The Conservation Compliance provision of the Farm Bill has the most potential to effect farmers who participate in USDA commodity and loan programs. The conservation Compliance requires highly erodible land that was planted to annual crops at least once between 1981 and 1985 to have a conservation plan by January 1, 1990. This conservation plan must be actively applied during 1990 and be fully operational by 1995 to maintain USDA eligibility for commodity

and loan programs.

If a farmer wants to farm highly erodible land, he must have and follow a locally approved conservation plan to remain eligible for USDA programs. That is, the farmer will not be able to participate in any of the covered USDA programs if he does not comply, even if the highly erodible lands make up only a small percentage of the pperation. 





Checkup For

a-year physical for a healthier Michigan fish population is the objective behind a Department of Natural Resources (DNR) sponsored fish quality workshop. Nearly 30 DNR fisheries specialists and a few University and outstate fisheries biologiest are expected to attend the December 9-11 workshop at Michigan State University.

This workshop will provide us (DNR) with objective measurements to determine the health and condition of our fish, remarked DNR Fisheries Chief John Scott, while enabling us to pinpoint whether diseases or other problems are hatcheryrelated or occur after stocking.

Ron Goede, a Utah fisheries disease specialist, will conduct the workshop to include a half-day of theory, followed by a hands-on physical evaluation of both hatchery and wild fishpopulations, concluding with a interpretation of the results.

The DNR will implement the checkup porgram at all six of its hatcheries immediately. Fingerling-size fish will be checked this winter, then rechecked as yearlings in the Spring. Some of the yearlings will then be marked, clipped or microtagged and released into specially selected






