

More than 3,000 people die from choking in the United States each year. Most choking in adults occurs while they are eating. Meat is the usual culprit. Other foods and objects cause choking, too, especially in young children who, as all parents know, seem to delight in putting all sorts of things into their mouths.

For years medical opinion differed on the best way, or ways, of dislodging an object from the throat of a choking victim. Sharp blows to the back, finger sweeps of the throat and manual thrusts to the chest were methods often recommended. Today, there is choking?" If Washtenaw County has a problem, it also exists in other counties around us as well so if we are in need of a protective ordinance, it should be under state jurisdiction.

Currently the state is in the process of writing a "right to know" law. It has passed in the State House of Representatives May 13. If you wish to go, call and is now being considered in the Senate. It is ridiculous to have a duplication.

The cost of this proposal is astronomical. It is out of balance to have agriculture charged as much as industry and with no chance to recover increased costs and furthermore our needs are seasonal. It has been publicly stated our county will have a deficit because of reduction of federal aid revenue sharing. Therefore this program has to be

on to businesses and consumers. How many more costs wil businesses have to fund and still survive? Currently our Senator Pollack has been striving to locate an ethanol production plant in Saline which would provide jobs and tax base. Don't think for a minute that the ethanol people wouldn't relocate 7 miles south to Monroe County or west to Lenawee or Jackson to be free of additional regulations.

Furthermore the regulations of this ordinance is much more complex than the proponents realize. I do not question the concern regarding toxic products but I state to you that this ordinance will not eliminate 100% of all accidents any more than the requirement of seat belts and air bags will in automobiles.




