



We have examined the combined financial statements of the Village of Manchester and its combining fund financial statements as of and for the year ended February 28, 1987, as listed in the Table of Contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures, including those prescribed by the State Treasurer, as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described more fully in Note 6, the Village has not capitalized and subsequently depreciated all fixed assets in the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds. These assets should be capitalized and depreciated to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that the omission of recording all fixed assets and appropriate depreciation as described above results in an incomplete presentation, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Village of Manchester at February 28, 1987, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its proprietary fund types for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted

accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, except that the omission of recording fixed assets and depreciation as described above results in an incomplete presentation in the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds, the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial individual funds of the Village of Manchester at February 28, 1987, and the results of the operations and the changes in the financial position of their proprietary funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In connection with our examination we also made a limited study and evaluation of the internal control. Since the entity is small and has only part-time elected officials and accounting personnel, it is not feasible to have an adequate system of internal control. Therefore, our substantive testing was increased thus placing little reliance on the system of internal control. Our additional testing disclosed no condition that we believe to be a material

Mark Fenelon's season is far from over. He is going to wrestle in the State Championships on Friday and Saturday in battle Creek. But first how has this come to pass.





#### New Mortgage **Interest Rules Explained**

"We are encouraging homeowners to order new Publication 932, "New Rules for Home Mortgage Interest Deduction," he said.

According to the IRS, this publication explains the basic rules for home mortgage interest deductions as modified by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

"While we estimate that only about 800,000 taxpayers nationwide will be affected by the new Sunday, February 28 - 10:00 rules, we want to make sure that

Generally speaking, the Tax Reform Act of 1986 did not change the tax treatment of interest on mortgage debt incurred to purchase or improve a principal or second home, which remains fully deductible. However, certain limitations apply to interest on debt for more than two homes, and to debt

incurred after August 16, 1986. "The new Publication 932 is a pocket-sized pamphlet that provides an overview of the new rules for the home mortgage interest deduction. It was developed to help homeowners understand the new rules and determine whether or not they are affected by them," Hummel

According to Hummel, those taxpayers who are affected by the new rules will have to file new IRS Form 8598, "Home Mortgage Interest."

"We have also developed new Publication 545. Expense," which includes a comprehensive discussion on the interest expense deduction," said



As you know the village council has DENIED our application for an (amendment) to the village ordinance for C-2 Commercial District. In, dening the amendment, the VILLAGE COUNCIL had DENIED our constitutional right, according to the 1st Amendment of The Constitution of the United States of America. I quote from the 1st Amendment: "Congress shall make no "Law" respecting an "Establishment" of religion,.... or the "right" of the people peaceably to "assemble". There are areas of 'personal freedom' where the government ought not to trespass at all.

We as a church have legally done everything right, in applying for an amendment to the village ordinance, and have been DENIED by COUNCIL.

#### Manchester **Scores High Meap Testing**

by Becky Doyle

According to figures from the State Department of Education, Manchester 10th graders have a higher rate of competency than those in any other district in the county. The tests, which were administered last fall, covered the three basic areas of math, reading some 44 years and a stretch of and science.

The Michigan Educational Achievement Program tests, known as the MEAP tests. measure passing by the students' greetings. ability to answer 75% of the questions in each section correctly. In Manchester 94.6% passed the reading portion of the test, Chelsea at 87.4% and Ann Arbor at 87%. Math scores were 83.9% for Manchester, followed by 83.3% in Saline, 77.4% in Ann Arbor and 76.4% in Whitmore

In Science, none of the school districts faired well, with less than 50% passing in all districts. Ann Arbor students scored the highest percentages of passing students with 44.8%, followed with 38.6%, Manchester 37% and Chelsea 36.8%.

While having 63% of your students fail the Science portion certainly shows some deficiency, the standing of Manchester students in the county is at least some consolation.

#### **Washtenaw County** As She Was

**Manchester Enterprise** 

An Interesting Letter From An Old Resident About Bridgewater And Manchester

Separated from dear Michigan by the shifting scenes of country reaching nearly to what was once known as "The Great American Desert," the writer of this wandering little sketch sends

"An exile from home"-probably this is more or less the feeling of all on the down hill side of life, living many miles from their native town, particularly if all their early life was spent there, and in cemeteries left the graves of many friends and loved ones.

So it is that no other place is yet so much home to me as Washtenaw county, Michigan, where I was born and lived for 25 years in the same house, a half mile west of the hotel in the village of Manchester.

My father, George Howe, died also in this house in 1846-a year and a half after my birth. To this home also was brought the lifeless body of the youngest son of the family, George Abner Howe, who died at Nashville, Tennessee, in an army hospital of the Civil War in August, 1865. He was a private in the 9th Michigan infantry.

Two sisters were married from this home, but they, too, are in their graves.

The father, George Howe, came to Michigan from Oneida county, quarter section of land a \$1.25 per acre in the township of Bridgewater. At that time it was part of Dexter township and went by the name of Dexter. The next year

other divisions were made and the locality where Mr. Howe settled. with a slice off the town of Manchester, was named Hixon. but in 1836 at Mr. Howe's request that name was changed to Bridgewater in honor of his home town in Oneida county, N.Y., where he was married to Katherine Cook Howland and where also she was born. This name it has retained

Mr. Howe was the first supervisor of Bridgewater township and was a member of the legislature when Michigan was admitted to the union as a state, serving two terms in 1836 and 1837. He was also a commissioned officer in the Black Hawk War. His oldest son, John O. Howe, now living here in Beatrice, Neb. distinctly remembers being with his father at one time during the session of the legislature in Detroit, then the capital. A little lad, 10 years of age, this visit with the lawmakers was quite an event. The hotel where they were stopping was called the "National Hotel" and he has been told that it stood on the site occupied in late years by the well-known Russell House, now

the Ponchartrain. When the family came to Michigan in 1831 John was five years old. There were also at that time two sisters and within the past five years or more he has frequently said that he knows no one now living who saw Michigan at such an early date as he.
