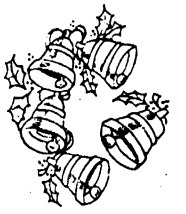

### Financial Aid Workshop Set

As the cost of education after high school increases every year many parents and students are wondering how they will pay for it. But there is a way, whether it be for a college, vocational, or technical school education. More than \$22 billion in federal, state and local aid will be awarded for students this year. Richard Parson, Manchester High School guidance counselor will tell parents about it at two free financial aid workshops in January.

The main workshop will be held on Wednesday night, January 7, 1987, at 7:30 p.m. in the high school study auditorium. Here a filmstrip giving an overview of financial aid will be shown and financial aid forms will be handed out and explained. Other written information will be given to families in attendance and numerous money-saving methods will be discussed. In addition, many tips will be given that should make the forms less complicated. Guaranteed Student Loans and other types of loans and financial assistance will also be explained.

A second meeting is planned for Tuesday, January 20, 1987 beginning at 7:00 p.m. This will be held in the guidance office and is designed to help individual families fill out their financial aid forms. Parents will be expected to bring all their tax information and financial aid forms on this night and will actually be helped in filling out the necessary forms. Parents are asked to call the guidance office to set up a time for their individual appointment.

### Comets Quiet Dutchment 53-43

On Friday, December 19th, we traveled to Hanover Horton to face our first conference foe of the season. The opening 8 minutes of play showed very little scoring, but we did pull a 2 point edge. ### Dependents Will Need Social Security Number

Under the newly reformed Federal tax code, any dependent claimed on a tax return must have a social security number. The IRS will use the social security number to verify proper withholding claimed on W-4 forms. The Federal government has adopted this policy as part of its effort to crack down on tax cheats.

In the past some taxpayers have received an illegal double deduction by claiming dependent children more than once. Similarly, in cases of divorce, both parents have claimed their children on their tax returns. In this situation only the parent with legal custody of a child may claim that child as a dependent.

Taxpayers may be fined \$500 if they file a W-4 form that results in less tax being withheld than is properly allowable. In addition, criminal penalties may apply for willfully supplying false or fraudulent information requiring an increase in withholding.

An advantage to a child having a social security number is that he can open a savings account in his own name. Then when that child receives money the interest earned will not be taxed at the parent's highest rate, as it would if the child's account was in the parent's name.

To get a social security number for a child or other dependent you need to provide evidence of age, identity, and U.S. Citizenship. The following qualify as evidence of age and citizenship: Public

birth certificate (this is the preferred document). Religious record showing age or date of birth. Hospital record of birth.

The following qualify as evidence of identity: Record of membership in Boy Scouts, etc. School record or report card. Doctor or hospital record. Day care or nursery school record. School ID. Adoption record. Vaccination certificate. Church membership record.

Requirements for citizens born outside the U.S. and aliens differ. For more information regarding obtaining a social security number, contact your local social security office.

**"RESPONSIBLE" TEENAGE DRINKING?**

Many parents ask what my view of responsible drinking by young people. Some say we must deal with the reality that many young people drink and that as parents and physicians the only thing we can do is to encourage their "responsible" drinking.

I disagree. Young people in their adolescence should not, in my view, drink alcoholic beverages at all. I strongly suspect that science one day will show that the immaturity of cells in the cerebral cortex of young people makes these cells more vulnerable than those in the mature brain to damage by toxic substances, including alcohol and other chemicals.

I recognize that adolescents may occasionally use an alcoholic beverage at a religious or other ceremonial occasion, and do not suggest that government should intrude into family decisions or practices in this regard. But for these youngsters, as a voluntary, recreational activity, there can be no such thing as "responsible" drinking.

I neither condone nor advocate adolescent use of alcohol or any

other mind-mood-, or perception-altering substance or drug not prescribed by a physician.

**Fourth Quarter Dividend**

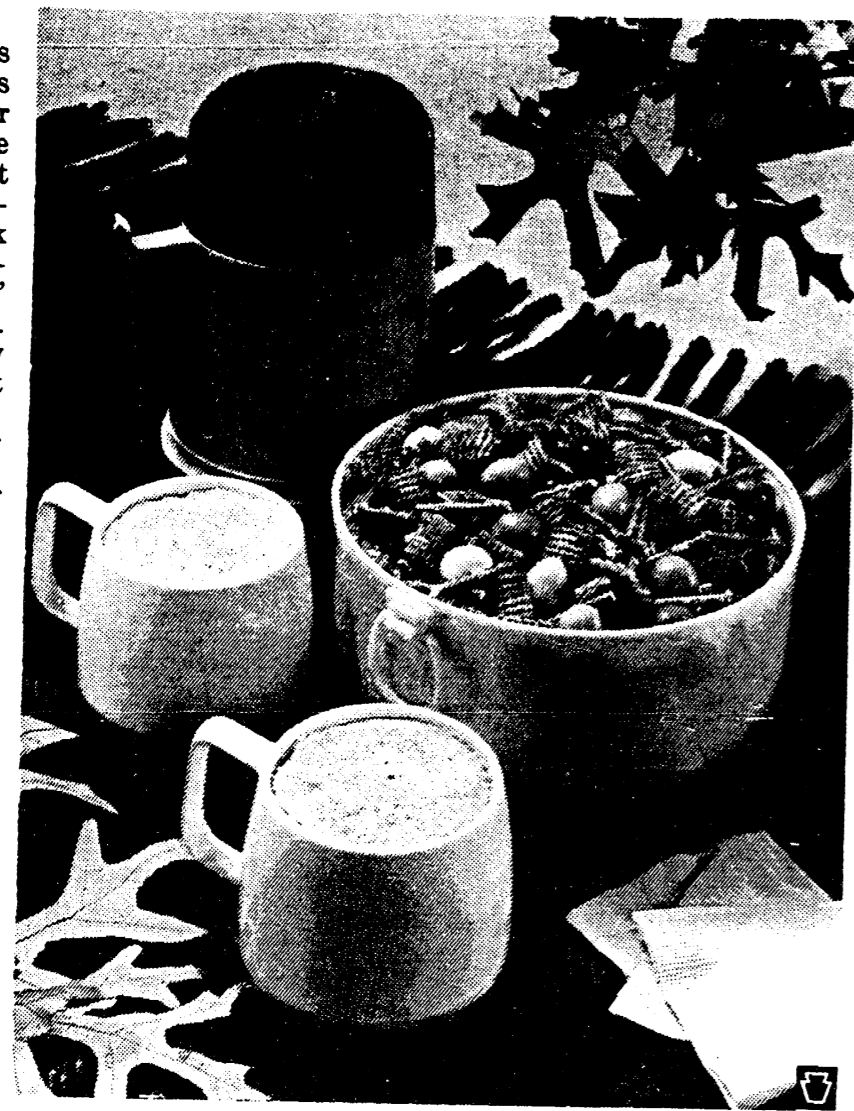

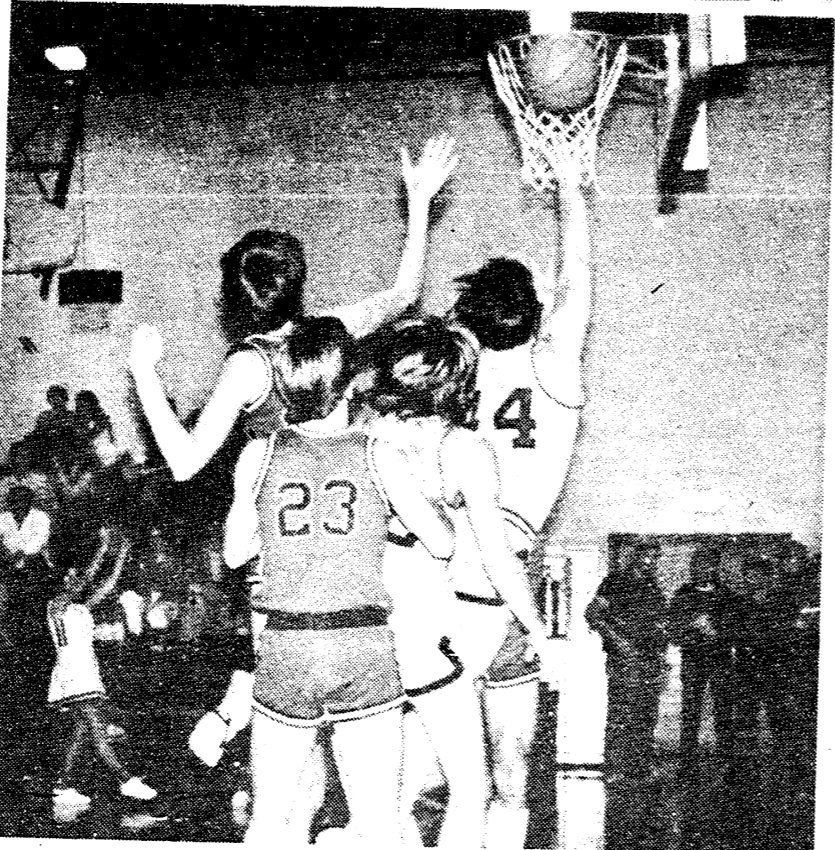

## Italian Seasoning Gives Pasta Authentic Flavor



It's possible to make an authentically flavored, fresh tasting pasta sauce in just a few minutes. Italian seasoning is, typically, a blend of basil, oregano, thyme, marjoram, savory, rosemary and sage—all in one handy container.

### QUICK PASTA SAUCE

- 1 can (14 1/2 ounces) stewed tomatoes, broken up
- 2 teaspoons Italian seasoning, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/16 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 1/2 cups thinly sliced celery
- 1 jar (4 1/2 ounces) sliced mushrooms

In a medium saucepan combine stewed tomatoes, Italian seasoning, garlic powder, black pepper, celery and mushrooms. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 5 minutes. Serve over freshly cooked pasta. **YIELD: 2 1/2 cups sauce**

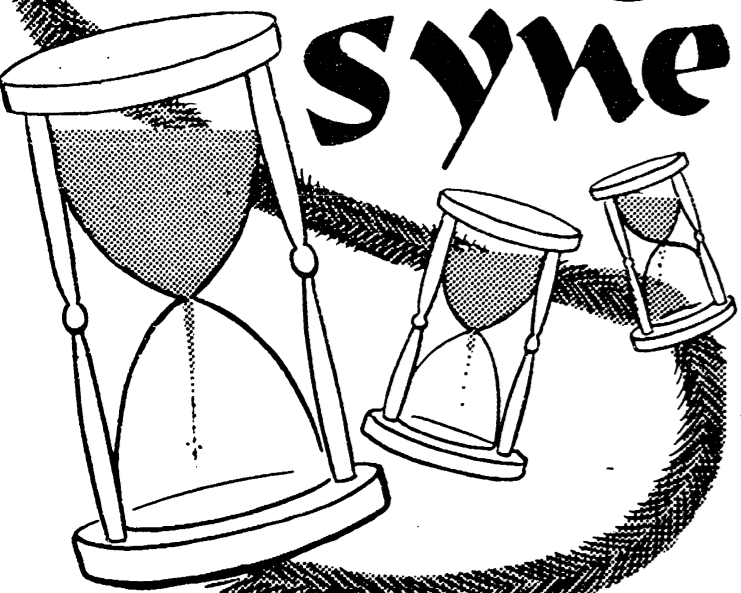

# Money Management

NOW'S THE TIME TO PUT YOUR FINANCES IN ORDER

(Prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants).

Amid the flurry of holiday festivities, we have a tendency to let the little things get ahead of us. But, no matter how hectic the season gets, it is the perfect time to get your financial records in order so you can be properly prepared for the new year. This year, suggests the Michigan Association of CPAs, you should make it a New Year's resolution to start off on firm financial footing.

The first step should be the preparation of a written budget. This is one of the most effective ways to keep track of your financial records. Doing this will help you to organize your income and outflow on a continuing basis and to direct your spending toward necessary expenses instead of splurging. Also, during the holidays, we are faced with the temptation to spend more than we should which could prove to be stressful later. That's why this is a perfect time to take hold of your finances.

Set the pace by outlining your income. This will include items such as your net salary and that of your spouse, interest, dividends, social security and so on. Make a list of all these items and total it on a monthly and yearly basis.

Next, detail your expenses. These will fall into three separate categories: fixed expenses, variable expenses and optional expenses. Your fixed expenses include things like rent or mortgage payments, taxes, insurance, loan payments; anything that you must pay on a regular basis at a somewhat fixed rate should fall into this category. As with your income,

your expenses should be categorized in a monthly and yearly fashion. Variable expenses include anything that you must pay, but the amounts may differ from month to month. What goes in this category? Expenses for food, clothing, utilities, charitable contributions, savings, club dues and home repairs to name a few. To get a feel for these costs on an annual basis, go through your checkbook or your credit card receipts. This will give you a rough estimate for budget purposes.

The third group of expenses will include items that could be termed the "wish list." These are expenses such as a new car, an expensive piece of jewelry or anything that you would love to have if you had the money to buy it. These are the expenses that you could forego to make your budget balance.

Now that you have a budget, go over your expenses for the past year and categorize them in the areas which you have outlined. Separate outstanding bills from those that have been paid and make an effort to pay any that could qualify for a tax deduction in 1986 that might be restricted or unavailable in 1987. These include: medical expenses, charitable contributions, state and local taxes (particularly sales taxes) and business expenses.

Contributions to your established Keogh or IRA should also be considered, but keep in mind that generally you have until April 15 to make these and still qualify for a deduction.

If you haven't done so already, compile receipts, cancelled checks or yearly statements that would substantiate your claim for a deduction on your income tax return. After the first of the year, you should receive statements from your employer, your bank and your creditors which outline your income or interest

payments for 1986. Compare these to the receipts you have compiled to be sure they match and save them since you will need them when you prepare your tax return.

Now that you have all this information in one place, how are you going to keep it organized? You might want to try an accordion file so you can separate items by category. Then, once you file your tax return, you can keep them organized for possible future reference. You'll need to keep these records for at least three years in the event you are audited; some may have to be kept longer. However you choose to organize them, be sure they are readily available.

Now that you have taken the time to get yourself organized, budgeting should be handled on a month-by-month basis. If you find you are having difficulties getting things in order, consult a CPA to give you some guidance. He or she will be able to help you look at your income and expenses from an objective point of view and help you to set viable goals.

Organizing your finances will make it easier for you to manage your money throughout the new year.

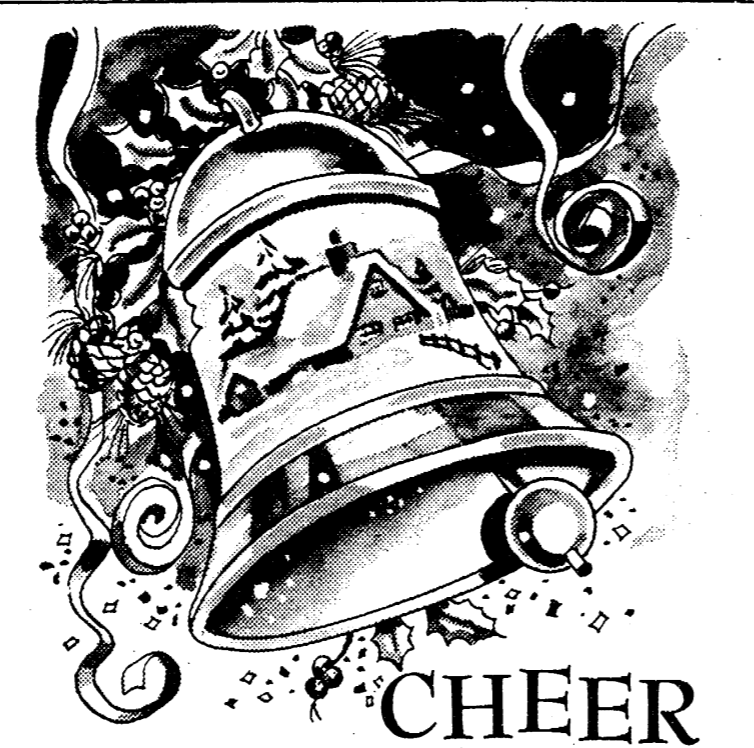

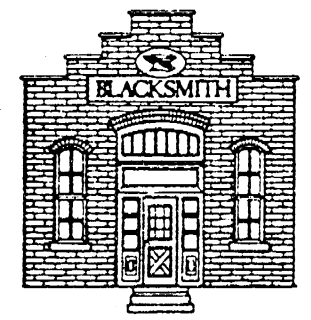
**Clear Michigan Fund**

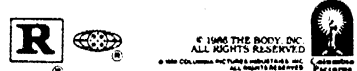

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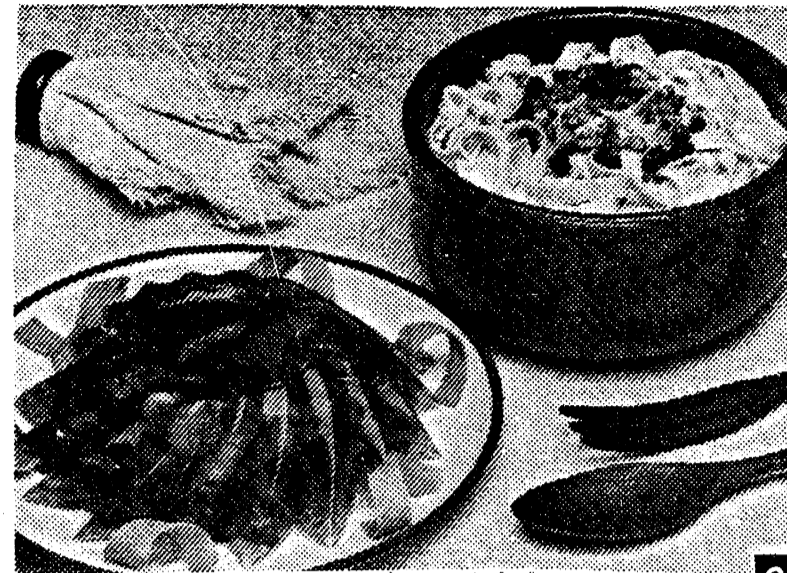

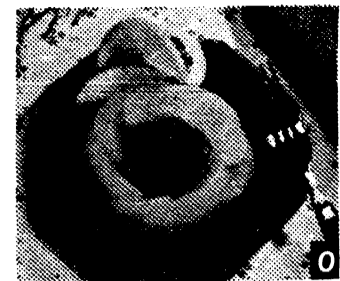

  - 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground red pepper
  - 1 (12-ounce) package fettuccine, cooked and drained
  - 3/4 cup seedless raisins
  - 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped

In electric blender container, blend milk, pudding mix, cottage cheese, sour cream, Worcestershire sauce, black pepper and red pepper until smooth.

Toss pudding mixture with hot fettuccine, raisins and walnuts. Serve warm or chilled.

Slice each apple into 10-12 sections. In six custard dishes or small soup bowls, arrange each set of slices in a ring. ## Hit or Miss

A group of educators have recently been checking over the history books that are being used in our schools and colleges and after reviewing the "history" books used in other countries they suffered a very profound shock for many of those books had little or no relationship with those that our school children are familiar with.

They learned that there is no such thing as "World history" as taught in most classrooms. The stuff taught is merely a look at the world from the viewpoint of the country you happen to be viewing it from.

If we look at British textbooks for example, we would be surprised to learn how little the American Revolution played in their viewpoint. It was merely a nuisance that interfered with the British-French relations of that time and it occupied only a paragraph or two in their accredited textbooks.

We also learn that Pearl Harbor was only a minor incident and the Japanese kids learn much more about the Hiroshima bombing than about the sneak attack that started the war. In Japanese history all wars begin with sneak attacks of one magnitude or another.

It has often been said that if you only know your own language you don't know it in the same way. If you know only the history

of your own country (usually distorted) you don't know it. Most countries are not challenged say the researchers. For example we have little knowledge of the decades of suspicion in which we have been held by Central and South America.

Anyone who writes a boastful biography of anyone or anything is taken to task for so doing but seldom is a nation that composes that kind of a "history" challenged nor condemned for their vanity nor their short sightedness. It is called "patriotism".

Summits and treaties will never, say researchers, achieve even a minimum of amity and understanding. Young people must be given a perspective that is world-wide. If we willfully misinterpret the past we can't comprehend the present.

He won, lost and won his title and 1957 was the year that the high brass heartlessly sold the last of the carrier pigeons owned by the army.

## Senior Citizens Annual Report

The Life Line Support System was made available in Manchester with money given by the Manchester Chicken Broil. The Senior Citizen's Council is the sponsoring organization.

Due to the retirement of Ethel Weir, a new cook, Jan Barbour, was hired to cook the Senior Citizen meals.

The Senior Citizen's news was placed in the ENTERPRISE and the bi-monthly newsletter along with PRIME TIME was mailed to all area Senior Citizens.

## Skeletons Found In Irish Hills

Steam Shovel On Trunk Line Road Digs Up Human Bones And Indian Relics

It is well known that what was known in the early days as a stage route between Detroit and Chicago was originally an Indian trail. Early settlers knew that, in fact saw Indians traveling the route, and men and women yet living have often listened in fear and trembling to the recounting of exciting adventures with the red men.

It is probable that along that trail the remains of many an Indian were buried. And it may also be possible that remains of white men and women were likewise buried in more or less secluded spots.

Some of them may be those unearthed by workmen in the Irish Hills district, about two miles east of Cambridge Junction, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Indian relics also found would indicate that the bones were those of Indians buried perhaps a century ago.

Leland Brighton, foreman of the steam shovel gang, made the first discovery. As the huge shovel arose from the ground he detected what his quick eye told him was a human bone on the shovel. Work was halted and two leg bones were found. This prompted a further search in the locality and within the space of a rod and a half the skeletons of what might have been a woman, two children and six men were uncovered. As all were found facing the sunrise, known to be an Indian burial custom, the work-

men came to the conclusion that they had indeed found an old Indian burial place. But none of them were able to judge conclusively by the skulls, which were, however, well preserved, whether they were really those of Indians or white people. In one the teeth were said to be in almost perfect condition, showing the lustre of the enamel.

Relics found with the bodies would indicate they were Indians. There was a tomahawk, a stone hammer with oval shaped head, arrowheads, strings of beads, three metal kettles, two basins, one of wood and the other of metal, pewter table and tea spoons, a pipe of red clay and a bottle painted red and green. The bodies of the people apparently had been wrapped in blankets, as pieces of heavy material of different colors, and armuets of metal inscribed with characters and punched with holes where they had been attached to clothing were there.

The location of the find was near what was long known as the Allen farm, later owned by Herbert Watkins, son of the late L.D. Watkins. The farm is now occupied by Sylvester Marr, and the bones and relics can be seen at the residence by those who may be curious to look upon them.

From the spot, looking south across Wolf lake, can be plainly seen a grove where several years ago were taken up what were claimed to be the remains of Tecumseh, one of the famous chiefs mentioned in history. They were shipped away to some museum, but no evidence was found to prove the claim. It had been supposed that Tecumseh had been buried in Canada.

## Michigan's History

Henry Ford, the revolutionary industrialist, was never short of daring and innovative ideas. On January 12, 1904, in an attempt to attract national attention, Ford drove one of his automobiles, the 999 Racer, on frozen Lake St. Clair at record breaking 91.37 miles per hour. On January 5, 1914, Ford raised wages of his workers to \$5 per eight-hour day, at a time when the average American worker was making a few pennies per hour on 10 to 12 hour work days. Ford declared that is was unfair that the only

people in America who could not afford to buy a car were the very men who made them. About a week after this startling announcement, Ford revolutionized the manufacturing world by developing the new assembly line technique. Instead of having workers move around the assembly line, Ford designed the assembly line to move in front of the worker, cutting production time for one automobile from 12.5 hours to 93 minutes. Today, much of the genius behind Henry Ford is displayed in the Henry Ford Museum of Dearborn, Michigan.
