








## Conservation District Annual Meeting

William Fishbeck, Chairman of the Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District announces the 40th District Annual Meeting to be held Wednesday, February 1, 1989, 8:00 p.m. at the Freedom Township Hall, 11508 Pleasant Lake Road, at Pleasant Lake.

Agriculture and Water Quality will be the feature program for the meeting. The program will include Dr. Ted Loudon, MSU, Agricultural Engineering Department and Michigan Energy Conservation Program Project Leader, plus a video presentation, "Agriculture and Groundwater Contamination: Exploring the issues", produced by MSU Cooperative Extension Service.

An election of two District Directors will be conducted at the meeting. Candidates for the director positions include: Grant Beeman, Lyndon Township; William Fishbeck, Superior Township; Dennis Huehl, Freedom Township; and, Stephen Soloweznik, Lodi Township. The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three-year terms. All occupiers of three or more acres of land within Washtenaw County are eligible to vote in the director election.

Other features of the Annual Meeting include award presentations, drawings for door prizes donated by area businesses and refreshments following the meeting. There is no charge for attending the meeting.

## Murderous Assault By A Highwayman

Manchester Enterprise December 2, 1875

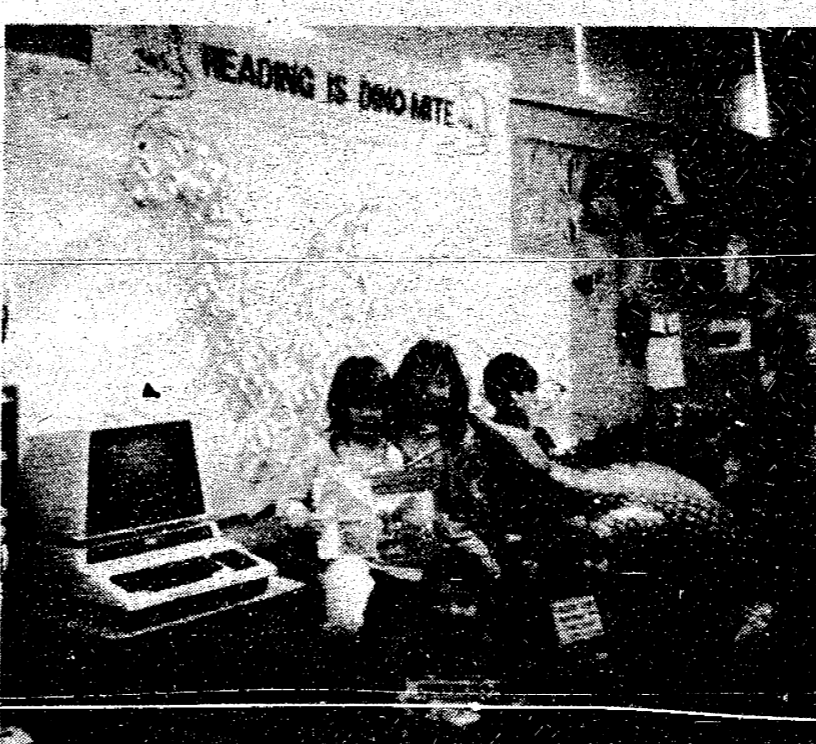
Mr. Freeman, the victim of the following outrage, the particulars of which are taken from the Elmira (N.Y.) Gazette, is a brother of Wm. and Frank Freeman of this town, and formerly owned the farm now occupied by Wm. H. Palmer. He also kept the Manchester Hotel for several years.

"We have learned the following fuller particulars of the desperate attack made on Mr. Freeman of Southport, on Sunday evening. He was on his way to church, and the place where he was stopped by the man was between John D. Miller's and the lower toll-gate on the plank road. His money or his life was demanded. Freeman said he had no money, he was going to church. The man then shot him in the mouth, and as Freeman was falling to the ground, the second shot again, but the ball failed of its murderous purpose. Freeman, although badly wounded, resisted with a heavy cane an attempt to rob him, and the man ran off, jumping over a fence and taking across the fields. Mr. Wm. D. Ingersoll was going to church from Mr. J. G. Copley's, and met the wounded old gentleman trying to get home to Southport Corners. Mr. Ingersoll turned and helped him home afterwards coming to the city after Dr. Henry Flood, who immediately went to the aid of the injured man. Freeman's lower jaw is shattered. All attempts to find the ball have so far failed. The wounds are very severe and painful, but are not believed to be fatal. The outrage causes deep excitement in the neighborhood and throughout the city. The murderous deed, so boldly committed, has aroused public attention to the startling frequency of such occurrences and the peril of human life by the desperate criminals swarming the country under the guise of 'tramps,' a most reckless and dangerous class which is rapidly increasing and preying upon every community, perpetrating crimes of the vilest character, such as the attempted murder on Sunday night, of an honest and peaceable citizen of Southport. The great evil of the times is the 'tramp nuisance' - and the great question is how can the people protect themselves against this alarming curse?"

#### Traffic Advisory

Motorists using I-94 westbound will be detoured between Willow Run Airport (exit 186) and US-12 (exit 185) in Ypsilanti beginning January 17, the Michigan Department of Transportation said today.

The detour is necessary because of US-12 bridge construction over I-94 east of Harris Road. Traffic will exit I-94 from Willow Run Airport exit, travel north on Wiard Road, a four-lane divided highway, then take US-12 westbound, back to I-94.

The signed detour will add approximately two miles to the travel distance. Work is scheduled for completion by early February.

Argersinger-Morse Construction Co. of Ann Arbor won the bridge construction project with a low bid of \$2,474,494. Once completed, the bridge will carry US-12 traffic over I-94.

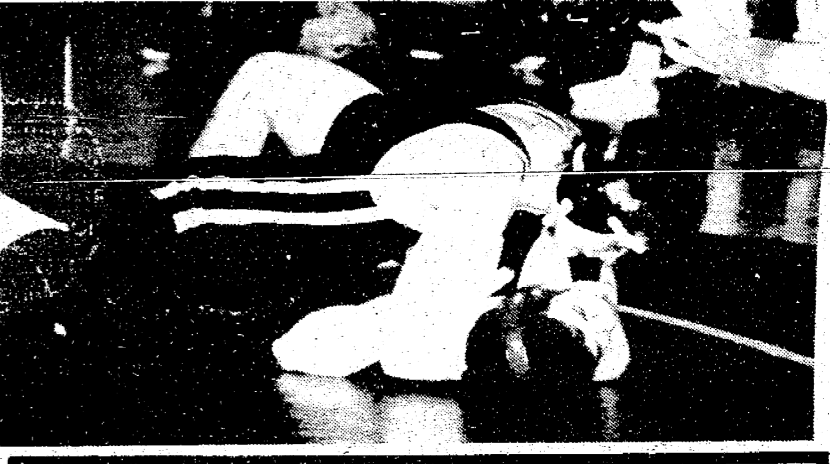

### Farm Bureau Supports Retaliation

Farm Bureau supports U.S. retaliation in the form of 100% tariffs on some imported products from the European Community if the EC proceeds to ban imports of U.S. beef on Jan. 1.

"The EC's unjustified decision to ban the use of all hormones in livestock, and its refusal to allow a GATT dispute settlement panel of scientists to rule on the validity of the ban, left the U.S. with no alternative but to retaliate," said Jack Laurie, president of the Michigan Farm Bureau.

The list of products imported from the EC against which the U.S. will retaliate includes fresh, chilled or frozen boneless beef, processed pork hams and shoulders, processed tomato products (except paste), instant coffee, certain fermented alcoholic beverages (not including wine and beer), some fruit juices and grain-based pet foods. The selection of products is intended to cover approximately \$100 million worth of EC exports, equivalent to the estimated U.S. trade loss resulting from the EC's action against meat.

The EC has threatened to counter-retaliate against additional U.S. exports. "That would be totally uncalled for and would likely precipitate a major trade war," Laurie said. "The U.S. retaliation simply balances the ledger, and our view is that the two sides should sit down immediately after the first of the year to attempt to find ways to re-open the markets for all of the affected products."

### Agriculture's Annual Check-up

It's almost time for agriculture's annual check-up, the Farm Costs and Returns survey, which the U.S. Department of Agriculture will conduct from Feb. 13 through March 31. Among the 26,000 farmers and ranchers interviewed during that period will be over 700 Michigan farmers.

"The USDA calls it 'taking the pulse of agriculture,'" said Bob Craig, agricultural economist for the Michigan Farm Bureau. "They do it every year, like the regular physical examination recommended by your family doctor. The difference is that the Agriculture Department focuses on the financial health of the nation's farmers and it conducts the annual checkup through a major survey."

Craig said that the upcoming survey could be the most important one to date.

"Agriculture has just been through a severe drought, and federal lawmakers will soon be considering farm policy proposals to take effect when the current farm bill expires in 1990," he said.

"The upcoming survey will provide answers to such questions as - did the drought affect the farm financial recovery that was evident in 1987? What impact did

the drought assistance program have? Did production practices change because of the drought? Until we have this actual data from farmers, the answers to many of these questions will be incomplete."

The results of the survey will be available this summer, in time for early deliberations of the 1990 farm bill. Survey findings are distributed to Congressmen, farm organizations, extension agents, farm management consultants, agricultural lenders and businesses that supply inputs to farmers. "This Farm Costs and Returns survey is a way for farmers to let lawmakers and the voting public know what it costs to produce the nation's food and fiber," Craig said.

Farmers participating in the survey receive a summary of survey results and a guarantee of confidentiality.

### Praises AG Secretary Choice

Michigan Farm Bureau President Jack Laurie called the selection of Clayton Yeutter as agriculture secretary for the Bush administration, a "very good" choice. "Clayton has a solid background in agriculture plus several years of invaluable ex-

perience in agricultural trade issues," said Laurie. "He is an ideal choice for the issues we are facing, such as the upcoming budget debate, world trade talks and the 1990 farm bill debate. All of these matters are tied together and each will have an important bearing in the next few years."

The farm leader said Yeutter was one of several excellent candidates for the job. "He believes in a market-oriented agriculture and strong competitive export policies. His choice will send a clear message to other countries that President-elect Bush views agricultural trade matters with the utmost importance," said Laurie.

During his campaign, Bush said he wanted the next economic summit of the seven leading industrialized nations, set for this July, to concentrate on agriculture. Yeutter, not his replacement as U.S. trade representative Carla Hills, may be called upon to lead the July trade talks.

Yeutter will also be responsible for conveying the Bush administration's views to Congress as lawmakers rewrite U.S. farm program policies. "He is articulate and well-informed on the issues facing American Farmers today. His selection will be well received in the farm community. He should also enjoy a good relationship with Democratic and Republican members of Congress," Laurie added.

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### Grape Meddling Has High Price

The support of the boycott against California table grapes announced by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors may come at a very high price indeed. Not only has the 3.7 million-member American Farm Bureau Federation dumped San Francisco as a future convention site, but a number of other agricultural organizations are doing the same. Among groups likely to ban San Francisco as a convention and meeting site are the United Fresh Fruit & Vegetable Association, the Produce Marketing Association, Western Growers Association and the California Grape and Tree Fruit League.

The gap in the city's convention revenue could add up to \$600 million over the next couple of years.



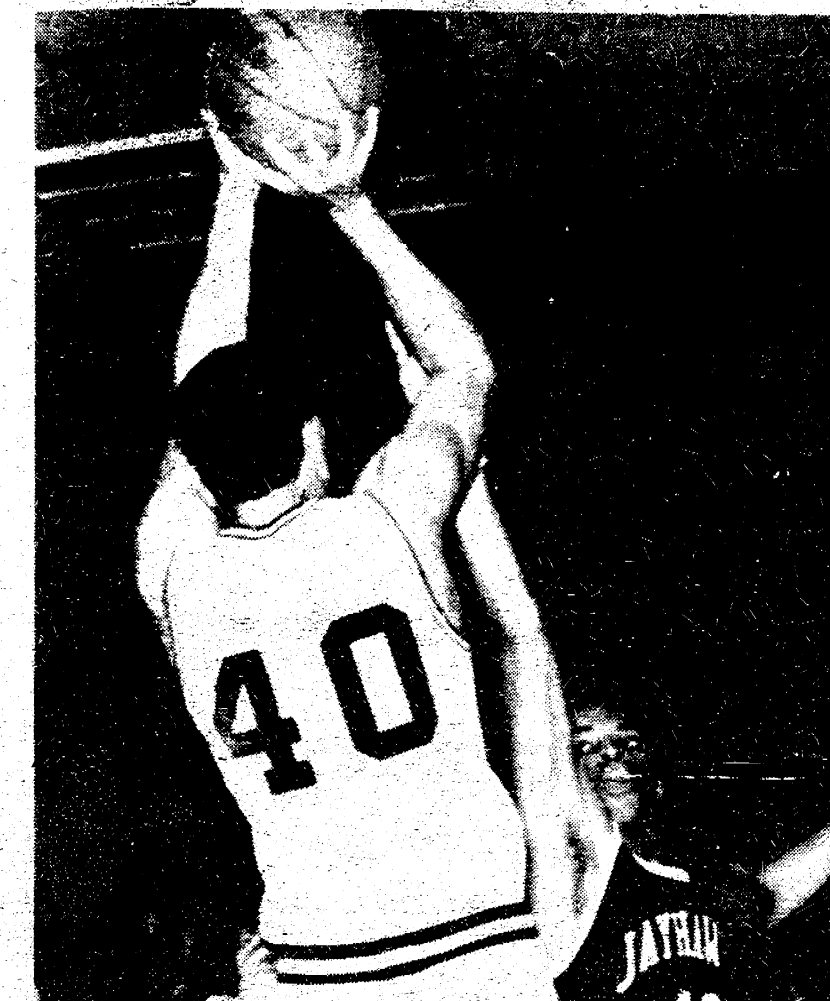

Smokers in Minnesota, for example, paid more than \$202 million in federal and state tobacco excise taxes in 1986—more than the state spent on natural resources, including agriculture, fish and game, and forestry. That same year, New York smokers paid nearly three times more in excise taxes than their state spent on police protection.

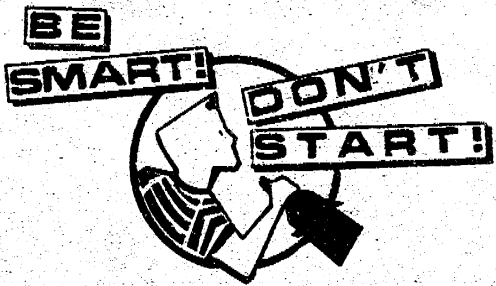

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON YOUR 1988 TAXES.

The countdown to April 15 has begun. Over the coming weeks, millions of Americans will be puzzling over tax questions. To help you get a fix on your tax situation, the Michigan Association of CPAs has supplied the answers to some of the most commonly asked questions on 1988 taxes.  
**Have the tax rules really changed since last year?**

Yes. Remember, last year served as a transition between tax systems. In 1988, several tax reform rules become fully effective for the first time, while others continue to phase in. In addition, this year's tax rates have changed.

### What are the new tax rates?

Basically, there are two tax brackets for 1988: 15 percent and 28 percent. However, the benefit of the 15 percent bracket phases out for single taxpayers earning \$43,150 to \$89,560 and married taxpayers earning \$71,900 to

\$149,250. These individuals pay a 5 percent surtax-making their top tax rate 33 percent.  
**Has the personal exemption increased?**

Yes. In 1988, the personal exemption increases by \$50 to \$1,950. One note of caution: If you can claim an exemption for your child or any dependent, that person may not claim his or her own exemption.

**I don't itemize. How much can I claim as a standard deduction on my 1988 tax return?**

For married couples filing jointly, the standard deduction is now \$5,000. Single taxpayers can deduct \$3,000 and heads of household may claim a deduction of \$4,400.

**Does the standard deduction increase for taxpayers who are either blind or age 65 or older?**

Yes. These taxpayers are entitled to an extra standard deduction of \$600 each if married, and \$750 if single. The amount doubles for anyone who is both elderly and blind.

**How do I know whether it pays to**

itemize on my tax return?

Itemizing may lower your tax bill-or win you a bigger refund. In either case, a simple test can help you make the right decision. Add up your itemized expenses. If they total more than your standard deduction, you should probably itemize.

**Can I still make and deduct IRA contributions?**

As long as you (and your spouse) do not actively participate in an employer-sponsored retirement plan, you are still entitled to the full IRA deduction.  
**What happens if I do participate in a retirement plan?**

If you (or your spouse) participate in a retirement plan, you may still be able to deduct all or part of your IRA contribution. Married couples with an adjusted gross income (AGI) of \$40,000, or less and single taxpayers with an AGI of \$25,000 or less may take the full deduction. For every \$1,000 in income over these ceilings, however, the deduction decreases by \$200. So, if you're married and earn at least \$50,000,

you lose the deduction completely. Can I make a nondeductible IRA contribution?

Yes, but you will have to inform the IRS by attaching Form 8806 to your federal tax return. To ensure that your after-tax contributions are not taxed again at withdrawal, you should also keep a personal record of all nondeductible contributions made between now and the time you receive the entire sum of your IRA funds-in other words, for life.  
**What are the rules for deducting miscellaneous and medical expenses?** Miscellaneous expenses are deductible to the extent that they exceed two percent of your adjusted gross income. Unreimbursed medical expenses are deductible to the extent that they exceed 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income.

**Has tax reform totally eliminated the deduction for personal interest charged on credit cards and personal loans?**

Yes, but the deduction is being phased out gradually. In 1988, only 40 percent is deductible. The deduction falls to 20 percent in

1989, 10 percent in 1990, and to zero in 1991.

**Is the deduction for mortgage interest being phased out as well?**  
 No. Home mortgage interest is deductible on loans of up to \$1 million as long as the funds are used to purchase or substantially improve a primary or secondary home. Interest is also deductible on home equity loans of up to \$100,000.

**Are state and local sales tax deductible?**

No. Tax reform has eliminated the deduction for both state and local sales tax. On the other hand, real estate, property, and state and local income tax remain deductible.

**I donated a little over \$500 to several nonprofit organizations. Can I still deduct these charitable contributions?**

Only if you itemize on your tax return. And don't forget that if you give more than \$500 in non-cash property such as furniture or clothing, you have to file Form 8283.

**My 13-year old daughter earned \$1,200 interest on her savings account. Will she have to file a tax return?**

Yes. Any dependent child who has a gross income over \$500 must file a return. The only exemption is when a child has earned income, such as a paper route salary, of up to \$3,000 and absolutely no unearned income, such as interest or dividends.

**How will her income be taxed?**  
 Under tax reform, children under 14 may reduce their unearned income by up to \$500 of their standard deduction. The next \$500 is taxed at the child's rate, with any additional unearned income taxed at the parents' highest marginal tax rate.

**Will my 17-year old be taxed the same way?**  
 No. Dependent children over age 18 are subject to their own income tax rates.

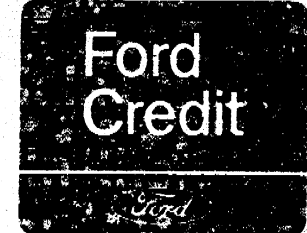

### Farmers May Prevent Foreclosure

Even though delinquent loan notices are being sent by certified mail to nearly 1,800 Michigan farmers by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the farmers may be able to save the family farm by acting quickly, according to Dr. Paul E. Kindinger, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"I urge Michigan farmers to respond to FmHA within 45 days and attempt to settle their debts or work out new financial arrangements," Kindinger said. "It is imperative that farmers take fast action as soon as they receive this Notice of Availability of Loan Service Programs for Delinquent Farm Borrowers from FmHA," Kindinger said. "If they do not take the notice seriously, they run a risk of losing their future farm financing options through the Loan Service and Preservation Loan programs."

The notice will say: "This is to inform you that you're seriously behind in your loan payments and to inform you of your options. Farmers who are more than 180 days late in making payments have several options." Details of the options, including debt restructuring, the write off, will be provided in the mailing.

Should a farmer fail to answer the notice within 45 days of receipt, his or her loan will be accelerated. Those who choose to answer the notice must complete the nine forms contained in the mailing and use them to convince FmHA that he or she should be allowed to continue farming.

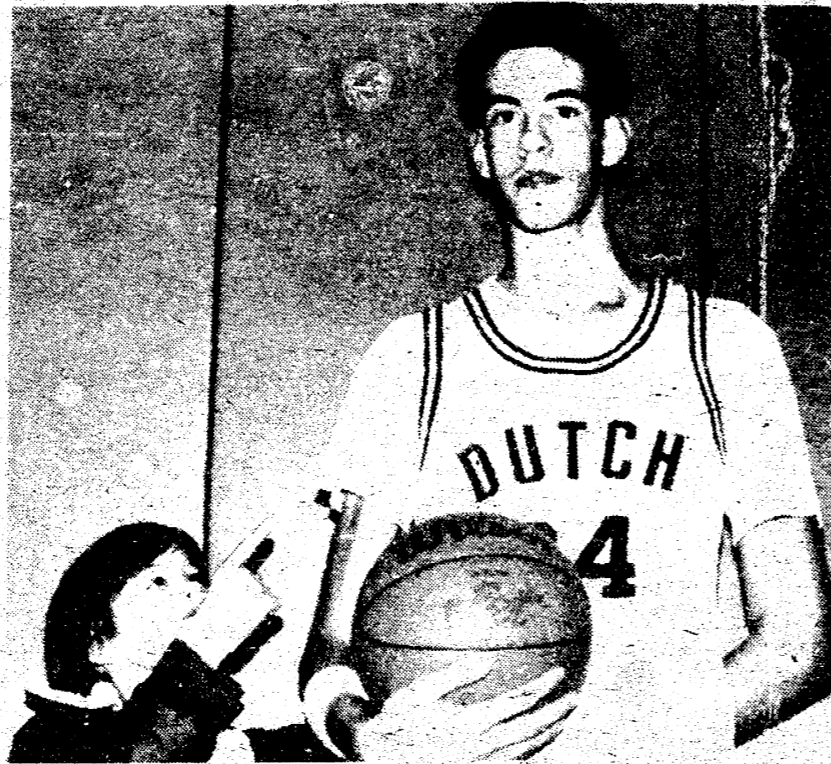

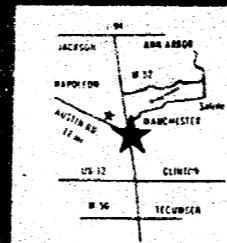

Manchester High School Agriculture teacher Joni DeBell has been awarded a grant for a Poultry Production project from the Michigan Department of Education.

Teacher mini-grants were initiated four years ago in an effort to encourage creative projects, while at the same time eliminating much of the bureaucracy involved with typical grants. Ms. DeBell is the first teacher from Manchester to be awarded such a grant.

The project involves poultry production from incubation to market with five different disciplines being covered: nutrition, management, economics, genetics and food science. Ms. DeBell's proposed instructional approach focuses on the technical knowledge gained from hands-on ex-

perience as well as developing student self-esteem and confidence while instilling a sense of pride in themselves and the school.

The grant total of \$430.00 has been provided from the State Vocational Education fund for an incubator, candler, floor brooder, and miscellaneous materials. None of these funds are available for salaries.

A total of 2,141 Teacher Mini-Grant applications were received by the Department of Education, but limited grant funds make it impossible to fund many projects.
