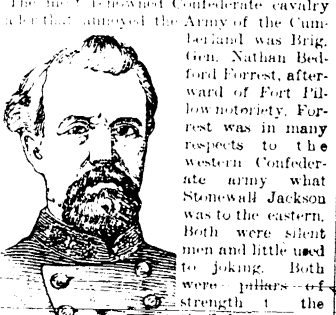

The snow is getting thin on some of the roads. Holt & Co. have put in a new feeder for their rollers. There seems to be quite an epidemic of sore throat about town.

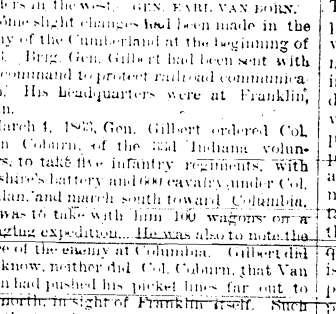
