

FISHING FOR TROUBLE One of the most popula hobbies is keeping ornamen-tal fish. Collectors should know what kinds not to buy so they don't get into he water for endangering wild-



Butterfly fish are among the most varied—and delicate of saltwater ornamentals.

Many of the freshwater fish commonly bought by U.S. hobbyists - including most guppies, mollies, swordtails, platies, and goldfish-come from fish farms. Other freshwater species

and most marine species however, are collected from the wild. Internationally, the ornamental fish trade goes largely unchecked. What is worrisome to biologists is the mortality that occurs when wild fish are collected and transported. Up to 50 percent of all wild-caught freshwater fish die before export.

#### Seat Belt Use **Urged To Protect** Children

Secretary of State Richard H. Austin called on parents to recognize the danger of driving with children who are not in a child safety seat or buckled up. Austin said, "Some parents do Minutes

not realize the danger their unrestrained children face in a collision. We have all seen these children bouncing around in cars or sitting in someone's lap. With the sudden swerving of the car or the jamming of the brakes, their precious cargo instantly becomes an unguided missle. Often the result is tragic."

Austin's comments were made at a Lansing press conference to promote Baby Safety Week.

Also present were four children who avoided serious injury in traffic crashes because they were secured in child safety seats. The children were awarded stuffed "Safety Bears" by Secretary Austin on behalf of the Michigan Coalition for Safety Belt Use.

According to Dr. George Baker medical director of Maternal and Child Health for the Michigan Department of Public Health, "traffic crashes are the number one health problem for children." Judy Coleman, president of the

National Passenger Safety Association, reported that while use of child restraints is over 70 percent, after age four, when child seat use is not required, safety belt use by children drops to less than 40 percent. Improper

Infants must be placed in seats that face toward the back of a car due to computer breakdown. and bigger children must be harnessed into their seats or they parents to get out the safety instructions for their seats and seats correctly," Coleman said.

Michigan's Child Restraint Law requires all children under age four to be buckled up. When riding in the back seat, children between ages one and four must working be protected with a salety seat. Children an approved safety seat. Children employees.
