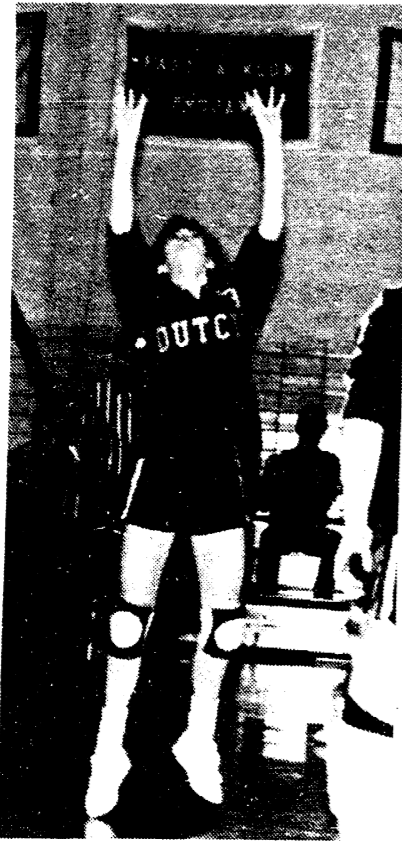

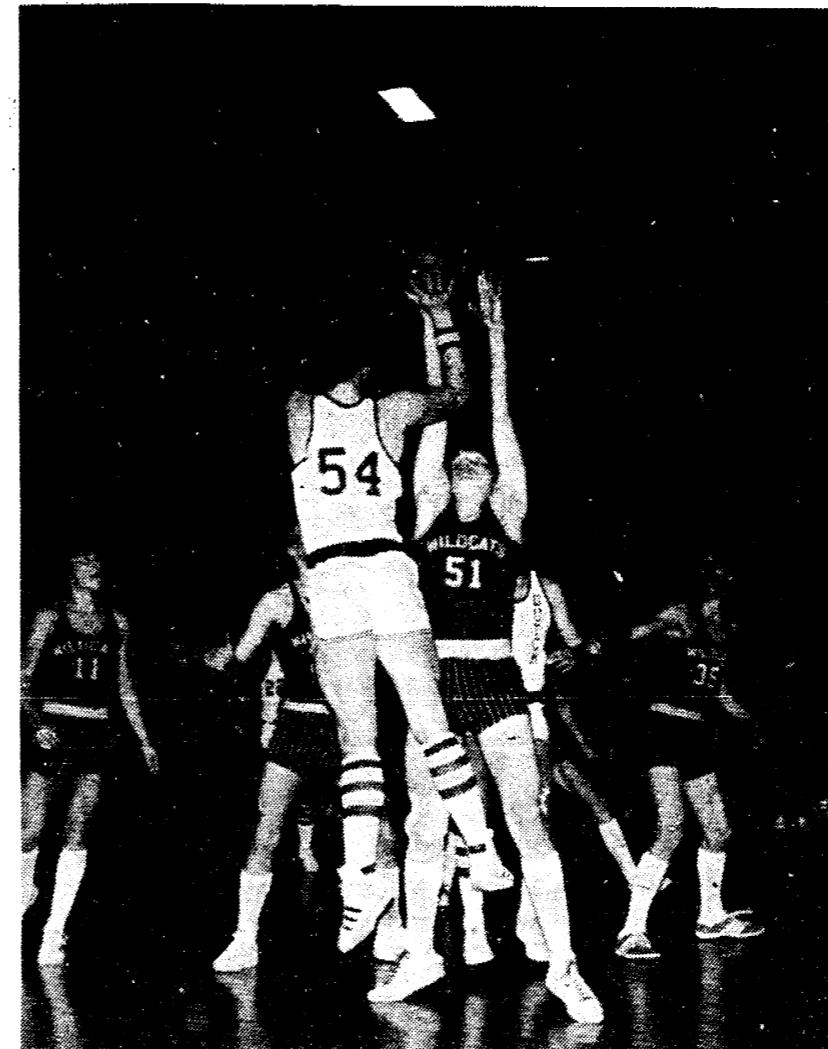

Aging In The 80's

Saline Community Hospital is pleased to present the third program of 1986-87 Women's Night Out - For The Health Of It! series, titled Aging in the '80's. Special guest lecturer for this presentation will be Jolayne Farrell, R.N., MPH, syndicated columnist and expert on aging. Good health practices, social interaction, remarriage, and elderly abuse will be among the topics Ms. Farrell will discuss in March 26th presentation.

"This segment of the population is just like you and I, only older," comments Farrell concerning elderly people. "90% of the older Americans are functioning on

their own in society just like anyone else, but with a different set of problems to deal with." Ms. Farrell approaches these problems from a practical perspective. Issues, such as functioning in the community, arranging one's own funeral, and other current concerns are the focus of her discussion.

A graduate of the University of Michigan with a BSCN, MPH and a certified Gerontologist, Farrell brings a high degree of expertise to her syndicated column which appears in newspapers across the country, including the Ann Arbor News. She has been on the faculty of the University of Michigan, the University of Toronto, and has a regular feature on CKVR TV in Toronto called Your Getting Better. She is currently Program Coordinator of the Victorian Order of Nurses, an organization in Canada to the United States' VNA. Farrell resides in Toronto.

Mrs. Ellsworth and Mrs. Schook confer as they develop plans for a very special parent workshop.

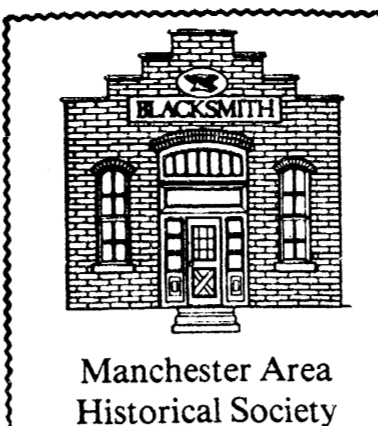

Manchester Area Historical Society

March 16, 1987

The regular monthly meeting of the Manchester Area Historical Society was held on Monday, March 16, at the Blacksmith Shop. Arlene Fellows Arnold presented the Society with a copy of the Fellows family history. She is a descendant of the Fellows for whom Fellows Hill and Fellows Bridge are named. Her great grandfather helped establish Sharon Township and served in the Toledo War.

The speaker for the evening was Governor John B. Swainson, President of the Michigan Historical Commission and Honorary co-chairman of the Sesquicentennial Commission. The Ordinance of 1785 provided for the Western lands to be divided into townships 6 miles square. Each township was divided into 36 sections. For the

first time, the land was surveyed prior to settlement. The Ordinance of 1787 set the rules for governing and spelled out how a territory could become a state. In 1805, Michigan became a territory. Detroit was the most populated part of the state because people came by water. Most of the settlers to Michigan came from the New England states. Many immigrants came after the opening of the Erie Canal.

In 1831, Governor Lewis Cass swore in Stephens T. Mason as Secretary of the Territory of Michigan. He was only 19 years old. He read the Ordinance of 1787 and decided that Michigan, with 86,000 residents, was eligible for statehood. Because there was disagreement about where our southern boundary was, we were not admitted as a state until 1837. In order to be admitted, we had to give up our claim to the Toledo strip in exchange for the western two thirds of the Upper Peninsula.

On March 11, 1837, Manchester Township was organized. Back then, it took two days to travel between Toledo and Adrain. The first railroad was built between those cities and it cut the travel time to 3 hours.
