Sales are rising rapidly since its introduction two years ago and now the ice cream shops at any hour are thronged with women from their teens until their late 20's.

Manchester Family Service Christmas

Manchester Family Service plans for Christmas for the local Department of Social Services clients and the low income residents of the area are in the making. Manchester School District, Manchester Township and that part of Bridgewater Township that is in the Clinton School District comprise the area.

Federal Surplus Foods will be distributed on THURSDAY, DECEMBER 18, at St. Mary's Catholic Church basement from 9:00 a.m. to 3 p.m. This is in conjunction with the annual Christmas Shop of used and new clothing, toys, games and household items galore — all of which will be put in place the day before in readiness for the opening Thursday morning.

The Holiday Gift Orders which have been arranged in advance by Manchester Family Service for all known clients will be given out at this time. If there are needy persons or families that have not been contacted, or their sponsors, they should call 428-8852 or 428-7940 by December 12th for interview.

There will also be boxes of

groceries (canned and packaged supplies) on hand for each household. These gifts are being collected by the three Manchester Community Schools. The Klager kids will be gathering their gifts around their Christmas tree in their main hallway during the first two weeks in December.

The Middle School children from the 5th and 6th grades will compete for a total-prize-collection by December 12th. The Junior High Student Council will participate in the action by donating a monetary gift to MFS collected by a Special Event to be announced later.

The Leadership Class at the High School is conducting the Food Drive there the week of the 8th through the 12th. All collections are final by that date, for all the collections.

No home canned or processed foods can be accepted because of Health Department ruling. Packages must not be broken and absolutely NO CANS without labels will be accepted. (People are urged to remember to save all Campbell labels and those on the school list for the school collection — a cannister will be placed in IGA at the necessary time.)

A food donation has already been started at the combined church Thanksgiving Service at Sharon United Methodist Church

on Thanksgiving Eve. Persons, other than parents and families of school children, who wish to participate in the Food Drive may take their donations to the school of their choice before the deadline date or call either number listed earlier in this report. Other gifts should be cleared through these numbers as well.

Reye's Syndrome Alert!

The Manchester Community Schools would like to remind parents and students that the flu season is again upon us.

The flu or various symptoms identified as influenza occur more frequently during the winter months. Influenza is a viral infection, and as such, warrants our special attention because a swift and deadly children's

disease is associated with it. The disease, Reye's Syndrome, affects children from infancy through late adolescence and can develop 3 to 5 days after the onset of chicken pox, an upper respiratory illness, or other viral infections. It affects the liver and brain, is non-contagious and is often misdiagnosed as encephalitis, meningitis, diabetes, poisoning, drug overdose or sudden infant death.

After a viral infection has seemingly run its course and the child is feeling better, the following symptoms should be treated as serious and as possibly the first indication of Reye's Syndrome. Anti-nausea medication may mask the symptoms of the disease and because of the possible association of aspirin with Reye's Syndrome, parents should consult their physician before using these drugs. Watch for these symptoms, usually occurring in this order:

- Relentless or continuous vomiting; Listlessness (loss of pep and energy, drowsiness); Personality Change (such as irritability, combativeness or slurred speech); Disorientation (unable to identify whereabouts or family members); Delirium, Convulsions.

A child's life can depend on early diagnosis. Reye's Syndrome should be suspected in any child with chicken pox who vomits repeatedly. Phone your physician immediately if these symptoms develop and tell him/her you suspect Reye's Syndrome. If your doctor is not available take your child or young adult to an emergency room promptly. Two liver function tests (SGOT/SGPT) can be done to determine the

possibility of Reye's Syndrome. There is a 90% chance of recovery when the syndrome is treated in its earliest stages by physicians and nurses experienced in the treatment of Reye's.

Epidemiologic research has shown an association between the development of Reye's Syndrome and the use of aspirin for treating the symptoms of influenza-like illnesses, chicken pox and colds. The Surgeon General, the Food and Drug Administration, and the Center for Disease Control recommend that aspirin and combination products containing aspirin not be given to children 18 years of age and under during episodes of these illnesses.

The NRSF is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization with chapters in over forty states. The NRSF has pioneered the movement to disseminate knowledge about the disease in an effort to aid in early diagnosis and also provide funds for research into the cause, cure, care, treatment and prevention of Reye's Syndrome.

OSUT is a 12-week period which combines basic combat training and advanced individual training.

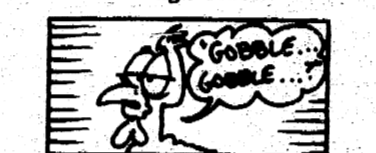
The training included weapons qualifications, squad tactics,

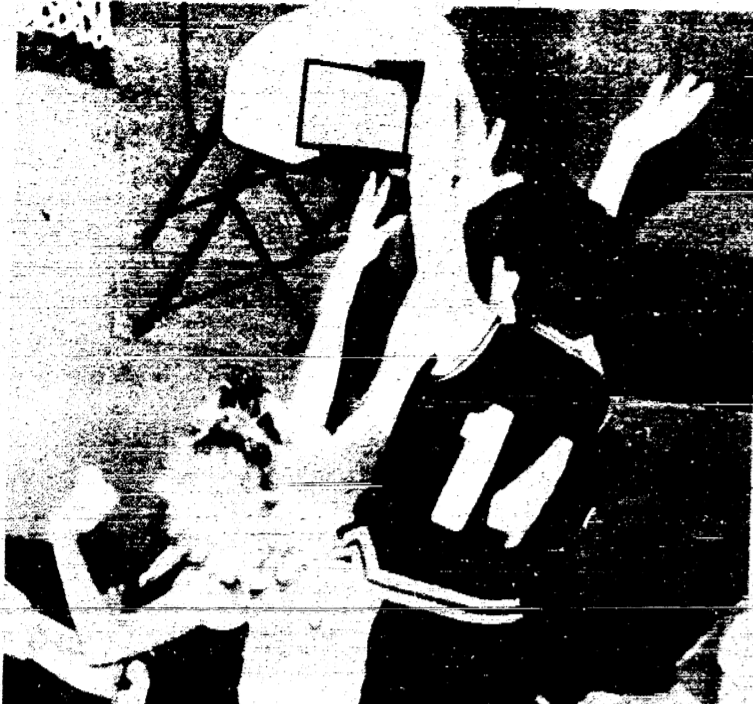

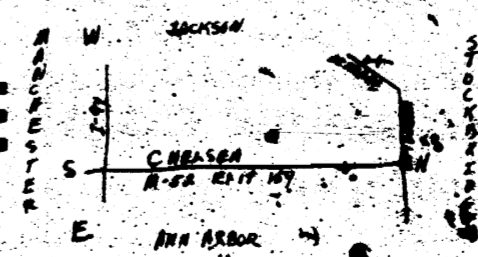

curtailed under the new laws. Many taxpayers who currently qualify for a deduction based on the amount they contribute to their IRA are going to have a reevaluate their situation. Some will lose this deduction altogether.

Single individuals who have an adjusted gross income (AGI) of more than \$35,000 and married couples who have an AGI of more than \$50,000 will be totally excluded from taking a deduction for their contribution to their IRAs—if they are able to participate in an employer sponsored retirement plan or who have a spouse who is able to participate.

In this situation, single individuals with an AGI that falls between \$25,000 and \$35,000 and married couples with an AGI between \$40,000 and \$50,000 will only be able to deduct a portion of their contribution. Only those taxpayers who are not eligible to participate in an employer sponsored retirement plan will be able to contribute the maximum amount possible to an IRA and take a full deduction on their income tax return.

If you have an existing IRA, or if you are considering opening one, contributions made before you file your 1986 income tax

return on April 15, 1987, will be totally deductible.

Another change in the tax law affects those who don't normally itemize their deductions and make charitable contributions.

Currently, a taxpayer is allowed to claim deductions for contributions to charitable organizations without having to itemize deductions. But that will change. In order to qualify for a deduction after 1986, you will have to itemize your deductions. What's more, under the current higher tax brackets, charitable contributions are worth more in tax savings.

CPAs advise that if you are confused about your eligibility for these deductions, consult an expert before the end of the year. Remember, by taking advantage of deductions allowed under the current tax law, you can effectively trim your tax bill.

mixture and pure vanilla extract. Strain through a fine sieve into 10 ungreased (1/3-cup) creme pots or 8 (1/2-cup) custard cups. Place in a baking pan. Pour in hot water to come half way up the sides of the pots. Bake, uncovered, until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, 22 to 25 minutes. Chill. Favorite Tax Deductions Fade Away in 1987

(Prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants)

Now is the time to ride the coattails of the old tax laws and to take advantage of tax deductions that will be phased-out under the tax reform act, advises the Michigan Association of CPAs. Here's a run-down on the deductions that will be affected by the new tax laws.

One favorite deduction that will be eliminated in 1987 is state and local sales taxes. Currently, whenever you make a purchase, you are allowed to take a deduction on your income tax for the sales tax you pay. Over the course of a year, this can really add up, especially for some one who makes a big purchase. If you were considering buying an expensive item, like a car, you might want to do it by December 31, so you can qualify for a sales tax deduction on your income tax.

Except for mortgage interest on a first and second home, the deduction for interest payments on loans and credit cards will be restricted and eventually phased out, beginning in 1987. Often, when you make a payment on a

loan or a credit card, a portion covers the interest payment. Depending on how much you owe, this can amount to a large sum of money.

Over the next five years, this deduction will be phased-out. In 1987, taxpayers will only be able to deduct 65 percent of the interest they pay on loans and credit cards. In 1988, they will only be able to deduct 40 percent. Only 20 percent will be deductible in 1989, and only 10 percent in 1990. By 1991, taxpayers will no longer get a deduction for non-mortgage interest payments on their income taxes.

Taxpayers who find themselves with several loan or credit card payments might want to consider paying them off in 1986, in order to qualify for a full deduction for the interest paid or consider refinancing them through the use of a home equity loan on their homes.

Medical deductions will also be restricted under the new tax reform laws. Under the existing laws, you are allowed to take a deduction for any costs that exceed five percent of your adjusted gross income. Beginning in 1987, you are only going to be able to take a deduction for expenses that exceed 7.5 percent

of your adjusted gross income. That means you are either going to need more medical expenses or a lower adjusted gross income to qualify for this deduction compared to the 1986 allowance.

Taxpayers who find themselves close to the five percent floor now should consider going for that check-up they have been putting off, buying those new glasses they need or getting braces for their children's teeth now instead of next year.

Deductions for retirement savings are also going to be
