Farmers May Prevent Foreclosure

Even though delinquent loan notices are being sent by certified mail to nearly 1,800 Michigan farmers by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the farmers may be able to save the family farm by acting quickly, according to Dr. Paul E. Kindinger, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"I urge Michigan farmers to respond to FmHA within 45 days and attempt to settle their debts or work out new financial arrangements," Kindinger said.

"It is imperative that farmers take fast action as soon as they receive this 'Notice of Availability of Loan Service Programs for Delinquent Farm Borrowers from FmHA'," Kindinger said. "If they do not take the notice seriously, they run a risk of losing their future farm financing options through the Loan Service and Preservation Loan programs."

The notice will say: "This is to inform you that you're seriously behind in your loan payments and to inform you of your options. Farmers who are more than 180 days late in making payments have several options.

Details of the options, including debt restructuring the write offs, will be provided in the mailing.

Should a farmer fail to answer the notice within 45 days of receipt, his or her loan will be accelerated. Those who choose to answer the notice must complete the nine forms contained in the mailing and use them to convince FmHA that he or she should be allowed to continue farming.

A Higher Standard Deduction

First of all, if you are at least age 65 (or blind) and do not itemize on your tax return, you qualify for an extra standard deduction. For married individuals filing jointly, the 1988 standard deduction is \$5,000 plus an additional deduction of \$600 per qualified spouse. For single taxpayers, the standard deduction is \$3,000 plus an extra \$750. The additional deduction doubles for anyone who is both elderly and

Tax Credit for the Elderly or Permanently Disabled

Elderly taxpayers with a low annual income may also qualify for an special tax credit-worth as much as \$750 for single indivi-

If you are an older American, total disability may likewise qual- couples who file separately.

The credit is based on taxpayer's income, filing status, ceeding \$17,500 or married, filing jointly with a combined AGI over \$25,000, you are ineligible for the credit. Similarly, you can be disqualified if your nontaxable Social Security or pension bene-

fits exceed certain limits.

For those who do qualify, be warned. Figuring the amount of the credit requires a sharp pencil or trusty calculator. To summarize, the tax credit is 15 percent of a "base amount," minus any nontaxable pension benefits you receive (including Social Security) and one-half of any adjusted gross income exceeding \$7,500 if single or \$10,000 if married. For 1988, the base amount is \$5,000 for qualified single taxpayers, heads of household or qualifying widow or widowers; \$5,000 for married

Handling Lump-Sum Distribu-

When it comes to costly mistakes, few are greater then mishandling a lump-sum distribution from your employer's retirement plan. Unfortunately, tax reform has not made this task any

If you were not at least age 50 before January 1, 1986 and you receive a lump-sum distribution before age 59½, you have only two choices: pay taxes on the distribution or roll the funds over into an IRA or other qualified retirement plan. On the other hand, if you were at least age 50 before January 1, 1986, and you participated in your employer's retirement plan for a minimum of five years, your options generally include a tax-free rollover, fiveyear averaging at 1988 rates or

ten-year averaging at 1986 rates. The Michigan Association of CPAs points out that averaging does not mean that the lump-sum distribution and its taxation is spread out over a five- or ten-year period. Instead, you pay five or ten times the tax (at single rates) on one-fifth or one-tenth of the amount of the distribution in the year in which you received it. Whichever method you choose, your decision is final.
