Proposed Sales Tax Increase Will Be Dedicated To School Aid Fund

On November 7, voters can choose between two proposals to raise the state sales tax either a half cent or two cents in order to dedicate more money to K-12 education. If both proposals gain a majority of votes, the one with the most votes becomes the law. If the voters say no to both proposals, the state's sales tax rate, and school financing system would not change.

Amendment A would increase the sales tax from 4 cents to 4.5 cents. This increase would generate an additional \$400 million for schools, including a proposed \$115 million for specific quality programs. This would also include an additional \$981 per student in the first year, with no obligation for wealthy districts to share their property tax base. Amendment A will constitu

tionally dedicate all revenues generated by the ½ cent sales tax increase to the School Aid Fund. This includes the net profits and interest earnings of the State Lotterv. Under the current law, except for 60% of the sales tax collections, current School Aid Fund revenues are statutorily dedicated. What this means is that at any time the Legislature could change the amount that goes towards the School Aid Fund. If Amendment A were to crease in calendar year 1990. It pass it would prevent the Legis- would also increase new money lative from statutorily changing for schools in 1990 by \$237 million.

the amount allocated to schools.

Under Amendment A the School Aid Fund would also receive 25% of non-auto sales tax collections at the existing 4% rate and 5% of the existing use tax collections. This would generate an estimated \$529 million in FY 1989-90 plus \$301 million from the increase in the sales and use tax. The sales and use tax increase would generate \$421 million not including the money from the existing tax collections which amounts to \$562 million in FY 1990-91. The total increase in the School Aid Fund revenues in FY 1989-90 would be \$837 million and \$990 million in FY 1990-91.

Amendment B would increase the sales tax to 6 cents and also provide property tax relief for residential and business property owners. During the first year the district would receive an increase of \$250-\$350 per student. It would vield \$468 million more each year for public schools, none of which would be set aside for specific quality measures.

The existing annual GF/GF appropriation for K-12 schools would be replaced with a dedication of 54% of the existing 4% use tax and 25% of the existing non-auto sales tax collections. This amendment would lead to a projected \$195 million tax in-
