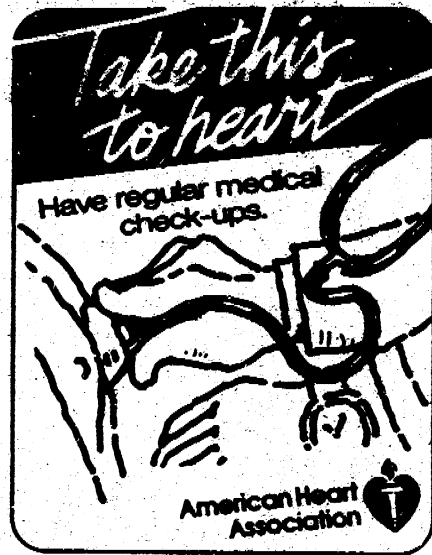

## Business and Religion

"Red Ink," in Fabrics, Fancy Goods and Notions has this to say in answer to the question as to whether a man could be a thorough Christian and also a successful businessman. If there was any harmony between business and christianity?

I answered with hesitancy, yes, and I believe there are some Christian business men, but like the dodo they are very scarce. To quote a newspaper paragraph, "There are lots of people who mix their religion with business, but forget to stir it up well. The business invariably rises to the top as a result." A superior quality of Sunday religion, but of no earthly account in the store or office.

The business man has many temptations, so has everybody for that matter, but the temptation is so much more where dollars and cents are concerned. What an enormous temptation it is to lie when a little lie will sell a bill of goods.

Many a man who would under no circumstances lie, will stretch the truth to the furthest limit, and an eighth of an inch more would

snap the truth and behold a lie. This border line of falsehood has its counterpart in the man who never gets drunk, but is forever "just a little pleasant."

You have some "staying goods," nothing will move them, you have tried everything, compound cathartics and so on, but they defy all your efforts, they are a well defined case of chronic constipation. Now comes the stock-taking and you do not want to carry them over, and it really is too bad, so try again to devise some way of disposing those goods that stick closer than a brother, but alas! everything has been tried and has failed, just at this moment when you are about to give them away as a sort of tea store chromo, your partner comes along. Good, kindly christian gentleman, just built a church, and only last month, sent the Rev. Dr. Longwind to Europe for his health. This partner is all right and really he would not do anything wrong, but, business takes up so much of his time that he cannot find time to go into the nice distinctions between right and wrong.

"Take a lot of this goods," says this partner, "and put them on the two ends of the counter, with the old goods in the centre, and then distribute some of the old goods among the new ones, and then if you put up a sign or two, latest importation, I guess that will boom them along."

It may sell the goods and often succeeds, but it does not need my word to say it is wrong. The merchant may feel easy in his mind about the transaction because he has become familiar with such tricks, his buyers and salesmen know him well, and though he may be a christian, he is a poor specimen, and his actions give christianity a black eye.

Somebody in a recent speech has exposed the sentiment that high wages and christianity go hand in hand. He is right. He is a poor christian who, although he may be a good and shrewd business man cuts his employees' wages down to the last farthing.

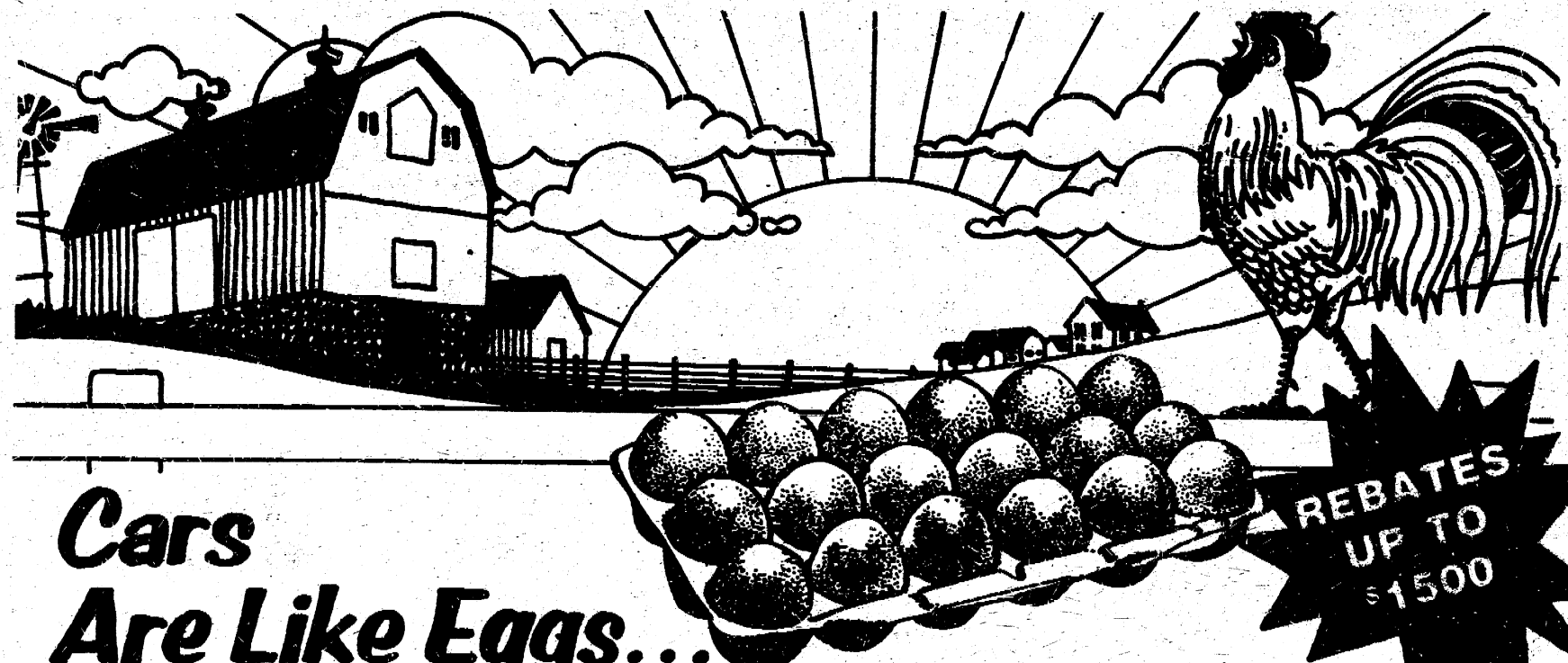

## Proposed Sales Tax Increase Will Be Dedicated To School Aid Fund

On November 7, voters can choose between two proposals to raise the state sales tax either a half cent or two cents in order to dedicate more money to K-12 education. If both proposals gain a majority of votes, the one with the most votes becomes the law. If the voters say no to both proposals, the state's sales tax rate, and school financing system would not change.

Amendment A would increase the sales tax from 4 cents to 4.5 cents. This increase would generate an additional \$400 million for schools, including a proposed \$115 million for specific quality programs. This would also include an additional \$981 per student in the first year, with no obligation for wealthy districts to share their property tax base.

Amendment B would increase the sales tax to 6 cents and also provide property tax relief for residential and business property owners. During the first year the district would receive an increase of \$250-\$350 per student. It would yield \$468 million more each year for public schools, none of which would be set aside for specific quality measures.

The existing annual GF/GP appropriation for K-12 schools would be replaced with a dedication of 54% of the existing non-auto sales tax collections. This amendment would lead to a projected \$195 million tax increase in calendar year 1990. It would also increase new money for schools in 1990 by \$237 million.

# Leaf Identification 1989

Do leaves have you stumped? Help is available! Every year the fall season brings the assignment of leaf collections for many classes and scouting groups. The University of Michigan Matthaei Botanical Gardens Docents is offering help with identification of already collected leaves from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on Sundays, September 24, October 1 and October 8.

To facilitate the process, students are asked to attempt to identify their leaves before coming to the Gardens and to indicate what they think the leaf is. Notes

with the following information are also helpful: Type of plant (tree or shrub or vine); age of plant (young or mature); arrangement of leaves on twig; type of leaf (simple or compound); color or characteristics of the bark; characteristics of fruit, if present; characteristics of the buds; habitat (where the plant is growing).

Tree identification guidebooks and pressed, identified leaves will be available for comparison and use while at the Gardens.

Students should be aware that many of the trees and shrubs

found in residential areas are horticultural varieties or exotic species which are not easily identified with the commonly available guides to trees and shrubs.

Please remember that the Docents are volunteers at the Gardens, not experts in the subject; but, they are interested and willing to help as much as possible.

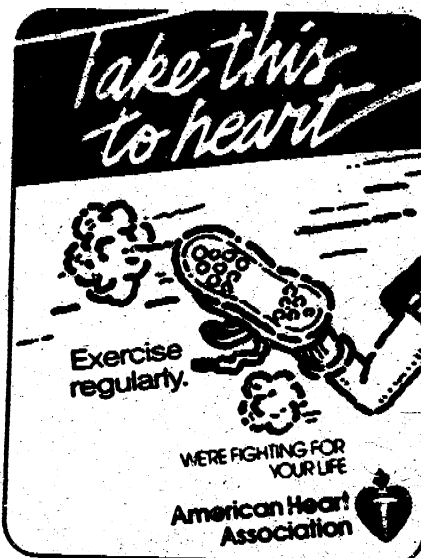

## Railroad Inspection

Manchester Enterprise  
February 24, 1887

The regular Sunday freight train on the Jackson branch of the Lake Shore Ry., under charge of Conductor Stout, drew a special car containing Mr. W. E. Beals, assistant in Supt. Worcester's office in Detroit, who had come over the line to inspect the employees in hearing, sight and color blindness. He was a pleasant gentleman and the boys all liked his appearance.

Railroad companies have found out that it is of great importance that men in their employ should be pretty good judges of colors, also that they should be able to see and hear, as often the lives of many people and the safety of much property depends upon the actions of a single man. This is why these examinations are held and if a man passes one he is given a certificate, but should he fail in many points we have no doubt that the company would try to fill his place with a better man.

Each employee is admitted to the car singly and examined in private. As a test in colors he is given a stick on which many different colors are painted and after picking out the red, white and green, he is told to match, say the green, with as many shades as he can find, worsted yarn of all shades being handed him for the purpose. This done he is placed at

one end of the car while, the inspector crouches behind a counter at the opposite end, quickly flits out red, green and white flags or raises globes or lanterns of the same colors, dropping them quickly and compelling the employee to tell what color they are. He also selects some object, as a house in the distance, and questions him regarding the color, number of windows and of glass in same, testing each eye separately and both together.

He also has a contrivance for testing short-sightedness and it is often found that a man can see distinctly at long or short range, but at an immediate point he cannot see objects, especially letters or figures, well enough to tell what they are.

In hearing he first speaks in his natural tone of voice gradually letting it fall while keeping up the questioning.

We learn that some of the men could not tell green from red but they may have been pretty correct in other things.

No certificates have been received here yet and some of the boys are "on the ragged edge," as it were, fearing that they may lose their jobs. We hope that they will not, but the company seems determined to improve their service and make travelers and shippers feel perfect safety in entrusting their lives or goods to their keeping.

Also in the works for the upcoming year are projects such as revising and updating the information brochure about Manchester as well as the Village walking tour brochure.

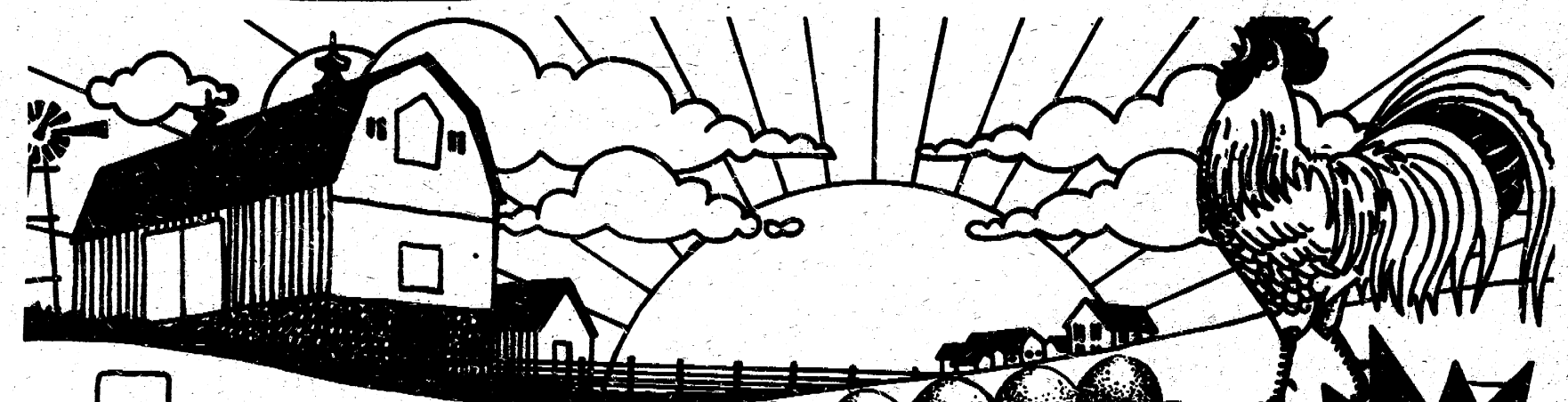
Downtown improvements like additional Christmas decorations and banners from light poles are also being considered and put on a "time-line" for implementation.

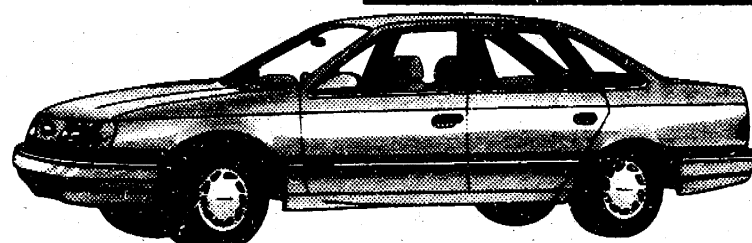
