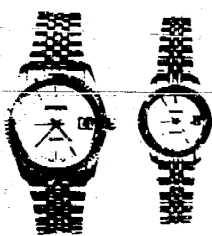

Our Fire Department

The Scientific American of Saturday June 15th contains an very interesting article on the care of fire apparatus in cities and villages, which reminds us of our own fire apparatus and what our citizens say about it. Because of its long disuse, it is very liable to get rusty, out of repair and unfit for use when it is needed. The hose by being wound upon the reel gives no opportunity for the air to pass through and are liable to become rotten and when put to a severe test as in case of fire, are liable to burst.

We have a good engine, hose of the best quality, buckets, Babcock extinguishers, hooks, ladders, etc., and they are all nicely housed and apparently kept in good order, but while we have what the council recognizes as an organized fire department, the citizens have yet to see the first token of the fact. While the

machine and all the apparatus stands apparently ready for action, the company has never been out for practice, neither has the apparatus been tested to know whether it is really in good order or not.

One of our german citizens who has suffered from fire, in a recent talk upon the subject, said that "they should get out and try the engine about three days before a fire happens." He got the "cart before the horse," in expressing his views but when they laughed at him said, "you should take a dutchman as he means, not as he talks."

That there is need of practice no one will deny and a little practice every four or six weeks would be of great service to the members of the company as in case of fire they would know how to handle the apparatus. As it is now when a fire occurs nobody what to do, at least to good advantage and much valuable time is lost and property destroyed.

How shall we go to work to build up a good fire department? The members get no pay and they think the village should buy them suits so they would make a fine appearance when they come out, but the city fathers do not think it advisable and so the matter rests. If the boys would get out and practice occasionally perhaps public interest would be aroused and the much coveted uniforms furnished.

Would it not be a good idea to offer a prize to the company that will get out the machine and throw a stream of water the quickest, farthest or highest. Or for the company that will put up a set of ladders the quickest, etc.

There is time enough to get things arranged and have an exhibition on the 4th, if begun at once.

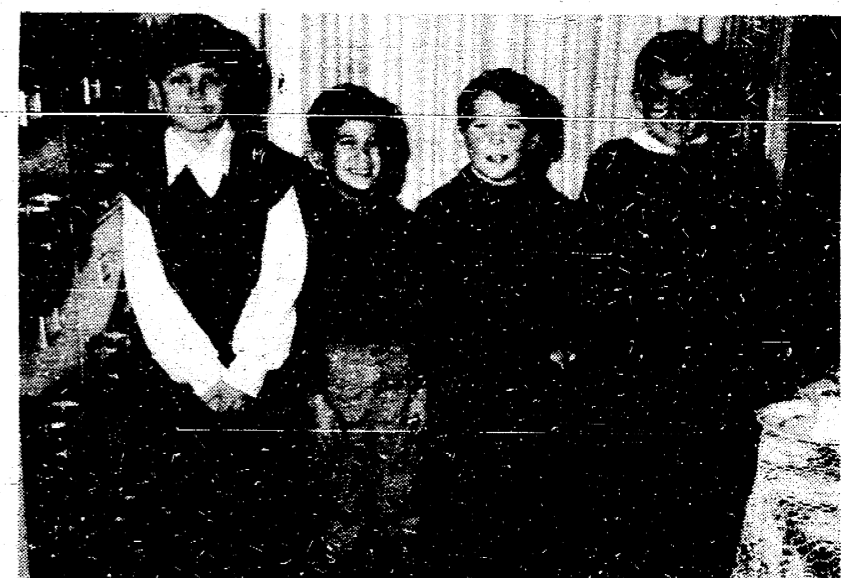

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

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

FB Cheers Bill Signing

President Reagan's signing into law of the 1988 technical corrections legislation "at long last relieves farmers of unjust tax treatment" regarding diesel fuel and preproductive expensing, according to Michigan Farm Bureau President Jack Laurie.

"The battle against the tax collection procedures on diesel fuel has been waged for more than a year and we have finally won," Laurie said. "Beginning on Jan. 1, farmers and other off-road users of diesel fuel will no longer be unjustly burdened with paying a tax they do not owe."

The technical corrections bill repeals a 1987 tax collection change that made farmers and other off-road users of diesel fuel pay the 15.1 cents per gallon excise tax and then request a refund. The tax change took effect April 1.

In order to receive tax-free treatment on the purchase of diesel fuel for farming and other off-highway uses after Jan. 1, the fuel must be purchased from a registered wholesale distributor.

Laurie said the new law also provides for a one-time refund opportunity, with interest, for excise taxes paid by off-road users between April 1, 1988, and Jan. 1, 1989. The interest rate paid will be set by the Treasury Department and will be based on the regular "deficiency rate" paid by the federal government for overpayments of tax. The deadline for filing for the refund is July 1, 1989.

"Besides correcting the tax collection procedures for diesel fuel, the technical corrections bill also repealed the 1986 'heifer tax,' representing a major victory for livestock producers," Laurie said.

Taxes Important To Consider In Retirement

The time to consider how taxes will affect your retirement income is before you leave the workforce, said Ellen Palmer, the executive director of the Michigan Tax Information Council.

"Distributions from retirement plans like Individual Retirement Accounts and Keogh Plans, or pension, profit-sharing plans create special tax situations," said Palmer. "When planning for retirement, it pays to learn the tax rules that will apply or to consult with a tax professional."

Palmer said sound planning is important because it can help you to project how much of your total assets will go toward taxes, to assure it is the right amount and to avoid unnecessary penalties.

Some general items to consider: **Retirement Plans**-Distributions from IRAs, Keoghs and other plans are taxed as ordinary income. Also, a certain portion of your retirement holdings must be withdrawn, beginning no later than April 1 following the year age 70½ is attained, or that amount will be subject to a 50 percent excise tax.

Lump-Sum Distribution-If you receive the entire balance of a pension, profit-sharing or similar plan within one year it is considered a lump-sum distribution. If specific requirements are met, you may treat a certain portion as a long-term capital gain and elect special averaging of the ordinary income portion of the distribution. This is beneficial only if you have

capital losses. **Social Security Benefits**-Social Security benefits are not taxable, unless the total of one-half of the benefits plus income from all other sources (including tax-exempt interest such as that earned on municipal bonds) exceeds \$32,000 for a married couple, filing jointly or \$25,000 for a single person.

Proceeds from Sale of Home-Up to \$125,000 of your gain can be excluded from the sale of a house, condominium, or co-op if certain conditions are met; you are at least 55 and have owned and lived in the residence at least 3 of the five years preceding its sale. This is a one-time election so it should be carefully considered before it is used.

Michigan's Capital In Red, White And Blue

In Michigan holidays are observed with reverent sentiment along with festive excitement and special holidays have special meaning. On January 1, 1989 the Capitol building in Lansing will be 110 years old and Andrew

Anthos, 53, a native born Detroit, would like to see the dome of the Capitol lit in muted, respectful hues of red, white and blue that night and other nights of special legal holidays such as Memorial Day, Flag Day, the Fourth of July, Labor and Veteran's Day.

Anthos, who considers himself a Michigander, is gathering signatures in a petition of those favoring the lighting of the dome. He drew a poster also showing the dome in red, white and blue and his first supporter, Governor James J. Blanchard, affixed his name to the poster. Lt. Gov. Martha Griffiths added her name as did eighteen others of the highest ranking officials in Michigan's government. Others

January 1, 1879 at a cost of almost \$1,500,000, will become the first state capitol in the United States to honor the colors of the American flag.

With his petition of signatures of support, Anthos is determined the state become the first to light its dome lest another learn of our plans and wrest the honor from Michigan. He believes this will inspire other state capitols to begin a nation-wide tradition.

The evening of the dedication of the dome lighting Anthos will not attend as he desires the lights of the festivities shine upon the dome and not him. He wishes for the Governor to do the honors and have with him a child, a homeless person, a handicapped person, a student, an elderly senior citizen and a Native American to show Michigan's regard and its care for these, its citizens, who will all lay hands-as one-to push the button or pull the switch to light up our great dome. Anthos promises to send a congratulatory message to the governor and the people in deep appreciation for their efforts to bring forth the majestic event.

Anthos learned that the cost to light the 144-foot high, 40-foot wide dome will cost about \$50,000,

which includes labor, insurance and union facets of the logistics involved, as well as the cost of the lights and installation. To light the dome on any legal holiday from six to midnight of an evening will cost about \$7 he was informed. This full amount is that of an average home in the state and is not an excessive price to the taxpayers of Michigan to what the entire project will represent in the final analysis. Anthos reasons that the cost of true honor is priceless.

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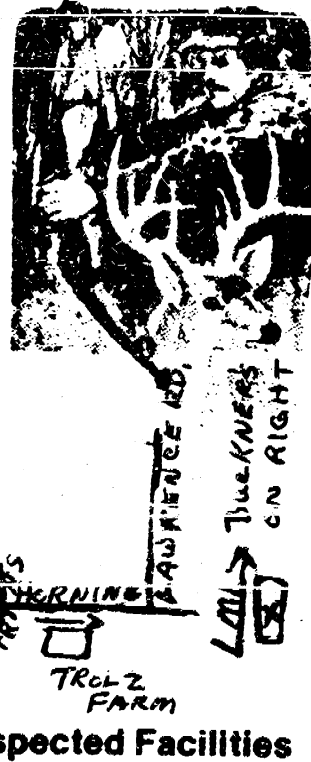

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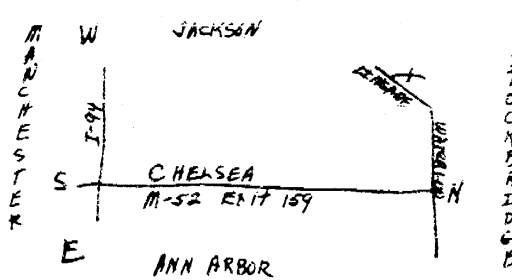

Residents Due Refund Checks

The Internal Revenue Service is trying to locate Michigan taxpayers who are still due tax refunds from their 1987 federal income tax returns.

"The Postal Service has returned as undeliverable 1,471 refund checks worth \$704,788," said John O. Hummel, IRS District Director for Michigan. "These checks range in amounts from \$1.00 to \$34,997, and average \$479."

Internal Revenue Service believes most of these taxpayers moved or changed their last names during the year, and failed to notify the Postal Service or IRS.

"When a refund is returned by the Postal Service, the IRS attempts to locate the taxpayer by follow-up mail; but there are always a small number who cannot be found," Hummel said. He indicated, however, that most taxpayers, about 3 million in Michigan, have received their refunds.

If you are due a refund from your 1987 federal tax return but have not yet received it, call the IRS, toll free at 1-800-424-1040.

Money Management

When It Comes To Tax Breaks, There's No Place Like Home

If you are looking for reasons to celebrate, look no further than your own four walls. From the day you sign your mortgage papers to the day you take down the "For Sale" sign, your house can make your life a lot less taxing, says the Michigan Association of CPAs.

Getting to the Point

At the beginning, there are "points"-fees that a lender charges when you secure a mortgage to purchase a house. Each point represents one percent of the loan's total amount. For instance, a charge of three points on a \$100,000 mortgage equals \$3,000. Pay the points with personal funds and they are usually fully deductible as mortgage interest in the year paid. If, on the other hand, you pay the points from the loan proceeds, you will most likely have to deduct the points over the life of the

mortgage, usually 15 to 30 years. **Not So Taxing, After All** Real estate taxes may add to the cost of owning a home, but they can also help reduce the amount of income tax you owe. Generally, you can deduct any real estate tax charged against your property. Owners of cooperatives may deduct a proportionate share of real estate taxes. Additionally, in Michigan, taxpayers may qualify for the Homestead Property Tax Credit. The credit refunds to homeowners a percentage of the property tax on their home which exceeds 3.5 percent of household income. However, there are limitations based on your income. Check with your tax advisor to see if you qualify for this deduction.

The Value of Interest

The deduction for a consumer interest may be down and almost out, but the itemized deduction for home mortgage interest remains largely untouched. In fact, you may deduct interest on loans of up to \$1 million as long as

you use the funds to construct, purchase or improve a principal or second residence.

You can also deduct interest on home equity loans of up to \$100,000, providing the loan doesn't exceed the difference between your home's fair market value and the amount owed on it. Just remember that a home equity loan increases the amount of obligation held against your home.

Rental Property

If you rent your second home for less than 15 days, the income is yours-tax-free. On the other hand, if you stay at your second home less than 15 days a year, or less than 10 percent of the time it is rented, your home is deemed a rental and you will have to report any income the property generates. However, you can offset the rental income by deducting a portion of the mortgage interest, the property tax and the home's depreciation. In addition, you can deduct a portion of such operating expenses as utilities, fire and liability insurance, repairs, advertising costs and even maid service.

Be aware that, under tax law, any net losses you incur while operating a rental are "passive losses." Unfortunately, this usually means that you may deduct them only from "passive income." But here's the good news. If you actively participate in renting the property and your adjusted gross income (AGI) is \$100,000 or less, you can deduct rental losses of up to \$25,000 from your regular income. For owners with AGIs over \$100,000, the

\$25,000 active rental loss allowance is reduced by 50 cents for every dollar of income above \$100,000.

There's No Business, Like Home Business

If you run a business out of your home, you have a few other reasons to smile. First, you may be able to depreciate your home office. Second, you can generally write off part of your various operating expenses, including utilities, for the office portion of your home. You can even deduct a portion of the cost of a home-security system.

As a general rule, to take a tax deduction for a home-based business, you must use the space exclusively and regularly as the principal place of business, or as a place where you frequently meet or deal with your clients, customers or patients. Deductions for business use of the home are allowed only to the extent of the taxpayer's net income from the business-that is, gross income less deductions attributable to the business. The net effect of this limitation is that home-office deductions may not be used to create or increase a net loss from the business conducted in the home.

Stop Taxes From Gaining On You

The house you bought for \$60,000 years ago is about to sell for \$250,000. You don't know if you should celebrate or get ready to foot the tax bill. Break out the champagne. As long as the cost of the new residence equals or exceeds the selling price of the old house, the tax on the gain is deferred. If you spend less than the old house's selling price, however, the excess amount may be taxable income.

Remember, your home may be your castle, but it can also be your best tax break.

CPAs advise you to proceed cautiously whenever making decisions that may affect your tax liability.

And remember that the new house must be purchased within two years before or two years after the sale of your primary home.

A special break exists for older taxpayers. If you are age 55 or older, you may exclude gain of up to \$125,000 on the sale of your home. Let's say you sell the quaint home you purchased for \$45,000 back in 1958 for \$270,000, for a gain of \$225,000. You can roll \$100,000 of the profit into a new home and pocket the remaining \$125,000-and owe absolutely no taxes on the gain from selling your home. But be warned: this is a one-time only exclusion-per individual or per couple. Use it too soon or at the wrong time, and you may regret it later.

It Pays To Be Charitable Here's a new angle on converting your home into a hand-some deduction. Contribute a "remainder interest" in your home to your favorite charity and take a substantial tax deduction in the year that you make the gift. A "remainder interest" means that you agree to allow the charity to take title and possession after you and your spouse pass away. While either of you are alive, you can continue to live in the house rent-free.

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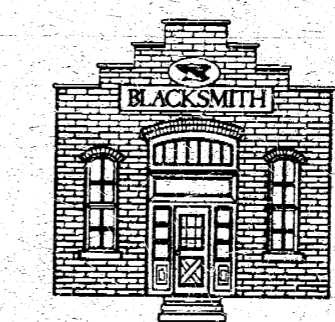

John Bunting Found

We received word yesterday noon that the body of John Bunting, of Franklin, the man who attempted to shoot his mother-in-law and his neighbors, and whom it is supposed burned Cromwell Eddy's barns, on the night of the 10th, was found in the forenoon by his son, who was reaping grain on his farm. His attention was attracted by a fearful stench and on investigating the cause he was horrified to find the fast decaying remains of his father. It was a westerly course from his late residence in a low place in the woods on G.W. Allen's farm and back of Mrs. Pawson's. It was partially concealed by the tall grass, etc., and was lying on the left side the right hand thrown across the body, and a revolver lay as though it had slipped from the hand.

Word flew from mouth to mouth, and soon the roads were filled with teams bringing people from every direction. The officers at Adrian were notified, and a post mortem held, and it was decided that he came to his death by his own hand, a bullet mark having been found near his right temple.

Owing to the high state of putrefaction, the body having been dead already 14 days, the flesh fell from the bone and it could scarcely be recognized, except by the clothes. When being rolled into a blanket the head and one arm became detached from the body. It was buried at night in the cemetery at Clinton. General satisfaction was expressed by the people at the result, and now that the mystery is cleared up the people can retire at night as of old in the full confidence of peaceful slumbers, so far as John Bunting is concerned.

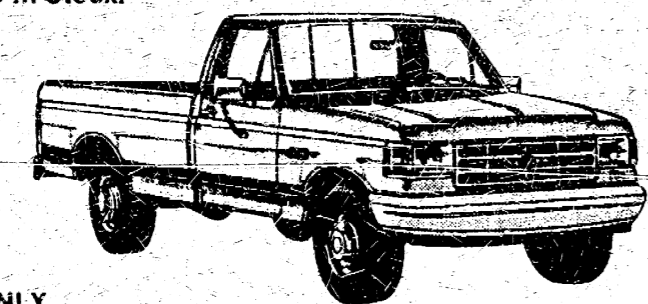
