This is a private firm based in Webster, Texas which broadcasts to schools in California, Arkansas, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas. These broadcasts consist of instructions in various subjects and may seem impossible but it is only the first chapter of the wonderful educational world of the satellite.

For the cost of one additional teacher this program enables the Whitmore Lake School to join the TI-IN network. The equipment

and system costs some \$16,000 and \$18,000 a year is to be paid as a subscription service. There are other satellite services but this is the only one that enables the student to talk to the instructor.

Mr. Oesterling is well known in the Manchester area as the majority of Bridgewater High School students attend the Clinton School. However some Bridgewater students are pupils at Manchester and Saline.

The TI-IN company claims that their program is the only one that will enable rural districts equal access with the 'larger ones' to quality education. The Whitmore Lake program has now been in operation for several weeks, but already it's effects are becoming evident.

For instance the Whitmore Lake School now has had one French teacher but with satellite assistance they can offer courses in German, and the two-channel network offers a variety of English courses computer and Science courses and enrichment courses for the elementary students.

For example the fourth graders the other day visited the San Diego, California Zoo on a tour conducted by an expert on mammals and they were all very enthusiastic about the trip. It made their study come alive, it was far more complete than the pages of a book.

Before installing the present station, gifted children who should be offered opportunities for expression had to take classes

## Futuring Group Sets Goals

Is it more important to you to see educational goals set or to have new tennis courts in Manchester? How important is it to have a teen center? Is it more important than senior housing or attracting new industry and jobs?

Those are some of the questions that Manchester citizens began to answer last Saturday at an open meeting held at the Manchester High School.

Although groups have been meeting since last May to decide the most important areas of development for Manchester, the fact that the futuring process was taking place was 'the best kept secret of the summer,' said Pat Sahakian.

The Futuring concept is one of gathering community input and setting goals and priorities for the development of the community in areas that will affect all members of that community. Over the summer, leaders met with fifteen local groups including the library, educational leaders, art and senior groups.

'Most of us are really happy to live in Manchester,' said Sahakian. She went on to say that there are some areas that almost everyone agrees needs improvement.

Some of those are education, recreational facilities, river resources, housing and the industrial park. In a brain storming session, Dan Naimowicz urged all participants to write down any thoughts they had about what steps should be taken. A list of first steps was made for each of these categories, and now those can be begun.

Many people were not contacted simply because they did not belong to a group, or because the group was too small. Susan Gleason expressed concern that 'several smaller groups could not or chose not to participate.'

**The Annual Christmas Eve Bloodmobile Hit or Miss**

The annual Christmas Eve Bloodmobile will be held at the Presbyterian Church in Saline on December 24, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. This Bloodmobile is held each year for the benefit of Motts Childrens Hospital. The Chairmen of the day is Ms. Wilma Trachet and appointments for this very important blood drive can be made by calling her at 1-428-7868. Blood can be donated by anyone who is in good health, weighs a minimum of 110 pounds and is between 17 and 70 years old. Donating blood is relatively painless and takes less than 45 minutes from registration to a post donation snack of juice and cookies. The actual donation takes less than 10 minutes. The Red Cross also reminds previous blood donors that blood can be donated every eight weeks, up to five times a year. The Presbyterian Church is located on Michigan Ave. in Saline.

Even though the last Bloodmobile held in Manchester was in October, the teams of volunteers that work at the clinic outside of Manchester keep busy. A team of volunteers worked at the Blood

at other schools, but now they will have to meet the challenge while competing with other schools. The TI-IN firm hires only Texas accredited teachers and broadcasts live from San Antonio as well as taping lectures given by experts in various academic fields all across the country.

The programs are picked up by satellites over Houston and a satellite 'dish' located between Whitmore Lake's Elementary School and the high school library. The students communicate with the teacher by dialing a number on a cordless phone. In many instances written test on the various subjects taught are required and these are picked up the evening of the required day by Federal Express and arrive in Texas the following day. There they are graded and sent back, being received here in another 24 hours from the time they are graded.

Students will not be able to take courses over the network until the winter semester, but many students say they hate to wait that long. This system can become the subject of controversy if it has already been said for some teachers already feel that they could be replaced as a classroom teacher, but that eventually is rather impossible. It just can't replace a classroom teacher for a personal contact is very necessary at all times especially for the slow learner.

The school now has a three year contract and Mr. Oesterling says that interest in the program is very high in both local and state wide circles and that he hopes that Michigan can soon develop its own system to bring the professors in Michigan's colleges and universities to our high schools. The future of these programs seems to be limitless.

Although nearly 7,600 Americans received kidney transplants last year, an additional 8,500 were kept waiting because of a lack of suitable organs. "We are asking all Michigan residents to think about organ donation and the fact they have the ability to pass life on to someone who otherwise might not live," Baikin said. "They should discuss their feelings with their family members and sign an organ donor card or complete a label for the back of their driver's license."

The National Kidney Foundation of Michigan is one of 50 Affiliates of the National Kidney Foundation, the major voluntary health agency working to educate the public about organ donation. The National Kidney Foundation was successful in its efforts to bring about the national Uniform Anatomical Gift Act of 1969, which recognized the uniform donor card as a legal document throughout the United States.

## Constable Report

Saturday, December 6, 1986, Constables Earl R. Alber and Lyle L. Moore attended the Winter Seminar held at Kellogg Center in East Lansing, Michigan. This seminar was conducted by the Criminal School of Justice of Michigan State University. This was headed by Paul Embert and David Kalinich. They were assisted by Jeff Shoultice, James Peacock, Dennis Anderson.

The subjects that were taught were, Corrections dealing with mentally ill, MELOT standards, railroad crossing enforcement, terrorism and emerging liability issues.

## Michigan Mortgage Now Available

The Michigan Mortgage, an innovative program to help Michigan families and individuals buy their first home, is now available through private lenders in all 83 counties, Governor James J. Blanchard announced.

Operated by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) and local savings and loan associations, banks and mortgage companies, the Michigan Mortgage program provides a federal income tax credit that gives buyers more income to make monthly house payments.

Michigan was the first state in the nation to design and implement a program taking advantage of the federal credit. Nearly \$20 million in mortgage loan reservations has been made through the program since Gov. Blanchard announced it last spring.

"We have been working for several months to bring more lenders into this worthwhile program for Michigan families," the Governor said. "We are very pleased that now, no matter where a family lives, a lender will be available to help them obtain a Michigan Mortgage."

More than 65 lenders, with 680 branch offices, are now participating.

Each participating lender sets its own interest rate, loan terms and down payment requirements. However, when the Michigan Mortgage tax credit is applied to the monthly payment, it effectively reduces the lender's interest rate.

For example, a 10 percent interest rate, with the credit, becomes an initial rate of 7.7 percent. On a \$50,000 mortgage, that would mean \$88 more a month in income that could be spent on house payments.

The federal tax overhaul legislation recently signed into law by the President has made certain changes in the program, the Governor noted, but has not hurt it.

Purchase price limits now will range from \$65,350 to \$73,500 for new houses, and from \$51,570 to \$60,000 for existing homes, depending on the location of the property. Household income cannot exceed \$30,000 for new houses or \$28,000 for existing homes; in most cases, up to \$4,000 in overtime earnings may be excluded from the income calculations.

The program cannot be used to refinance existing loans or land contracts. Although the Michigan Mortgage is primarily for first-time homebuyers, some areas of the state are exempt from this federal restriction.

### Ordinance No. 155

Take notice that the Village of Manchester has amended Chapter 148, the Uniform Traffic Code for the Village of Manchester, by adopting amendments thereto in accordance with Michigan Administrative Rules 28.1001 through 28.2074, and that the purpose of said amendments is to make uniform the Traffic Ordinance of the Village of Manchester with those enforced throughout the State of Michigan, and to bring the Village of Manchester Uniform Traffic Code into conformance with Public Act 309, 310, and 311 of 1982, Public Acts which provide penalties and procedures for the offense of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of intoxicating liquor, operating while visibly impaired, operating with blood alcohol level of .10 percent volume by weight, and to provide for the administrative remedies through the Michigan Secretary of State as set forth in said statutes. 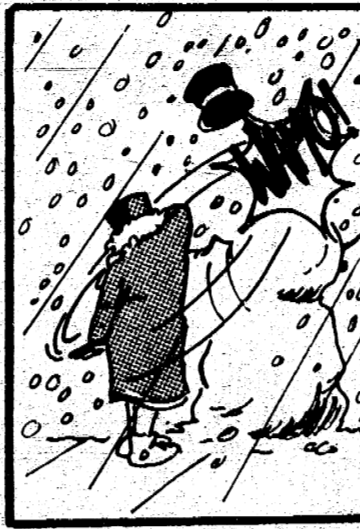

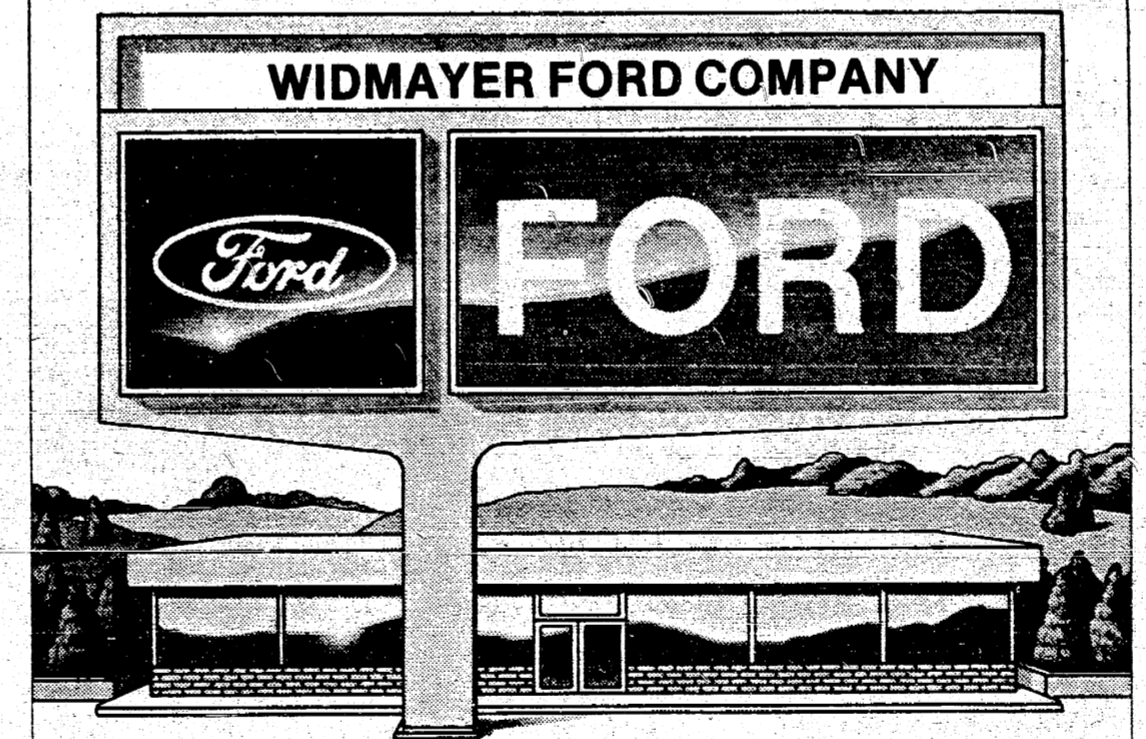
