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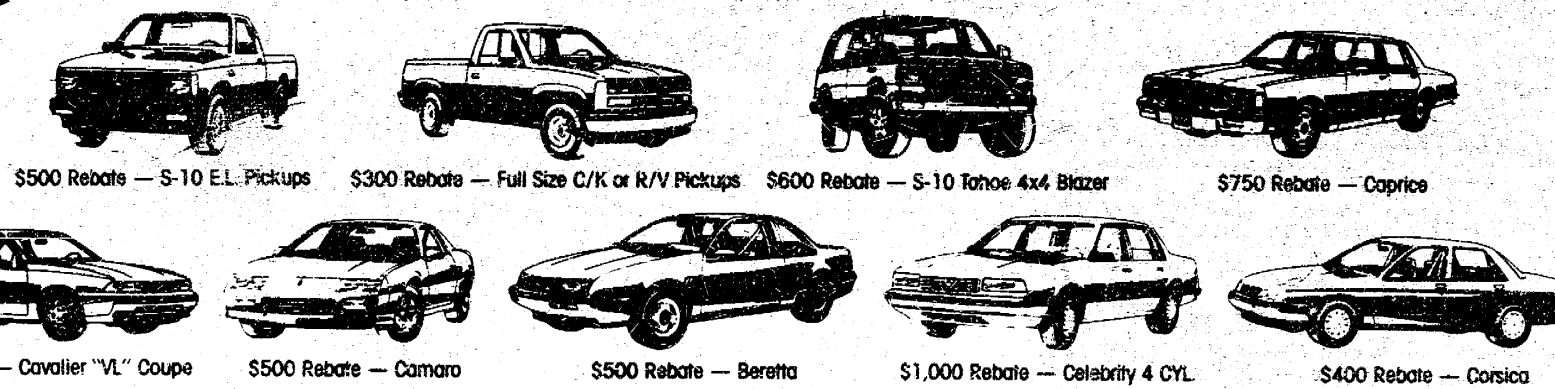

Shall We Have A New Bridge!

Manchester Enterprise
July 22, 1886

The Enterprise had supposed that every man, woman or child who have crossed the bridge on Exchange Place were aware of its unsafe condition. Certainly every boy who skates or swims and has been under the bridge knows that the timbers are rotting away, and that the structure has settled at the east end, and the stringers and planking are in a dilapidated condition is apparent to everyone.

An examination proves such to be the case, and further: the embankment at either end is crumbling away and careening piles offer but scant support for the timbers, which make it hazardous for teams with heavy loads to cross, and the township commissioner has so notified the people.

Looking at the bridge from "this side of the road" it does not look very bad, but the township board, having examined it, conclude it really is in an unsafe condition and must be repaired or replaced by a substantial structure; and after carefully estimating the probable cost of repairing and rebuilding, they wisely conclude that it will be cheaper in the end to build a new bridge of iron and set upon stone abutments, than to repair this one.

Hearing that there was some opposition to the project, the Enterprise interviewed a number of the heaviest taxpayers both in and out of the village, besides a large number of successful business men and farmers and every man said that if the bridge needed repairing to any extent, it was cheaper to build a new bridge.

Supervisor Burch, whom every tax payer knows, is always opposed to paying out money

unnecessarily or in increasing the tax, informs the Enterprise that "it will cost about \$2.25 per \$1,000 on the assessed valuation of the township, this includes interest, and as it is a maximum figure, it is liable to be less." He considers the money paid out in repairing the bridge the same as thrown away, as we can't delay building a new bridge much longer.

Commissioner Case says: "The main points for the taxpayers to consider is, whether a new bridge shall be built or the old one repaired. An estimate of the cost of repairing the old one cannot be given until the bridge is in torn up, but suppose \$200 or \$400 is required to repair it, would it not be economy to rebuild if we have to loan the money rather than be continually patching up the old structure? An estimate of the cost of rebuilding can be made at the rate of \$16 or \$18 per foot.

Age 85, died Sunday, November 13, 1988 at her home. She was born February 6, 1903 in Webster City, Iowa the daughter of Henry T. and Anna M. Yunglas.

In 1924 she received her B.S. in Home Economics and Education from Iowa State University. While at I.S.U. she was a member of Sigma Kappa, Omicron NU (National Home Economics Honorary) and Mortor Board, and was president of Women's Student Government.

She was married to Franklin M. Reck on January 27, 1926. He preceded her in death on October 14, 1965.

While in Detroit Claire was office manager for American Boy Magazine, field secretary for Sigma Kappa and chairman of the board of the Detroit Council of Camp Fire Girls.

The Recks moved to Manchester in 1941 and she became active in the American Red Cross Canteen. She also served on the Manchester Twp. Library Board (1943-1988), Washtenaw County Library Board (1963-1975) and as volunteer trustee at large of the Michigan State Library Board. She was on the board of the Manchester Community Chest (1957-1970), Chairman of the Manchester Red Cross Blood Bank (1957-1966), Secretary of Washtenaw County Red Cross Board (1966-1972), and Chairman of Manchester Family Services (1965-1988).

Her work as secretary for her author/editor husband took her on travels throughout the world. Claire was the recipient of

many awards including, Washtenaw County Bar Association's Liberty Bell Award, Washtenaw Community College Service Award, Wilfred de St. Aubin Award of the Ann Arbor Red Cross (its highest award), 1983 Detroit Kiwanis Club #1 Take Time to Care Award, Certificate of appreciation from the Manchester Community Chest (presented to her on the occasion of "Claire Reck Day" in 1972) and the Manchester Village Council, The Governor's Minuteman Award (1988), and a Special Tribute from the Michigan State Senate (1988).

Survivors include 2 daughters, Linda Head of Adelphi, Maryland and Sarah Wakefield of New Carrollton, Maryland, 4 grandchildren, and 2 brothers. Cremation has taken place.

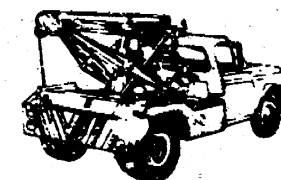

Students Travel To Judge Soil



On October 6th, students from Manchester and Saline High School's Agriculture Class traveled to Hillsdale County to judge soil in a county wide soil judging demonstration. Officials were on hand from Hillsdale's Soil Conservation Service to set-up the holes and determine the land capabilities. The purpose of soil judging is to determine the best uses of our

land. By determining soil types, texture, slope, permeability and erosion, students can decide the best agricultural, recreational or non-agricultural use for that area, while minimizing the effects of soil and water erosion with specific conservation practices. Other schools attending the demonstration in Pittsford were Camden-Frontier, Litchfield, Waldron, and Reading.

"Stress Management Update"

A new program, "Stress Management Update", will be sponsored by Chelsea Community Schools will implement procedures to respond to the conditions. Road conditions at selected areas throughout the district will be checked. 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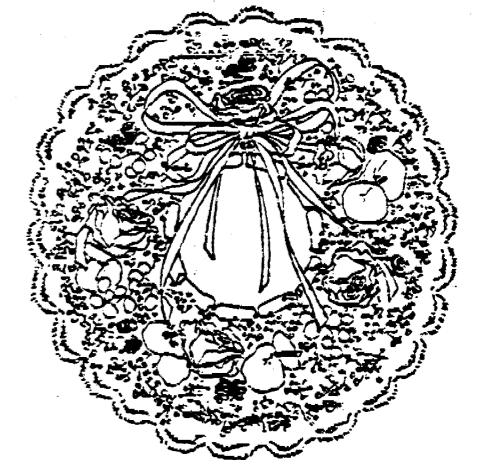
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Halloween Costume Judging

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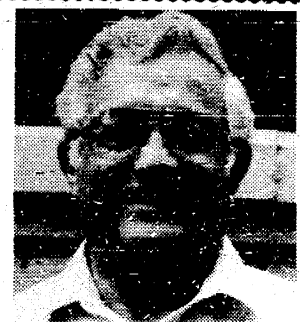
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Senior Citizens News

As I went to vote the other day I thought back over the years to various other elections; 1988 was my thirteenth presidential election. I talked to TV about possibly writing something about them for her column. She said she didn't mind as long as I was sure to let her readers know she wasn't that old!

I turned 21 in time to vote in the election of '40. I voted an absent ballot as a student in Ann Arbor and saw Wendell Wilkie when he stopped at the train station on his whistle stop campaign. By 1944 I was in the army in California and voted absent ballot again. Wilkie was running against Roosevelt a second time and lost just as badly, I recall. In the next two elections our country repeated the tradition of putting popular generals in the White House. I liked "Ike" - thought he was a good commander and became a good president. He surely tried to warn us about the dangers of the Industrial-Military Complex - we're trying vainly to keep that monster under control.

In 1960 I thought "Ike's" VP was more qualified than that rich kid from Massachusetts, but the rest of the country didn't. Thank you, Howard, for your

Camelot was here. I never learned respect for anyone faster than I did for Kennedy during the Cuban Missile Crisis. I don't think of a president has exercised his office as skillfully since. I am reminded of MacArthur's comment on his assassination. Dirksen and many other orators were interviewed by the media and used words like terrible, tragic, etc. Mac called it "A monumental calamity".

I never got used to Johnson and could not sort out his various political dealings along the way back in Texas. Nixon finally got his chance in '68 and I had high hopes for him. He really did a lot - recognizing China and getting us out of Viet Nam, but lost it all with Watergate. I backed Ford in '76 but the country didn't - one pardon too many, or something, I've always felt.

Along came the Carter years and the oil problems he neither caused nor could solve, but he got all the "credit" for them. Maybe that's why we turned our hopes to the star from Hollywood. I believed he could fix the economy and he did get inflation and interest under control. But the federal bureaucracy has not been reduced and the budget has not been balanced. Who would ever have believed that he could out-deficit the New Dealers? Still seems odd to hear Democrats complaining about a deficit.

Makes one wonder sometimes just how much one man can do, but that's the system we have. I sure wish George Bush well even though this year I really felt like voting "no" for president. Bon voyage, Claire! We will try to get along without you.

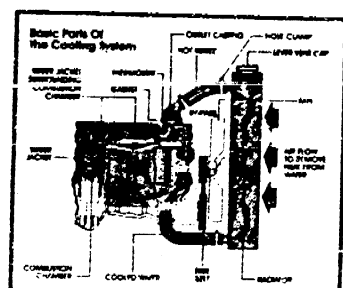



Made His Last Run

Manchester Enterprise
May 24, 1888

We clip the following extract from the *Adrian Times*, and publish it as a bit of interesting history:

Frederick Avery was born in Rochester, N. Y., August 9, 1830. In 1842 he moved with his parents to Toledo, Ohio, where he went to school until the month of March, 1847. He then commenced rail-roading on the Erie & Kalamazoo railroad, and was installed as fireman of the old locomotive "Toledo," Isreal Scramtum engineer. This was the second locomotive that ever ran west of Lake Erie, and the second one purchased by the Erie & Kalamazoo company, the first one, the "Adrian," being disabled at that time. Mr. Avery ran on the "Toledo" 15 months as fireman, when he was promoted to the position of engineer. This was when he was in his eighteenth year, and about two years after he was given a new and larger engine. At that time there were no regular passenger or freight trains, nor time cards, except a mark of some kind, half way between stations, consisting of a certain stamp, log or house, and the train that arrived at this mark first, compelled the opposite train to back up to the side track. It made no difference whether the train forced to back up was a passenger or freight train. There were no pilots, head lights, steam gauges or heaters, and brakes were unknown in those days. When there were no passengers

and the train consisted of freight cars, the engineer and fireman were the only human beings who accompanied it. All trains "run wild" and got to their destination as soon as possible. It was considered a good run to go from Adrian to Toledo in four hours, or eight miles per hour. It often took from six to 10 hours to get over the road, a distance of 32 miles. At one time during the winter of 1847-8, after a fall of about 15 inches of snow, he was eight days making the trip from Toledo to Adrian and back, with two locomotives and one car, and the locomotives were off the track 22 times during this trip. Cars never ran nights in those days, and when darkness came on trains were stopped until the following morning. Mr. Avery continued with the Erie & Kalamazoo until the road was leased by the Michigan Southern company in 1849, and has continued with that company ever since. The extension of the road from Hillsdale west was commenced in 1849, and Mr. Avery run his engine as far west as South Bend, Ind., in 1851, when he was sent to Michigan City with a locomotive, and assisted in constructing the road from that place to Chicago, and during the winter of 1851-2 he had the honor of running the first locomotive that ever ran into the city from the east. The first passenger train from Toledo to Chicago arrived in the latter city in June, 1852. Mr. Avery served the road as engineer until October, 1863, serving about 16

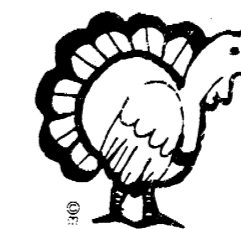
