I don't think that there is any question about this but on the poster also there was a picture of several hippopotami standing with their mouths wide open.

I don't quite know just what the connection is but just before I was poster, I had been reading about the activities, both physical and verbal, of the state legislature in which was a great deal of information about our 7,461 state legislators and their activities during 1985. It was one of their busiest years. Forty four of them met during that year and most all of them faced budget strains that came from deficit caused cutbacks in federal spending. Many fiscal problems too add to the problems of these very diversified men and women.

If you can remember, once upon a time, this group consisted mostly of a group of homogenious white male lawvers who interrupted their various careers for a few weeks of lawmaking every year or so but now most of them have become power centers. Many of them seem to forget who

represent while they are there. However, they seem to be

"As more programs come to the states, the pressures became greater," says William Pound, Director of State Services for the National Conference of State Legislators. "There's no question but that legislators put in more time than they used to."

Part of the increased work load comes from more increased and said. In the 1940's only four legislatures met annually while the balance were content to meet every two years. Now only six didn't meet last year.

Sessions too last longer, but many states limit sessions to 60 or 90 working days. Legislators in 19 states - the most populous except Texas and Florida - go round the year if need be.

In states with short sessions many of the legislators engage in serving on interim committees. "It isn't just going to the capitol any more for just three days", says Mr. Pound. "There is committee work and meetings and more pressure on them."

These demands have led to changes in the makeup of the legislatures. Self-employed

Book Review

illustrated by Ati Forberg. New York: Thomas Y. Crowell Company, 1968. 34 pages.

Perhaps the most striking feature of this little book are Mrs. Forberg's illustrations. They are done in warm oranges, yellows, and soft pinks - the colors of spring, the colors of Easter. They don't merely adorn the text; rather they are integrated part of the story. Easter grew out of ancient

spring festivals. Everyone, Christian or not, seems to be relieved at the ending of winter and people everywhere at all times have celebrated the return of life in Nature. And what is more symbolic of life than an egg? The Easter egg has ties with such non-Christian cultures as China, India, Persia and Egypt and the custom of decorating Easter eggs

is very old and widespread. This where Ati Forberg's illustrations are so helpful as she shows some of the favorite themes and designs that are often used on Easter eggs. Mrs. Fisher also traces the background of Easter egg trees and the heavily jewelled crystal and gold Easter





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
