school are being renovated with sinks and other fixtures being replaced. The showers in lockers are receiving attention. Water systems in the cafeteria will be improved according to public health guidelines.

The project is seen as part of the ongoing effort to direct tax dollars toward the improvements needed in the schools. Work is being carried out by the Roberts Plumbing Company of Ann Arbor who submitted the low bid.

Bell Choir Celebrates Handel's 300th Birthday

On Sunday, May 19, at 10:30 Worship, the Ringers in Emanuel Church's Bell Choir will perform three movements from George Frederic Handel's "CLOCK MUSIC": "Allegretto", "Andantino" and "Allegro", in honor of the world-wide celebration of his 300th Birthday, in 1685.

One usually hears this delightful music performed by organists. However, with growing interest and scholarship regarding "performance practices" of the time during which the music was composed, it is most appropriate and refreshing that bells perform this music. Handel entitled his music "Tunes for Clay's Musical Clock."

The fame of Charles Clay, the Clockmaker, is apparent in the London WEEKLY ADVERTIZER for May 8, 1736: "On Monday Mr. Clay, the inventor of the machine watches in the Strand, had the honor of exhibiting to Her Majesty at Kensington, his surprising musical clock, which gave uncommon satisfaction to all the Royal Family present, at which time Her Majesty, to encourage so great an Artist, was pleased to order fifty guineas to be expended for numbers in the

intended raffle, by which we hear Mr. Clay intends to dispose of this said beautiful and complete piece of machinery."

Charles Clay's musical clock is described in detail by F. J. Britten in his book, OLD CLOCKS AND WATCHES AND THEIR MAKERS, 1911: "It stood 8 feet 6 inches high...the chiming machine had 21 bells driven by a weight. Dampers prevented the vibration of the bells one with another and the music started directly after the clock had finished striking."

Federal Foods Distribution

Distribution of Federal Surplus Foods in the Manchester Area will be Friday, May 24, at Manchester United Methodist Church, 501 Ann Arbor Street (M-62) from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The longer hours are available as the Spring Shop with summer clothing only for low income families will also be on that day. The foods this month are expected to be Cheese, Flour, Rice and Honey. (Do not bring clothing to the shop on the 24th.)

The income eligibility guidelines have been changed slightly this year. Based on 100 percent of Federal Poverty Levels persons under 60 years of age are as follows (based on total income of the entire family): Household of 1 - \$6,825 (\$699 per month); household of 2 - \$9,185 (\$764 per month); 3 - \$11,505 (\$959 per month); and \$2,340 (\$195 per month) for each additional household member.

For persons over 60 years of age, eligibility based on 100 percent of Federal Poverty Levels is as follows (this is the total income of the entire family, Social Security, pensions, dividends, interest, etc.): household of 1 - \$8,400 (\$700 per month); household of 2 - \$11,250 (\$940 per month); 3 - \$14,100 (\$1,180 per month); and add \$2,880 (\$240 per month) for each additional household member.

Identification includes proof of residence in the Manchester area, part of Manchester Township or that portion of Bridgewater Township in the Manchester or Clinton School Districts, Food Stamp, SSI or GA assistance cards and proof of Social Security income for 1985. The latter may be obtained by calling Social Security, 994-8810, asking them to mail the information to you. Please contact 428-8852 for further information.

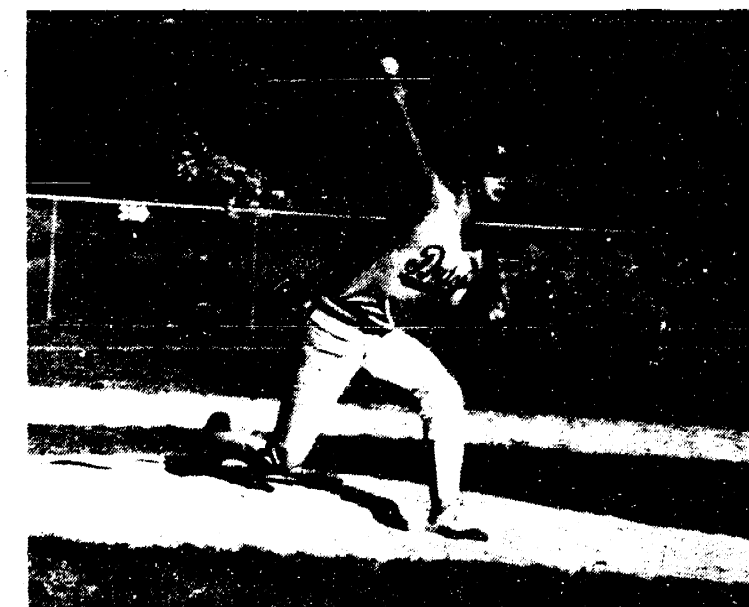

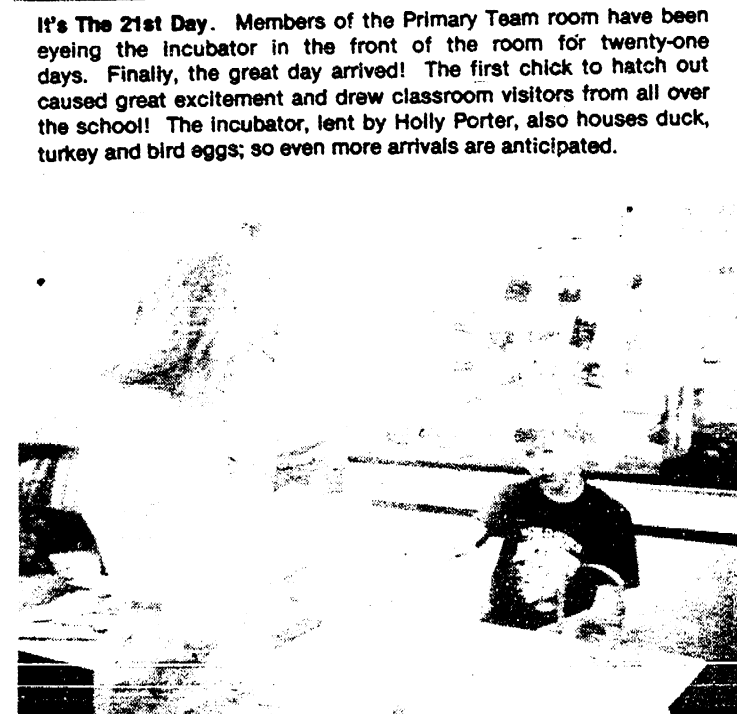


LaPetite Ballet Performs

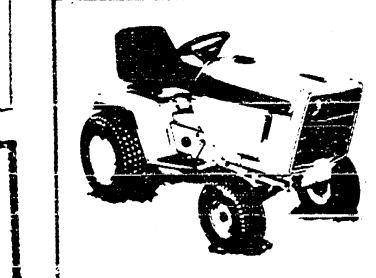

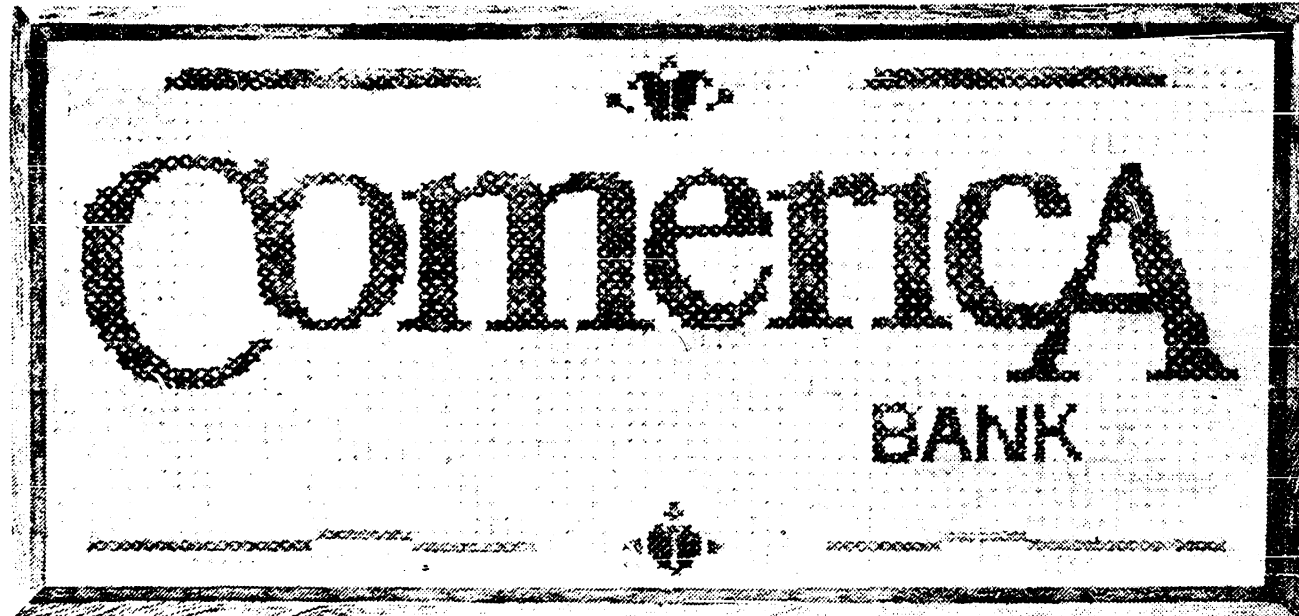

How much tax will they pay for improving roads and bridges; for the support of the poor of the country; for the expenses of running the business of the town, county and state?

On what page is their offer to contribute money or service in the establishment and maintenance of a Sunday school and church for the improvement and moral tone of your community?

What line of credit will they

extend to you when your crops are poor and money gone; when through illness or misfortune you are not able to send "cash with order" for your groceries, clothing, farm tools and crockery? Where is their offer to contribute to your entertainment next Fourth Of July?

Eastern Michigan University's Office of Financial Aid has named 105 additional high school students as recipients of the University's Regents Scholarship awards.

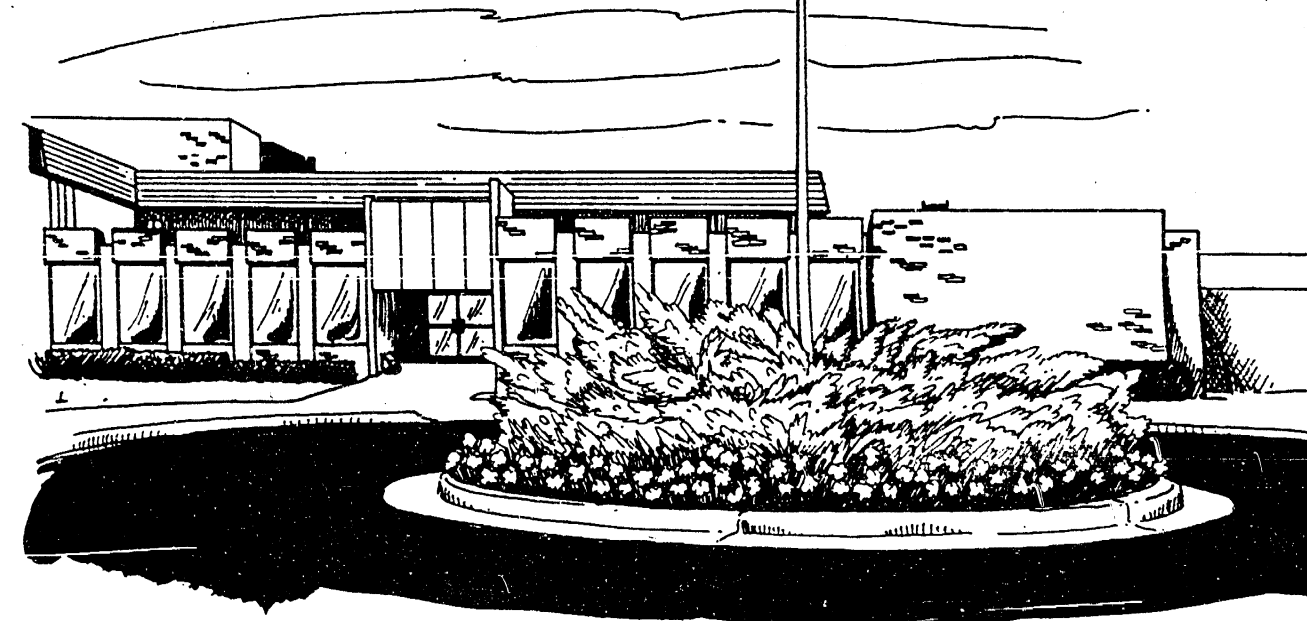

Hit Or Miss

I'm not one of the average Americans who run their TV an average of 6 1/4 hours per day nor am I one of those 1.6 million who live without this benefit to mankind, but at times I like to do my thinking for myself and to form attitudes for myself.

I watch the news daily and the presidential press conferences and many sporting events and the National Geographic tours of the many inaccessible parts of the world but a great deal of TV entertainment is not often viewed by me.

The bigshots of the advertising TV world however will be willing to bet that "there are very few people that you don't get with television—any reasonably sized campaign will get 99 percent of the people in the country" they will tell you.

These experts also add that light television viewers are usually heavy on listening to news on radio and reading newspapers and news weeklies.

Commentator Charles McCabe writes that his experience with the tube "reinforces his belief that the American people will buy anything and elect most anybody if their lower nature is exploited and artfully seduced."

Things I have learned:

That on a given school day in New York City, the number of students who are absent equals the total population of Reno, Nev. — about 150,000.

That, historically, Poland was once absolutely the largest state

in Europe.

That although the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., is internationally renowned and treats many prominent people, about 85 per cent of its patients still come from within a 500-mile radius of Rochester.

That the single most profitable activity that a bank performs is bouncing a check.

That the persistently most popular American show in Japan remains "South Pacific," in which Japan is the pervasive, though unseen, enemy.

That the first woman elected to the prestigious French Academy in the 346 years of its history has lived on an island off the Maine coast, Mount Desert, for the last 40 years.

That one-third of all prescription drugs tested by the Federal Drug Administration in the last two decades have been ruled as "ineffective" for the purpose they were advertised.

Now while no more than 5 percent of Americans take ocean cruises as vacations, 85 per cent of the passengers are repeaters.

That Dr. John Gorrie, a Florida physician hailed as "the father of air-conditioning," began his experiments in an attempt to lower the body temperature of malaria and yellow-fever victims by suspending buckets of ice from the ceiling of a U.S. Marine hospital.

That more than a hundred years ago, when his book publisher paid Benjamin Disraeli 10,000 pounds for his novel "Endymion," it was the largest amount ever advanced for a work of fiction anywhere in the world. (It would be the equivalent of 60,000 pounds today, an absurdly small sum for a book by a successful novelist who was also a

former prime minister.)

That of the world's 20 largest rivers, 10 of them flow into the Amazon, which, with its tributaries, drains an area of more than 2 million square miles, an expanse larger than all Europe.

That the most extraordinary hike in modern times was made by James Holman, a British naval officer who retired at age 25 because of blindness, who walked 3,500 miles from Moscow to Irkutsk, across the desolate stretch of Siberia.

That well over half of U.S. First-class mail consists of bills being sent or paid.

Q. Does your blood type have anything to do with your personality?

A. Not according to the scientists. However, numerous young Japanese think it does. A Tokyo dating service requires signers-uppers to list their blood types. Idea is to match compatible blood types the way the stargazers purport to match compatible astrological signs. However, numerous young Japanese don't know their blood types. So they're flocking to donor labs to give blood so they can find out their own types.

Michigan residents, happy with their tax reduction should be reminded that after all, they didn't escape a state tax boost either.

The state legislature, in May, enacted a six-month increase in

the state income tax. The tax rate 4.6 per cent in the past, will be 5.6 per cent until October 1.

A family of four with a \$25,000 income will pay \$185 more to Lansing. Extra state, Social Security, and local taxes for one family in Michigan will be \$231.25. With the federal tax cut this means however, a cut of some \$70.

But inflation, bracket creep and the combined effort of other tax changes will mean that Michigan taxpayers will also end up paying more taxes than before.

They came in all sizes and about all things, and I have quite a collection of them that it seems to us are interesting so may we share a bunch of them with you this week?

There is a juvenile time in the lives of eels when you could lay them across this printed page and clearly read the type through

their transparent bodies.

If you have preschool children, you might want to send them to Italy's Venice — just so they can say they've seen it. It's sinking. Venice is. By two inches a decade. Experts think it may be abandoned to the sea by the time your pre-schoolers are grown old. Or maybe even grown up.

Q. What's the difference on food labels between "enriched and fortified?"

A. "Enriched" means a nutrient originally in the food but diminished in processing was added. "Fortified" means a nutrient not originally in the food was added. Or at least, that's what they're supposed to mean.
