#### New Auto Lemon Law

Michigan joined 39 other states as its new Auto Lemon Law took effect on June 25. The law provides a legal definition of a lemon vehicle and provides avenues of recourse to consumers. Consumers who will buy a new

car, pick-up truck, or van are now protected under the new law. Vehicles which meet the legal definition of a lemon may be bought back by the manufacturer or replaced in one of three ways: voluntarily by the manufacturer; through the decision of an arbitration process that meets Federal Trade Commission guidelines; or through decision of a court of law.

factory official models covered by manufacturer's warranties are also subject to the new law. It does not apply to most used vehicles; leased vehicles; or business or government fleets of ten or more vehicles purchased in the same year. To assist new vehicle owners


The Board of Education has the complete authority to establish that 37.169 mills be levied in 1986 from within its present authorized millage rate.
