### **Area Girl Wins** In State **Track Meet**



Chris Wilson of Manchester, a student at Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard High School, won the Women's Long Jump competition in the State Class C Track Meet on Saturday, May 31st at Bangor. She set a new State record for Class C with her 18' 7" leap. This was the best jump of the day in the event regardless of class and beat the Class A winner by a

This was Chris' last jump of the day and her High School career. After jumping 18' 2" to clinch the meet on her second to last jump, she finished the day with her

record breaking leap. Chris, who is a Senior, also the same event at the State meet in her Sophomore year with a jump of 17 5%". Last year as a Junior, she had shin-splints and a severely pulled muscle and was imited in her preparation, but still managed a sixth place finish in the State meet.

After playing softball her Freshman year, Chris switched to track as a Sophomore. In individual competition Chris' record was 24 first place finishes, never placing lower. In her three years of competition, she has won 56 medals. She also played

Illiteracy ranged from nine percent by adults whose native tongue was English to 48 percent of people brought up speaking another language. However the test was in English and most of those with another native language are thought likely to be literate in that language.

This percentage is far from the truth in this area for example. 

This year the Center for Talent Development (formerly the Midwest Talent Search Project) of Northwestern University conducted its fifth annual search for junior high students who are academically talented. This year 13 seventh and eighth grade students from Nellic Ackerson Middle School participated in the search. These students qualified for the Northwestern program by scoring at the 95th percentile or higher on the verbal or mathematical portion of a standardized in-grade achievement test. • More grass in late afternoon or early evening, when grass is dry. The heat of midday is past and the sun will not beat down or scorch newly-exposed turf. Dry grass will discharge more evenly and bag more easily.

· Mow often and limit clipping removal to one-third (maximum of one inch) of the grass height. This avoids shocking the lawn, which makes for a thin, yellow looking stand of grass; and it makes bagging, mulching or discharge easier.

• Change direction with each mowing. Grass cut in identical directions can take a "set" or "grain" and flattens out. Changing directions creates a better cut and avoids streaks in the lawn.

 Cut across face of slopes. This is a safer way to cut than up and down; the mower is less likely to roll backwards or the operator to slip under it. • Consider a mower that



### Health For All

Sing Your Way To A Long Lung Life

Go ahead, sing in the shower even if others in your household you sing, the longer you may live.

Her research shows that professional opera singers have stronger chest wall muscles and that their hearts pump blood better than those of otherwise normal nonsinging adults. This may help explain why professional singers often outlive nonsingers by 20 years or more.


Dr. McCormick examined lung and heart function during sustained deep or abdominal breathing in 20 members of the New York City Opera Company who were between 28 and 65 years of age. Some of the singers smoked, and some engaged in physical conditioning exercises. Regardless of these factors, the group as a whole were able to maintain diaphragmatic breathing with large lung volumes during testing. Throughout the tests. their hearts worked more efficiently in pumping blood and their heart rate was lower than that in a group of young nonsingers, all under 40 years of

Normally, heart and lung functions decline with age in most adults. This decline is accelerated in people who smoke and those who live a sedentary lifestyle. According to Dr. McCormick, the results of this study indicate that the decline can be slowed down by

'Singing is a condition exercise of the muscles of respiration," Dr. McCormick said. "It very efficiently tones up the chest wall muscles in a manner similar to swimming, rowing and
