## First of America To Celebrate 50th Birthday

First of America Bank-Ann Arbor will celebrate its 50th birthday Feb. 14, 1986, President Bruce Benner announced. The celebration will commemorate the merger of three local banks fifty years ago.

First National Bank of Ann Arbor, founded in 1863, Ann Arbor Savings Bank (1869) and Farmers and Mechanics Bank (1863) joined forces to become Ann Arbor Savings and Commercial Bank in 1936. The first Board of Directors' meeting was held February 14, 1936, and the first day of operations for the \$13 million bank was February 17, 1936.

Through the years, the bank changed its name to Ann Arbor Bank, Ann Arbor Bank and Trust, and the current First of America Bank-Ann Arbor.

Originally a two-branch bank (Main Office at 101 S. Main and the State Street branch in Nickels Arcade), First of America now includes 17 branches and 16

Automated Teller Machines, including branches in Clinton, Dexter, Manchester, Saline and Whitmore Lake.

The original Board of Directors included: R.E. Reichert, President; Malcolm Taylor, Vice President; John Airey; Junius E. Beal; Fred E. Benz; George J. Burke; Oscar Eberbach; John C. Fritz; A.C. Notice is hereby given that the Manchester Village Council will hold a public hearing on the Draft Facilities Plan Amendment for alternative wastewater management systems. The hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m., March 18, 1986 at the Manchester Village Hall, 120 South Clinton Street, Manchester, Michigan 48158.

The purpose of this hearing is to present the wastewater management options and discuss their environmental impacts. Comments and views of interested persons will be received at this hearing and considered in developing final plans. In addition, written comments received before March 14, 1986 will be entered into the public hearing record. Written comments should be addressed to Mr. Dan Naimowicz, Village Manager, City Hall, 120 South Clinton Street, Manchester, Michigan 48158.

The proposed plan includes the following major wastewater treatment improvements at the existing facility:

- Sequencing Batch Reactor Biological Treatment;
- Rotary Sludge Thickening Facilities;
- Sludge Storage Facilities;
- Chlorination/Dechlorination Facilities

Completed improvements will enable compliance with Michigan DNR effluent standards for the River Raisin land application of Liquid Sludge is proposed as the primary disposal method under the Village Program for Effective Residuals Management.

The estimated project costs for the recommended plan are as follows assuming receipt of a U.S. EPA construction grant:

Project Cost	\$2,100,000
Local Share	692,000

## Manchester Family Service Holiday Report

A belated report for Manchester Family Service on the 1985 Christmas Project is finally ready. There were 84 households served this year with a total of 205 individuals. Of this number 91 were children and 40 Senior Citizens. The Food and Clothing orders were distributed at the annual "Christmas Shop" on December 18, at St. Mary's Church. The "Shop" is a free bazaar of new and used household items, clothing, toys and Christmas treasures donated by over sixty area families.

The Manchester School system was outstanding in collecting canned and packaged foods for the 84 grocery boxes this year. The Middle School collection was a competition between classes which nearly half filled the needed supply. The High School Leadership Group produced a pick-up truck load of food and with the Klager collection boosted the number of items over 4,000. Emanuel, Manchester Methodist and St. Mary's and many individuals added to the supply. The excess amount is an Emergency Food Cupboard for the agency and the churches to distribute during the coming year.

The Toy and Doll Shop, from which each child and teenager on the list was able to have a special Christmas gift selected by the parent, was mainly supplied by the endeavors of Carolyn Kovach, at Chrysler Proving Ground. She collected approximately 40 new gift items with the help of many kind hearted fellow employees. Ten dolls were added by the Twentieth Century Club, socks, mittens and 3 dolls came from Bethel Church Preschool Fellowship and a sufficient number of gifts were added by numerous individuals. A windfall of 28 Barbie type dolls complete with handmade wardrobes were sent in from Romulus by an elderly doll-maker in response to the story about MFS in the December Woman's Day Magazine.

Little folks were not forgotten as Mrs. Robert Pratt donated dozens of her specialty, soft, cuddly toys that were placed in each grocery box where little folks were involved.

The largest donation for a specific area of the Holiday Giving Project came from Abtrex Industries, Inc. of Inkster as they furnished all of the turkeys and fowl not given directly by local people. 10 turkeys came from Manchester Stamping Corporation, Manchester Tool and Die, Double A Products and Hoover Universal employees. Half of the cost of the food orders for the households who chose them was the interest of Chrysler Proving Ground Employees. Fourteen households outside the

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Manchester School District but in Washtenaw County were furnished by the Manchester Unit of the Salvation Army which serves the larger area.

VOLUNTEERS are what makes the "Christmas Shop" tick. Over two dozen men and women work for two days and evenings packing 84 carefully marked grocery boxes, unpacking bags of clothing, toys and household things and putting them on display tables. (St. Mary's basement looks like Hudsons on Bargain Day - one has to see it on Tuesday night to realize the magnitude of the project.) Then on Wednesday, volunteers help guide clients through the maze to be sure they are completely served, even to the Federal Surplus Foods that have arrived on time. This help comes from Churches, Senior Citizens, every civic group and then there is the necessary truck and man power from Manchester Tool and Die, The Manchester Jaycees and Russell C. Smith.

This annual activity is possible because of a host of anonymous donors and a community spirit typically Manchester. Monetary gifts came from the following sources to make the whole project work:

Kallewaard stated the Public Hearing is being held to hear comments on the appeal of Samuel R. Beal requesting a Variance from the Manchester Village Code for the C-2 (General Commercial) District to allow "Printing/Lithography" as a use on premises located at 103 East Main. The Double A Products will be the tenants.

Discussion followed. Sam Beal said the work hours will be 9:00

Kallewaard said the following was passed unanimously by the Planning Commission and is submitted for Council's consideration:

1. As allowed in Article 8, "Variances", 5.652 "hardship variance" with the following conditions: 2. Granted to Sam Beal and Double A, a use for non-retail printing, for a period of the life of the lease between these two parties; 3. Use of the first floor and the basement only at 103 East Main; 4. Variance non-transferrable; 5. Employee parking of Double A restricted to public lot during business hours; 6. No identification sign on behalf of Double A on the front of the building.

Kallewaard read the following letter:

January 24, 1986

The granting of a use variance of any type is not to be recommended. I apologize that this fact was not discussed by the planning commission at its last scheduled meeting. Since the meeting I have researched a bit deeper. At the time of discussion last Tuesday, the planning commission involved itself with the special circumstances of Sam Beal's property. Not one of us considered in depth, the long range precedent which could be established in respect to Michigan Appellate Court rulings. The attached information excerpted from "PLANNING & ZONING NEWS" VOL. 3, No. 9; July/Aug 1985, explains the situation in enough detail to guide us in making a wise decision.

I recommend that the Zoning Board of Appeals consider these facts when deliberating Sam Beal's petition. My opinion is to

interpret the use of this property as a permitted use. There is a close similarity with the current use of property at the location of the Manchester Enterprise. The Code also provides for a permitted use for professional offices. Refer to Article 12 5.132 para (3). A graphics department established to provide services to Double A Products is no doubt, a professional service. It is up to the ZBA to apply this interpretation to this petition. It denies the village the restrictions which the planning commission recommended in its motion. But it does not open the door to future problems that could extend far beyond this specific petition. I further recommend that appropriate excerpts such as court rulings listed in the attachment be entered into the public record of this petition. This written opinion should also be made part of the public record.

Tapping stated that he feels that Sam Beal's petition should have been approved by Variance. Tapping moved to adjourn, supported by Niehaus. Meeting adjourned at 7:40 p.m.

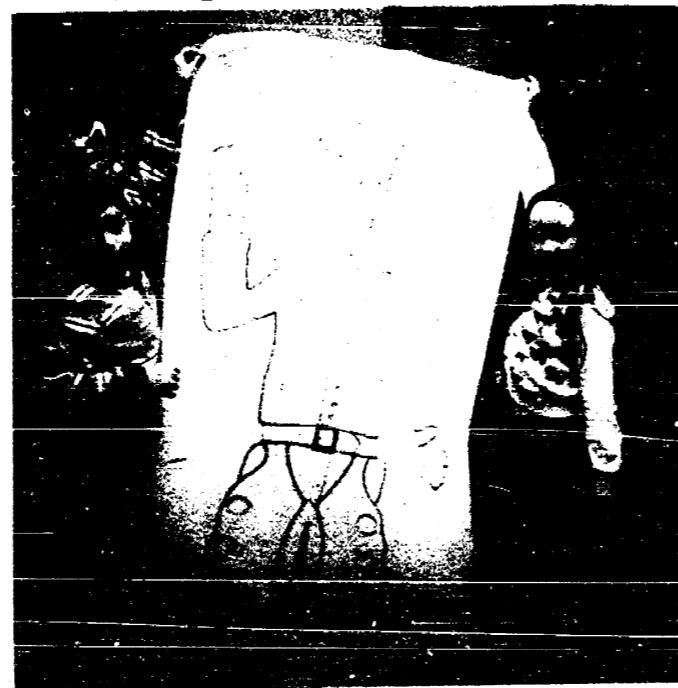

Someone who had to wait for a coffee break or until they got home saw it then for the first time. Television needs no excuses for its coverage of this event. If any heads need to be hung in shame, they belong

to those whose obviously empty lives are fulfilled only by some writer's imagination - to those who are totally unable to accept reality. It is a very sad commentary on our times."

## Book Review

THE COLUMBUS STORY by Alice Dalgleish with illustrations by Leo Politi. New York: Charles Scribner's Sons, 1965. 27 pages. Once there was a red-haired boy named Christopher who loved the sea and the ships that sailed the sea. Like all boys everywhere, Christopher was a dreamer. He longed for mystery,

danger, adventure. And he longed to see things he read about in books - strange lands with strange names like Cipango, Cathay, India where there were gold, spices and priceless jewels and people who knew nothing of God. Most boys grow up and lose their dreams. But Christopher's dreams never left him. Once, on a voyage, he was shipwrecked and washed up on the shore of Portugal. There he married and studied the maps of Portuguese navigators who at that time were the best sailors in the world. The King of Portugal, however, was indifferent to Christopher's wonderful dreams. So Christopher went to the King and Queen of neighboring Spain and, after trying very hard, he convinced them to give him money and ships to make his dream come true. The ships were the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria. And indeed Christopher's dream did come true. The strange lands were there - not Cipango and Cathay (what we now call Japan and China) but a land Christopher called San Salvador in honor of the Holy Savior. And there was little gold and hardly any spices and the people who lived there and painted their bodies in bright colors knew little of Christopher's God. When he returned to Spain, he had little to show the King and Queen. He did not know that he had found a whole new world.

Alice Dalgleish, the author, spent her childhood on Trinidad, the island discovered by Christopher Columbus on his third voyage. Upon hearing the Columbus story in grade school, she was so fascinated that she "went home to write the only poem I ever attempted." She has used Columbus' own words as a kind of refrain throughout this book which should perhaps be read aloud to a kindergarten or first grader. Mr. Politi's illustrations are beautiful. The book is certain to delight a child. It will, however, also intrigue the child's parent. In a recent TV miniseries, Columbus came across as the very picture of sanity and vision while those who opposed him seemed very narrow and provincial. Yet, the best evidence convinces me that the man must have been at least half mad. His maps were wretched. His mathematical calculations were so far off the mark as to be ludicrous. Although there was no serious doubt that the earth was round by the late fifteenth century, no one had ever

accurately measured its circumference. And those who had surmised its diameter were philosophers, not sailors or geographers. Moreover, Columbus manipulated the math to persuade some prince or other to finance his dreams. And dreams they positively were. Only the scantiest hints in ancient and medieval sources suggested any land mass beyond Asia. Ms. Dalgleish has captured accurately the youthful - and in the long run, the mature - Columbus. He never ceased to be a dreamer. I personally would not have given this man a raft to go down the Raisin. Happily, Isabella was a little less practical.

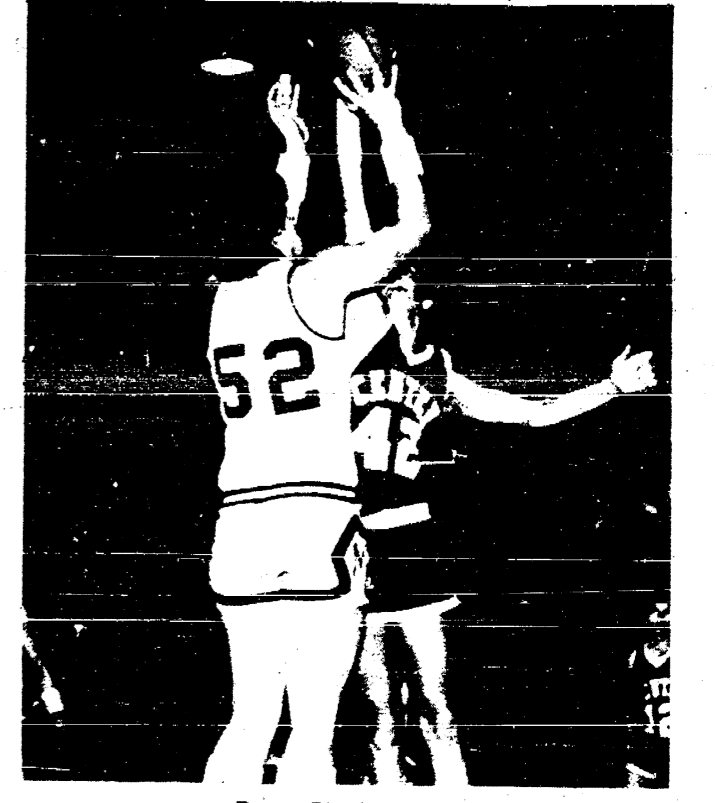
