PROPOSED VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 151 UTILITY HEARING OFFICER ORDINANCE

ADOPTED: NOVEMBER 3, 1986 EFFECTIVE: UPON ADOPTION

An Ordinance to provide for the appointment of a Utility Hearing Officer and to establish proceedings for hearings on disputes with customers concerning charges by utilities owned or operated by the Village

> SECTION I. **HEARING OFFICER:** APPOINTMENT, TENURE, COMPENSATION

The Village Council shall appoint a Utility Hearing Officer, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Council and who shall receive such compensation, if any, as is established by resolution of the Council from time to time.

SECTION II HEARINGS

A. The Utility Hearing Officer shall conduct a hearing at a reasonable time and place following receipt of a written request by any customer of any Village-owned or operated utility, including but not limited to Village-owned or operated sewer and water facilities, to take evidence and adjudicate any dispute between the customer and the Village utility concerning charges for utility services. The Hearing Officer shall cause a written notice of the time and place of the hearing to be mailed to or delivered to the

B. The hearing shall be conducted in an informal manner, and in all respects conducted in such a manner consistent with due process to the customer as to promote the fair, speedy, and inexpensive resolution of disputes. The record for hearing shall consist of file materials and originals or copies of documentary evidence offered at the hearing, plus written findings and conclustions of the Hearing Officer. A verbatim record shall not be required. A form shall be developed under the direction of the Village Manager for use at the hearings, which shall include provisions for requests for hearings, lists of witnesses and documentary evidence, and factual findings and conclusions of the Hearing Officer.

C. The utility and the customer may offer witness testimony or documentary evidence and each party may present a written summary of its position. The Hearing Officer may admit and consider evidence of a type commonly relied upon by average people in the conduct of their affairs, without regard to formal rules of evidence. Neither party may be represented by an attorney, unless the Hearing Officer finds affirmatively that the customer is in need of legal representation, in which case both parties may be represented by an attorney at their own expense, but the utility may elect not to be represented by an attorney at its

D. The Hearing Officer shall make written findings of fact and conclusions, which may be to affirm the bill submitted by the utility, to reduce the bill, or to cancel the bill in its entirety. The customer and the utility shall be supplied with a copy of the written findings and conclusions at the end of the hearing.

SECTION III. APPEALS

Decisions involving more than \$500.00 may be appealed to the Village Council by the customer. The Village Council shall rehear the matter de novo during an appeal. Notwithstanding any provision of this Ordinance, the rights of the cusotmer and of the utility to remedies provided by the courts are preserved, and neither party shall be required to utilize or to exhaust this administrative remedy before seeking legal remedies in the courts.

SECTION IV. CONFLICT OF ORDINANCE, EFFECT OF PARTIAL INVALIDITY, SEVERABILITY

A. In any case where a provision of this Ordinance is found to be in conflict with a provision of any Michigan statute or any ordinance or any adopted code of the Village of Manchester, the provisions which establish the greater degree of protection of the rights of the customer shall

B. If any section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance should be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance, which shall remain in full force and effect; and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.

> SECTION V. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption.

Horses are susceptible to the oxic effects of the dried leaves and bark of Red Maple (Acer rubrum). When eaten, these cause the red blood cells to break mart or otherwise become unable

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include blood transfusions. Horse owners are advised to rake and remove the fresh leaves from the nasture before they dry. Michigan State University reported three horses affected with the poisoning during the last week of October.

Dogs and cats (as well as hildren) are very susceptible to the toxic effects of antifreeze (ethylene glycol). When ingested, sweet-tasting liquid interferes with kidney function and frequently results in death, especially if treatment is not immediately. changing antifreeze, properly dispose of any that is unused as well as the old. Clean up spills since even small amounts may be harmful.

If you suspect either type of poisoning has occurred, contact your veterinarian immediately.




