Made His Last Run

Manchester Enterprise
May 24, 1888

We clip the following extract from the *Adrian Times*, and publish it as a bit of interesting history:

Frederick Avery was born in Rochester, N. Y., August 9, 1830. In 1842 he moved with his parents to Toledo, Ohio, where he went to school until the month of March, 1847. He then commenced rail-roading on the Erie & Kalamazoo railroad, and was installed as fireman of the old locomotive "Toledo," Isreal Scramtum engineer. This was the second locomotive that ever ran west of Lake Erie, and the second one purchased by the Erie & Kalamazoo company, the first one, the "Adrian," being disabled at that time. Mr. Avery ran on the "Toledo" 15 months as fireman, when he was promoted to the position of engineer. This was when he was in his eighteenth year, and about two years after he was given a new and larger engine. At that time there were no regular passenger or freight trains, nor time cards, except a mark of some kind, half way between stations, consisting of a certain stamp, log or house, and the train that arrived at this mark first, compelled the opposite train to back up to the side track. It made no difference whether the train forced to back up was a passenger or freight train. There were no pilots, head lights, steam gauges or heaters, and brakes were unknown in those days. When there were no passengers

and the train consisted of freight cars, the engineer and fireman were the only human beings who accompanied it. All trains "run wild" and got to their destination as soon as possible. It was considered a good run to go from Adrian to Toledo in four hours, or eight miles per hour. It often took from six to 10 hours to get over the road, a distance of 32 miles. At one time during the winter of 1847-8, after a fall of about 15 inches of snow, he was eight days making the trip from Toledo to Adrian and back, with two locomotives and one car, and the locomotives were off the track 22 times during this trip. Cars never ran nights in those days, and when darkness came on trains were stopped until the following morning. Mr. Avery continued with the Erie & Kalamazoo until the road was leased by the Michigan Southern company in 1849, and has continued with that company ever since. The extension of the road from Hillsdale west was commenced in 1849, and Mr. Avery run his engine as far west as South Bend, Ind., in 1851, when he was sent to Michigan City with a locomotive, and assisted in constructing the road from that place to Chicago, and during the winter of 1851-2 he had the honor of running the first locomotive that ever ran into the city from the east. The first passenger train from Toledo to Chicago arrived in the latter city in June, 1852. Mr. Avery served the road as engineer until October, 1863, serving about 16

New Calling Options Coming For Manchester

Michigan Bell will bring customer distance companies offering "Dial 1 Plus" in the Manchester area. To select a long distance company, they need only check the appropriate box on the ballot and mail it back to Michigan Bell in the postage-paid envelope provided.

Nearly 2,500 residence and business customers in the 428 exchange will be able to order Touch Tone and Custom Calling services," said Marcia Buhl, Michigan Bell's local public relations manager.

Michigan Bell also will bring customers in the exchange "Dial 1 Plus," which will allow them to use any available long distance service simply by dialing "1" plus the area code and phone number.

"Right now, customers who use a long distance company other than AT&T must dial up to 22 digits," Buhl said.

Information describing the new services will be mailed to customers as the services become available. Customers also will receive a "ballot" listing the long

distance companies offering "Dial 1 Plus" in the Manchester area. To select a long distance company, they need only check the appropriate box on the ballot and mail it back to Michigan Bell in the postage-paid envelope provided.

Custom Calling features that will be available to customers in the 428 exchange include:

Call Forwarding, which automatically transfers an incoming call from one telephone to another;

Call Waiting/Cancel Call Waiting, which lets a customer using the phone know that a second call is waiting to be answered and permits canceling the feature so that important calls can be made without interruption;

Speed Calling, which permits a customer to reach frequently called numbers by dialing special codes; and

Three-Way Calling, which enables a caller to add a third party to a conversation.

Receives Optimist Award

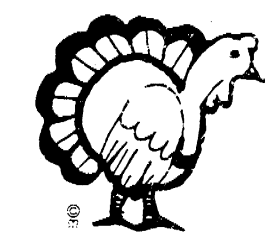

As of today he is running 3 months behind but still plans on meeting the March 15, 1989 deadline as described in his January 1988 letter. Kuntz requested an audit for the 1986/1987 year which is almost completed and an audit for the

1987/1988 year in March. Becktel asked for bids on two audits so a decision could be made at the next meeting.

Sheriff's Report - Sgt. Swope was present to answer questions on the Sheriff's report. Motion by Marshall, supported by Becktel to accept report as submitted. Ayes-all.

Planning Commission - No report.

DPW Report - Reinhart brought several items to Councils attention. No action was required. Kallewaard appointed Marshall and Reinhart to a committee to look into maintenance on the Village Hall. It was decided that first priority should be windows and roof.

With Thanksgiving nearly here, this seems a proper time for us to express our gratitude for the many hours of volunteer work which are cheerfully given to make our Senior programs operate.

It would be nearly impossible to name each volunteer, but a few should be given credit directly: Rubena Boelter for the many ways she generally keeps things going, Joan Berry for keeping track of the thousands of dollars that come and go in our account, T.V. Ludwick whose nimble typing fingers pound out *The Trumpeter* and produce our excellent column each week in *The Enterprise*, and "Grandma" Gillo for her ever-faithful work in the kitchen.

Our ten Council members meet monthly to set general policy and conduct the business of M.A.S.C. (Incidentally, they are happy to have guests at their meetings—second Tuesday of every month, 9:30 a.m. at the Center.)

Many people volunteer to keep our meal program running smoothly: Ladies from the churches who assist with serving and dishwashing; contributors of vegetables, fruits or table decorations; individuals who assist bus drivers as they deliver meals to shut-ins; those who help

the handicapped by carrying food and beverage; and those who make it a point to welcome diners and generally make our mealtimes friendly and sociable.

Volunteers arrange trips, take reservations and recruit bus drivers.

A volunteer makes monthly and quarterly bus reports to the proper agencies. Another volunteer sees that there is gas in the bus, that it is kept in running order and that it is insured.

Someone keeps the Center neat, clean and properly supplied. Weekly bingo games are directed by volunteers, and many contribute modest prizes for the players.

Monthly card parties are managed by volunteers: set-up and take-down, refreshments, etc. Individuals from our area who reside in nearby nursing homes look forward to the visits of volunteers. They and other residents are recipients of lap robes, walker and wheel-chair caddies, and seasonal tray favors—all made by volunteers (Fabric and materials are donated).

Lifeline units are installed by volunteers. A volunteer nurse takes blood pressures monthly. Volunteers keep the birthday lists, send out birthday and get-well cards.

The Trumpeter is an accomplishment of several volunteers: our typist, editors, designer, calendar arrangers, contributors.

The pages are duplicated and stapled and some are mailed by volunteers.

Many volunteers contribute to our Bill Knapp Bonus Trip project. Through this effort, several useful items have been provided for the Center.

Volunteers assist in community activities: Mill Run, Heritage Day, potato peeling for the fair and School Staff Luncheon.

Though they may not accurately be termed "volunteers" we also need to mention: the federal and state taxpayers whose funds provide and support our transportation system, the Village taxpayers who provide our Center at virtually no cost to us, contributors to United Way which assists our meals program and members of Emanuel United Church of Christ who are so generous in furnishing their kitchen and dining room facilities.

To paraphrase Edgar A. Guest: "It takes a heap of volunteering to make a Senior program go". If you can't be a volunteer, how about a personal "Thank You" for those who are?

Author Discusses Ship Wreck

The Fall Reading and Discussion Series, sponsored by the Manchester Township Library, ended last Thursday with a meeting at which the guest lecturer was the author of the book being read. Robert J. Hemming, the author of GALES OF NOVEMBER, presented the story and answered questions about the sinking of the huge ore freighter "Edmund Fitzgerald" in the stormy seas of Lake Superior in November of 1975.

A large group attended; nearly 50 people gathered in the warmth of the "1988" room at the Blacksmith Shop. Gov. John Swainson introduced the speaker, and then Mr. Hemming began.

The story of the "Edmund Fitzgerald," and hence the book about it, command much attention. Undoubtedly that accounted for the somewhat larger-than-usual crowd. And Mr. Hemming knows the subject-inside and out! Even his account of how he happened to become interested in writing the story was compelling. The author summarized the story for those who perhaps hadn't quite finished the book yet. And the audience was encouraged to ask questions at any time. And ask they did!

One woman in the audience had a wealth of information about Lake Superior, including a photo of a ship literally iced-in to the Lake. Others wanted very specific information about the investigation after the sinking and its findings which differed from Mr. Hemming's conclusions. Still others wanted to know if and how safety precautions have been improved.

Finally, the author was called upon to defend his decision to fictionalize the details and

thoughts of the men as the ship became more and more endangered. (Although the story described their actions and fears, since all were lost, this had to have been fictionalized.) Mr. Hemming maintained he knew the physical layout of the ship and had researched thoroughly the men's habits and personalities, and so the "conjectural" account was based on the best information and thus was a very "probable" narrative. And besides, he said, what kind of a story would it be if it ended without you knowing about the drama which the main characters experienced? Some were not convinced.

However, it was an exciting and dramatic ending to an interesting and successful Series. Refreshments and conversations followed in the friendliness of the Blacksmith Shop.

Although this meeting concluded the Fall Series, another is scheduled for the Spring on the subject of women's biographies. This series was sponsored by the Manchester Township Library through the Library of Michigan and the American Library Association, with funding provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Michigan Council for the Humanities. The Project Director was Dorothy Davies. Contact the Library for further information about the Spring Series.

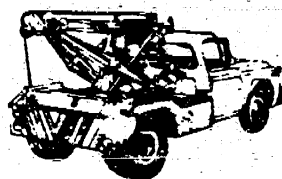

years in that capacity, and met with but one accident during the entire time. The 1st of October, 1858 he commenced running from Toledo to Detroit as conductor, and has since served in that capacity. The 1st of November, 1884, he moved to Adrian, and has been a resident of that city ever since. He ran on the Detroit division about seven years, and the Michigan division about nine years. He was one of the conductors selected to run the "fast mail" from Toledo to Chicago during the time the general government kept up that branch of the mail service. With one exception Mr. Avery is the oldest employee of the company, having been in constant service for about 34 years. In 1858 Mr. Avery was married to Mary J. Garey, daughter of George and Sarah Garey of Adrian, by whom he had three children, as follows: Geo. E. born in Michigan City, Ind., Nov. 16, 1858, a resident of Adrian; Frederick, died in infancy; Edward G., born in Adrian, May 11, 1873, at home.

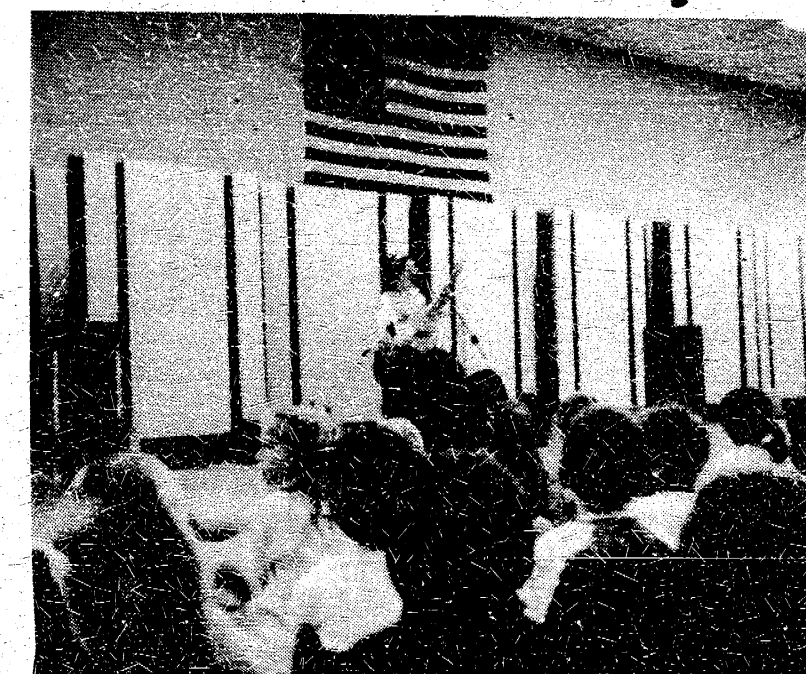

Our Fire Department

The Scientific American of Saturday June 15th contains an very interesting article on the care of fire apparatus in cities and villages, which reminds us of our own fire apparatus and what our citizens say about it. Because of its long disuse, it is very liable to get rusty, out of repair and unfit for use when it is needed. The hose by being wound upon the reel gives no opportunity for the air to pass through and are liable to become rotten and when put to a severe test as in case of fire, are liable to burst.

We have a good engine, hose of the best quality, buckets, Babcock extinguishers, hooks, ladders, etc., and they are all nicely housed and apparently kept in good order, but while we have what the council recognizes as an organized fire department, the citizens have yet to see the first token of the fact. While the

machine and all the apparatus stands apparently ready for action, the company has never been out for practice, neither has the apparatus been tested to know whether it is really in good order or not.

One of our german citizens who has suffered from fire, in a recent talk upon the subject, said that "they should get out and try the engine about three days before a fire happens." He got the "cart before the horse," in expressing his views but when they laughed at him said, "you should take a dutchman as he means, not as he talks."

That there is need of practice no one will deny and a little practice every four or six weeks would be of great service to the members of the company as in case of fire they would know how to handle the apparatus. As it is now when a fire occurs nobody what to do, at least to good advantage and much valuable time is lost and property destroyed.

How shall we go to work to build up a good fire department? The members get no pay and they think the village should buy them suits so they would make a fine appearance when they come out, but the city fathers do not think it advisable and so the matter rests. If the boys would get out and practice occasionally perhaps public interest would be aroused and the much coveted uniforms furnished.

Would it not be a good idea to offer a prize to the company that will get out the machine and throw a stream of water the quickest, farthest or highest. Or for the company that will put up a set of ladders the quickest, etc.

There is time enough to get things arranged and have an exhibition on the 4th, if begun at once.

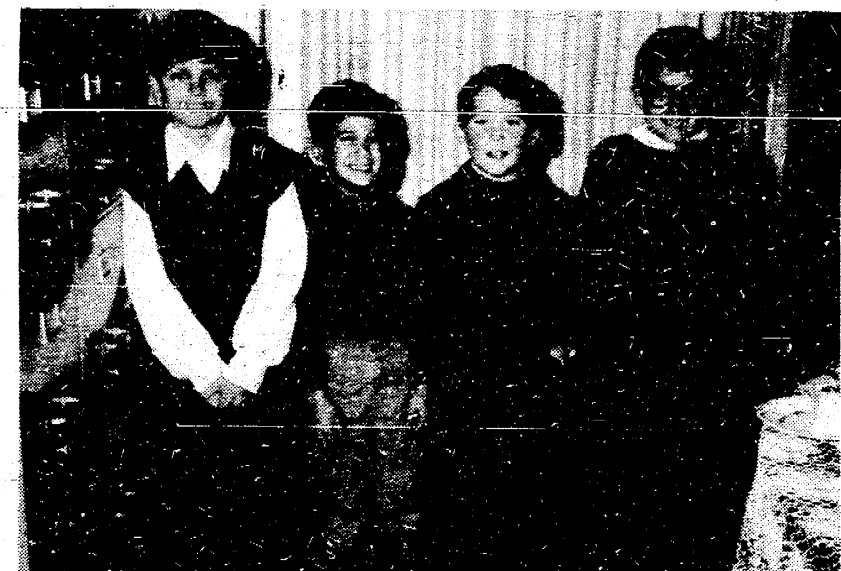
