School Board Announces Millage Requests

At a Special Board Meeting held on Monday, April 28, the Manchester Board of Education approved the annual school election resolution.

On Monday, June 9, 1986, voters will be electing two new school board members for four year terms. John Gaughan, Paul Kluwe, Steve Halchishan, W. John Porter, William Kemner and Patricia Sahakian will be the candidates running for the two vacancies. Kent Talcott and Earl Jorning will not be seeking re-election to the Board of Education.

Voters will also be asked to renew the current operating millage of 22.78 mills for five years. In addition to the renewal request, voters will also be asked to approve 4.8 additional mills for operating purposes. The 4.8 mills will be for two years and was split into two packages of 3.5 mills and 1.3 mills.

Time Changed For Memorial Day Parade

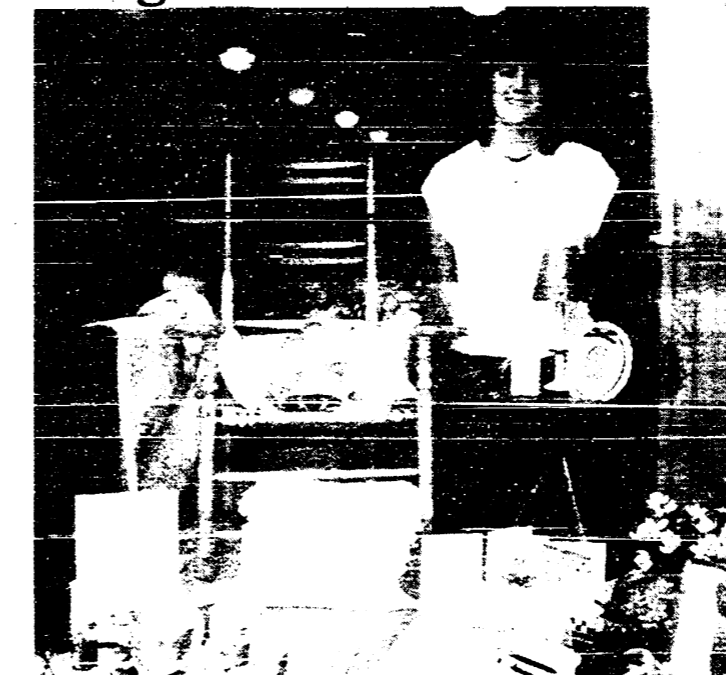
The time for Manchester's Annual Memorial Day Parade has been changed. The parade will begin at 1:00 p.m. on May 26th.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Gerald Marion, at 8:10 p.m.

The minutes of the meeting of March 10, 1986, were read and accepted, and approved as read.

Private Roads: Discussion covered questions of drainage and length. Costs were estimated to be approximately \$42.00 per foot, or \$4,000 per 100 feet. Costs for black top were estimated to be \$70,000 a mile. Further definitions and descriptions were felt to be needed, as well as further definitions for frontage, private road, and private drive. It was recommended by Doug Parr, Supervisor, that the questions might be considered at zoning level, and that a driveway might be for one dwelling, and a private road for over one.

Resource Conservation: Land considered for this along the rivers, streams, and lakes would be lands on which the septic tanks could threaten the water purity, and flood plains the safety of any building. Recharge areas, which are areas through which wells are recharged by rain and snow meltage, may need protection also.

Map consideration: Proposed development: Motion to remove R-1 except around Bridgewater. Moved, Dull, Second, Becklehamer. Vote: Passed, 5 yes, 3 no.

Resource Conservation to remain. Vote to include Flood Plain, 100 yr. level, Moved, Fraumann, Second, Hardenbergh. Passed, unan.

Next meeting: May 12, 1986, 8 p.m. Bridgewater Township Hall. Meeting adjourned 9:30 p.m.
