

Tourism Hits 12.6 Billion

Michigan's tourism revenues increased 7 percent to a record \$12.6 billion in 1985, due to the state economy's upswing, stronger promotion and more out-of-state visitors, according to AAA Michigan.

"This is the third straight year tourism revenues rose in the stated AAA Travel state." Services Director Peter R. Erickson. "There was an 11 percent rise in tourism revenues over the 1984 total of \$11.4 billion, but when inflation is factored in, the actual growth was 7 percent." Total state tax revenues resulting from tourism last year also hit a record \$582 million, surpassing the \$525 collected in 1984 and \$488 million in 1983.

"Last year's revenue increase occurred despite greatly reduced air fares, especially to other U.S. cities, bargains in charter trips and the strength of the U.S. dollar overseas." Erickson said.

A large part of the true wealth of Washtenaw County is its soil and water. If the value of these resources is not fully appreciated, it is because there has always been enough soil and water to produce adequate supplies of food and fiber. Washtenaw County's soil and water resources, however, are finite and vulnerable. Some of the information revealed by the 1982 National Resources Inventory is not

Wind and water erosion are occurring on all cropland in Washtenaw County. 102,700 acres, of this land are eroding faster than the land can tolerate and remain productive. Over a million tons of soil are being eroded from Washtenaw County farms each year.

Highly erodible soils complicate erosion problems in the southern part of the county where continuous rowcrop rotations are commonly used. Sheet and rill erosion in the area often exceed \bar{t} tons per acre per year.

Large fields, the absence of windbreaks and clean tillage make most of the area around Manchester vulnerable to severe wind erosion. Wind erosion on coarse textured soils is often three times as severe as sheet and

According to the Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) conservation practices are needed on 129,000 acres of the county's cropland to reduce soil erosion or improve crop production. Conservation tillage, crop residue management and cover crops may be all that is needed to control erosion on relatively level cropland in the county.

Grassed waterways, contour farming, diversions and erosion control structures may be needed on land with a severe erosion problem to support conservation tillage, crop rotations and other management practices.

Conservation practices are also needed on 33,500 acres of forest land and 23,600 acres of pasture and idle grassland.

Farmers and other landowners should inspect their land for evidence of sheet, rill and wind rosion. If an erosion problem is found, they should apply the conservation practices farming methods that will prevent further erosion damage.

Other people concerned the quality and condition of their food producing resource should support programs and policies that will help farmers apply conservation and management practices needed to control

what causes colon cancer remains unclear, the findings reported by Lipkin and Newmark are considered to bring us an important step closer to linking the pieces of the complex puzzle that is colon cancer.

Further support for a beneficial role of calcium in colorectal cancer was provided several months earlier by Cedric Garland of the University of California, San Diego at LaJolla and his coworkers. In their 20 year study of almost 2,000 middle-aged men, these researchers found that the 49 men who developed colorectal cancer ate substantially less calcium and vitamin D than those

High Calcium Diets May Reduce calcium intake will protect us Risk of Colon

Increasing calcium intake may reduce risk of colon cancer, say food supply, according to recent Martin Lipkin, M.D., and Harold Newmark, M.S., of the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and Cornell University Medical College in New York City.

These medical researchers studied the growth of precancerous cells in 10 persons who, because of family histories, were defined as high risk for colon cancer. When these individuals (seven males and three females) increased their intake of calcium by 1250 mg/day for 2 to 3 months, the growth of pre-cancerous cells

Abnormal cell growth is a hallmark of cancer. Before the increased intake of calcium, the growth of pre-cancerous cells in these persons was characteristic of a group at high risk of colon cancer, observed Lipkin and Newmark In contrast, when dietary calcium was increased, the pattern of pre-cancerous cell growth resembled that found in

low risk groups. Cancer of the colon and rectum or colorectal cancer is a leading form of cancer. It affects about 6% of the U.S. population with an estimated 138.000 new cases and

While it's not established for certain whether increasing our against colon cancer, nutritionists recommend that we consume at least 800 mg calcium daily, the Recommended Dietary Allowance for this nutrient. Milk and other dairy foods are the major source of calcium in our diet. In 1983, Dairy Council of Michigan dairy foods (excluding butter) contributed nearly 75% of the calcium available in the nation's

The Congress passed, and President Reagan signed into law, a new farm bill in late December, and now details are coming out of Washington on just how the new law will be administered

The new law is no panacea and it will not solve the farm problems overnight. But as the economics editor of the FARM JOURNAL said in a recent issue, "You'll love the new farm law in 1990." The new law will gradually get American farm product prices more in line with world prices and allow U.S. farmers to compete once again in the world export There are a lot of different

sections to the new farm law, and every producer will have to decide on which ones are most practical for him or her. For example, there is the wheat and feed grain section that has some paid diversion programs and begin moving to a three-year government.



Board Seeks Land Nominations

Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Board has begun its annual search for recreational lands to purchase with funds earmarked from the sale of oil, gas and mineral leases and royalties on gas and oil wells located on State-owned property.

"We are looking for land suitable for management by the State or local units of government that would provide additional recreation for Michigan citizens, says Rodney Stokes, Department of Natural Resources Executive Secretary to Natural Resources Trust Fund Board. "We're also interested in acquiring land to protect because of its environmental importance or scenic beauty.'

Also, 1986 marks the first time the Board will be considering proposals for the development of outdoor recreation facilities. Up to 25 percent of the available Trust Fund dollars can be used for development outdoor recreation facilities.

Anyone can nominate lands for may only be nominated by units of Individuals or government. nominating lands for acquisition and/or development purposes may obtain guidelines and necessary forms from the Recreation Services Division in the Department of Natural Resources. April 1, is the deadline for submitting nominations.

Acquisition and development of lands nominated this spring should begin during the fall of 1987. The Board will evaluate all public proposals and submit a recommended priority list to the Legislature next January.
