Manchester Village Council Proceedings

Approved Synopsis June 6, 1988

The June 6, 1988, regular meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. The minutes of the May 16, 1988 meeting were corrected and approved.

Several reports were presented to Council for review, including the DPW Report in which the following decisions were made: 1. Council approved the hook-up to a fire hydrant for a fund raising car wash at no charge. 2. Council decided to proceed as previously decided using McNamee, Porter and Seeley's Inspector and issuing a building permit at no cost to Clark Construction noting that if we charged for a permit it would be added to our bill. 3. Council authorized up to \$2000.00 additional expense on the Macomb Street project to supply bottled water to residents after chlorinating the line.

Council approved to pay the May payables in the amount of \$69,112.57 and to borrow \$15,000.00 from General Highway Cash Savings.

 50/50 Sidewalk Program - Committee will have more information at the next meeting.

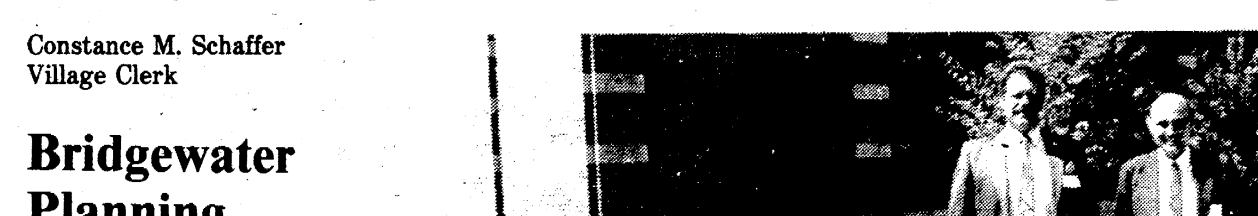
Conquering Faith Fellowship - Council voted to deny the amendment to S.5.133 of the Zoning Ordinance of Manchester Village providing a "Church" as a conditional use in the General Commercial District (C-2).

Louis Ciotti Rezoning Petition - It was decided to refer the Mobile Home rezoning petition back to Planning Commission asking them to consider the petitioners request for seven acres and to consider whether the northern triangle above the easement should remain Mobile Home Park or be rezoned as agriculture.

Garnett Johnson Rezoning Petition - Put on June 20 agenda.
Johnson Controls - M-52 Access - It was agreed on a vote of 4 to 3 to support opening up a limited portion of M-52 therefore supporting the Johnson Controls and Schmerberg-Holiday petition to remove the limited access status over a defined portion of M-52. The resolution will be written by a special committee.
