## Mentally Disabled Given A Chance To Earn Their Way

A Manchester business has linked itself to the public sector through a workshop that provides supervised jobs for the mentally disabled.

Manchester Stamping Corp., a manufacturer of automotive parts, provides work for the clients of the Development Center, a division of Washtenaw County Community Mental Health.

Manchester Stamping began contracting jobs with the Development Center six years ago. Other Washtenaw County companies have also contracted work with the Development Center, but Manchester Stamping has gone a step further.

In December, Manchester Stamping and the Development Center opened a sheltered workshop in Bridgewater. Manchester Stamping owns the building, leasing it to the Development Center. The company plans to bring the workshop to their Manchester location by the end of the year.

In the workshop, about 30 clients, age 25 and up, from the Development Center perform assembly jobs Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The clients are either developmentally disabled or mentally ill. The Development Center supervises the workers, helping them to

increase production rates and learn good job behavior.

"Manchester Stamping has made a much more significant commitment to this project in that they have guaranteed a certain level of contracts to us for the first year to help us get started and by kicking in a quality control person," said Susan Bay, program administrator from Washtenaw County Community Mental Health.

"In that way, they have tied themselves to a community services program, which in business is highly unusual," said Bay.

Bay also serves as program consultant from Washtenaw Interventions, a non-profit corporation, which conducts the workshop program, employs the staff and determines policy.

The workshop is designed to be a transitional program, said Bay. Clients would move through the program and eventually be placed in competitive employment.

"Too often programs are where people work there and are stuck there, so this is an innovative idea to create more flow," said Bay.

"They could even work for us," said Wayne Hamilton, president of Manchester Stamping. "We would also recommend their

employment with other firms. There's a stigma attached to the people who are clients here that they're not capable of working in industry, and that's not true.  
 Clients are selected from the Development Center if they demonstrate a potential for competitive employment. The client should have a production rate of at least 30 percent of the norm. Clients are also chosen if they have fewer behavioral problems.  
 The main job performed at the workshop is placing the springs in Thunderbird car brackets used to hold door trim. The workshop processes about 17,000 brackets daily. Another 7,000 daily are pressed on the workshop's two stamping machines.  
 Clients are paid bi-weekly, according to the number of pieces they process. If they perform janitorial duties, they are paid by the hour.  
 Clients on assembly jobs average between \$5 and \$16 per day depending on their productivity level, said Belinda Parks, a job coach from the Development Center. Some clients can now produce 90 percent of the norm.  
 "I do spot checks on the floor. I observe how they work. I meet with them every week to talk about their production rate and how they can improve performance," said Parks.  
 The Development Center works on the client's job behavior. For instance, clients may talk 100 words per minute while trying to work, shout across the floor or become upset with minor changes, said Anne Goodell, contract procurer for the Development Center.  
 Parks holds classes to train clients in hygiene and job seeking skills. The classes use role

What you see is what you get at the Morley Candy Company. Visitors to the company's huge Bavarian-style confectionery factory in East Detroit can watch the candymakers at work — melting the big blocks of

chocolate, pouring the molds, working their Willy Wonka magic through an observation window that runs the length of the candy kitchen on the Nine Mile Road side of the 30,000 square-foot building.

It's really window-shopping at its best. If you see something you can't resist — and it is difficult not to — you can pick it up at the sales counter in the display room on your way out.

Morley candy, in hundreds of assortments, is sold at selected stores and gift shops in the Midwest — Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin. But, you may be more familiar with Morley candy than you think — many schools, churches and associations sell Morley's finest and sweetest as a fundraising venture. In fact, the director of our promotion office swears she sold Morley candy door-to-door twenty years ago as a school fundraising project in Portland, Oregon!

The company maintains a warehouse and distribution center in Arizona for wholesale sales for that very purpose. The Morley candymakers have been at it for a long time, beginning in 1919, in the cramped kitchen of founder Erwin Morley's flat above his soda and mail shop on Detroit's lower east side.

The shop was a popular teen hangout during its heyday in the '40's and '50's — a great place for the kids from the nearby high schools to sip a soda and watch the hot rods cruising Gratiot. As a matter of fact, the shop could have served as a set for "Happy Days", complete with a lot of kids who looked like the Fonzy and his friends, lounging in piano veneer booths under a pounded tin ceiling with rotating fans. Ha-a-a-y!

The success of the shop (and Morley's candies) paved the way for the move to the new \$2.5 million candy factory on Nine Mile in 1961. Morley retired four years later and turned over the business to his sons Erwin, Jr. and Thomas, who had busied tables in the "old place" on Gratiot.

Today the sons (and grandsons) of Erwin Morley are carrying on the tradition. Visitors often see them on the other side of the big kitchen window-wall, helping out the 60 other Morley candymakers who also are part of the tradition. In any case, let's keep making it — and buying it — in Michigan!

### Do-It-Yourself Wills Approved

Legislation to help Michigan residents make a legally sound will without hiring a lawyer has received final legislative approval. The bill provides for a fill-in-the-blanks form, written in simple language. The form is to be available at little or no cost.

"The Legislature has recognized that being able to leave one's property to whom one wishes is an issue of basic dignity, regardless of the size of one's estate," said State Representative Perry Bullard (D-Ann Arbor), sponsor of the measure.

The Michigan fill-in-the-blanks form was carefully drafted by a committee which included several members of the Probate and Estate Planning Council of the

State Bar of Michigan. The committee set out to create a will that was legally sound, easy to understand, and useful to a large number of people, Bullard explained.

Using the will, a person could leave up to two gifts to people or charities. He or she can also write a list of personal items and household goods leaving each to a specified friend or family member. This list could include everything from jewelry, books, furniture and clothing to boats or

automobiles. All property not included as a cash gift or on a list would go to one's spouse, if still living, or equally to one's children.

Bullard cautioned that the fill-in-the-blanks form would not be useful to everyone. "People with complex estate plans or vast property holdings still need to seek competent legal advice. It is my hope that passage of this will may indirectly help even these people, by spurring those who don't yet have a will to hire a lawyer," said Bullard.

"This bill represents the wave of the future. It is nice to see Michigan in the forefront of a long overdue effort to simplify the law and increase access to legal procedures," Bullard said.

If the bill is signed by the Governor as expected, the law will take effect on July 1, 1986. Bullard advised that people wait until that date before executing this new type of will.

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## Emanuel Church To Present Lenten Concert

This Sunday, March 16, 1986, at the 10:30 a.m. Service of Worship, the Adult Choir of Emanuel United Church of Christ will present their annual Lenten Concert. 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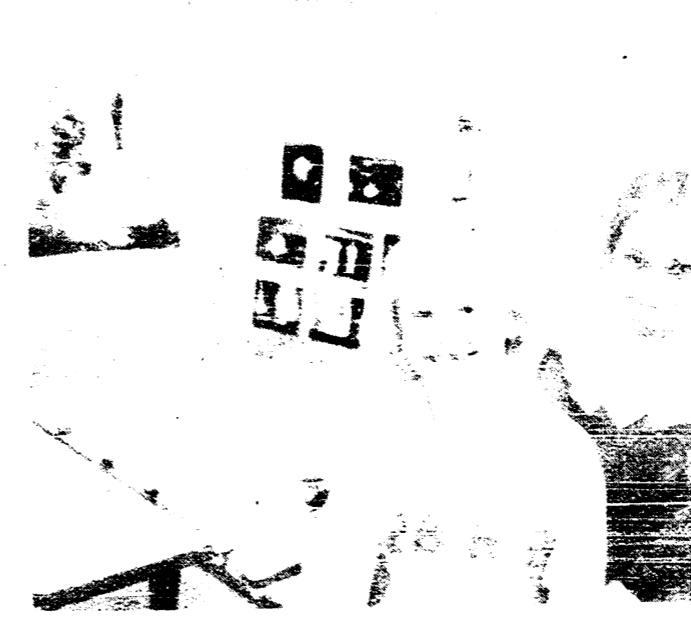

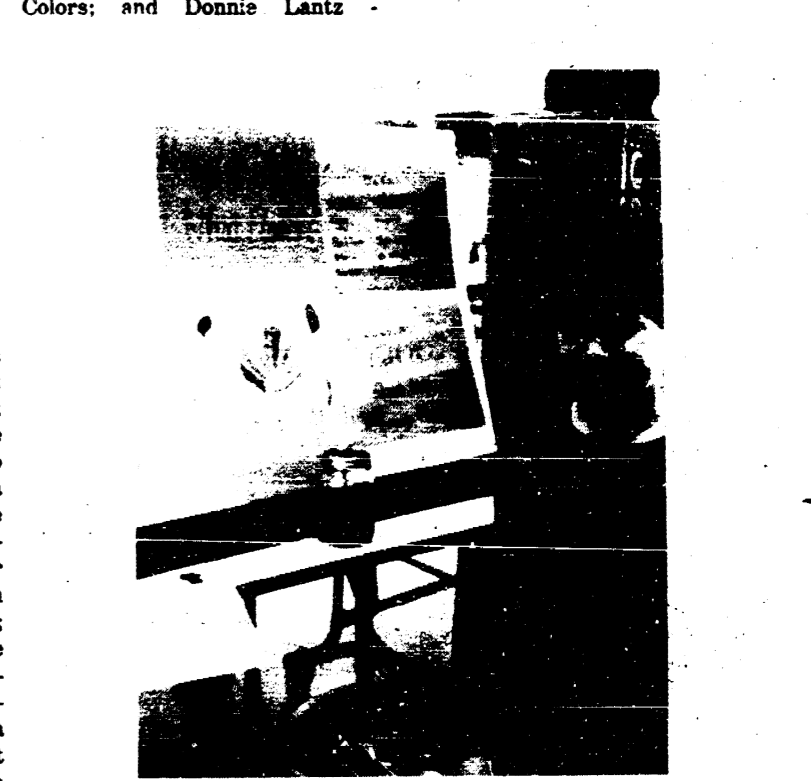

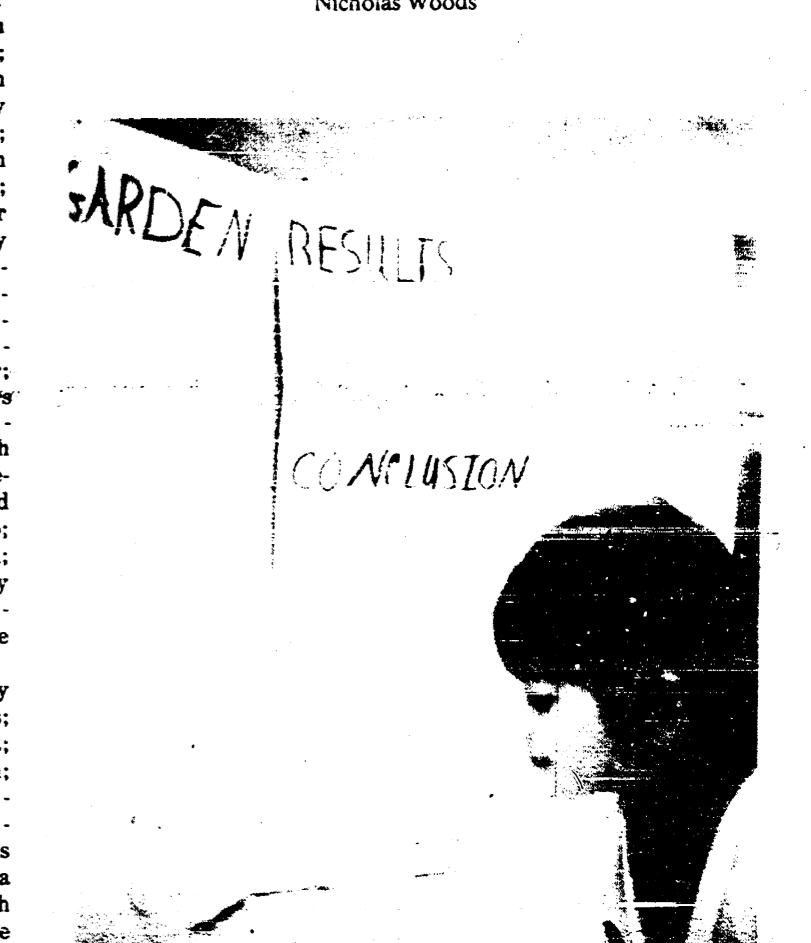
