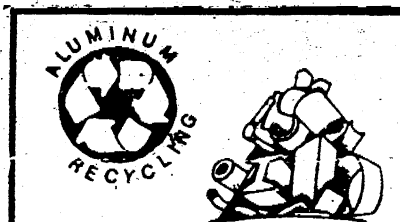
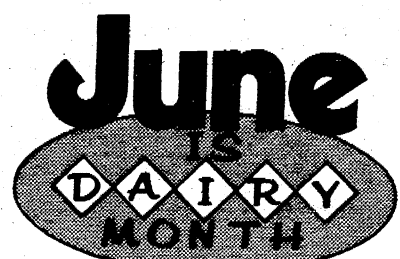

DNR News

Youth Off-Road-Vehicle (ORV) safety education courses, funded by ORV registration fees, are being offered now through the summer by Department of Natural Resources (DNR) personnel, area Sheriff's Departments, schools and ORV clubs. ORV safety certificates are required of all users, 12 through 15 years of age, operating ORVs on state lands, without adult supervision. A certificate is not required if the vehicle is used on land owned or controlled by the parent or legal guardian of the child.

The DNR compiles the student ORV manual, handles outstate ORV registration and also maintains 1,800 miles of ORV trails on state forest lands and another 400 are ORV use area at Silver Lake State Park in Oceana County, just south of Pentwater.

Students taking the seven hour course, receive a comprehensive training manual with units of trail riding techniques, riding apparel, trail survival and first aid.

Respect for the environment and other uses is also emphasized.

DNR park officials at Silver Lake State Park, will conduct weekly ORV classes from June 29 through September 1. A schedule of classes, available by mid-June, may be obtained from the park or by calling 616-873-3083.

In addition, several DNR District Office Law Enforcement Divisions throughout the State are offering ORV classes or will schedule and conduct classes by request for 10 or more youngsters. They additionally can advise of ORV classes being conducted by other groups, organizations or

businesses in the area. For information contact DNR District 13/Jackson office, 517-784-3188 which serves Branch, Calhoun, Eaton, Hillsdale, Ingham, Jackson, Lenawee, Livingston, and Washtenaw counties.

Sheriff Schebil Honored



Ronald J. Schebil, Sheriff of Washtenaw County, Ann Arbor, Michigan was honored by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) for outstanding contributions in the field of highway safety. The NHTSA Administrator's Public Service Award was presented at a press conference on June 7, 1988.

Sheriff Schebil was honored for his long-term commitment to traffic safety and dedication to the implementation of innovative highway safety programs throughout Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Rep. O'Connor To Seek Re-Election

Widely regarded as Michigan's staunchest proponent of free enterprise and traditional American values and fighter against wasteful government, State Representative Margaret O'Connor has announced that she will seek re-election to a fourth term as the 52nd District's legislator in the House.

O'Connor, whose last three terms have been dedicated to demanding fiscal responsibility in the State Legislature, is recognized by both parties in the Legislature as being an expert on the budget. More than any other legislator she knows how money is being spent and where reductions are possible. Her "Pork Barrel of the Week" awards have called attention to examples of the blatant disregard for taxpayer's money which is so prevalent in Lansing. She knows taxes can be reduced if control can be secured over spending. O'Connor was

cited by the Michigan Conservative Union as the legislator most careful with taxpayer's money.

"I believe that most Michigan residents would be absolutely appalled by the total lack of fiscal restraint displayed by their elected officials at the state level," O'Connor said.

"In my past three terms, I have been guided by two forces, the first being the will of my constituents. The second is the Jeffersonian principle - government which governs least, governs best."

A proponent of deregulation and privatization of government, O'Connor believes that the state and federal governments should do only what the private sector cannot do. She also believes that the "excessive taxation" of Michigan's citizens is damaging and is restricting the state's economy to the detriment of everyone.

"In a free enterprise system, the government does the worst financial planning of all," she said. "If people are allowed to keep their money, their investments in our state will provide a strong financial base which will improve all our lives and upon which we can experience significant growth," O'Connor said.

In a display of personal financial restraint, O'Connor spent approximately \$5000 winning her last election, while her defeated opponent spent close to one hundred thousand dollars.

As testimony to the efficiency and effectiveness Rep. O'Connor brings to her office, House Speaker Gary Owen has not felt it necessary to provide her with a legislative aide, apparently feeling she does as much without an aide as other house members do with aides.

A Lodi Township resident, O'Connor previously served on the Lodi Township Board, the Lodi Township Planning Commission, the County Board of Commissioners and the County Planning Commission.

MMBA Introduces New Program

The Michigan Municipal Bond Authority's new Equipment Financing Program, introduced in the spring of 1988, will provide public agencies with simpler and more flexible financing.

The MMBA issues bonds or notes for sale on the national market in the amount it expects to loan to municipalities and school district in order to finance its purchases for the program. The MMBA uses the principal and interest payments of local borrowers to repay its securities. Furthermore, the profits derived from the sale are immediately passed back to the local units.

School districts and municipalities can take advantage of the state's credit rating as the MMBA pools the local units' bonds and notes into a larger MMBA bond or note. Any local government unit, cities, townships, villages, counties, schools, and hospitals which are legally authorized to issue debt can receive a MMBA loan.

The new program has a source of financing available to local governments for equipment and

real property needs which include the following: communications equipment, public safety needs, vehicles, and land purchases.

Adjustable rate and fixed rate are the two structural options for financing in the program for equipment and real property. The adjustable rate can be periodically prepaid without penalty and it will provide slightly lower average interest cost than fixed rate financing. Also, the interest rates will be adjusted twice per year and funding will be available during the year. The fixed rate prepayment is limited, the funding available is approximately 2-4 times a year, and the interest rates are set for the term of the agreement.

Since Michigan's state law prohibits localities from issuing general obligation bonds to purchase equipment, communities have been filling their needs through lease-purchases. The program thus would give localities flexibility for dealing with vendors while achieving lower financing costs than individual communities can negotiate.

The free 7:30 a.m. tent raising

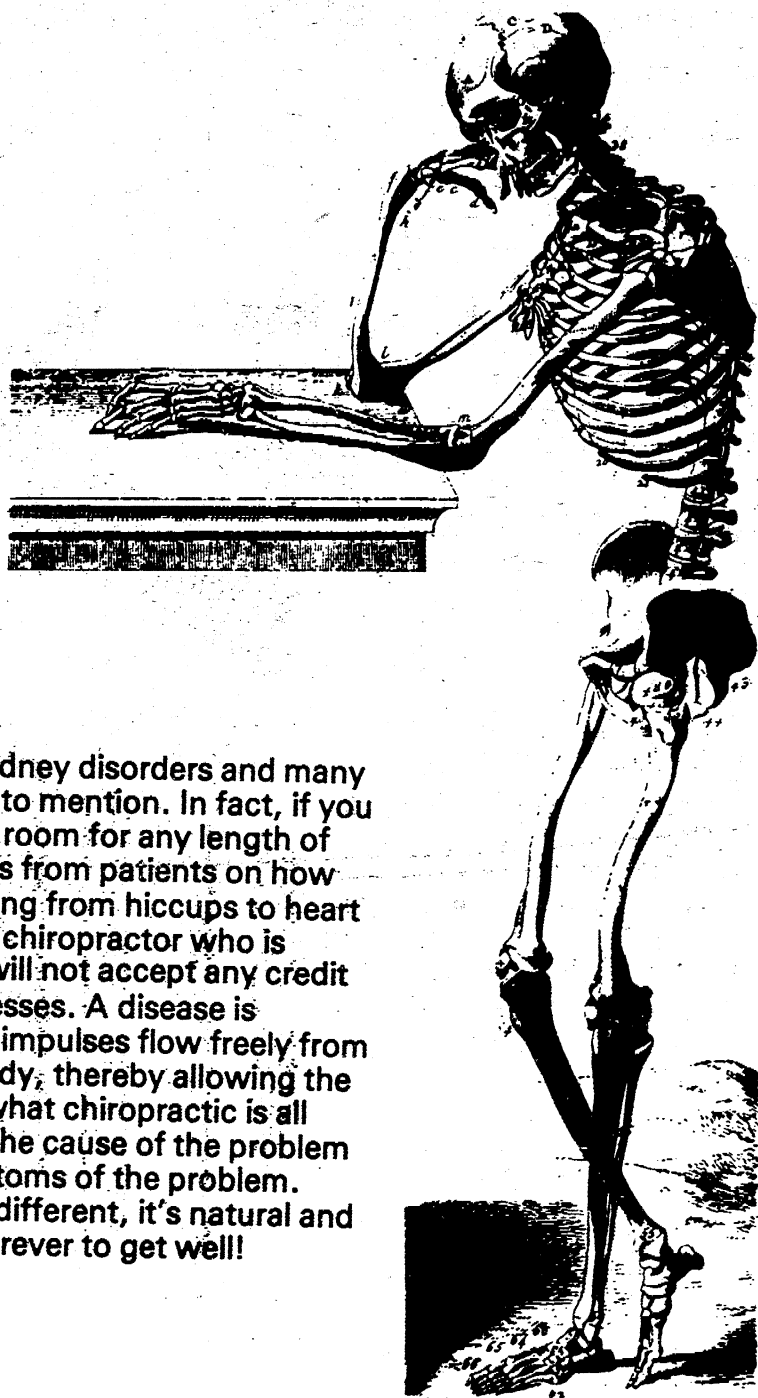

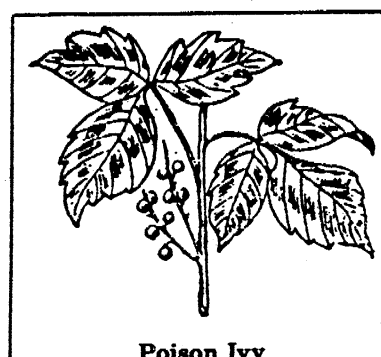

body or is intensely itchy or begins to blister or ooze, contact your physician. He or she can prescribe the proper treatment.

Insects — Mosquitos, wasps, hornets, black flies, bees, fleas, ticks and mites.

These biting, stinging predators can't be avoided entirely, but there are ways to reduce exposure. Insect repellents — personal sprays, lotions and airborne defoggers — are the first and best lines of defense.

Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts in wooded areas (also a protection against poison ivy/oak), avoid insect nests and hives and pest-infested swampy patches to reduce risk.

If a bite or sting does occur, use cold compresses to reduce swelling and apply a Rhuil product to soothe itchiness. Contact a doctor if redness or swelling persists.

If a person is known to react strongly to a particular insect, or exhibits a severe allergic reaction — fast or difficult breathing; cold sweats; weak pulse; pale, mottled face — call for emergency assistance immediately.

Poison Ivy and Oak — The most common of the poisonous plants, these are easily recognized by their clusters of three leaves; sometimes with waxy white berries at the base. Found as vines or bushy shrubs, poison ivy and oak produce a gummy sap that causes an allergic reaction in at least 50 percent of all children and adults.

Symptoms may include a red, itchy rash — usually evident within 12 to 48 hours — and swelling, blistering and oozing.

If direct or indirect contact with the sap occurs (an example of indirect contact is petting an animal exposed to the sap), wash affected skin as quickly as possible with cool water and mild soap — washing within five minutes may avert a rash; clothing should be removed with gloves, rinsed in cold water, then laundered separately.

If a mild itchy skin rash does develop, an anti-itch preparation could be applied to the affected areas, since scratching might result in spread of the rash or infection. You may want to consider a modern-day clear gel like Rhuil for this purpose to avoid the blotching and staining associated with traditional calamine lotions. If the rash is more severe, appears over large portions of the
