



Manchester Family Service Holiday Report

A belated report for Manchester Family Service on the 1985 Christmas Project is finally ready. There were 84 households served this year with a total of 205 individuals. Of this number 91 were children and 40 Senior Citizens. The Food and Clothing orders were distributed at the annual "Christmas Shop" on December 18, at St. Mary's Church. The "Shop" is a free bazaar of new and used household items, clothing, toys and Christmas treasurers donated by over sixty area families. The Manchester School system

The High School Leadership Group produced a pick-up truck load of food and with the Klager collection boosted the number of items over 4,000. Emanuel, Manchester Methodist and St. Mary's and many individuals added to the supply. The excess amount is an Emergency Food Cupboard for
